Burning Permit A Must

Phil Verdung of the Sanibel Volunteer Fire Dept. would like to remind everyone that you MUST have a burning permit before you burn anything, regardless of how small it is. This is the second reminder of this.

Anyone that burns without a permit is subject to a fine. These permits are issued free of charge and can be picked up at the new Firehouse on Palm Ridge Road, Monday through Friday between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.

"If I have to go any where for any reason, a note will be put on the door as to the approximate time I will be back unless we are on a fire or rescue call. We urge everyone to cooperate," said Mr. Verdung.

Come To The Fair

All systems are reported "GO" for the opening of the 36th Annual Sanibel Shell Fair. The count down will start shortly, with the first call for volunteers to assist in the assembly of exhibit tables, arrange displays for the Driftwood Shop, fill tanks for the live shell exhibit and place panels for the Art League. Help is needed to arrange decorative banners, traffic controls, and parking facilities and to assist in many last minute details.

The Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation has been assigned space for a display, the Audubon Society will participate, the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, Supervisors of the J. N. Ding Darling National Wildlife Refuge, will take part in our Fair this year.

One week from today, Thursday, March 1, at 10 a.m., the Fair will be open to visitors. Thursday, March 1, will be photographers day. One hour, from 9 to 10 a.m., has been allotted to them for picture taking. Friday, March 2 and Saturday, March 3, the Fair will open at 10 a.m., and close promptly at 5 p.m.

Exhibitors who have not filed applications for space have until Saturday noon, Feb. 24, when reservations will close.

32,000 To 85,000?


Public hearings by the Master Plan Committee have been well attended and generally lead to constructive input. After three hearings, this seems to be the consensus of committee members. One more hearing is scheduled for March 8 to ensure that all viewpoints have a chance to be considered.

Once the public hearings are completed, the committee will redraft appropriate elements of the Master Plan proposal in preparation for a second public "progress report." The target date for this report is April 1 and it is expected that this report will bear a close similarity to the "final" proposal to be recommended to the County Commissioners for approval.

One of the areas scheduled for redrafting, according to Commissioner Walter Shirey, is the recommendation concerning business zoning along Periwinkle Way. Based on information obtained from the public hearings, Shirey feels that existing business zoning now in use as business will be maintained with a proviso that no further living accommodations will be allowed. Present business zoning permits dense residential use as well as commercial activity.

The questions of density and comprehensiveness of the Master Plan have been raised several times during the hearings as have been individual "hardship cases." The problems of trying to plan the islands from A to Z without some idea of the future population figure are difficult, as many committee members have pointed out. Though the Master Plan Committee originally suggested a density in the vicinity of 32,000 for Sanibel-Captiva, a spokesman for local developers stated at one of the hearings that "85,000 would not be too many." "Until the issue of how big a community we are to be is resolved, it is somewhat academic to start planning for other services," one committee member felt.

Commissioner Shirey noted that the new County Planning Director, Mr. Bayard Irwin, will begin work by Feb. 24. Commissioner Shirey said that one of Mr. Irwin's first jobs would be to focus on the Sanibel-Captiva Master Plan to help arrive at sensible finished product in the shortest time possible.




SANIBEL-CAPTIVA ART LEAGUE

"One day of seeing Sanibel liked this is worth two weeks of talking about it at the courthouse." So said one of the County Commissioners to the nodding agreement of his fellow officeholders on completion of the Community Association's Commissioners Day.

Four Commissioners, three of their wives, one of their mothers and County Administrator Lavon Wisher plus some scattered press representatives rode, hiked, saw, ate and listened their way through a 6 hour tour of Sanibel on Monday, Feb. 12. Chairman Kenneth Daniels was unpreventably absent due to the snow storm that blanketed Dixie that weekend, but the other County leaders met some 50 islanders and inspected many of the island's best and worst features during the day.

Starting with coffee and shellcrafting at the Community House, the Commissioners were transported to the Library, Island Water Association, Darling Refuge, and Bowman's Beach before a sit-down buffet at the Island Beach Club. At each stop, island spokesmen acquainted them with relevant data about plans, progress and problems. The after lunch tour focused primarily on the Eastern end of the island, notably on the influx of condominium building on the beach. Stops were made at the Lighthouse and at the site of the new fishing pier prior to embarkation from Sanibel Marina for a short boat ride around the southeast end of the island.

Community Association President Duane White considered the day an "unqualified success" in terms of promoting better understanding and communication between Sanibel and Lee County. "The only trouble," he commented, "is that there is so much to see, so much to talk about, so many nice people to meet, it's impossible to do it all in six hours."

