Illegal Signs

Snipe, Banner and Sandwich signs are among the several kinds of signs outlawed by the Sanibel-Captiva Island Sign Ordinance. Business as well as residential property owners and operators alike should have taken down this type sign by August 1971. If you are among the few who forgot, or did not know, please remove them.

According to the Ordinance, a SANDWICH SIGN is any double or single faced sign which is portable and may readily be moved from place to place. SNIPE SIGNS are any small signs tacked, nailed or attached in any way to trees or other objects. Cloth, paper or fabric signs (including awning signs) are called BANNER SIGNS and are also illegal.

The Sign Ordinance Coordinating Committee will make available copies of the sign ordinance for anyone interested. They are also available to help sign owners understand the law, and will handle violation reports from anyone. Committee members are reached through Ms. Roberts, at the Chamber of Commerce, 472-1080, daily 10 a.m. - 5 p.m. excluding Sunday. Next week: Sign regulations affecting new business.



Fishing Pier Fund

This is an account of the money donated to the Sanibel-Captiva fishing pier fund. The total to date is \$13,303.13, including the interest. Of this, \$8900.00 has been turned over to the Lee County Commissioners towards the bid price on the basic structure.

The bid was awarded to Foster Brothers Marine of Ft. Lauderdale for \$28,900.00. The state gave \$10,000; Lee County gave \$10,000 and \$8900 came from our Pier Fund. The balance in the fund now is \$2724.86. This money will be used for a covered area, lights, water, benches, and a fish cleaning area on the pier.

The contractor has a local firm, Rivers Construction, subcontracted to do the job. The material is on the job site and construction should start soon. We were held up awaiting approval of the State monies. A 90 day completion date after start of construction is in the contract. The new pier will be 300 feet west of the old structure.

The Sanibel-Captiva Chamber of Commerce would like to thank all members for the help and contributions towards this very much needed pier project. Special thanks to Dave Holtzman, Herb Purdy, Ella Mae Rasmussen and Don Case who were knocking on doors and twisting arms.

For those who couldn't or didn't give before, we are still accepting help towards the before mentioned extras. We would like this to be the finest fishing pier in the area.

Water Shirey, our District Commissioner did a tremendous job of getting the necessary permits and a large chunk of money. Our hats off to a hard working commissioner who wants to help with our problems on the Islands.







PLUSH CONDOMINIUMS ON SANIBEL

Mr. Robert Stevens president of Stevens Construction Co. has just revealed his plans for a condominium development which will include a recreation club house with a swimming pool and many other recreation facilities for the use of the residents at his "King's Crown" project. "This will be the only

"This will be the only condominium development of its kind on Sanibel," said Stevens. "The architectural firm of Smith, Bechamps and Khoury of Miami are designers for the strictly luxury development."

Mr. Stevens is noted for his quality buildings on Sanibel and Captiva, where he has been in the construction business for 16 years, after coming here from St. Louis, Mo., where he owned a successful contracting business.

The King's Crown will be located on a 300 by 600 foot land parcel between West Gulf Drive and the Gulf of Mexico. Twenty-four attached two and three story buildings will house 72 apartments in phase one besides the recreation area and facilities. The Lathan Corporation will be financing the construction of the luxury setup.







VIOLATORS APPREHENDED ON BRIDGE

On Feb. 6, 1973, and March 2, 1973, three persons were apprehended on the J. N. Ding Darling National Wildlife Refuge and cited for the harvesting and attempted removal of plants from the area. On Feb. 28, 1973, the U. S. Magistrate in Lee County assessed one offender a fine of \$50.00 for the removal of five culms of the state and federally protected sea oat. 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
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FILM FOR BENEFIT OF CONSERVATION FOUNDATION



MUSEUM-PLANETARIUM PLANNED FOR SANIBEL

The campaign to back construction of a nature center and planetarium in Lee County came to Sanibel last week in the form of ex-County Commissioner Julian Hudson. Mr. Hudson, who is executive chairman of the campaign, presented slides, plans and information to a group of interested islanders on Tuesday evening, March 20.

Mr. Hudson noted that the museum/planetarium would be an environmental showcase illustrating Southwest Florida's delicate ecology for young and old alike. Outdoor nature trails on a hundred acre city-owned parcel south east of Fort Myers, a 'touch" wildlife museum and an imaginative planetarium program will be the principal highlights.

The campaign has already attracted substantial financial support both because of its novelty and its wide-spread appeal. Mr. Hudson pointed out that in addition to being a fascinating educational facility for youngsters of Lee County, the museum/planetarium will be an attraction for both visitors and local residents. The campaign, sponsored by the Junior Welfare League of Lee County, is aimed almost entirely at broad-based private support.

Several island residents have pledged significant contributions to the project. "This is an appealing program which has much in common with many of our island activities," said an Island spokesman. "Granted we have plenty of problems on the Islands to devote

ourselves to, none the less, it's important to show the responsible leaders in Lee County that our environmental concerns go well beyond our own island interests."




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

Wouldn't you just love to know what the girl had to say when she got home? It probably started out like this: "Guess what happened to me today? There was this guy ----."



An endangered species that a number of Islanders have found exciting is our national bird, the Southern Bald Eagle, a pair of which have been nesting on Captiva for several years running. Quite often resident and visitor alike have glanced up to watch a vulture soaring overhead only to catch sight of a dazzling white-feathered head and tail which identify the adult bald eagle.

