All visitors to the Island as well as the residents are cordially invited to attend at 8 o'clock at the Sanibel Community House.


As usual the Association will hold its regular business and dinner meeting at 6:30 for members and their guests. This special Christmas program will then follow.





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
HELP US HELP WILDLIFE IN NEED!





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


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SCHOOL NEWS







SANIBEL TOUR TO GREECE 1972 (PART I) by Winifred Iurka

If the Greeks never had a word for it, most certainly, the thirty-two happy people in Bill MacIntosh's sixth Sanibel tour have. oREo --- Beautiful!

We gathered together on September 5, 1972, in the little room at Kennedy Airport which TWA had kindly provided for us. We were greeted by Bill and his lovely wife, Dorothy, warmly, with sighs of relief and downright admonition according to our various times of arrival, 4 p.m. being the **DEADLINE!**

At 6:30 p.m., Bill, clucking like a mother hen, herded his brood on to the TWA flight for Athens, where we arrived at 10 a.m. Greek time. Here we were escorted to the King's Palace Hotel, a four star establishment which boasted a most unique elevator. If you were lucky enough to find one not already filled to capacity you might just push the button labeled "down" only to be whisked with alacrity to the top floor, and vice versa. The hotel did have a most lovely roof garden where a late, late dinner was served every night with a gorgeous view of the Parthenon and Erechtheion on the top of the Acropolis, beautifully illuminated.

Wednesday, Sept. 6, was a day in which to get acquainted to a new way of life and to rest up for the busy days to come. Thursday, Sept. 7, we visited, in the morning, the National Archaeological Museum on the way to which we passed the National Library, University, Academy, Royal Palace, Panathenian Stadium, Temple of Olympian Zeus, Hadrian's Arch, the Cathedral and Byzantine Church of Saint Eleftherios. In the afternoon we were treated to the Acropolis.

Our guide, Aliki Tzalopoulou, who was to accompany us during most of our tour of Greece, was Athenian by birth, a graduate of Mt. Holyoke Colege

with a degree in archaeology. Aliki, or Alice was only one of the nice things that happened to us in Greece. She made things live for us because they were her life. We did, however, accuse her of trying to make Spartans of us all, for she led us up hill and down relentlessly with never a stone unturned. And so we did not only see the myriad of wonderful remains of Ancient Greece, we were part of it. Indeed, we might all have been living in the middle of the 5th Century BC.

On the evening of this day, after a delicious and well nourishing dinner at the King's Palace, some of us went slumming in the old quarter of the city. The Plaka, a twisting and climbing of alley ways, of whitewashed houses, shops and tavernas. Here at number 11 Aghias Theklas St. marked by a plaque, is the humble house in which Lord Byron lived and wrote his poem "Maid of Athens." The streets were crowded with young people in all sorts of modes of dress selling their handcrafted wares or obviously enjoying themselves in the tavernas all very polite and orderly.

Friday, Sept. 8, was a day of leisure or shopping for those who wished. In the evening we attended an awe-inspiring program of sound and light on the Acropolis followed by an even more awe-inspiring performance by Greek dancers under the able direction of the renowned Dora Stratou. It was interesting to note that the beautiful and richly embroidered costumes of the dancers were of a somewhat sombre nature as were the dances themselves. The native music with flute and lyre produced a haunting plaintive note. (to be continued)



With its mangrove expanses, shallow mud flats, and impounded brackish waters, this 4,500 acre area sees a major portion of the refuge public use through wildlife appreciation, photography, fishing, crabbing, canoeing, and wildlands observation.

Ecologically the Darling tract represents one of the most productive habitats on the face of the earth, producing twice the yield of the most efficient cornfield; for the Darling tract is part of an estuary, a nursery of the sea. In the shallow tidal waters, millions upon millions of tiny marine animals are hatched or born --- shrimp, horseshoe crabs, blue crabs, tarpon, mullet, molluscs, sea worms, on and on the list goes.

