The next scheduled meeting of the Association is March 19, 1973.



the musical tradition of Christmas

The musical tradition of Christmas is believed to have begun in 129, when Telesphorus, Bishop of Rome, decreed that "in the holy night of the Nativity of our Lord and Savior, (all) do celebrate public church services and in them solemnly sing the Angel's Hymn . . . '

Since then, literally thousands of carols have been written by such as Sir Walter Raleigh, Martin Lu

ther, Johannes Brahms, Francis Scott Key, Henry Wadsworth Longfellow and Pope Pius IX.

But Christmas songs weren't called carols until well into the 13th Century, because, during most of the Middle Ages, priests and monks did all the singing inside the churches.







The people were only allowed to sing and dance outside, making up words and tunes about the birth of Christ. The French word "carole" and the Italian "carola" both mean a ring dance accompanied by singing, and from this comes our word carol.


The first American Christmas carol was written by a French Jesuit missionary named John de Brebeuf. He composed a song called "Jesus Is Born" for the Huron Indians with whom he worked in the

THIS WEEK AT THE SANIBEL LIBRARY by Hal H. Harrison

Most of us, regardless of our age, can remember a few books about Christmas. Is there anyone who does not recall "The Night Before Christmas" and Charles Dicken's classic "A Christmas Carol" with Tiny Tim and Scrooge and Bob Cratchett? After that, memory begins to fail many of us, but no matter, the Sanibel Public Library is well equipped to lend us many books about Christmas -- easy readers, juveniles, adults, in both fiction and non-fiction.

One book that can be ready by or to children (while we enjoy it ourselves) is "Christmas Stories Round the World" edited by Lois Johnson. Here are stories from 14 different countries that entertain and at the same time give us an idea of how the holiday is observed in other lands. Lois Lenski's "Christmas Stories" are chosen from

nine of her books and offer the best in Yuletime fiction. For those who remember Dickens at this season only for his "Christmas Carol" may be surprised to learn that he also wrote a book of Christmas stories titled "The Holly Tree." The three parts of the book are labeled "The Seven Poor Travelers," "The Poor Relation Story," and "The Haunted House."

Forty four stories, some of them well known, are included in "The Fireside Book of Christmas Stories" edited by Edward Wagenknecht. Entertaining pictures in color by Ilonka Karasz make a distinguished book of a favorite old folk song, "The Twelve Days of Christmas.'

In the non-fiction department, the Sanibel Library has a wealth of material about all facets of Christmas. Outstanding, of course, is the three-volume set "The Life Book of Christmas" published by Life Magazine. The volumes are titled "The Glory of Christmas," "The Pageantry of Christmas," and "The Merriment of Christmas." In this same vein is a definitive book on the subject by Alfred Carl Hottes: "1001 Christmas Facts and Fancies." This is a real encyclopedia of

For those who like to "do things" about Christmas there is "Holiday Handicraft" by Nine R. Jordan, a book that includes other holidays too. "A Treasury of Christmas Decorations" by Beth Hemingway will help adults discover new ways to decorate. Photos of Christmas creations are included.

If you like poetry, borrow "Welcome Christmas," a garland of over 50 poems chosen by Anne Thaxter Eaton. Published just last is "Holly, Reindeer, and Colored Lights," a story of Christmas symbols told by Edna Barth. The library has it marked "juvenile," but I enjoyed it very much and I have not been marked "juvenile" for a

CAPTIVA MEMORIAL LIBRARY TO EXPAND HOURS

Starting Jan. 2, Captiva Memorial Library will expand its hours for the convenience of its readers, particularly the children, for whom we have a very good collection of books. New hours of the library will be Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, from 10 a.m. until noon, Friday, 2 to 4 p.m.

Of special interest in our library this week is TOPSIDE RICKSHA by the late Harold M. Bixby of Captiva. Arthur Kinsolving, minister of the Chapel by the Sea


enjoyed the book and reviewed it briefly for us.

The book takes its title from the Shanghai pidgin English for airplane: "Topside Ricksha, coolie no have got." Meaning a conveyance traveling overhead with no visible means of propulsion.

Mr. Bixby relates his fascinating experiences in the early thirties, as a pioneer Pan-Am executive, flying a single-engine plane into the remote areas of China where planes had never before been seen. Coming into the ancient capital of Chengtu without assurance that the local warlord would allow a landing, he had to circle the parade grounds many times before detecting an area for a runway that was not crowded with frantic humanity. He had many harrowing experiences with the quaint corruptions of the ruling warlords in a time when coolies could be seen tied together. under the last of the drill master, dragging the ships upstream.


Mr. Bixby gained a great admiration for the common people of China, who seemed to have survived unbelievably primitive conditions because of their own unique good nature.

He gives a humorous and anecdotal picture of China in transition, trying to unify itself under Chiang Kai Shek. When the original air routes were finally established, people had an option on the journey from Chungking to Kwiyang, twelve days by sedan chair through bandit-ridden country or one hour and 45 minutes by plane.

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



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




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DING'S THING

For the past three weeks, the ecological and economical aspects of the Darling tract of the J. N. Ding Darling National Wildlife Refuge have been this feature's focus. Still another facet of this 4,500 acre mangrove expanse remains to be explored, its historical values.

As most islanders know, Sanibel and Captiva have seen occupation by Indians and then visitation by the Spanish before Florida cameunder the jurisdiction of the United States. From these peoples and from pirate bands the two islands received their names; Sanibel from the Spanish, Captiva from the days of the pirates.

