Latest On Gala Benefit

As previously announced, two benefits for the Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board will be held at 8 p.m. on Friday, Feb. 9 and Saturday, Feb. 10 in the auditorium of the Island Beach Club on Sanibel. These gala events will feature "Crop of the Cream," the new 'photo-verse' show by Mario F. Hutton who, as in past years, will offer on this occasion the premiere of all his latest compositions completed in 1972.

In addition to the new features described in past issues of the Islander, the show will include "Raptorial Idyl," a story covering much more ground than the title implies. It presents 80 striking pictures selected from hundreds taken last spring of a pair of ospreys attending to their nesting chores. But it also assumes dramatic overtones, offers glimpses of other breeding species, and even closeups of a "villain" in the person of an alligator hankering for fresh eggs.

Another feature to be shown offers a delightful change of pace under the title "Happy -- Phase Two." 'Happy' is the nickname of the Huttons' immaculate and cute white poodle, and in the story she gives a first person account of her adult years, spiced with all kinds of amusing canine adventures. Last, but indeed not least, will be shown "Birth of a Day," a saga in color and verse of daybreak, the hour that early birds prefer over all others. In a stunning sequence of superb shots, viewers will share the thrilling beauty of this hour, from the first glimmer of light to the sun's triumphant return. It promises to be a fitting finale to a show that none of us will want to miss.





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Realtor Priscilla Murphy in Tuesday's restrictions of 22 and 18 units per acre for multiple housing would permit a city of more than 92,000 people on Sanibel and Captiva. Also, that the plans for Loggerhead Cay call for buildings to qualify for flood insurance.

With the help of representatives of the Lee County Building Dept., Federal and State agencies, and the Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board, we have the preliminary draft of a comprehensive, low density plan for the islands. If we are to preserve even a vestige of the charm that has been Sanibel and Captiva, we must be like the bundle of sticks, forgetting personal differences and perhaps even immediate gains for the magnificent rewards that could be in store for us. History will judge us on what happens this year.

There are those who love the islands --- and those who love what the islands can do for them. Who do you think should control Sanibel and Captiva? Write the Board of County Commissioners, Fort Myers, and urge public hearings on our plan, as well as an RU-3 density moratorium of 8 units per acre until those hearings can be held. They have told us that local government is the most responsive to local needs and desires. Make them prove it.



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
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SANIBELITES WIN AWARDS AT CONCHOLOGISTS SHOW

Sanibelites walked off with many prizes and honors in the Conchologists Society Show held at the Exhibition Hall last week. Emma Guthrie copped one of the top awards, the Conchologist Society Trophy, for her beautifully and skillfully designed artistic display in the artistic division.

Mrs. Elsie Malone won a first place award for her Florida and deep water shell of the show in the scientific division. Mrs. Malone displayed 13 large boxes of rare shells from all Florida and her almost 8 inch Cipri Cervus from the Florida Keys was the Blue Ribbon winner. Other shells in her collection are a colorful box of lion's paws, gorgeous Florida pectins, ranging from lemon yellows to reds with all colors of the rainbow in between; shells from the Pleutomaria family, mirabilis, Spondylus, Cymatiums, distorsios, Mitres, and three different species of Marginellas.

Helene Eker won with her all cones display and world-wide shells, and she also took a special judge's award.

Eugenia Wright placed first in the world-wide shell collection, and she, too, won a silver cup in the special awards from the judges.

Mrs. Edna Russell won a blue ribbon in the beautiful shells division, and Mary Nix won a red ribbon for her three boxes in a family collection of Cockles, though she has not completed her collection.

Bette Parke won a first place in paintings for the commercial artistic division.

All of these winners are a foretaste of what will happen at the Sanibel Shell Fair on March 1, 2 and 3. Shell Fair workshops are open to all visitors and residents and meet on Mondays from 10 to 3 at the Sanibel Community House and all are invited to participate.

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




"DING'S THINGS"




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"ISLAND IN THE SUN" FEATURED AT NEXT SANIBEL COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION MEETING

The next meeting of the Sanibel Community Association to be held Tuesday, Feb. 6 will feature a special slide film presentation by Harrison Brailsford.

