#### **Audubon Program Tonight**

Tonight, Thursday, Jan. 11, the Sanibel-Captiva Audubon Society will present its fourth program of the season at 8 p.m. at the Sanibel Community House. It promises to be extremely interesting, and is entitled "The World Around You." The presentation offers through beautiful slides a fascinating look at what can be seen almost anywhere if one is truly observant. In the world of the forest, the swamp, the seashore and the pine woods plants, flowers, animals and insects come alive against striking backgrounds.

The live commentary is by Rosemary K. Collett, author of books on animals and conservation, who has been featured on national television and publications. With her husband, George, she operates the Felicidades Wildlife Foundation in Venice, Fla., and is presently secretary of the Florida Audubon Society.

As ususal, the program is open to the public, and all are cordially invited.



#### Gala Benefit Announced

It has been announced that what promises to be one of the leading highlights of the current season will be held on the evenings of Friday, Feb. 9 and Saturday, Feb. 10. The event will be repeated on these two evenings in order to allow all interested Islanders and visitors to attend. It will take the form of a gala benefit to be conducted in the auditorium of the Island Beach Club, graciously offered for the occasion by the management. All proceeds will go to the Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board, to assist in its efforts to protect our islands unique natural beauty.

The program will consist of a new presentation by Mario F. Hutton, president of the local Audubon Society, who will offer the premiere of his latest "photo-verse" compositions, completed during the past year, under the intriguing title of "Crop of the Cream." In addition to at least five features never before shown, Mr. Hutton will include in this two-part program a selection of all-time favorites, covering a variety of island subjects. Further details will be published in coming issues of the Islander.

Committees to assist in the sale of admissions, at \$3.00 per person, will be published shortly. Tickets will also be available at the Sanibel Public Library, the Island Beach Club, and the Fur, Feathers and Scales store.

#### Exhibit of Wildlife Photographs

On Jan. 15, 16 and 17 from 10:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. each day, Fur, Feathers and Scales, Inc. will present an exhibit of wildlife photographs by noted author; photographer Mr. William G. Damroth. The exhibit and sales therefrom will be for the benefit of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation.

Mr. Damroth is a native of New York City and former chairman of the board of the Lexington Research and Management Corp., a \$450 million investment management organization which he started 13 years prior to his retirement.

At 48, Mr. Damroth turned his back on the world of business to become a writer and naturne photographer. He sold his interest in Lexington Research & Management and put much of the proceeds aside for conservation and philanthropic causes. He is a resident of Captiva Island and when not travelling to Africa, New Zealand, and other exotic places seeking new subjects for his camera, he is in the Ding Darling Sanctuary photographing birds. With his camera, which he has come to regard as his own "Passport to Nature" (the title of his Viking Studio Book), Mr. Damroth has taken this series of superb pictures of birds and animals, many of which are from Sanibel and Captiva Islands.

These lovely salon prints will be available only to those making contributions to the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation during this exhibit. The Damroth Foundation, a long time supporter of the foundation (SCCF) has generously consented to contribute all costs.

For \$100.00 a contributor will receive, direct, an original 11x14 Indiatone Salon Print of the subject of his choice, attractively mounted on 16x20 white mounting board and ready for framing.

For \$150.00 a contributor will receive a 16x20 mounted on 20x24 board. Each print will be custom crafted from Mr. Damroth's original negatives at Modernage Studios in New York by Mr. Jorge Fiqueroa, the darkroom artist who made all the prints appearing in the book "Passport to Nature."

Mr. Damroth will be at the gallery to meet the public from 2 to 4 p.m. each day of the exhibit. All photos delivered to the gallery for pick-up may be personally signed by Mr. Damroth.



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

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
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#### SURFRIDER

#### TO THE ISLANDER:

As a member of the Chamber of Commerce, a voting taxpaying property owner on Sanibel for 17 years, I am steadfastly opposed to 90% of the proposed overall planning for Sanibel. The plan is based on so many false claims that it is irrational to the extent that it is almost unbelievable. The plan is autocratic in its concept and the method of presenting it to this date is

unfair and sneaky.

The planners claim to be opposed to "spot zoning" but that is exactly what they propose in designating three spots as shopping centers. Also, the odd idea of rezoning Periwinkle Way so as to disallow business where it is most natural for businesses to be would force upon us large blighted areas of concrete buildings and asphalt paving. It is far nicer to have the small shops scattered along the main road as befits a rural island. The rural effect of small shops along the main road avoids the worn out concept of putting commercial houses together in blobs of concrete and traffic.

