## **Conservation Foundation Presents Film**

A memorable film event -- John Muir's High Sierra, Filmed and narrated by Dewitt Jones, Jr., Sunday April 1, at 8 P.M., at Island Beach Club.

Mr. Jones' Muir film has received enthusiastic praise in its initial showings on the East and West Coasts. Under the partial sponsorship of the National Geographic Society, he spent 18 months in the Sierra, following the footsteps of John Muir, the noted conservationist. Highlights of the film include Yosemite Valley; climbing Washington's Column; backpacking into the high country.

Dewitt Jones Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Dewitt Jones of Captiva, graduated from Dartsmouth in 1965. After traveling throughout Europe, he produced, "Written in the Water" for the National Geographic Society. This film traced the story of a kayak expedition around Japan.

Mr. Jones will personally present and narrate his unique new color film for the benefit of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation.


## ``Ding's'' Things


Several times during the past year, the usually infrequent visits of an endangered sea mammal have made the J. N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge look suspiciously like the setting for one of Jacques Cousteau's recent movies. Sea cows or manatees -- now thought to be the mythical mermaids - have taken refuge in several of the federal bays and bayous. The most recent live sighting was in the boat basin at the Tarpon Bay residences in January. Also in that month, a dead yearling was found tangled in the mangrove roots on the Tarpon Bay canoe trail.

Once numbering in the tens of thousands on both Florida coasts, the manatee is now endangered and limited in range to Southern Florida. Man still poses the greatest threat to this gentle creature even though legislation now provides for legal protection througout Florida. Before this protection was initiated, manatee hunting reduced populations significantly. Hides were used for canoe coverings, the meat was fed to slaves, manatee oil was in demand, and rumor has it that the manatee tears were sought as an aphrodisiac. At times wanton slaughter of the animal purely for sport occurred in Florida. Even with the elimination of manatee hunting, man's activities still deter population increases. The silting in of coastal feeding grounds and injuries from boat keels and propellers take their toll. Freezing weather has been known to induce pneumonia in these warm-blooded mammals, and crocodiles and sharks probably take the very young manatees.

Several management techniques have been proposed for the manatee, but many have proved unsuccessful. A "sea ranch" was established as a managed area for the animals, but this failed due to coralling difficulties, the fact that the animals each require about 300 pounds of vegetation a day, and the breeding characteristic of bearing only one calf. In addition to establishing sanctuary areas for manatees (of which the Everglades National Park is the largest) and to continuing legal protection, the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife is suggesting that certain areas be impounded and experimentally stocked with manatees.

Populations of manatees appear to have stabilized though there are no reliable estimates of their numbers. They are the most difficult aquatic mammal to observe. One factor in favor of the manatee is its herbivorous eating habits. Its usefulness in controlling aquatic vegetation in canals and ditches may encourage its protection.

#### MAKING TRACKS with Sandy

I sat at home Sunday afternoon and traveled all over the world. I traveled to Australia, New Zealand, Japan, Hong Kong, Tonga and the Fiji Islands, among other faraway places, and my guide was Mr. Brian Kane. Each one of us listening to his fascinating verbal descriptions felt as though we were experiencing the journey.

Mr. Kane, a winter visitor to Island Inn from Chestertown, Md., kept his audience in rapt attention as we accompanied him by plane and ship through a South Seas storm to the serenity of a Japanese garden, and finally to a Fiji Island where his uncle had lived.

It was the latter sojourn that was the highlight of his travelogue, and at our urging he began the dramatic account of his uncle, Tom Stockwell - adventurer, sheep herder, opal miner, philanderer, vagabond sailor, and finally, husband of the beautiful cousin of Tonga's Queen Salote. "The Adventures of Uncle Tom" would make colorful reading in book form and would prove that truth, indeed, is stranger than fiction. Here is the story.

Tom Stockwell, brother of Brian Kane's mother, left home at age 18 and disappeared. When next heard from a couple of years later, he was in Australia drifting from job to job seeking his fortune. Leaving this country, he sailed the high seas on tramp steamers - taking any sort of job offered him, traveling the world.

"Uncle Tom" in true Stockwell style was shipwrecked on a Fiji island where he eventually met the Queen of Tonga's cousin.

"Her name was Malaia Waingolo," Brian Kane told his attentive listeners, "and the next thing we heard from him back home was that he had fallen in love.'

The story takes a dramatic turn when the two approached the Queen for her consent to their marriage. She agreed, but made two stipulations: I. that they wait seven years; and 2. that there should be no children. It was obvious that Uncle Tom was in love, for the man who had made ladies swoon from San Francisco to Singapore was willing to wait seven years for the only real lady in his life.

After the lavish wedding ceremony and feast, Mr. and Mrs. Stockwell left for the island of Katafaga (in the Lau group) which he had leased for 99 years. Here the couple happily lived for twenty years until his death in 1945, and here it was that he introduced his bride to western ways and culture.

It was as though they had their own little kingdom, for Tom Stockwell's every thought was for his "Queen," providing her with fine Paris gowns, jewels, and all the comforts of life, including a complete silver service, rare china and linens which he required for the evening meal. (Though Malaia had lands of her own, it was the income from her husband's coconut plantation that gave them more than enought to live on).