Harrison Brailsford, a photographer, musician, and inventor, combines all three talents in making this special slide film presentation of prize winning photographs of our special island. For Mr. Brailsford not only takes prize photographs, records all his background music taking all the parts himself, but has constructed a special slide film projector which puts the whole show --- pictures --- narration --- music --- together in one automatic operation. No where is this better demonstrated than in this special presentation "Island in the Sun." He also does his own color printing.

Mr. Brailsford is a member of the Photographic Society of America, the Color Camera Club of Westester, N.Y., the National Audubon Society and the Wildlife Federation.

Last year when this film essay was shown to the Audubon Society there was standing room only so come early if you want a seat.

In additition to "Island in the Sun" Harrison will exhibit prints of some of his prize winning pictures which have been exhibited in 12 foreign countries where he has won awards including a recent medal from behind the "Iron Curtain" in Bucharest, Romania.

This program was especially arranged by Harry Borchers a personal friend of Mr. Brailsford and a permanent member of the Community Association's Program Committee.

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

THIS WEEK AT THE SANIBEL LIBRARY by Hal H. Harrison

REPORT TO FRIENDS OF THE LIBRARY:

Library workers are continually trying to add to the building fund so that the new library can get underway sometime this year. Among activities that have been helpful is the sale of "Sanibel Island" license plates. According to Library Treasurer Pat Siegenthaler, 167 plates were sold in 1972. They are still available at \$5 each. Pick yours up at the library. Harriet Howe tells me that she collected \$398 in December from library friends who contributed to the building fund instead of sending Christmas cards. Barbara and Bill Sur, who have been growing and selling named varieties of hibiscus, have added \$152 to the building fund from this personal affort.

In her annual report, Librarian Mary Margaret Emmons announced that 10,105 books were circulated in 1972. This is a substantial increase over 6,221 in 1970 and 8,273 in 1971. In addition, Mrs. Emmons reported 196 new people registered to borrow books last year. Added to the previous total of 809, there are now 1,005 persons listed as welcome borrowers.

Another reason for hurrying on that new building is the curtailment of parking at the present building due to the erection of a fence on the west side. The fence was legally necessary to protect the owner's rights against public access. A big parking lot

is planned for the new building on the Martin site. It can't come too soon.

Those who wonder why the library does not maintain a more complete file of magazines should stop in some day and try to suggest to the library workers where the magazines should be kept. You will find every inch of space already utilized. A much greater magazine file is planned for the new building.

People who have books to give to the library should check with the librarian before bringing contributions to the building. There are several reasons for this. One is lack of space to accommodate additional books. Another is that the library may already have one or more copies of what you are offering. And finally, not all books are suitable for a small library such as Sanibel's. The Latin text book that you used at Heidelberg College in 1918 may not be exactly what the Sanibel reading public has in mind for 1973. However, don't throw books away until you check with the library.

You have noticed, I hope, that the library has added to its "open-to-the-public" time. It is now open from 2 to 4 on Wednesday afternoons (as well as 10 to 12 on Wednesday mornings). Hours on other days remain the same.

According to John Cook, who is in charge of that department, the library has practically no trouble collecting 2 cents per day "fine" for books that are kept overtime. When I inquired, there was 24 cents outstanding. People who lose library books invariable are anxious to pay the cost of replacement. Books may be borrowed for two weeks. If no one is waiting to read the book you borrowed, you may renew your time for another two weeks.

NEW TRAM TOUR **IN EVERGLADES PARK**



BRINE DISCHARGE PERMIT SOUGHT

A permit to install a pipe to discharge brine water from the Sanibel-Captiva water treatment plant into the Gulf of Mexico has been requested by the Island Water Association from the Corps of Engineers.

The 10-inch pipe will be buried below the sand for a distance of 300 or more feet from shore, then continue out to a total distance of 600 feet with the end about six feet below the surface at low water and three feet off the bottom.

The brine will come from a desalting plant to be built to provide water to the island. The Corps of Engineers office in Jacksonville will take comment in writing concerning the application until Feb. 21.

