United Way Close To Goal

Norman Chambers, hardworking Sanibel chairman for the United Way this year reports a total of \$4,738 to date has been donated to the fund for the support of the 14 charitable organizations depending on it for the major part of their operating expenses.

Of this total, mobile homes contributed \$50.00; building and construction \$55.00; professional people, \$475.00; commercial, \$110.00; public services, \$1,046; residential, \$3,002; and clubs, \$50.00. One generous gentleman, wishing to remain anonymous donated \$300.00, in mock payment for calling it the United Fund instead of its new name this year, the United Way, and bringing the fund close to its goal.

Captiva, with its super chairman, Mrs. Max. Hayford, working like mad, reports \$805.00 with \$37.00 donated by Government and education; \$50.00 from mobile homes; \$25.00 from public service and residents donating \$693.00.

Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation

After several years of effort, the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation working closely with state and local officials, has secured the grant of \$281,000 in federal funds for the purchase of land on Sanibel.

The award, from the Bureau of Recreation of the U. S. Department of the Interior, came as matching funds for money raised locally. It will be used for additions to the Sanibel Freshwater Wetlands Sanctuary.

The official award was made at a ceremony in Fort Myers by Nathaniel P. Reed, assistant secretary for Fish Wildlife and Parks, at 2 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 28, at the Sheraton Inn.

Pat Murphy Feted

The Honorable Patrick O. Murphy was feted by the members of the Sanibel Volunteer Fire Department on Wednesday evening at Sanibel's Gasparilla Restaurant to honor his pending retirment as Commissioner and President of the Sanibel Fire Control District. Pat, who has not sought re-election, has served as a Commissioner for almost twenty years. Attending the party were Mrs. (Betty) Murphy, the other Commissioners, Floyd Pflough and Tom Nix, all of Sanibel's Firemen and their respective ladies.

Chief Alan Nave presented Pat with an engraved pipe rack and humidor from the men of the department; stating that although Pat retires as a Commissioner, the men had unanimously elected him to honorary membership in the Sanibel Volunteer Fire Department and will allow him "to continue directing traffic at its fires." Pat thanked everyone and recounted some of the past activities from the original formation of the Control District through this time with special thanks extended to Floyd Pflough and Tom Nix. Pat mentioned that our tax rate applicable to the Fire Control is less than one-tenth than permitted by Florida law. Even so, we now have one of the State's finest fire stations and operate four pieces of mobile equipment including the brand new rescue unit. He also noted that no volunteer fire department is any better than its wives who have to answer the emergency phones many times and stand by when their husbands are out protecting the lives and property of the Island residents and visitors.

The dinner and festivities were kept the best secret in the history of Sanibel Island by Betty Murphy who arranged, "to have Pat take me out to dinner," whereupon he was surprised to be greeted by the entire department at the Gasparilla. Following dinner, Toastmaster Marty Holtz expressed gratitude on behalf of the firement as well as the citizens for the many years of labor spent administering the Fire Control District. Emphasis was put on the fact that so few people realize the work exists much less its importance. Without this administration, there would be no equipment to operate by the volunteer firemen and, hence, no protection or rescue service on the Islands. Pat's original commission was signed by Governor LeRoy Collins back in the 50's.

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

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


FRIDAYS RETURN FROM ANNUAL BUYING TRIP



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WILDLIFE NOTES by griffing bancroft

It is always an event when a new bird can be added to the official lists. We have been able to do this quite often on the islands, but seldom more than one a year.

This year we can add three new species to those known to occur in these parts. And each one represents a different manner in which such new individuals usually

Keeping records of birds seen in an area and also, for migrants and part time residents, keeping tabs on times of arrival and departure, is important statistical work for the bird watcher and the ornithologist.

On the islands such records are now being compiled by George Weymouth. Any new sightings or first arrivals should be reported to him by phone, 472-2498, or by mail, Box 91, Sanibel.

As for the new birds seen this year, first is the yellow-headed blackbird, whose name aptly describes him; black with upper parts bright yellow. He can't be missed. He looks, and in fact is sort of half way between the blackbird and its close relative the oriole.

This is a bird which is fairly common in western United States and like some others in the past has apparently strayed to the Gulf coast and on to here because climate and food were favorable and familiar. Whether he remains an accidental or becomes a resident remains to be seen.

Next we can report the sighting this fall of several veerys. The verry is a thrush, and he can be missed. He is lighter with fewer spots but very similar to other thrushes. Like most of them he is highly migratory.

