Audubon Event Today

Today, Thursday, April 5, the Sanibel-Captiva Audubon Society is holding its last outdoor event of the season. It is a conducted tour in the Bailey Tract Wildlife Sanctuary on Tarpon Road, starting at 3 p.m.

Leader and speaker is Griffing Bancroft, vice president of the Society and vice chairman of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation. One of Florida's leading ornithologists, Mr. Bancroft will offer interesting information and unusual insights into the conduct and habits of many species of birds. The mating and nesting season being at hand, he will dwell particularly on aspects of their way of life during the breeding months. As usual, the gathering is open to the public at no charge.



Incorporation Of Islands?

Registered voters on Sanibel and Captiva will shortly be receiving in the mail a report and a ballot about incorporation of the islands. Incorporation, or Home-Rule, as some prefer to call it, has been under study by a special committee of the Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board for more than a year.

The committee report was announced at the March 19 annual meeting of the Planning Board. The membership overwhelmingly endorsed the concept of exploring home-rule as an alternative to the present system and authorized the Planning Board to pursue the matter at once with the public-at-large on the islands.

The committee report neither favors nor opposes incorporation. Rather, it seeks to point out what the likely advantages and disadvantages might be under a certain type of self government. In brief, it shows that for a modest increase in taxes it would be possible for Sanihel-Captiva to adopt a mayor/council type government which would closely control building and zoning and which would provide round-the-clock police protection. The report concludes with the necessary steps of procedure for incorporation, should there be sufficient interest among island voters.

The ballot that will accompany the mailed report is unofficial and seeks primarily to determine if there is enough interest in the concept of home-rule at this time to explore the matter further. The voters are not asked to vote for or against incorporation. The ballot is also designed to obtain remarks from islanders about what form of government they think best for the present circumstances.


The Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board, which is sponsoring the mailing, believes that better controls and enforcement than now exist are necessary under the conditions of rapid growth facing the islands. The Planning Baord's work on the Sanibel-Captiva Master Plan as well as its regular communication and cooperation with county officials and departments is aimed at promoting reasonable planned growth while preserving our unique natural assets, according to Vernon MacKenzie, Board President.

Nature Walk Scheduled

On Wednesday, April 11, we have a real treat in store. Aptly called "Look and Learn," this will be an exciting, educational walk through the "Nature Center" site --one of the original purchases by the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation of the interior wetlands.

Led by William Hammond, this promises to be an outstanding experience for all. Most of us know of his success with young people on such tours. Now adults can have the advantage of "Look and Learn," and this is a fine chance to see one of the areas acquired through your generous contributions.

Be at the Sanibel Community House at 10 a.m. The date again, April 11. All Conservation Foundation members and guests are welcome.


Mr. & Mrs. WALTER KING of Marianna, Ga., are here for their third trip, planning to stay until July to see if they might like to retire here.

NEW BOOK ON NATIVE PLANTS

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"Native Trees and Shrubs for Sanibel-Captiva Landscaping," by Mada Harrison will be published for the benefit of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation.

Mrs. Harrison's book has many suggestions for gardeners who want to save what they have on their land, and she offers means of transplanting and propagation.

Some of the author's favorite plants are well worth knowing. Many resist a change, for example, the joewood and the seven-year apple. The joewood is known for its fragrant blossoms and the apple for its lovely leaves and blooms. So, if you are fortunate enough to have these shrubs on your property guard them well.

The coco plum, lovely in appearance, excellent bearer and fine for screening will grow anywhere, unlike other plants that need certain soil or shading.

The wild coffee shrub, with its shiny leaves and white blossoms in season, can be transplanted but certain rules should be followed. Use small plants or seedlings, pot them and give them a chance to re-root for a few weeks before putting them in the ground.

The annual meeting of the Board of Directors of the Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board was held March 22, 1973 when four new members were welcomed: Porter Goss, George Tenney, Charles Holland and John Willard. Officers were elected for the coming year. They are, president, Vernon MacKenzie; first VP, Benton Blair; second VP, George Tenney; third VP, Charles Holland; recording secretary, Mrs. Charles Paschall; corresponding secretary, Mrs. Robert Dormer; treasurer, Don Marshall; assistant treasurer, Malcolm Beatty.

Committee chairmen were appointed as follows: Membership, Don Marshall; Zoning and related problems, Bob Haynie, Malcolm Beatty, co-chairmen; Sanibel-Captiva Incorporation, Porter Goss; Review of by-laws, Benton Blair; Publicity, John Willard; Causeway Refinancing, George Tenney.

Brief discussions of various problems involving the Planning Board indicated the great importance of rapid development of the Comprehensive Plan being studied by Lee County and the inclusion of the Island Comprehensive Plan in the discussions. Plans were made to send information regarding possible incorporation of Sanibel-Captiva as requested by the members at the annual meeting before arranging to obtain opinions regarding incorporation.

THIS WEEK AT THE SANIBEL LIBRARY by Hal H. Harrison

One of the major aims of the committee in charge of acquiring books for the Sanibel Public Library is to have on our shelves just as quickly as possible all the books that make the best seller list of the New York Times and other publications throughout the country; to bring to the people of Sanibel the books that people everywhere are reading when they are reading them. In many cases, the acquisition committee must make judgements regarding the books that are likely to appeal to Sanibel patrons and those that are not. In the case of best sellers, however, it is our policy to assume that a book that has reached that status is worthy of circulation on the Island.