The proposers of the planhave taken just the opposite idea to what is normal in their concept of units per acre for multiple housing. Since so much of this island is taken up in swamps and sloughs for the bugs and mosquitoes, the limit per acre for multiple housing should be raised to something like forty or fifty. It is not fair to other taxpayers in the state and county to restrict the density severely. Density should have some relation to costs of highways, bridges and other means of getting to Sanibel; some relationship to the airport costs,

Many of the people supporting the plan are trying to make up for their lack of prudence and wisdom at the expense of someone else. Many of these Johnnies-come-lately surely must have observed the thousands and thousands of undeveloped acreage over the islands. Could they have forgotten that they were coming into one of the fastest growing areas of the USA? Surely a prudent man would have assumed that the waste land would not be allowed to remain in a state usable only for bugs and mosquitoes.

I strongly resent the expression of the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife that "nothing other than single family residential should be permitted on lands adjacent to the Refuge." These people are out of order to make such expressions while they are being paid by the taxes of those very same people they are attacking. This is despotism in the lowest form.

The "arguments" set forth by these unenlightened planners will not stand close scrutiny. For example, such a statement as, "The GU classification shows increasing amounts being changed to other use classification through 1967-71 period." This statement is meant to be something on their side, while it is totally meaningless. The GU classification is merely an interim classification, only to last until the expected request for higher zoning is made.

I shall request the County Commissioners that those of us who oppose the overall planning project be allowed the identical privileges which were granted to the planners: that we be allowed at least one year to prepare our side of the case and that we be permitted to present our side to the Commissioners and to the public with the same stipulations that no questions nor arguments be allowed at the time of our presentation.

All properties should remain zoned as they are now, unless the owners request a change. Request for zoning of property should be made by the owner, not by his neighbors.

#### **TOLL CALLS TO SANIBEL** TO DISAPPEAR

United Telephone Company plans to extend its Greater Fort Myers toll free dialing area to Sanibel and Captiva Islands in May as part of a \$12-million construction outlay in Lee County for

District Manager J. M. Dalton said Wednesday the company surveyed residents of the two islands to determine if customers wanted the service and said "a lot of private residents, as well as business people" wanted it.

Dalton said phone rates will increase as a result of the toll free system, depending on what type of service a customer is receiving.

Dalton said a private business phone, now costing \$12.10 will increase to \$16.30 a month. A private residence line (one party) now costing \$6.85, will increase to \$9.25; and a two-party residence line, now costing \$5.95, will increase to \$7.90.

"Usually, the few who push toll

free service are the business people, but in this case a lot of private residents wanted it, too," Dalton said.

At present residents of Sanibel and Captiva have toll free access only to Fort Myers Beach and the Cypress Lake exchanges.

#### **GOVERNOR ASKEW** AT SOUTH SEAS PLANTATION

#### WILDLIFE NOTES by Griffing Bancroft

The Sanibel-Captiva Audubon Christmas bird count was held this year on a cold, windy and rainy (and of course unusual) day, so perhaps the results could have been predicted.

Thirty two observers participated, four more than the year before, yet only 115 different species were recorded, five less than in 1971.

However, some consolation may be taken by the fact that the total number of individual birds estimated to have been seen was larger by 6,000 than the year

When all the reports were put together and added up, the estimates totalled 30,840 birds seen during the 24-hour period. But almost half of these consisted of one species --- the tree swallow that is seen so often in dense masses over the islands

This year the estimated number of this bird was put at 15,000 while last year we estimated the number of tree swallows at 10,000. So the increase in this one species almost accounted for the additional birds tabulated this year.

No really rare species were reported, the most unusual for the islands, perhaps, being a pigeon hawk, a barred owl and two song sparrows. But, as so often unfortunately seems to be the case, several rarities were seen just before or just after the official day and so could be listed but not counted. These included a water pipet, never before reported on the islands, a back-necked stilt and a Baltimore oriole, birds not supposed to be here at this time of year, and a flamingo who may have strayed off from somebody's garden.

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

"DING'S" THINGS

Those attributes of the Bailey tract of the J. N. Ding Darling National Wildlife Refuge outlined in last week's article --- its fresh water, dense vegetation, and protected status -- make this area one of the refuge's most varied habitats. Management on this tract is basically water management, keeping the waters as open as possible, guarding against salt water intrusions, and maintaining a system of dikes and artesian wells designed to minimize water loss during drier periods.

Each of these management practices presents its own set of problems. The next time you walk through the Bailey tract not the encroachment of the cattails into the impounded waters, especially those north of the fill pond by the observation tower. As desirable as cattails are for birds such as rails and bitterns, the rapidly advancing armies of these plants are reducing drastically the areas attractive to waterfowl. It is a goal of this refuge to provide and maintain maximum quality habitat for each species; therefore, limited cattail reduction has periodically been undertaken. Of course, some of the ones controlling the cattails are not listed on the refuge payron; in their thrashing "housekeeping activities" alligators open up some of the choked

It is necessary to guard against saltwater intrusions for several reasons. The lens of freshwater overlying the saltwater is the only sweet water available on the island. Should this resource be diminished or destroyed, many animals and vegetative species would be eliminated from the Sanibel scene. In addition, the Sanibel Slough drains into Tarpon Bay, a significant shrimp spawning area as well as the site of numerous shellfish beds. What affects the Slough affects these important bay waters.

