## That Pier Will Appear

At least, that's the news from Ralph Woodring and Don Case, of the Sanibel-Captiva Chamber of Commerce Committee heading up the Pier Fund.

'We actually hope to have the pier built and in operation by next January 1," said Woodring. "The plans for it are already in the office of the Lee County Engineer, M. M. Cornwell, Jr., and will soon be ready for bids. The pier will be built on Lighthouse Point and will be 112 feet long; 108 feet will be 12 feet wide and 54 feet, 8 feet wide.

"Cost of the pier is estimated at \$20,000 of which Lee County will pay \$10,000 and the Sanibel-Captiva Chamber and residents will pay the other half. We urge every one here to make a donation. Already the Chamber of Commerce has \$5,000 in the bank and we have \$3,000 more in pledges for the pier fund.

"Oh, and in regard to pier, it will also have handrails along the whole extent for safer use.'

At the Sept. 5 meeting of the County Commission, action was halted on the petition to make a 147 unit addition to a Sanibel motel after a huge protest from many Sanibel and Captiva residents and business people.

**Commission Stalls Action** 

Zoning for the addition to the Shalimar Motel on a 61/2 acre tract near the Bailey Sanctuary just north of Gulf Drive, was deferred by Lee County Commissioners Tuesday to await the findings of a year-long development study on the island's development trends.

Rufus M. Dodrill Jr., owner of the Shalimar and petitioner for the zoning change from a general use to multiple family residential which permits motels, said the 147 units in the addition would provide a density ratio of 21.9 units per acre, just under the county recommended density of 22 units.


A large group of Sanibel opponents of the addition were at the meeting to oppose the rezoning and many more had written letters, sent telegrams and


purchased advertising to oppose the rezoning.

After the first Zoning Board meeting, the Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board had asked the owner to defer his request until he could meet with the Planning Board and explore the possibility of developing mutually acceptable plans. However he refused.

Those opposing the expansion said that apartment and motel zoning in this area would dangerously increase the high density area and that each downgrading of zoning tends to set a pattern making further changes more easily approved.

Another reason against the new building was that it would increase the difficulties the Island Water Association is now facing; also it would help add to the highway congestion, already bad in the tourist season. Over 50 leading residents on the Island protested the zoning change.

## TOO LATE TO CLASSIFY by Russell Kay

You would probably be startled and indignant if somebody called you a slumlord. But you are just that if you happen to be an American taxpayer, for the U. S. Government probably owns more slum property than anyone else.

There used to be a time when "Landlord" was a dirty word. Now, in major cities, landlords have been going out of business so fast it isn't funny.

During the last few years owners have abandoned 105,000 housing units in New York City alone, or enough to house the population of Newark, N.J., if they were occupied.

It is no longer profitable to try and maintain rental property in most metropolitan slum areas. In fact, you can build new housing from the ground up cheaper than you can rehabilitate the old structures.

For example, a 36 apartment building in Boston which was structurally sound was purchased by an investor who borrowed \$456,000 from the Federal government to make it habitable again. It was a sad experience. Since he renovated the building insurance rates have doubled, heating costs have risen 60% and taxes have gone up 30%. Rental rates sufficient to meet actual operating costs are beyond the means of underprivileged families. The owner can either default on his mortgage, walk away leaving the white elephant to Uncle Sam, or continue to operate and lost his shirt.

Today in all major cities we find block after block of abandoned buildings suitable for housing that are ghost towns in the middle of the city. Rat infested with broken windows, they serve as temporary shelter for junkies. Many have been destroyed by fire of unknown origin.

People in dire need of housing are afraid to rent in certain areas. Vandalism and crime run rampant. Tenants, particularly the elderly, are mugged. Rooms and apartments are entered and everything of value is taken.

It appears that none of the government's programs to provide low cost housing have met with success. Bright young bureaucrats of the numerous agencies set up to solve the problem have only developed more problems and more red tape.


What has happened, housing experts agree, is that the private housing market can no longer afford to shelter the poor. Labor costs have risen steadily. No landlord can meet the costs of providing hot water,, heat and other services. They throw up their hands and walk away while the luckless tenants follow them hoping that, some how, some way, their problem will be solved by government housing agencies.

In the meantime we continue to conduct costly surveys, investigations and hearings to no avail. Millions of federal funds go down the drain and we are no where nearer the answer. Congress studies and ponders but can't find an intelligent, workable answer. It is a pitiful situation that promises to get worse before it gets better.