Such a book is "Dr. Atkins' Diet Revolution," by Robert C. Atkins, M.D. Not that some of us on Sanibel do not need all the advice that we can get when it comes to dieting, but circulation of "diet books" has not been a great factor in the Sanibel Library. But any book that can knock "I'm OK, You're OK" out of No. 1 in non-fiction, must have a lot going for it. So we have the book for you to read. According to the advance publicity it is the high calorie way to stay thin forever; an incredible diet discovery that makes your body burn up its own fat.

To quote further from the blurb concerning the book: "Amazingly successful even in cases where all other diets have failed, the Atkins Diet has gained wide approval, acclaim and use --- it is a diet you can live with in comfort and enjoyment for the rest of your life."

So, if you don't get thin, don't blame the library. We tried.

Speaking of eating, we have a new book by an expert in the field; "Stalking the Good Life," by Euell Gibbons. You will remember him best as the author of "Stalking the Wild Asparagus" and "Stalking the Blue-eyed Scallop." In this, Gibbons' sixth book, he tells of his love affair with nature. To him, the good life is sharing and enjoying nature, and maintaining an environment where natural things can flourish unhampered by man's carelessness or indifference to the bounty and privilege nature offers all of us.

If the conservation overtones of that review strike a response to you, I can offer you another by Paul Brooks, the author of "Roadless Area" and "The House of Life (Story of Rachael Carson)." It is "The Pursuit of Wilderness," a book that tells what we are doing to save our remaining virgin wilderness. Brooks describes six continuing battles in defense of the American earth, together with examples of wildlife destruction and protection in all parts of the world. Each chapter includes an account of a personal wilderness experience. The illustration by Philip Hyde, Fred Truslow and others are excellent.

And finally, a real shocker in the ecology field is "The End of the Dream" by Phillip Wylie, written shortly before his death in 1971. In this one Wylie trains his sights on the ultimate catastrophe --- man's destruction of the world through his unheeded and willful poisoning of the atmosphere, land, seas, rivers and finally the human race itself.

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



### HIGH SIERRA SHOWN



Proceeds from the event were contributed to the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation.



## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

#### TO THE ISLANDER:

Twice during the last week I have encountered Sanibel beach visitors carrying sea oats. One was a woman from Canada and the other a little girl who had found a stalk lying on the sand. Both were one day visitors who were completely unaware of the restrictions regarding cutting of sea oats until someone stopped to tell them of the penalties involved. They were both visibly embarrassed when they found they had violated an island regulation. The little girl lay down the sea oats and covered it with sand. A beautiful day at Sanibel was tarnished with guilt and self reproach.

I believe there must be a more effective way to protect our beach and island. For a long time I have felt all visitors would welcome and benefit from information about Sanibel, its unique place in our national ecology and how they would participate in its preservation. Those of us who are here for longer or permanent residents, of course, have many opportunities to learn these things through the intensive Audubon Society and Conservation Foundation programs, but the first time or one day visitors do not.

A small natural history museum at the site of the Chamber of Commerce building with a short film on island plants, birds, animals, fishing information, beach access and parking, etc., would be the ideal way to solve the problem. Until such a dream can be a reality, a simple, brief brochure handed out at the bridge toll station and placed in motel rooms and restaurants would do much to make a day at Sanibel a happy learning experience.

Sanibel residents are asked day after day to share a treasure with a great many people, for the Gulf, the beach and the bird sanctuary belong to everyone from the occasional, casual sheller and fisherman to the permanent resident. Every visitor to whom I have spoken hopes to return.

There are the exploiters and spoilers, but I believe the majority would be happy to contribute toward finding a Sanibel as lovely on each return visit as it was on the first. We can help by presenting vital conservation information in a kind and intelligent manner.

She said families on Medicaid could make appointments with the health department for the immunizations.





## **MANGROVES VALUE HAS** GONE UP

Joel Christianson of the Environmental Education Center gave a talk the other evening to persons at Shell Point under the aegis of the Adult Education program and we hope he will be come to address islanders in the near future about mangroves and their value to all of us.

Some of the highlights of his talk pointed out that one acre of mangroves is worth \$35,000 a year ecologically and economically. "The adventitious or aerial roots of the common red mangrove, which is indigenous to almost all of our islands around here, trap detritus material in the amount of 8 tons a year," he pointed out. "Not only does this build up land, but in the process, symbiotic processes occur that feed our shrimp industry, which is the second largest in the state, and also our sport and food fish."

The West Coast is the best and last tarpon grounds in the Gulf of Mexico, and the brown pelican nursery is the largest in the state, and all of these are dependent on the mangrove for life, he stated. He strongly urges the protection of our mangroves from destroying them by dredging, uprooting or draining land, and he stated emphatically that we must protect our mangroves to protect our own lives here in Southwest Florida.

Bourbon Beets


- 1 can (1 pound) sliced beets
- ¹/₂ teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 1 tablespoon vinegar
- 1/3 cup Bourbon

Drain beets, reserving liquid. Place beets in a glass container. Add seasonings, vinegar, Bourbon and beet liquid to fill. Cover. Marinate 24 hours or longer.