SANIBEL SIGN ORDINANCE

The Sign Ordinance which regulates advertising on Sanibel and Captiva Islands is the continuation of efforts made by Islanders over the years to prevent visual pollution, and to preserve the unique, natural beauty of their islands. Implementation and enforcement of the Ordinance is the duty of the Lee County authorities.

The Sign Ordinance Coordinating Committee (currently composed of seven members with one more to be appointed) is charged with assisting everyone on the Islands and the Lee County authorities in administration of the Ordinance. The committee plans to be especially active in 1973 to prepare for the deadline of Jan. 31, 1974, by which date all non-conforming signs must be removed and/or conform with the Ordinance.

Some aspect of the Sign Ordinance will be discussed in the Islander every week or two until everyone is informed of the full scope of the Ordinance. A summary of the contents of the Ordinance will be widely distributed in the near future. AUDUBON PROGRAM TONIGHT

Tonight, Thursday, Feb. 1, the Sanibel-Captiva Audubon will hold a very interesting program at 8 p.m. at the Sanibel Community House. Featured speaker will be Robert L. Barber, resident manager of the J. N. Ding Darling National Wildlife Refuge on Sanibel. He holds a B.S. in Wildlife Management, and has served since 1960 in the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Subject of the program will be the famed J. N. Ding Darling National Wildlife Refuge, and Mr. Barber will illustratete its history, unique features and contemplated improvements. As a visual counterpart to Mr. Barber's talk, Mario Hutton will present a six-part "photo-verse" composition vividly portraying the highlights of the Sanctuary's wildlife and scenery. The program will also appropriately include a U. S. Wildlife color film title "So Little Time," that underscores the urgency of protecting the birds and the habitat of many waterfowl species. As usual, the program is open to the public, and all are cordially invited.



QUANTUM PHYSICISTS AGAIN GATHER ON SANIBEL

Some 200 Quantum Physicists again came from around the world to meet on Sanibel and exchange ideas for their 13th annual session. Atomic, molecular and Solid State Theory and Quantum Biology were the subjects of the sessions, according to one of the hosts, Mr. Sam Trickey of the University of Florida in Gainesville, and they met at the Island Beach Club. Fifteen foreign countries were represented besides the United States, and the symposium was sponsored by the Quantum Theory Project of the University of Florida, and the Quantum Chemistry group from Uppsala, Sweden.

Prof. Edward U. Condon was honored by the group for his lifetime contributions to the project. He is from the University of Colorado in Boulder, Colo., and a reception in his honor was given on Wednesday evening. A beautiful painting of island water fowl done by Adelaide Bailey was presented to him in the only planned social event of the sessions. "In the odd numbered years, distinguished contributors to the sessions chose from the many contributors, all of whom are distinguished, and honor this man. This year it is Dr. Condon," said Mr. Trickey, and then we had the pleasure of meeting Dr. Condon, who was charming in his quiet way. Dr. Condon has had a varied and colorful career, starting as a newspaper editor and as a Unidentified Flying Objects sighter and researcher for the Air Force. Dr. Condon is 71 years young.

At the meetings, the outstanding problems and best methods for computing and solving some of the problems are discussed. A blackboard for theory and proof demonstrations is used, and also slides and movies showing equations. Mornings met in session with a series of short papers by contributing scientists with various aspects of study. Prof. Per-Olov Lowdin of Uppsala, Sweden was the director of the lecture series, which started out with long lectures by distinguished scientists who are authorities in special fields and subjects. Prof. Lowdin, too, was utterly charming. Many of the scientists were accompanied by their families and some were too young to be married, and all were vitally active. After the morning sessions, the afternoons were free for beachcombing and general recreation and most of the foreign scientists joined in a sport which is quite popular abroad called football but which is what we know as soccer. They played on the airstrip.

Then at 4:15 groups convened again for another session of study of contributor's papers until 6 p.m. Then there was a break for supper and the groups reconvened from 8:30 until midnight.

Tuesday afternoon, wives attending were treated to a fashion show by the Seahorse Shop. Some dozen women scientists attended the sessions with the men. There was some language barrier, but all spoke English more or less fluently.

Biology attended. Dr. Robert Mulligan,

Nobel Prize winner of 1966, Per Stanske




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
