Sewer Referendum Subject Of Special Meeting

The Sanibel Community Association has arranged a special meeting for Tuesday, Feb. 20 at 8 o'clock at the Sanibel Community House to hear a complete discussion on the pros and cons of the new proposed Sanibel sewerage disposal plan. Every home or property owner on Sanibel is urged to attend and learn how this county le project will effect him either now or later.

Mr. Bill Thompson, county engineer in charge of this project will be present with maps and figures to make a presentation and to answer questions.

Some of the questions Mr. Thompson will be prepared to answer will be:

What areas are to be effected at first?

How will it be financed?

How much will it cost every taxpayer on Sanibel?

Who will and will not be able to vote?

Where will the disposal plant be located? How will it effect present local disposal plants? If this is just Phase I what about Phase II and III? What options or alternate plans are being considered? How should I vote? For or against the plan? What happens if it is defeated?

Other experts on the subject will be present to answer these and other questions. The meeting starts at 8 o'clock at the Sanibel Community Association House Tuesday, February 20. This special program has been arranged by Duane White, Porter Goss and John Shepherd.

Sanibel Library To Be Built

"The new Sanibel Public Library will be built in 1973 even if we have to borrow some of the money to do it." That was the promise made by Sanibel Library President Robert C. Haynie at the first annual meeting of members held in the Sanibel Community House Thursday morning.

The campaign for funds to erect the new building on the lot donated by Mr. & Mrs. Gerald Martin is now underway, and treasurer Pat Siegenthaler announced that \$4,800 has been received since letters of solicitation went out a few days ago. In this initial response, 74 renewed their memberships (most with increased donations) and 26 new members joined the library.


With the \$2,500 realized on the Sanibel Arts and Crafts Fair held Feb. 3, and with money which has been accruing in the building fund for several years, Mr. Siegenthaler announced a total of \$35,000 in the building fund at this time. It is estimated that the new building will cost between \$50,000 and \$55,000, so the drive for funds is still far short of its mark.

The following directors were elected at the meeting: To serve one year: Marn Carnahan, Edie Levy, Betty Muench, Pat Siegenthaler and Don Simonds. For two years: Bob Haynie, Jean Denyes, Barbara Sur, George Tenney and Duane White. For three years: Jean Bair, Arthur Clark, Hal Harrison, Harriet Howe and Charles Werkheiser.

President Haynie announced that George Tenney will be general chairman for the Sanibel Arts and Crafts Fair next season.

In her annual report, Librarian Mary Margaret Emmons, stated that 1972 was a banner year with over 10,000 books in circulation among 1,090 patrons. January 1973 broke all previous monthly records when 1,444 books were circulated.

The building committee composed of Vic Hackler, Leigh Bair, Walter Emmons, Leon Levy and Arthur Clark are working with architect Frank Vellake on plans for the new library building.





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


WIEGERT-OWENS WED




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
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PTA HEARS OF NEW MILLAGE

The PTA met the third Tuesday in January and the Lee County School Finance Officer explained the millage referendum due to be voted on by Islanders on Feb. 27. He stressed the importance of the effect it will have on island children if passed, noting that a new high school would be built to relieve the overcrowding at Cypress Lake, which must go on double sessions in the fall due to overcrowding. Since a new school room must be built each three days in Lee County to accommodate the influx of children, the millage is long overdue, and he commended Sanibel and Captiva residents for approving the millage at the last referendum.

He also noted that with the passage of the millage, the Sanibel School could be air conditioned, a situation long needed also. The PTA adopted the project of raising money to help in the passage of the millage vote by donating \$100 from the treasury to the cause.

Several motels and condominiums got together and donated \$400 for the purchase of two new water coolers for the school, and these too were in need, and a vote of thanks was given the donors.

It was noted that the only real objections to the school millage increase were voiced by new retirees in the area, and it was pointed out that the homestead exemption has been doubled for persons over 65, which would more than make up for the millage increase. Anyhow, the increase would be for only two years, and each child deserves an education, and indeed must be assured of one since Thomas Jefferson inovated the public school system.


PAT SLATER OF SONG OF THE SEA

SANIBEL-CAPTIVA CONSERVATION FOUNDATION

Mrs. George Winterbotham, chairman of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, announced this week that the Foundation will present three programs this winter as special events for their membership. Each program is intended to acquaint Conservation Foundation members with information on some of the functions of the organization.

