Sanibel Rescue Reports

American Red Cross Advanced First Aid certificates were presented to two new members of the Sanibel Rescue Squad upon completion of sixteen-week courses; Tom Schnabel and Ray Davis.

Eight-week refresher courses and re-certification were presented to Mary Holtz, Alan Nave, Preston Woodring and Chuck Nave. Mary Holtz, R.N., was the instructor and followed the new comprehensive format as used in similar courses at Ediston College including the full gamut of first-aid procedures. The other active members of the Sanibel Rescue are Jerry Muench, Ralph Woodring, Phil Verdung and Jeff Woodring. The Sanibel Rescue has responded to over fifty emergency rescue calls since January 1st of this year. Needless to say, this represents some of the finest and most devoted volunteer work performed on the islands, that of trying to save human lives and care for the injured. The cooperation of the residents, as well as visitors, is asked to call the Sanibel Rescue only in cases of EMERGENCY-RESCUE. In all other cases, call the Lee County Ambulance by telephoning 334-2494.

All calls to the Sanibel Fire and Rescue during the hours of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. should be reported on 472-1414. If no answer then use 472-1717. All calls before 8 a.m. and after 4 p.m. report on 472-1717. This is the emergency phone number and to be used only in an emergency.

All fire calls west of Wulfert Road should be reported to Captiva Fire Dept. on 472-1313 at all times.

All calls for the Sheriff's office should be reported on 472-1711. If no answer, call Fort Myers Beach on 463-6163.

The Lee County Ambulance number is 1-334-2494.

These important phone numbers should be kept as close to your telephone as possible. By cialing the correct number the first time it will save precious minutes in dispatching the Rescue or Fire Units. These precious minutes could save your own life.

Also when reporting an emergency try to keep your cool and be specific in pin pointing the emergency. If possible meet the unit on the road. At night a moving flashlight does wonders when you see the Rescue Unit coming.

Also when you see the blinking lights and hear the horn blowing on private vehicles these are not "nuts on a joy ride." They are volunteer fire and rescue men on their way to an emergency. Please cooperate by pulling your car off the road as soon as possible so they can pass you safely. Any vehicle doing this other than authorized vehicles are subject to fines and even jail sentences.

We would also like to make it clear that we are not an ambulance service. Any one that can be taken to the doctor or hospital either by car or Lee County Ambulance should be taken in this manner. This leaves our unit for some one that may need it much more. If everyone cooperates it will help make Sanibel and Captiva healthier and safer islands to live on.
