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

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
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

TO THE ISLANDER:

After consulting Mr. Thompson from the County Attorney office and Mr. Schmidt, controller, and checking their copy of the Bond Resolution of the Sanibel Causeway I asked Mr. Walter Shirey, our Commissioner, to request a reduction of the commuter ticket to one dollar and a longer validity.

The Board of County Commissioners advised me that a memorandum was sent to Mr. Pavese on Nov. 28, quote: Please prepare a resolution to Ford, Bacon & Davis as adopted by the Board at its meeting of Nov. 22 in regard to the reduction of the Sanibel commuter rate.

The copy of the requested resolution was mailed to me and says: The Board does hereby request Ford, Bacon & Davis Ins. consulting engineers, to review the feasibility of reducing the toll on the Sanibel Island and Causeway system for the benefit of the residents of Sanibel Island and advise this Board as to the feasibility thereof. Duly passed and adopted 22nd day of Nov. 1972.

As can be read, the request for a commuter rate reduction was changed to a resident rate and the amount and validity deleted in the official request.

Commuter reduction is the only way feasible under the existing bond until refinancing provides other ways such as stickers or annual fee. This solution has the advantage to please everybody. The toll stays at \$3.00 bringing revenues but slowing down the traffic. Students and commuters both way get the break they need, and a few residents can happily pay the full toll they feel to be the price of their privacy.

Many passes have been cancelled and in fact only one islander, Mr. Dormer, has one, all others are given to County employees or ministers. List of passholders is made available at Mrs. Wisher's office.

A state law oblige the County to give a pass to any ordained minister who

applies for it, regardless of the fact that he has or has not a church. And so far 41 apostles are claiming to cast their nets for our souls and I wonder if St. Peter will find these passes valid for the Pearly Gates too?

Thanks to all the residents who supported my plea and offered their help for this petition.

TO THE ISLANDER:

A copy of the following letter was sent to the Islander for publication from the Island Water Assn., Inc.:

Mrs. Hilda Rush Ridgefield, N.J. Dear Mrs. Rush:

In answer to your letter of concern regarding the quality and taste of the water supply on Sanibel and Captiva Islands, the Island Water Association has no physical connection with the water supply of the city of Fort Myers. Rather, we are supplied by the Greater Pine Island Water Association of Pine Island.

The water is sampled and tested at regular intervals for salinity and bacteriological purity.

You failed to note where you stayed while on Sanibel. Not all homes on the island are served by our system; many use shallow wells and a few have artisian wells as their source of supply. This could possibly account for the appalling taste.

Something is being done about the future water supply. For more than two years we have been planning a system, arranging financing, securing sites for both plant and well fields, selecting the type of treatment to be used and arranging final contracts for construction. These have all been finalized and construction has begun, completion date is two hundred and seventy days, or Sept. 1, 1973.

We hope your next visit to the Islands will be more pleasant.

MAKING TRACKS with Sandy

Imagine sitting in the same room with an astro-physicist who prepared the flight plans for John Glenn and Scott Carpenter! He looked like any other good looking, clean-cut young man, but his conversation was far different. Not that I could understand Robert D. Mercer as he expounded on the space program, I was just simply thrilled to listen and to be caught up in his enthusiasm and to marvel at his brilliant mind.

Bob Mercer is the son of Mr. & Mrs. Joseph Winterrowd and he spent the weekend on Sanibel in the Winterrowd home before returning to the Cape for the Apollo 17 launching. He is a graduate of Yale and a research associate at the Dudley Observatory in Albany, New York. He started with the space program in 1961 when it was still called the Space Task Group and worked with several Gemeni flights. Bob, 40, had applied for an astronaut's position but said that men who are accepted now probably will never fly since "there won't be enough vehicles in their lifetime" to make a space voyage.

He was explaining an experiment he labeled S-178, compounding ideas he has wrestled with for 10 years. These ideas came into fruition in the successful photographing of the dark side of the moon in the flight of Apollo 15 that he and his

colleagues coordinated.

S.178 set out to photograph portions of a band of tiny dust particles orbiting in space called the Gegenschein-Moulton Region (he had to write that down for me, because who could ever remember that?). This was named after the scientists of over 100 years ago who first detected this faint patch in the night sky. He said that it is felt this band of particles (some as big as rocks) could present a hazard to future interplanetary space voyages. The cameras aboard Apollo 15 were able to photograph this band of particles and thus determine accurately its position from earth.


For Apollo 17, he had helped install the photographic equipment astronaut Evans will use while the mother ship is orbiting the moon. Bob Mercer will be in

Houston at the controls directing this venture.

He and wife wife Jinx, are the parents of three lively and interesting children. Jinx is an artist and one of her lovely paintings hangs in the Winterrowd home. Bob, at the present time, is working on the plans for photographic experiments to be used on "Sky-Lab," and orbiting laboratory to be launched next April. To quote Bob, "The space program has benefited many areas of endeavor, principally weather, communications and medicine." Little do we realize the far-reaching effects this will have on civilization itself.