First in the series will feature a discussion of the sea turtles, the giant 400 pound reptiles that nest on the beaches of Sanibel-Captiva, and the conservation work underway by the Foundation-sponsored Caretta Research project. The two part program will be held on Feb. 20 at 8 p.m. at the Sanibel Community House. Paul Zajicek, a Sanibel teenager who will be heading up the project's Cape Romano Project this summer, will present "The Next to Go: The Loggerhead Turtles of Cape Romano" (a slide lecture) and a film, "Operation Loggerhead" produced by E. J. Phillips. The movie was made on Sanibel-Captiva and covers scenes of the nesting habits of loggerhead trutles and the work of Caretta.

The other programs will be presented by William Hammond, director of the Lee County Environmental Education Center. On March 21, Mr. Hammond will present a program titled "Introduction to Sanibel Wetlands." On April 11, he will conduct a walk, "Look and Learn," on the proposed Nature Center site of the Foundation.

All members of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation are urged to attend these programs and bring their guests.



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"DING'S" THINGS


The second beach tract of the J. N. Ding Darling National Wildlife Refuge is dominated by the 90 year old Sanibel Light and Lighthouse keepers' quarters. Constructed in the 1880's, the 98 foot landfall light was built primarily for cattle shippers on their runs between Key West and the Punta Rassa cattle markets. Since that time it has served shrimpers, commercial and sport fishermen, and pleasure boaters by marking Sanibel's eastern shore.

In 1950 the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife through a special permit with the U. S. Coast Guard obtained use of the 23 acre lighthouse tract. Now the keepers' quarters are used as the refuge headquarters and residences. Here visitors may ask questions, make tour reservations, and avail themselves of free literature on the Darling Refuge and her satellite areas, recreational opportunities, and Ding Darling himself. Several prints of Mr. Darling's cartoons are now displayed in the front office as well as two original works of the Pulitzer Prize winning cartoonist and conservationist.

The Lighthouse tract also offers a variety of outdoor activities. Shellers have only to search and explore a few yards to make use of both bay.ide and Gulf beaches. Many sea and seaside creatures can be located on the Pt. Ybel beaches. Tunicates, parchment worms, jelly fish, sea pigeons, sea cucumbers, starfish, sand dollars, crabs, shorebirds, and waterbirds keep the beachcomber busy.

Beach ecology receives an impetus from the well-defined plant zones at the Lighthouse. The salt purslane, sea blite, saltgrass, and stately sea oats attract botanists in ever increasing numbers. For those of you who are tempted to remove these beach plants, no plant may be taken from the refuge, and sea oats are protected by both State and Federal law, as plant picking refuge visitors have discovered via violation slips.

Fishermen know that Pt. Ybel is a good beach from which to wet a line and bring home dinner, and with the new fishing pier in the offing the bay fishes had better beware. Those of you interested in projects involved with animal populations will be pleased to find the sea turtle hatchery of Caretta Research on the Gulf beach behind the refuge offices. A new interpretive sign has recently been installed at the hatchery for the curious visitor.

PRATT SAYS BIKE PATHS "FEASIBLE"

County Transportation Director Ben Pratt said last week that publicly owned and maintained lanes designed for exclusive use as bicycle routes "are entirely feasible."

Commenting on a proposed regulation that developers provide bike paths, Pratt said: "Developers can include a paved lane in conjunction with their major thoroughfares, arterial and collector streets."

Prass said he agreed with a recommendation by the Adley Associates consulting firm of Sarasota which called for widened right-of-ways to include bicycle routes.

The recommendation was for 125 feet for major thoroughfares, 100 feet for arterial streets and 75 feet for collector streets.

Present right-of-ways are inadequate due to heavy traffic, Pratt said, and addition of the bike paths would tend to relieve some of the volume in addition to serving as needed safety features.



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
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

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
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THIS WEEK AT THE SANIBEL LIBRARY by Hal H. Harrison

Christmas may be long gone at your house but not at the Sanibel Library. Boxes with new books for you to borrow keep coming every week, and, although they are not gift wrapped, they certainly contain some "goodies."