Like many other national wildlife refuges, the Darling lands encompass sites which recall glories of past civilizations and the pride of ages gone by. Several Indian shell mounds may be found within refuge boundaries, two of which are evident within the lowlands of the Darling tract. The Ladyfinger Lakes region, bordering

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Dixie Beach Blvd. and Tarpon Bay, and the west end of the Wildlife drive each boast of these historic Caloosa mounds, still built upon and bedecked with bleached and brittle shells carried by the tall, proud Caloosa tribes and shaped into hills for rituals and rites.

Recently the refuge staff has labored to re-open the trail locally known as Gasparilla's Hideaway — a path leading through lands once farmed and harvested to one of these fascinating shell mounds. This trail begins immediately after the Wildlife auto route again becomes a two-way road. On the left, space has been opened for two cars to park, and the hiking path leads off left of this parking area.


The Gasparilla's Hideaway Trail, extending approximately one-fourth of a mile back into the island's upland vegetation, is a virtual world to itself, rarely seen by island visitors. Air plants and orchids grow in profusion from buttonwood and poison wood trees. Papaya, lime, bamboo, myrtle, and gumbo limbo line the eastwardly-winding walk. A magnificent wall of nightblooming cereus hangs languidly between 2 cabbage palms, and prickly pears from a spiny, tangled undergrowth at points beside the way.

A sudden rise finds the hiker looking down to his right into part of the Caloosa shell mound, scattered with whelks, king's crowns, conches, and other shells before the trail continues on, meandering around and over the mound and again out into the more-open upland area. Visitors are cautioned that the mound and its contents are protected under the Antiquities Act and must not be disturbed.

Those desiring to explore this intriquing site need only one piece of equipment a good supply of mosquito spray.

A copy of the following letter was sent to the Islander for publication: Col. B. E. McCharen, Jr. (Ret.) 4009 S.E. 10th Ave. Cape Coral, Fla. Dear Colonel McCharen:

Congratulations on your recent appointment as Southwest Florida Field Representative to our newly-elected Congressman L. A. (Skip) Bafalis.

The news article reported that you moved to this area in March. I hope that you have since had the chance to visit nearby Sanibel and Captiva Islands and gained an appreciation of their "unique and scenic" character. If you had the added opportunity to chat with some of "us Islanders" you probably also noted our aspirations to maintain that character.

In line with those aspirations, possibly your Numero Uno task should be to get an answer from the Army Chief of Engineers to my enclosed inquiry of Nov. 16. It concerned a seawall on the shelling beach near the causeway that Florida Attorney General Shevin is also investigating as a "possible violation of Chapter 253, Florida Statues." A sanibel property owner from Cleveland has also raised the guestion as to whether my permit granted was based upon a detailed statement on the environmental impact filled with the Council on Environmental Quality as required by the National Environmental Policy Act.

In the event that you missed it, also enclosed is an article reporting the recent appointment of and proceedings of a Collier County Legislative Advisory Committee to State Representative James Lorenzo Walker. Many of their suggestions on natural resources and the problems of the coastal zone seem to be matters with which the Congress should be concerned. I am hopeful that Lee County's Representative Paul Nucholls will form a similar Advisory Committee, and that you will work closely with both.

Many of my neighbors on the Islands are looking forward to the answer from the Army Engineers and appropriate action on any breach in public policy.

At 10 p.m. we sailed for the island of Delos where we arrived the next morning at 8 a.m. Delos, small, rocky and almost uninhabited except for a few shepherds, guards of the archaeological treasures and staff of the museum. We had a few treasured, uninterrupted hours to explore the ruins. One of the most outstanding features was, of course, the Terrace of Lions. Originally fourteen lions, or lionesses in number, but the years have taken their toll and now only six remain, one of which has been removed to guard the arsenal at Venice.

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
Here are some suggestions to help beat the rush:

We wish to thank the officers and directors of the Community House as a classroom with its many benefits, air conditioning, public address system, etc.

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

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






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

At The Colony the luminarios line entrances, driveways and the walkway to the Gulf. They are lighted shortly after dark and generally burn for several hours. Last year a steady stream of cars drove slowly through The Colony grounds with headlights out, the better to enjoy the flickering shadows and globes of soft candlelight.

When these fruits mature they split open revealing bright red seeds which complete the picture.

The Chinese gardeners about the large American cities grow it under the name of la-kwa for the edible pulp surrounding the seeds and the rind which is used in medicinal preparations.

It is certainly fortunate that the Balsam Pear lends its charm and beauty to the causeway roadsides for all who will take the time to observe it!

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
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

Many people put together displays on marine life, plant life, mangrove, turtles, fishes, wildlife sanctuary, birds, erosion and other items pertinent to the survival of all living things.

In addition to the literature and vocal information there was a live bird exhibit. Shirley Walter and Jessie Dugger who have just gotten their non-profit incorporated license to take care of and rescue unfortunate birds and animals brought several to the Fau. There were two brown pelicans, a red shouldered hawk and one barred owl.


These birds all came to under the care of the two ladies from the doings of mankind. That is, Austin was taken from the rookery at a young age before he could fly. He was helpless not being able to dive for fish he almost starved. Then there was Adam who had a fall on a erosion groin which broke his wing. The hawk and the owl were both shot. The owl's one wing is droopie and the hawk has one wing and one leg amputated because of a gun shot.

They have 33 birds at the moment and the cost of keeping them is terrific.

They appeal to you for donations to buy food (mainly fish) for these rescued birds. They are looking after the whole thing and will be grateful for any contributions you may care to give, Much of the work is done on dead birds which come to their attention or are brought to them because they are sick. The birds that die are sent to a laboratory to determine what caused their death.

The service these women are giving to the people is a much needed one and one which is teaching information to the scientists concerning some of the diseases of birds.


