Wisher to Address Community Assoc.

Mrs. Lavon Wisher, newly appointed Administrative Assistant for Lee County will address the next meeting of the Sanibel Community Association dinner meeting Tuesday, October 3.

The subject of Mrs. Wisher's talk will be "How the New Organizational Set-Up for Lee County will Effect the Objectives and Problems Facing Both Sanibel and Captive"

Some of the subjects Lavon Wisher will touch on have to do with Flood Insurance, Sewerage Disposal, Ambulance Services, Bridge Refinancing, Traffic Control, Roads and Parks Maintenance, Beach Clean-up, Easement Right-of-Ways, Fishing Pier, and overall Zoning and Planning. If you wish to know the Commissioners thinking on these subjects, at this time, you are urged to attend this all important meeting. There will be time for questions and answers at the end.

In addition to Mrs. Wisher's talk there will be a short movie film on the recent "water spout" sighted over the bay just this past August and caused traffic on the Causeway to be held up for 30 minutes.

The covered dish supper meeting is for members of the Community Association only and starts at 6:30. However, the above program will be open to the general public beginning at 8 o'clock.

This meeting was especially arranged by the program committee consisting of Harry Borchers, Paul Howe, Cecil Rhodes and John Shepherd, chairman. The committee also announced that due to the fact the November meeting falls on election night (Nov. 7) the Board of Directors have voted to move the date to the following Tuesday, Nov. 14, at which time the Audubon Society is arranging a special program.



Dr. Haber Retires; M.D. Needed For Islands

Dr. Mordecai Haber, in a letter to his patients, has announced the intention of terminating his general practice on Sanibel and Captiva as of the first of November. Dr. Haber will continue to reside on Sanibel and will open an office in Fort Myers for the practice of Psychiatry, his field of specialization.

The Sanibel Community Association has taken immediate steps to assist in the task of insuring that "the serious gap left by Dr. Haber's departure" will be filled as soon as practicable.

"We are conscious of the importance of having a qualified General Practitioner on the Island and of the valuable contribution made by Dr. Haber," Mr. Duane White, president of the Community Association, stated.

The Community Association has appointed a committee to explore ways of encouraging a medical doctor to establish an office on the islands. Mr. Robert Dormer is charman of the committee which includes also Dr. John Willard, Dr. I. H. Simmons, Mrs. George Winterbotham and Mr. Porter Goss.

Chairman Dormer has indicated that his committee would like to cooperate with any other groups working toward the same objective. He has asked that all groups or individuals with a knowledge of available General Practitioners contact him or his committee.

Fishing Pier Bids Out

Bids are out for the Sanibel Fishing Pier and are due to be returned to the County Commissioners Office in Fort Myers by an October 4 deadline. For anyone interested in viewing the blue prints for the proposed pier, a copy is available at the Chamber of Commerce building, but the plans may not be taken from the building.


"Now that we are just around the corner from reality," states Mr. Don Bissell, committee member for the pier, "we are hoping that anyone interested in contributing to the pier cost who has not done so will either contact me at the Dairy Queen, or Mr. Don Case at Harbor House or Ralph Woodring at the Bait Box. We will be happy to apply any contributions to the cause, and we will be glad to receive mailed in contributions too."


They are also asking that those who have not completed their pledge of funds, now is the time to do so, as available money is needed now for the imminent construction, with a completion date as early as possible in the near future.

Also, according to Mr. Bissell, a preliminary plan for a park open to the public at Bowman's Beach is at the Chamber of Commerce for viewing. This plan is contingent upon completion of the new Bowman's Beach Road by the County Commission.

KEY LIMES ARE THE IN FRUIT

Key limes are really bustin' out all over right now, and if you don't know anyone whose favorite pie is Key Lime, then we must bow out of the culinary department. There is one made with sweetened condensed milk which is attributed to Conchs (residents of the Keys), but we believe that must be a conch without a stove. And then there is the regular lime meringue pie, which we think is about the best there is, but we shall give you both recipes, and you can take your choice.

CONCH KEY LIME PIE

1 can condensed milk (sweetened) 4 egg yolks & 4 whites (separated)

½ tsp. cream of tartar

6 Tbsp. sugar ¹/₄ cup lime juice

Beat the four egg yolks until light yellow then add the can of condensed milk and the lime juice, and pour all into either a baked pie shell or one made of butter and crumbled graham crackers. Then beat the egg whites into stiff peaks, add cream of tartar and the six Tbsp. of sugar and spread in peaks on pie. Bake at 350 until egg meringue is delicately browned.

KEY LIME PIE

1/2 cup lime juice plus 2 drops green color 21/2 Tosp. corn starch and two cups water

1½ cups sugar3 eggs, separated

Mix corn starch, water, sugar and lime juice together and heat in double boiler until a thick sauce is formed. Then in another bowl, beat egg yolks, and add the very hot liquid a little at a time and beating constantly. Pour this mixture, slightly cooled, into a cooked pie shell or prepared graham cracker shell. Beat egg whites very stiff; add six Tbsp. sugar and ½ tsp. cream of tartar, and spoon over pie. Bake in low oven until merinque is lightly browned.