The mystery about the veery is why he has not been reported here before. Almost every fall Dorothy Mendinhall bands a good many of them in Maryland on their way south, along with other thrushes that regularly pass through here. The best bet is the verry has just, up to now, been overlooked. He will remain a migrant.

The final new bird is the monk parrot, a large, green fruit eater, seen in Boca Grande. This is an escapee. Like the budgerigger, or small green parakeet previously reported here, a caged bird that was set free or otherwise got away and is establishing himself in the wild and extending his range.



TO THE ISLANDER:

An open letter to the citizens of Sanibel and Captiva:

While we are awaiting the results of the work by the Analyzation Committee for the Islands' Master Plan as well as the report of the committee which is studying the pros and cons of incorporation, here are some things we can do which will slow down the increasing density of the Islands.

1. Owners of rental properties: Limit the number of persons per unit, or hold down the total number of persons on your property at any one time. We lose some business because we impose this restriction, but the guests who are here appreciate the effort. Limiting the number per unit cuts down on damage as well as on normal wear and tear of the furnishings.

Don't overbuild, even if banks impose conditions that require you to build more units just to get a loan. Such conditions are frequently imposed, but it might be better in the long run to get a new bank than to be pushed into building what you don't want in the first place.

2. Managers of rental properties: Take some time to inform your employers about general conditions on the Islands, especially if they don't live here. Try to get their authorization to institute policies suggested in No. 1.

3. Landowners: Insist on full disclosure from prospective buyers as to what they plan to do with your land. Become informed regarding ways to impose deed restrictions that limit density, preserve trees and open spaces.

4. Residents: If you live in a subdivision see that your local residents' association enforces deed restrictions you already have. A regular newsletter is helpful. Have everyone participate, not just your officers. If you live in a subdivision talk to your neighbors and form a neighborhood association. See that every resident has an opportunity to be heard and counted.

5. Organizations: Have your organization assess what you as a group can do to get accurate, up-to-date information distributed to all your members. Cooperating organizations could set up a special telephone "Information Hotline" manned by volunteers part time and a mechanical answering and recording device part time where anyone could have access to the information you leave available. Grapevine rumors do a lot of damage to people, and hinder the work that needs doing.

6. Individuals as individuals: Get a copy of the book "Property Power" by Mary Ann Guitar (Doubleday) and study it to see how other communities throughout the U.S. have faced and dealt with threats to their natural resources. Discuss the problems and

solutions found with everyone, not just with those with whom you agree.

Write to our Planning Baord indicating your interest in the work they and the Analyzation Committee are doing. Ask to see the maps; one shows all current zoning, the other shows all current land usage.

Take time to carefully study the maps as soon as they are available to the public and think seriously about what you would like to see as the future land use of our Islands. The Analyzation Committee cannot represent your view point in their recommendations to the County Commissioners if you don't tell them what you want. They need everyone's ideas and help.

Think about the advantages and disadvantages of incorporation of our Islands. The Committee that is studying this is not making the decision, they are gathering information. Ultimately, the people of the Islands will have to decide.

We should all remember that doing nothing is taking a stand just as surely as is doing something. But doing something just so it is "something" is wasteful of our time, energy and talent. We have to figure out what action will save us from the density of the east coast as well as that of the west coast islands, to the north and south of us. For them, it's too late. Is it too late for

To all of you, members of the Department, your wives and sweethearts who planned and executed this surprise, I wish to express my heartfelt thanks and appreciation.



DING'S THINGS


Last year the staff of the J. N. Ding Darling National Wildlife Refuge initiated a series of articles designed to acquaint islanders with the workings of the refuge and its role in the community, environmental problems, and announcements of refuge activities. Due to a reorganization of the National Refuge System's planning and budgeting methods, increased staff duties necessitated a temporary discontinuing of the column. Now, with the implementation of the new planning and budgeting system, schedules are returning to normal and the refuge staff again looks forward to reporting refuge concerns in The Islander.

The J. N. Ding Darling National Wildlife Refuge is charged with the administration of federal lands on seven refuges off the coast of southwest Florida; Sanibel Island, Island Bay, Matlacha Pass, Passage Key, Pinellas, Pine Island, and

Caloosahatchee. All the above, with the exception of the Sanibel lands, are accessible only by boat. Two refuges, Island Bay and Passage Key, are designated as Wilderness Areas, about which a future article will provide further detail.

The seven refuges encompass 5,208 acres of mangrove, beach, fresh and salt water marshes, brackish waters, and wooded uplands --- a mix of varied and, therefore, highly attractive wildlife habitats. According to latest species counts, the Ding Darling Refuge provides useable lands and waters for 304 species, 226 of which are birds, 45 are reptiles and amphibians, 8 are mammals, and 25 are fishes.

