## **Chambers Heads United Way Drive**

Norman Chambers of West Wind Inn is the new chairman of Sanibel's United Way Drive. "If I could stop long enough to wring my hands, I'd do it," said Chambers, "but there is really too much to be done.

"Co-chairmen with me are Bob Dormer, Robery Aycock, James Evans and John Cook.

"We have decided on a different approach this year and expect to break all previous records. We plan to make a personal contact with the folks on Sanibel and part of that is a review of former records of names of Islanders to bring the list up to date. We have had more help offered and in only four days, we have already got \$1,200 in pledges or donations."

## School Daze

Two weeks ago the Lee County Commission voted to let the teachers going to the Sanibel Elementary School have free bridge passes. Shortly after this vote, Attorney Jim Thompson wrote an opinion that permitting free passage of the bridge for the teachers was not legal. In spite of the feeling of some of the Commission members that this was not fair, yet at their last meeting they voted to uphold Thompson's opinion.

Commissioner Walter Shirey, Julian Hudson and James Sweeney were in favor of the teachers receiving the tickets, but naturally they could not vote for something ruled illegal.

"The next step in my opinion," said one of the Commissioners, "is for the teachers themselves to consult an attorney and look into the matter. At the moment, the latest Commission decision is based only on an attorney's opinion." So there's hope yet that the teachers driving to the Sanibel School will get a fair break. The School Board itself may decide to pay for the tickets.

## **New Parking Lot?**

Lee Phillips, chairman of the Lee County Park Advisory Committee, is at present discussing a proposed swap of land which would give the Sanibel Islanders and their visitors a bigger parking lot than is now contemplated about three miles south of the present Turner Beach which is on Captiva.

The contemplated parking lot would be used by people now enjoying the so-called Bowman's Beach. The south end of Turner Beach might be traded and Phillips is taking up the matter with attorneys for the two companies which own land on either side of Sea Belle Road.

"The parking areas on our plans are far too small for a three mile long beach," Phillips said. "It was designed for 114 places or 500 persons. Now we're thinking of five or six times that number of parking spots for a minimum of 3,000 to 4,000 people."

Phillips said the 600 feet up for trade lies near the site of a proposed wooden foot bridge across Blind Pass at the south end of the beach. The cost of the bridge is estimated at between \$2,000 and \$3,000.

At present the county owned beach front is accessible only to boaters and those willing to trespass on private property.



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



#### THE FENCE IS DOWN!



Regardless of who is legally right, the fence is down but we think the hassel is not yet over.










#### FLOWER SHOW

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






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
#### VOTE YES FOR PARK LANDS

The Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board and the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation are urging the residents of the islands to vote in favor of two propositions on the Nov. 7 ballot. The first is for a general revenue bond issue of \$240 million, \$200 million to buy endangered lands and \$40 million to buy recreational lands. The second "Yes" would give the state government a constitutional amendment permitting the issuance of revenue bonds to buy more recreational lands and improve parks and recreational areas.

The first bond issue would be paid for from the general revenue, the second from the Land Acquisition Trust Fund and probably would make no difference in the tax bite of the average taxpayer. Conservationists and state officials agree it is a now or never action to save what remains of Florida's natural beauty, including parts of our southwest coast. If the voters approve both propositions, it will greatly improve the chances of Sanibel and Captiva to be designated as "areas of special concern" and so benefit under the new legislation.

Registered voters who will not be on the islands November 7 are urged to write the Supervisor of Elections, Lee County Bldg., Fort Myers, for an absentee ballot. Everyone's vote is of utmost importance.

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
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


#### TO THE ISLANDER:

Dear Mr. Verding:

In answer to your note dated Sept. 28, 1972, we are not aware of any plan now under discussion by the Board of County Commissioners which will allow permanent residents of Sanibel Island free use of the Sanibel Island Bridge and Causeway.

So long as there is a bonded indebtedness on the present facility, the Board is obligated to confine itself to the restrictions of the resolution under which the obligation was incurred. This resolution clearly states that there shall be no free passage on said bridge and causeway except to officials or employees of the County on official assignments.

Therefore, even though the facility's financial condition is excellent, a "sticker" such as suggested in your letter cannot be issued under existing circumstances

TO THE ISLANDER:

On October 3 the Hon. Walter Shirey spoke to the Sanibel Community Association about a 100 foot wide easement to the beach along Bowman's Beach Road (now being called Sea Belle Road). He was not explicit in saying where the parking area would be nor whether a 100 foot wide strip of trees would be chopped down in order to make room for automobiles to enjoy the beach.

He also did not explain the type of walk bridge to be built over the little bayou. Since there is only a very small amount of water at the east end of the bayou, it would be a simple matter to fill the bayou at that point thereby helping destroy one of nature's magnificent incubators for all kinds of sea life. However, the benefit of the doubt must be afforded to Mr. Shirey who insists that his main interest is in keeping Sanibel a special place. Let us hope for aproper bridge.

There was also no discussion regarding where toilet facilities were to be built and whether the county intends to have a large enough septic tank or sewage disposal plant to handle a very large and growing beach population. I whole-heartedly support the sentiments regarding overdevelopment so well expressed by Rod Happel's letter of Sept. 28. Such letters and the ads sponsored by him and others are a great public service. A few developers --- Trost International, Nationwide Realty and a group planning a large development near my neighborhood --- have consulted an ecologist and the Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board with the result of planning with nature to the betterment of all. This kind of cooperation, along with the land acquisition program of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, could keep the islands from becoming just another disaster area.

Nevertheless, our frustrating meetings with the Lee County Zoning Board, the Lee County Planning Commission and occasionally the Board of County Commissioners has proved that we cannot put our faith in county government but must look to Tallahassee --- from whence cometh help. Our Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board and the Conservation Foundation, separate organizations but singular in purpose, are working to have these islands designated as "an area of special concern" with all the necessary controls to keep them beautiful. On the November ballot, we will vote on a special bond issue that will help finance this program and we urge a big, resounding YES. Please, don't let this chance slip by. Wouldn't it be wonderful not to have to worry any more?

#### TO THE ISLANDER:

The subject of this letter is Zoning Request 72-7-32. My wife and I stayed at the High Tide Motel during the winters of 1952 and 1953, and since 1954 have lived in our present home on Gulf Drive. We have passed the area involved in the above request almost daily for the past 18 years. It is a swamp, and alligators abound all the way to Tarpon Bay Road. According to reports, this 66-acre piece of swamp is owned by the same owner of the land in Request 72-7-32.

There should be a moratorium of all building in the areas above described at least until an adequate sewage system is installed. Septic tanks are not good in such an area. In fact, in past years during heavy and continuous rains, the "privy" odors from septic tanks on the south side of Gulf Drive in this area are quite noticeable. As you know, Sanibel once had its own Planning and Zoning Board. Now we have only the County Zoning Board and no county planning for future development. I wish our officials would pay some attention to our local Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board. They should listen to all experts in the planning field and not just to the developers who have no apparent interest in the future of Sanibel or Lee County. Last year we appeared with counsel before the Commissioners on the proposed extension of Gulf Drive. Their decision was very favorable to us. We look to them to keep undesirable "progress" in hand. We are residents of a unique part of Lee County and we will oppose as best we can any ill advised and undesirable moves to sacrifice our little island.