Talking with one of the scientists connected with the program brought more meaning into the experience of watching the red glow in the sky as Apollo 17 raced toward the "left eye of the man in the moon," Bob Mercer's way of describing to the layman the location of the rocket's destination. And to think I saw it from my own back yard!

accommodations were very nice, the cuisine rich and plentiful and the service superb. There was something doing all the time on board for those who wanted to do something all the time. For those who did not, relaxing in the beautiful warm sunshine on deck was sufficient. It might be said here that during our whole tour the weather was just about as perfect as weather can be.

Our first day on board was one of leisure and then the fun and games began. We reached the port of Istanbul at 7 p.m. on Sunday, the 17th. Later that evening we visited the once beautiful but now somewhat shabby Casino where some of our group won and lost at the slot machines. Afterwards we attended a night club where there was varied entertainment. Very good magicians, Turkish national dances and lots of lovely belly dancers who got more glamorous at the evening progressed. On Monday we motored to the famous Bazaar. Suffice it to say that once visited never forgotten. On Sept. 19 at 8 p.m. we sailed for Ismire where we arrived at about 2 p.m. Izmir, or Smyrna, was much more beautiful to us than Istanbul. We also had time to visit lovely Ephesus, where the Virgin Mary was said to have spent her last days. The ruins here were among some of the most interesting we had seen and quite a lot of the area was still being excavated.

On the way back to our ship we saw colorful nomads encamped with their camels by the side of the road. It was also here that our bus driver decided to drag race another bus. We


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

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

BICYCLE GROUP REVEALS PLANS

To no one's surprise, lack of bicycle paths on Sanibel continues to be of high concern to residents. At least this is the conclusion drawn by a group of young women who recently banded together to plan and promote "Hike and Bike" trails for the island. They report that their display booth at last Saturday's Conservation Celebration was very well attended and that they received substantial pledged support for their aims.

Immediate activities arranged by the group are a bicycle rodeo for children and two bicycle races on Saturday, Dec. 23. The rodeo will start in the movie theater parking lot at 2 p.m. and feature slalom, bounce ball, polo and relay races. A main

event will be a tricycle relay race for all ages using balloons as batons.

The races will follow the rodeo. Class A will be for 14 years and older, 10 speed bikes from the Lighthouse to the Post Office. Class B will be 3 speed and other bikes racing from Scotty's to the Post Office. Top prize for each race will be \$50 cash with second and third prizes being donated by Island merchants. There is a \$5 entry fee for each rider, but the group reports that many island businessmen and citizens have already pledged to sponsor entrants.

Proceeds from these events will be used to begin building a fund to support eventual construction of some 21½ miles of trails on Sanibel. First priority will be a path along Periwinkle from Causeway Rd. to Bailey's and from Bailey's along Tarpon

Bay Rd. to the Gulf.

Using the theme "PRESERVE your environment, PROTECT children and wildlife, PEDAL your way to health," the group hopes that the display of public interest will not be lost on the County Commissioners. A recent article in the Fort Myers News-Press noted that the Commissioners will be reviewing plans for a county-wide bike trail system in January with Dept. of Natural Resources representatives from Tallahassee.

Commissioner Walter Shirey, who has been contacted by the Sanibel group, has provided helpful guidance and advised that there may be state funds available for bike path construction on Sanibel.

Volunteers to act as road patrol, judges and so forth will be welcome. There is still room for many more contestants for both the 10 speed and the conventional bike races.



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
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
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

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THIS WEEK AT THE LIBRARY by Hal H. Harrison

Art students, bird watchers, botanists and the general public, especially that segment interested in Americana, will be pleased to learn that the Sanibel Public Library now has on display a special exhibit of Rex Brasher's "Birds and Trees of North America." The two volumes (originally published in four volumes for \$200) contain 848 color plates of 1,094 species and sub-species of birds and 383 species of trees. An explanatory text of 172 pages is divided between the two beautifully bound books, each measuring 161/x121/4 inches.

Rex Brasher, who died in 1960 at the age of 91, early in life set for himself the monumental task of painting all the species and sub-species of birds of North America. That he ever accomplished such a feat is indicative of his persistence, and that the work is of high quality is affirmed by the words of John Burroughs: "He is the greatest bird painter of all times."

The original edition consisted of only 100 copies of the book and was published by Brasher himself. Each contained 875 full color plates all hand colored by the artist. All reproductions in the present volumes are full color facsimiles of the original paintings which now hang in the Harkness Memorial Museum.

Paintings of trees, all with common and scientific name labels, serve as backgrounds for the birds. An example is a pair of blue jays in a calabash tree --- a scene depicted in real life almost daily in my own yard.

Accompanying the two big volumes of paintings is a third book entitled "Rex Brasher, Painter of Birds." This 345-page biography was written by Brasher's nephew, Milton E. Brasher.

The exhibit is on loan from the Lee County Library and may be viewed at the Sanibel Library until Jan. 15. Although the books may not be taken from the library (they weight 18 pounds) they may be enjoyed at your leisure in the building.



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
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





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DUPLICATE BRIDGE

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
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

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