Future articles will consider refuge species, management practices, explanations of legislation affecting the refuge lands, announcements of public use plans, and benefits to wildlife and the community. If readers have specific questions or comments about the refuge system, particular species, or refuge management, the staff will welcome their letters and attempt to answer these in this column.

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
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
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
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LANDS FOR YOU, INC.

During the 1972 regular session of the Florida Legislature, your lawmakers recognized a need for the state to take a more active role in the conservation and preservation of the irreplaceable natural beauty of Florida, and in the acquisition of parks and outdoor recreation lands. Two laws were enacted which give us the opportunity to preserve our natural heritage, prevent damage to our environment, add new state parks and recreation areas for people and wildlife, and protect historical and archaeological sites. Both laws require voter approval at the November, 1972 general election, when two referendum questions will appear on the ballot.

The first referendum question will ask for approval of a bond issue to raise the funds needed for environmentally endangered lands and for outdoor recreation lands.

If approved by the voters in November, the State will be authorized to issue up \$200 million in bonds for environmentally endangered lands, and up to \$40 million for outdoor recreation lands. The type of bond to be sold is known as a "full faith and credit bond," because the bonds will be paid off from the general revenue with the State's full faith and credit pledged for repayment. This will give us the lowest interest rate.

The second question on the ballot will ask for approval of an amendment to the State Constitution which will allow the State to sell bonds to raise the funds needed to acquire recreation lands or improve existing recreation facilities. These bonds would be backed by the Land Acquisition Trust Fund, which receives money from a documentary surtax on land transactions throughout the state. The maximum amount which could be raised initially by selling bonds backed by the existing trust fund is no more than \$35 million to \$40 million. Since the trust fund receives about \$5 million each year, it would be possible to issue new bonds in future years to finance a continuous program of capital projects for recreation. Because these bonds would be backed by a different revenue source than the full faith and credit bonds, the two bond programs complement rather than duplicate each other.

Once the bond programs are passed and the bonds are issued, the selection of sites for acquisition will be made by the Governor and the Cabinet, sitting as the head of the Department of Natural Resources. In each case, the selections will be guided by a comprehensive statewide plan prepared by the Department's professional staff, with the consultation and assistance of all other interested agencies. Any person can bring suggestions for projects to the attention of the Department of Natural Resources by writing a letter and explaining why he or she thinks the State should acquire a particular piece of property. The Department will investigage all new ideas for projects, and the comprehensive plan will be updated accordingly. A proper geographic balance across the state can be achieved in purchases by a systematic selection of sites.

To illustrate what can be done with these new funds for outdoor recreation and environmentally endangered lands, consider what happened when the state floated a \$20 million outdoor recreation bond issue in 1968. The proceeds from the sale of those bonds were used to acquire eleven major new parks and recreation areas, comprising some 16,900 acres and including almost 10 miles of prime beach frontage. These projects were selected throughout the state and property was purchased in 12 different counties.

Why buy more land? Florida is the fastest growing large population state. Of the six fastest growing metropolitan areas in the country, three are located in Florida. At the same time, property prices are rising astronomically, and more and more people have more and more leisure time. If the State is ever going to set aside sufficient space to provide room to relax, fish and enjoy Florida's distinctive natural beauty, if future generations of Floridians and their guests are to learn to appreciate the State's irreplaceable environmental, historical and archaeological heritage, and if wildlife, unpolluted water sources and clean rivers and lakes are to be preserved, the time to

Why sell bonds? If bonds are sold now to raise the funds to acquire new land and water resources and to preserve them for future generations, the debts will be paid off over a period of perhaps 20 or 30 years by the people who will be here to enjoy the benefits of the land acquisition program -- by present Floridians, by their children, and by the millions of new Floridians who are expected to double our population by 2000 AD. Also, since land purchases require large amounts of money at the time of purchase, a bond sale is the only practical way by which the State can raise the necessary cash.

No new tax is tied to these bonds. The annual cost of paying off the bond obligation will be a small fraction of the overall state budget. Last year, for example, the State collected \$2.5 billion in taxes, and that was before the corporate profits tax went into effect. The annual cost will be a fixed amount each year, regardless of future inflation.

The two bond questions on the November ballot hold much promise for the future of Florida. But before any of these things can happen, before the irreplaceable scenic and historical places of the state can be preserved for future enjoyment, the voters must show their approval at the ballot box. Between now and November, Floridians who are concerned about the future of our state's unique environment should actively work for the passage of both programs. If they are approved, we can take positive steps to protect the quality of life for many years to come.