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
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CHAPTER 72-164 Senate Bill No. 305

DAMAGE RELEASE STICKER

AN ACT relating to regulation of traffic on highways; amending \$316.065, Florida Statutes, 1970 Supplement, as created by chapter 71-135, Laws of Florida, by adding subsections (3) through (6) thereto; providing for the issuance of a "damage release sticker" as a prerequisite for having a vehicle involved in an accident repaired; providing that a report be made to authorities of any vehicle lacking such a sticker when it is evident that the vehicle has been involved in an accident, struck by a bullet or involved in the commission of a crime; providing a penalty; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Section 316.065, Florida Statutes, 1970 Supplement, as created by chapter 71-135, Laws of Florida, is amended by adding subsections (3), (4), (5), and (6) to read:

316.065 Immediate reports of accidents.

(3) Upon the completion of his investigation, each officer investigating an accident resulting in damage to a vehicle shall attach to said damaged vehicle a damage release sticker author-izing repairs to be made thereon. Said sticker shall describe the vehicle by year, make, model, and license number.

(4) It is unlawful for any person in charge of any garage or repair shop, or any other person repairing any motor vehicle, to make repairs upon any damaged motor vehicle not possessing a damage release sticker authorized by and issued pursuant to this section when the external condition of the whicle gives notice that the vehicle has been involved in an accident or struck by the discharge from any type of firearm.

(5) Any person in charge of any garage or repair shop to which is brought any damaged motor vehicle which shows evidence of having been involved in an accident, or which shows evidence of having been struck by a bullet or involved in the commission of a crime, or any other person to whom is brought for the purpose of repair a damaged motor vehicle showing such evidence, shall make a report or cause a report to be made, to the nearest local police station or Florida highway patrol office within twenty-four (21) hours after the motor vehicle is received and before any repairs are made to the vehicle. The report shall contain the year, the license number, make, model and color of the vehicle, and the name and address of the owner or person in possession of the vehicle. Nothing contained herein shall be deemed to require the reporting of a vehicle which possesses a dumage release sticker.

(6) Any person who knowingly revairs a motor vehicle

(6) Any person who knowingly repairs a motor vehicle without such vehicle having attached thereto a damage release sticker when required by this section or without having made a report of the damaged vehicle, as required by subsection (5), shall be punished as provided in §316.026. The owner and driver of a vehicle involved in an accident who makes a report thereof in accordance with subsection (1) or §516.066(1), shall not be liable hereunder.

Section 2. This act shall take effect October 1, 1972. Approved by the Governor April 5, 1972. Filed in Office Secretary of State April 6, 1972.

Mr. Deknatel was a graduate of Princeton University and for several years studied architecture in Paris and was a Frank Lloyd Wright Fellow, alternately practicing his speciality in Chicago. A member of the Board of Directors of Hull House at the time of his death he was president of the Mackay-Lovejoy Co. of Travis City, Mich. The family has requested that those who wish make contributions to the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Association in his memory.

THIS WEEK AT THE SANIBEL LIBRARY by Hal H. Harrison

Recently I wrote of the abundance of fiction that has arrived at the Sanibel Public Library. This happy condition is matched by the arrival of a great number of non-fiction books, many of them best sellers.

Notable is the addition of the two latest books on the Vietnam situation: "Fire in the Lake" by Frances Fitzgerald and "The Best and the Brightest," by David Halberstam, now second on the N.Y. Times best-seller list. Of course the No. 1 best-seller, "I'm O.K.-You're O.K." has been available for some time.

As in the two books about Vietnam, war is the theme of another best-seller and a Literary Guild selection, "O Jerusalem," BY Larry Collins and Dominique Lapierre. The authors may be more familiar to you when you remember that they wrote "Is Paris Burning?" and "Or I'll Dress You in Mourning," both of which are included in the library stock. "O Jerusalem" is the day-by-day, minute-by-minute record of the 1947-48 struggle that engulfed the Jewish-Arab world.

Those of you who enjoyed Dr. Laurence J. Peter's "The Peter Principle." the nation's best-seller in 1969, will be anxious to read Dr. Peter's new one, "The Peter Prescription." Through a series of 66 "Peter Prescriptions," the author attempts to prove that "True progress is achieved through moving forward --- not through moving upward toward incompetence." The book is designed to keep you out of the Peter Principle for the rest of your life. If you missed Dr. Peter's first book, it too is yours for the borrowing.

Most of us are familiar with some of Vance Packard's revealing books on contemporary American life ("The Hidden Persuaders," "The Waste Makers," "The Status Seekers," "The Sexual Wilderness," etc.) so the arrival of his latest, "A Nation of Strangers," is an event. This time, Packard tries to explain why, every year, more than 15 million Americans move from one locality to another. He also analyzes what this is doing to our society, our nation, and ourselves.

"America, Inc." by Morton Mintz and Jerry S. Cohen asks the question, "Who owns and operates the United States?" In reviewing this dramatic book, Publishers Weekly states: "American, Inc." presents evidence that America is 'owned' by conglomerates that are gradually usurping the rights of the individual." Another expose is contained in "John Edgar Hoover," in which Hank Messick takes a critical look at the former director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

For lighter reading there is Johnny Cash's "Winners Got Scars Too;" "To Me It's Wonderful" by Ethel Waters; and Lee Bailey's "The Defense Never Rests."