There are several reasons that an estuary has this great potential as a hatchery-nursery, two of these being its abundance of food and its profusion of protected hiding places. Great amounts of estuarine food are produced by the shallow waters, sunlight, and tide water movements which carry throughout the swamp high concentrations of nutrients from decaying plant and animal materials. These the aquatic plants use to produce the lush vegetation evident in the Darling waters. These aquatic plants, both microscopic and macroscopic, feed the great food webs of the estuary; from the tiniest creatures to the mightiest birds of prey, the otter, raccoon, alligator, and man.

Of course, if one happens to be a tiny, newly-hatched marine animal feeding and growing in the estuary, protection is essential, for numerous are the hungry eyes searching for just such a tasty tidbit. Luckily, however, there is an abundance of places to hide. Many creatures simply duck under a passing mangrove leaf, or bury in the sand, or hide amongst the mangrove roots or in the turtle grass, until they are large enough to journey out to the Gulf. Here they take their places in ocean life, time and again returning to estuarine waters to breed and perpetuate their species.

Starting Tuesday, Nov. 21, refuge personnel began guided tours through this fascinating site. Tours will continue Friday, Dec. 1, leaving at 9:30 a.m. from refuge headquarters at the lighthouse. During the remainder of the season, tours will be conducted on Mondays. For reservations and information, call the refuge office between 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. (472-1100).

Clark, a most capable librarian, has accepted the post.

Two of Ronald Dahl's delightful books are on the best seller list; his recently published "Charlie and the Great Glass Elevator" and "Charles and the Chocolate Factory," published in 1964.

On every best seller list annually is E. B. White's "Charlotte's Web." This book, published in 1952, is a classic and a "must" for every child. The Sanibel Library also has White's other great books, "Stuart Little" and the latest one, "The Trumpet of the Swan."

"Winnie-the-Pooh," A.A. Milne's perennial favorite published 46 years ago, is only one of six of Milne's books that children may borrow from the library. Included in the others are "House of Pooh Corner" and "Now We are Six."

Other best sellers at the library are "The Little Prince" and "The Velveteen Rabbit."

I asked Mrs. Clark what kind of books are requested most by the youngsters who patronize the Sanibel library. "Young picture books, especially animal stories such as "Babar the Elephant," and "Curious George," she replied. "We also have requests constantly for factual material about animals and science. SEA TURTLE SPECIALISTS TO MEET


Charles R. LeBuff, Jr. of Sanibel announced that he will meet this week with leading marine turtle biologists in an effort to improve laws protecting sea turtles in Florida. The meeting is being sponsored by Caretta Research of Sanibel.

LeBuff, who heads the Caretta Research Project, the largest privately financed sea turtle conservation projects in the world, said that Florida's laws protecting these endangered animals are antiquated and that conservationists everywhere are laughing at Florida's inability to properly protect her marine turtle resources.

Scheduled to attend the meeting in Orlando with LeBuff are Frank Lund, director of Atlantic Loggerhead Turtle Research of Jupiter Island, Fla.; Peter Pritehard of the University of Florida, and the International Union for the Conservation of Nature; and Ross Witham who heads a sea turtle program for the Florida Department of Natural Resources at Hutchinson Island. Topics to be discussed include a review of existing marine turtle legislation in Florida and other states, a look at turtle laws in force elsewhere in the world, suggestions to create legislation at home that shall improve protection of all species of sea turtles in Florida, and adoption of policies that will enhance the overall survival of the threatened creatures.

This meeting was stimulated by an incident which occurred on Vanderbilt Beach in Collier County this summer when turtle hunters flagrantly took a loggerhead turtle from the waters edge in sight of a Caretta Research officer who was helpless to stop them because of a loophole in the existing Florida Statute which is supposed to protect sea turtles. Numerous witnesses to sea turtle poaching activities in Southwest Florida and irritated citizens who have watched helpless turtles being slaughtered at marinas or public docks during the nesting season or otherwise also have complained to Caretta Research representatives. Improvements in protection for sea turtles was a major objective when the group was established on Sanibel in 1968.

The Caretta Research Project is sponsored by the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation and is supported entirely by contributions.






SMITHSONIAN INSTITUTION ASSOCIATES VISIT SANIBEL