The new best seller by Adam Smith (George J. W. Goodman) is one of the best. I refer to "Supermoney," successor to "The Money Game," which was on the N.Y. Times best-seller list for so many weeks I lost count. Now, "Supermoney" has been on the list for over four months. The Times refers to it as "the best book there is about the stock market and all that goes with it." Life's review said, "The charm of 'Adam Smith' is that he treats money as if he were writing about love, or art, or religion but heavens, not business." The book is an insider's view of what goes on in the new world of high finance.

For Sanibel residents, an appropriate and informative book is William C. Anderson's "Hurricane Hunters." Anderson is a former commander of a hurricane-hunter squadron in the air weather service. His story about flying into the eye of a hurricane and recording its progress makes for exciting (and scary?) reading.

Harcourt Brace Javanovich has just republished one of Helen MacInnes' early mysteries, "Assignment in Brittany." Although the Sanibel Library has 10 other novels by MacInnes, this one has never circulated here --- and it is one of her best. Incidentally, this book was one of about 50 new books donated to the library by Burnett Ball of Sanibel, executive vice president of Harcourt Brace Javanovich.

Among other fiction just received are Muriel Spark's "Not to Disturb;" Elizabeth Spencer's "The Snare" (author of "The Light in the Plaza"), which is set in New Orleans; a happy new book by MacKinlay Kantor, "I Love You, Irene;" "Enemies, A Love Story," a bittersweet, deeply moving novel by Isaac Bashevis Singer (New York in the 1940's is the setting); Winspear's "Tawny Sands;" and a collection of short stories by Pierre Boulle (author of "The Bridge on the River Kwai" and "Planet of the Apes") titled "Because it is Absurd."

For photographers, art lovers and bird watchers, Robert Northshiled has put a life time of work into his 300+ black and white photos that make up "The People's


Birds." The author relates the stories behind the pictures.

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
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LOGGERHEAD CAY PRESENTED LIFE SIZE REPLICA OF LOGGERHEAD SEA TURTLE


A custom-crafted, life-size model of a female loggerhead sea turtle was presented Saturday, Feb. 10 to Robert F. Buntrock one of the developers of Loggerhead Cay Condominium on Sanibel Island. The model will be displayed in the office and model of Loggerhead Cay.

It was fabricated by George Weymouth of Sanibel. Weymouth is noted for his abilities in wildlife art and sculpture and is involved in Loggerhead Turtle conservation with the Caretta Research project based on Sanibel.

When Loggerhead Cay Condominiums are completed in three years the model Loggerhead will be donated back to the Caretta Research group for their use and display.

The loggerhead turtle is now considered by biologists as a threatened species. It has been known for some time that the sea turtles of the Gulf of Mexico are rapidly approaching the endangered status. One factor which is influencing this reduction is the development on ancestral nesting beaches. Lights produced by development (houses, motels, condominiums, etc.) alter normal behavior of nesting sea turtles and disorients young turtles upon leaving the nest which causes them to head for the lights instead of the water.

Loggerhead Cay's management has agreed to control lighting on their beach during sea turtle nesting and hatching time, May through October. This policy makes Loggerhead Cay a pioneer in this aspect of sea turtle conservation.



Sanibel had its first auction one sunny afternoon last week and we joined friends, neighbors and visitors to the island to watch the proceedings. Those of us who planned to stay brought chairs in order to have good front row comfort. I was interested, of course, in the furniture and other household effects to be sold, but I was mainly there to hear and see Bill Alquist, an old time Sanibel friend, who was the auctioneer. Bill (who bears a resemblance to Lee Marvin, the actor) normally is a soft-spoken man with a delightful eastern accent and so I couldn't imagine him in the role of an auctioneer. I was to see a new side to our friend who had never let on to us or anyone that he had this special talent.

At precisely 1 p.m., Bill stepped up to the microphone and with the adroitness of the professional that he is, began one sale. With triple-tongued smoothness he cajoled and coaxed his audience and the audience never let him down. For four hours he kept up his fast firing tactics and we loved it. Marvelling at the fact that he still had a voice after it was over, I asked him how he could keep up such a pace and not show it.

"Once, back home in Connecticut, I did it for a whole day," he said with his usual smile, "and I began at nine in the morning. I took two hours off during the day

for lunch and dinner and ended at midnight. That was the longest day I've ever spent. But that was entirely for charity."