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

TO THE ISLANDER:

To correct a statement I made regarding Loggerhead Cay, residents there do qualify for flood insurance under the temporary government program now in effect. However, since the first floor level of this and other Gulf beach condominiums is low, the insurance will be very, very expensive.

My main contention with Loggerhead Cay is the total height of the structures. Although the four story buildings are to be 34 ft. 8 inches high, air conditioning units, elevator shafts and other appurtenances, add an extra 8 feet. This, many of us believe, is a violation of the intent of the 35 ft. height restriction ordinance now in effect on Sanibel and Captiva. For this and other reasons, the building permits could have been issued illegally.

Since the development plans to break ground March 1, it might be well to write, telegraph or telephone the Lee County Commissioners and find out what steps, if any, have been taken to examine this whole matter more closely. I'm sure Chairman Kenneth Daniels. our own Walter Shirey and Commissioners Sweeney, Sayers and Goldtrap would welcome your opinions and suggestions. To be perfectly fair, one could also contact Mr. Harold Hicks, A.I.A., who designed these buildings in conjunction with the firm of W. R. Frizzell of Fort Myers. No doubt he would be glad to explain this unusual plan.

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DING'S THINGS

In addition to the J. N. Ding Darling National Wildlife Refuge, six other refuges are administered through the Sanibel headquarters. These more northern refuges --Caloosahatchee, Matlacha Pass, Pine Island, Island Bay, Passage Key, and Pinellas -are islands dispersed between Sanibel and Tampa Bay.

The Caloosahatchee Refuge was initially set aside in 1920 by President Woodrow Wilson as a reservation for the protection of native birds, and it encompassed eight small unsurveyed mangrove islands situated in the Caloosahatchee River east of Fort Myers. The lower four islands were lost to river channel dredging, but the remaining lands are used to some extent by herons and egrets.

Pine Island Refuge also came into federal hands as a "bird reservation," a term later changed to "wildlife refuge." An executive order by President Theodore Roosevelt in 1908 designated three islets in Pine Island Sound between LaCosta and Pine Islands as a preserve and breeding ground for native birds. Here pelicans, cormorants, frigatebirds, herring and laughing gulls, forster's terns, great blue herons, little blue herons, Louisiana herons, black and yellow-crowned night herons, common egrets, and wood ibis may be found roosting or nesting.

In that same week in 1908, President Roosevelt signed another executive order setting aside three small islands in Matlacha Pass as protected wildlife areas. Upper, Middle, and Lower Bird Keys provide attractive habitat for pelicans, cormorants, snowy and cattle egrets, common egrets, laughing gulls, little blue herons, great blue herons, Louisiana herons, white ibis, wood ibis, night herons, frigatebirds, least terns, anhingas, ovstercatchers, and various sandpipers.

Twenty-three miles northwest of Fort Myers, the Island Bay National Wildlife Refuge, located in a vast complex of mangrove islands and brackish waters, consists

of six tracts of land totalling 20 acres which occupy the higher portions of numerous islands and mangrove shorelines. Parts of this refuge have a rich history: two Indian mounds are found here, and the pirate Jose Gaspar reportedly used these islands for hiding treasures. Wildlife found on Island Bay lands include pelicans, ibis, willet, royal terms, cormorants, great blue herons, common egrets, ring-hilled gulls, laughing gulls, oystercatchers, and raccoons. In 1970, the Island Bay Refuge was officially designed as a National Wilderness Area under the Wilderness Act of 1964 (PL

The Passage Key Refuge was similarly included in the National Wilderness Preservation System in 1970 by President Richard Nixon. This refuge, another which had its beginnings as a Roosevelt-proclaimed reservation in 1905, was one of the first migratory bird reservations in the country. Since that time, the 20-acre island has been considerably altered by hurricanes and Gulf current changes. Once important as a nesting area for laughing gulls and black skimmers, Passage Key now serves primarily as a loafing site for terns, gulls, pelicans, cormorants, and shorebirds.

The most northern and largest island refuge under the Ding Darling administration is the Pinellas Refuge at the mouth of Tarpon Bay. At one time the proposed site of a commercial shrimp farm, this 377-acre refuge is now one of the most important brown pelican rookeries in the United States.

These six satellite refuges encompass a total of 498 acres, bringing the administrated acreage of the Darling offices to 5,208 acres. Because the smaller areas are important nesting and roosting sites and offer few recreational opportunities, no facilities are provided for public use, and access is limited to boaters. The Sanibel headquarters has available for the interested visitor more information on the islands as well as the Wilderness Study Area analysis of the Passage Key and Island Bay Refuges.

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
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
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
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