The 3 artesian wells on the Bailey tract were financed by Ding Darling in his dramatic efforts to protect and enhance wildlife habitat on the island. They still operate on the main dike, where the sulfur water pours out into the ponds.

The success of management on the Bailey tract then determines both directly and indirectly the fate, not only of the freshwater area itself, but also of those ecosystems relying on the slough.

In a recent column I wrote: "By the time you read this a new stock of books right off the press will have arrived at the Sanibel PUblic Library." What an understatement that was! Almost 100 new books have been added in the past two weeks or so. Let's take a look at some of the new fiction.

My own favorite is "The Man Who Loved Cat Dancing." You aren't going to learn anything about dancing from this best seller but you are going to burn some midnight oil finding out what comes next. This first novel by an Evansville, Ind., housewife, Marilyn Durham, is an engrossing adventure story about Wyoming territory in the 1880's. I am telling you no secret when I reveal that Cat Dancing is the Indian wife of a U. S. Army officer. The book is filled with surprises and has an unpredictable ending.

Nabokov fans will welcome his "Glory." And if there are any of Vladimir Nabokov's books you have not read, you will find them all available: "Lolita," "Ada," "King, Queen, Knave," "Pale Fire," and "Speak, Memory." His new one, just off the presses, ("Transparent Things") should be along any day.

If you were one of the many who put Frederick Forsyth's "The Day of the Jackal" on the best-seller list for many weeks, then the Library's new Forsyth pense novel, "The Odessa File" is "must" reading for you. This is a story of a reporter who joins an organization of SS-men to get to a German captain who was responsible for the death of 80,000 Jaws. "Jackal" is available too.

Irving Wallace's new novel, "The Word," is a switch for this popular writer. This time he tells of the discovery of a new gospel, written by James, younger brother of Jesus. The implications are world-shaking and make fascinating reading. The library has three other Wallace books.

If you like your reading matter neat and clean, then "Semi-Tough" is not for you. This first novel by Dan Jenkins takes a satirical look at pro football. The narrator is Texas Billy Clyde Puckett, halfback for the Giants. It is rough, tough, sexy and full of four-letter words. You may like it. A lot of people did. It is fourth on the best-seller list and has been there for three months.

Joyce Carol Oates, author of the new library book, "Marriages and Infidelities," is one of America's most honored writers. Among her many awards was the National Book Award for fiction in 1970 (for "Them," which is available at the library). "Marriages and Infidelities" is Miss Oates' fourth volume of short stories. The library also offers you "The Wheel of Love" and "A Garden of Early Delights" by this



At the Craft Show he can be observed making his tiny shell flowers and will have some of his work for sale.


Jean Denyes, after some 15 or 20 years of vacationing here, came from Maplewood, N.J., three years ago to make Sanibel her permanent home.

Subtropical winter is again upon us here in the Islands. It is a time of the year when nature is taking a breather after the outpouring of flowers which began last summer and continued throughout the autumn.

In winter hereabouts there is no complete dormancy in plant activity as in temperate climates but a very definite changeover is taking place and the overall appearance of the landscape is a bit less vibrant and not quite as green as a month

Som shrubs which flowered in the summer and fall are now setting fruit on a variety of types. Among these are the necklace-pod (Sophora), marlberry (Ardisia), myrsine (Rapanea), wax myrtle (Myrica), various stoppers (Eugenia), guava (Psidium) and the Florida holly or pepper tree without which our local Christmas would not be complete

Other shrubs and trees at this time of the year lost at least some of their leaves and on the Wulfert Road a colony of persimmon (Diosphyros) are already defoliated

and will remain bare until April. The Cherokee bean (Erythrina) is now defoliating and will remain so until the red flowers appear starting in late January or February. Some bumbo-limbos (Bursera) lose most of their leaves in winter but usually manage to keep a smattering of them. The seagrape holds onto its leathery leaves until, beginning in February, they finally fall off, making way in a few days for the shiny new foliage which appears lacquered.

Two of our most common and interesting small trees reverse the trend of flowering in summer and autumn and, after blooming in winter, they set fruit in the spring. They are the wild olive (Forestiera) and the saffron-plum (Bumelia), the flowers of the latter being noticeably fragrant.


Finally, the beloved periwinkle (Catharanthus) keep right on blooming the year round to the delight of everyone and thus brighten the winter landscape.





There were 24 fire calls. There were 86 rescue calls which included: 22 heart attacks; 7 strokes; 7 auto accidents; 9 falling with injuries; 15 miscellaneous accidents with injuries; 1 motorcycle accident; 4 dead on arrival; 3 asthma attacks; 3 burn victims; 3 possible drug cases; 2 sting ray cases; 1 drowning; 1 heat stroke; 1 epileptic case; 1 diabetic coma; 1 possible appendix; 3 boat capsizings; and 2 missing persons.