LEGION FISH FRY SUCCESS

The American Legion Post's annual fish fry was a huge success, better than ever, as a matter of fact, according to Commander Jim Dowling, and he wishes to thank publicly the Island Beach Club and 'Tween Waters for their wonderful cooperation in their effort (they supplied refrigeration and the kitchen use). And Alan Navewonplaudits for his delicious hush puppies, and all the other willing Legionnaire hands deserve thanks too. Over 400 were served at the fish fry.

TOO LATE TO CLASSIFY by russell kay

Under the heading "Time Thieves" the current issue of Newsweek points out one of the reasons taxes are so high and why governmental agencies have such a hard time meeting their steadily increasing budgets.

The article points out that a large percentage of governmental employees have developed the art of goldbricking to a high degree. The situation, particularly in our larger cities, has become so bad that recent checks in some areas indicate they would provide material for a paperback (to be read on the job, of course) titled "How to Get Paid for Doing Little or Nothing.'

Listing a few examples from a recent check in New York City showed that meter readers average 39 meters a day while meter readers employed by private firms read an average of 100 meters a day. City elevator inspectors are supposed to inspect at least 9 elevators a day. A check revealed that most were inspecting 6.

An auditor checking activity of employees in the city welfare department, who's job was to check on cases of welfare fraud, worked less than one third of the time. The balance of their time was spent reading books or newspapers. One couple was observed playing chess, others roamed around aimlessly, some arrived late to work and many left early. In fact, they did very much as they pleased with little or no supervision.

A clamp down and quotas established in some departments showed startling results. Rat control inspections by the health department were increased 100% in the number of pot holes plugged in a day. With the cooperation of unions, Mayor Lindsey got remarkable results in increasing productivity among city employees.

In other cities, notably Detroit and Louis, stiff union opposition prevented any improvement at all when city fathers tried to cut down on the boondoggling.

Perhaps the most successful efficiency plan, says Newsweek, was in Jacksonville, Fla. There teams of work watchers compiled an "idleness index" that compared the number of workers in each department with the number wno were actually doing something.

To make sure the idlesness index was not ignored, the city council introduced its figures at budget hearings and used these figures to determine which department actually needed an increase.

When department heads realized that they were being checked and that their jobs depended on their doing something about it, they got busy. As a result taxes have dropped three years in a row and indications are they will drop again this year.

Most jobs performed by those paid for by taxpayers have counterparts in business and industry. A check of what those in private industry do to earn their pay compared with what civic employees do makes interesting material to bring up at a budget session.

Not all civil employees are loafers. They get that way through lack of supervision and apathy on the part of department heads and officials. Surveys and auditors' reports in some instances show that as many as 80% of employees fail to give an honest day's work for the money received.



LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

TO THE ISLANDER:

Current zoning already approved and "on the books" permits an Island population increase of over 100,000 people. (33,000 in tourist and condominium accommodations, 66,000 in single and duplex dwellings). That's almost a twenty fold increase over the current 5,700. Can you imagine what the new population will do to the island water supply, sewerage, roads, telephones, and electrical system? It also means that Sanibel and Captiva as a "unique tropical paradise" will be better known as "the asphalt jungle of concrete block and mortar."

Guam, a United States island possession, increased its tourist population from 500 in 1965 to 90,000 in 1971. Since Sanibel and Captiva are considerably easier to reach than Guam. why can't they increase with the same speed? Have you noticed that: --- the coast line to our north, at Tampa, Sarasota, Venice, etc., is already overbuilt? -- the coast line to our east, Miami, Fort Lauderdale, etc., is already overbuilt? -- the coast line to our south, Marco and Estero Islands, etc., is already overbuilt? --- Florida's population increases now at over 4,000 persons per week with no place to go but undeveloped lands (and these Islands have a plentiful supply)? --- Lee County Government apparently views expansion as "good for the economy." hence minimal official opposition to expansion? --- within the last several years large Island acreage has been acquired by investment companies noted for their ability to anticipate building booms and having the financial capacity for rapid construction and resale?

It's high time to get alarmed about the near future. There are serious questions to deal with like water, roads, sewerage, and electrical power; like the right of a community to determine its own future; like the right of a property owner to develop his land without infringing on his neighbor and the community; like the right to have a community with open green spaces; etc. After the land is built on it's too late. Nine out of every ten visitors to the Islands from Miami, Ft. Lauderdale, Tampa, Sarasota, Chicago, New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Baltimore, and Washington ask us over and again to stop the overdevelopment of the Islands now before it is to late as it is for them in their communities.