I learned that if an auctioneer doesn't continually work, he must "warm up" before hand much as a singer does before a concert. "This time I walked the beach vocalizing and people probably thought I was crazy," Bill confessed, "but I must keep in practice or my voice would tire."

Bill and his darling wife Anne have recently sold their resort business in Salem, Conn., and now call Sanibel their permanent home. The Alquists enjoy boating and fishing, but Bill wants to keep his "finger in the pie" as far as auctioneering is concerned.

"I was in the business for 30 years," he went on to explain, "and from the time I was 12 years old I knew that this was what I wanted to do in life." Nowadays, there are auctioneering schools but Bill had to learn on his own. This entailed the serious study of antique furniture, paintings, coins, stamps, old and new books, glassware, dishes, etc., for the auctioneer must set the pace and have the first-hand knowledge of the goods he is selling.

There's no doubt about the fact that Bill Alquist, who is licensed to practice in Connecticut and Florida, loves his work --- "the oldest profession in the world" and that he appropriately uses the slogan: "Have Voice - Will Travel!"

The charger will be presented by Matthew B. Sellers of Ft. Lauderdale, senior vice president and membership chairman of the Florida Society SAR.



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

1 elephant, medium size
2 rabbits (optional)
Salt and pepper to taste
Brown gravy

Cut elephant into bite sized pieces; this should take a bit of time, so plan accordingly. Put in a large pot, add gravy to cover. Cook over low fire (300 degrees) until grey (about 4 weeks). LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

TO THE ISLANDER:

On Oct. 1, 1972, Florida Statute 316.065 was amended. This statute provides for the immediate reporting of all accidents. Under the prior law, an accident was only required to be reported if the damages to property exceeded a certain amount. Under the new law, all accidents are required to be reported without regard to amount of property loss. Florida law also requires a person with a damaged automobile to obtain a damage release sticker before a repair shop repairs the damage.

A typical fact situation would be as follows: Mr. A backs into Mr. B's car while parking his car. The only damage to either car is a scratch which would cost \$10.00 to repair. Both parties not being aware of the law, do not report this minor accident. Mr. A takes his car the very next day to ABC garage to have his car repaired. ABC garage tells Mr. A that he can't have his car repaired unless he obtains a damage release sticker from the Sheriff's Dept. or other law enforcement agency. Mr. A then goes to the Sheriff's Dept. and tries to obtain the damage release sticker; when he tells the officer the date of the accident, the officer gives Mr. A a citation for failure to immediately report an accident.

I am sure Judge Orosz joins me in my feeling that people must be made aware of this law in order to avoid technical violations. I would appreciate any publication of this problem that you would be able to give.

SANIBEL-CAPTIVA PLANNING BOARD HAS ACTIVE YEAR

The Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board, which will be entering its 5th year of operation on March 19, has been active in meeting the objectives for which it was organized, and it is through the active support of its hundreds of members that this has been accomplished. The main purposes of the Planning Board have been to protect the unique character of the islands, and to ward off urban congestion, while preserving and protecting the quality of the general environment. The Board has been active in promoting and conducting land and resource planning, and in order to continue needs the support both financial and participating of new and old members.

It has been actively cooperative with other organizations, and reviews zoning and developer plans, representing the membership in dealing with state and local agencies.

The Planning Board has been successful in limiting the heights of buildings and in density limitations. It has been successful in modifying land use in specific zoning cases and in the control of canals and excavations.

It has been successful in starting a master plan for Sanibel-Captiva with improved planning by the County. And as a result, a comprehensive plan for the islands is underway. A committee of nine members is working on this judgmental analysis and study. Two of these members are from the Planning Board, two are County Commissioners, two are from the County Zoning Board, and one each are from the Sanibel-Captiva Chamber of Commerce, the Community Association, and the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

The Planning Board is currently involved in an incorporation study for Sanibel-Captiva, but the study is strictly fact-finding and in no way promotional, and Mr. Don Seymour is chairman of this committee.

All committees need the continued support of both old and new members, and the Membership Committee is composed of Don Marshall, J. E. Scholefield, Lillian Paschall and Parker Mills, who will be happy to hear from you. The only revenue the Board receives is from dues and donations which are necessary in meeting expenses, and a widespread membership is necessary for the Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board to continue actively.





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