Once this eagle was more widely found in the southern United States from Atlantic to Pacific Oceans, Now these populations are greatly reduced. Major eagle nesting areas have succumbed to the demands of an increasing human population for housing and industrial areas. Nesting birds are disturbed and will abandon partially incubated eggs. Illegal shooting in western states has significantly affected the eagle. In one state in the year between Sept. 1970, and August, 1971, more than 500 eagles, both bald and golden, were killed in spite of a 1940 federal law protecting these birds. Nesting trees have been lost due to habitat destruction. But perhaps the most insidious threat to the bald eagle, and to many other creatures susceptible to the same, is that of indiscriminant pesticide use. Reducing populations by thinning egg shells, causing infertility of eggs and sterility of adults, and sapping the vigor of both the hatchling and adult, pesticides have brought the bald eagle one step closer to extinction.


Protective measures have been initiated in an effort to sustain and enchance the dwindling eagle numbers. As mentioned earlier, federal law protects both bald and golden eagles. In addition, numerous agencies and groups are cooperating and pooling information gathered on these birds. The National Audubon Society conducts intensive studies on the status, distribution, breeding biology, and factors which limit agle populations. The State Audubon Societies are working with landowners to set aside areas for eagle sanctuaries. The National Wildlife Refuge System has undertaken defensive methods to protect eagles nesting on federal lands. Effects of pesticides on eagles are investigated; access to nesting areas is restricted; timber cutting, road traffic, and the use of pesticides have been reduced or eliminated; and cooperation is being sought with the public in the vicinity of the refuge to reduce activities near eagle sites. Possible nesting trees are left standing, and experiments are underway to find a method to enhance captive breeding.

For the fifth straight year, the Captiva bald eagles were unsuccessful in their nesting attempts. After ascertaining that the nest was unsuccessful, one egg was removed for chemical analysis and as yet the results of that analysis have not been released.

AUDUBON PROGRAM TONIGHT

Tonight, Thursday, March 29 the Sanibel-Captiva Audubon will present the fifteenth program of the current season at 8 p.m. at the Sanibel Community House. It will consist of a fascinating color slide presentation entitled "Underwater Wonderland," dealing with the teeming wildlife and vegetation found in the Florida Keys. The photos and commentary will be by Michael Stuart, chairman of the S 'hwest Florida Conservation Clearinghouse, who is an expert in this field, and has it marine biology in Sarasota. At the present time Mr. Stuart is on the staff of the Environmental Education Center in Fort Myers, and very active in the defense of Lee County's ecological wealth.

As usual, the program is open to the public, and all are cordially invited.



Most of the bicycle signs are up. The yellow signs designate bicycle crossings. The green signs show which roads are to be used by bicycles. These roads are: Gulf Drive (east and west), Casa Ybel Rd., Tarpon Bay Road, Rabbit Rd., and Lighthouse Rd. The speed limit on these roads is 35 mph or less, and the bicycles have the same rights as cars. Cyclists, please ride on the correct side of the road. For those who may not know, bicycles should stay on the right hand side, the same as automobiles.

The purpose of these bicycle routes is to try and divert bicycle traffic off congested parts of Periwinkle Way. Please, if you are riding your bicycle for fun and exercise use the designated bike routes.

This is the best we can do until enough funds are collected to start on proper bicycle paths. We are grateful to Mr. Larry Gnagey of the Div. of Community Services of Lee County for getting these signs up for us.

At present, there is \$500 in the Bike Path Fund. When you think it costs \$2 a foot for a paved path, we have a long way to go.







THIS WEEK AT THE SANIBEL LIBRARY by Hal H. Harrison

During a fortnight holiday in London last fall, my wife and I, along with Bob and Phoebe Haynie, made a list of the shows we wanted to see. No. 1 on the list was Agatha Christie's record-breaking mystery drame, "The Mouse Trap." It has played in London non-stop for over 20 years. At the end of the first of two acts, the Haynies left for their hotel. Mada and I stayed although we were sure who the murderer was long before intermission.

But such is the reputation and the tremendous drawing power of Agatha Christie. The writings of no other English author except Shakespeare have been translated as often as the works of this great mystery writer whose full name is Agatha Mary Clarissa Miller Christie Mallowan. In her native England, she is known as Lady Mallowan. Or, as honored by Queen Elizabeth, she is also Dame Agatha.

All of which brings me to the announcement that the Sanibel Library now has Agatha Christie's latest mystery, "Elephants Can Remember." Long-time Christie fans will find this book as rewarding as many of her others, for, as the New York Times puts it, "Criticize 'Elephants Can Remember?' As well criticize the Brooklyn Bridge or the Tower of London."


In this book, a middle-aged author of detective stories enlists Poirot to look into an old mystery, which, needless to say, Poirot solves in his usual suave manner. It is y'' that the reader will also solve the mystery long before the book ends, but this itage Christie.


The Sanibel Library now offers its patrons 25 books by Agatha Christie. If we have more by any other author I am not conscious of it.

How old is Dame Christie? Believe it or not, she is 83; and she still turns out at least one new mystery book every year. She was born in Devonshire in 1890, the second daughter of an Anglo-American marriage, and her name was Agatha Miller. In 1914, Miss Miller married Archibold Christie. She divorced him in 1928 and in 1930 married a distinguished British archeologist, Max E. I. Mallowan. Prof. Mallowan was eventually knighted by Elizabeth II and became Sir Max and his famous wife became Lady Mallowan.

Agatha Christie's first thriller was published in 1921 after six rejections. It was "The Mysterious Affair at Styles." Hercule Poirot, the famous Belgian detective, was introduced in the first book. It was 10 years later before Dame Agatha introduced her second famous character, Jane Marple, in a mystery titled "Murder at the Vicarage."

In all, Agatha Christie has authored 63 myster novels, 17 plays, innumerable short stories, and two non-fiction works. She has also written a number of novels under the pen name of Mary Westmacott. Her favorite book? "Crooked House," published in 1949. Her worst book? She rates "The Mystery of the Blue Train" in that category.