Through the terms of the will, Mr. Kane was made sole heir and guardian and because of this, he makes periodic trips to "Loma Loma", where Malaia now lives. Of the very first trip he relates:

"I traveled by ship the last 36 hours and I found that the produce hoisted onto the ship at various ports was all to be used at a feast in my honor. When at last my destination was in sight, a most terrible storm came up and I was forced to jump into the water and wade ashore with the aid of ropes. There was Malaia waiting for me in the downpour, dressed in her Paris gown, and throwing her arms about me cried, "You look just like Tom," and burst into tears. Never was a person more royally treated and I might have been eating in one of the finest restaurants in New York. I was waited on hand and foot by well-trained servants and my every wish was their command.'

In the ensuing years, Mr. Kane's wife, Hilda, and their daughter, Nancy, have accompanied him to Loma Loma to visit Malaia, who is in her 80's now.

As guardian of Tom's widow's estate, Brian Kane learned (as has been the case everywhere inflation has upset the economy) that it would require a substantial increase in the will to allow her to live in the style his uncle would have wanted. Therefore he has added many comforts to her "buri" (house) and even brought electricity to the island.

Thus ended the romantic story of a couple from two different worlds - just like a fairy tale.

#### THIS WEEK AT THE SANIBEL LIBRARY By Hal N. Harrison

With the recent death of the Nobel and Pulitzer Prize-winning author, Pearl S. Buck, we moved immediately to acquire for Sanibel patrons her latest book, "All Under Heaven," which was announced less than a week before her death. The novel is about an American diplomat forced to leave Peking after the takeover by Mao Tse-tung.

After the book was ordered, I began to wonder just how popular Pearl Buck has been with Sanibel readers, so I checked the list of books we have acquired over the years. The total is 19 and it indicates her popularity locally. Indeed, one on that list is also new: "Once Upon a Christmas." You may not want to wait until the Holidays to read it. The book contains 14 stores gathered from her own tales and her Christmas reminiscences of nearly a lifetime. This is a lovely book for both adults and children. It is both fiction and personal experiences, much of it in China.

Miss Buck's most famous novel was "The Good Earth," which won her the Pulitzer Prize in 1931, just two years after she started publishing. In 1938, she became the first American woman to win the Nobel Prize for Literature on the basis of six of her works on China. Special mention was made at the time of two biographies of her missionary parents, "The Exile" and "Fighting Angel."

She was born Pearl Sydenstricker in Hillsboro, W. Va., on June 26, 1892, but spent most of her first 43 years in China where she went with her parents as an infant. She learned to speak (Chinese; before she spoke English.

In 1964, she started the Pearl S. Buck Foundation with \$1 million contribution. Since then the foundation has helped more than 2,000 Asian children who were fathered and abandoned by American servicemen.

Despite her profound sympathy and love for Chinese people, she was denied permission to visit Red China last October. The Chinese declared her works took "an attitude of distortion and villification toward the people of China and their leadership."


The group, in costume, will present a varied program of chorus, solo and small ensemble music using a challis harpsichord, a consort of recorders and small percussion.


### Recipe of the Week CANTONESE SHRIMP and BEANS 1½ lbs. raw shelled deveined shrimp 1½ tsp. chicken stock base 1 cup boiling water ¼ cup thinly sliced green onion 1 clove crushed garlic 1 Tbsp. oil 1 tsp. salt ½ tsp. ginger dash pepper 1 pkg. (9 oz.) frozen cut green beans 1 Tbsp. cornstarch 1 Tbsp. cold water

Dissolve chicken stock base in boiling water. Cook onion, garlic and shrimp in boiling water. If necessary, add a little chicken broth to prevent sticking. Stir in salt, ginger, pepper, green beans and broth. Cover and simmer 5 to 7 minutes (or until beans are cooked but still slightly crisp). Combine cornstarch and water and add to shrimp mixture, cooking until thick and clear, stirring constantly. Serves 6. (approx. 128 calories per serving.)





#### DOROTHY MENDENHALL DRAWS CROWD

Dorothy A. Mendenhall, noted ornithologist and licensed operator of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, drew a large crowd of interested onlookers and photographers at her Thursday Lecture and demonstration sponsored by the Sanibel- Captiva Audubon Society. Mrs. Mendenhall had set up some almost invisible black nylon nets to trap birds for banding. She succeeded in netting a ground dove and demonstrated how to band his leg with a lightweight but sturdy aluminum marker, which slipped over the feet like a bracelet, explaining that the process was painless and harmless to the bird which she then released.

Over a period of many years, Mrs. Mendenhall has a wide range of experience in identifying and observing the migratory habits of many birds, both in Central America and in the United States, and in particular at her home in the summer and fall in Maryland. She is here in the winters and her show was staged at Island Inn with its background of local trees and grasses. She has frequently banded more than five hundred birds in one day in her studies, and she has thus been able to determine their flyways, which often follow rivers.

Children of the fourth and fifth grades under the direction of Mr. Runnels watched Mrs. Mendenhall at work with her field implements, along with about 100 other island spectators and visitors.

#### FANS AND PURSES

Art in the afternoon at the Pirate Playhouse on March 28th will feature all the prop fans and purses used in the theater's productions.
