SANIBEL-CAPTIVA PLAN DELAYED BY COUNTY

The approval of a comprehensive Sanibel-Captiva program was stalled Monday at the first formal meeting of the Lee County Planning Commission.

The planners, meeting jointly with the county commission, voted to bracket Sanibel-Captiva with 11 other county districts for presentation as part of the overall Leeprogram, due in August.

The Island's plan was the result of 18 months of study by a special committee.

It was put in with the other districts after County Commissioner Dick Sayers recommended its rejection as a separate action.


The 7-2 planning commission vote against acceptance of the plan after Sayers said: "I realize a lot of time and effort have been expended to produce the master plan for Sanibel-Captiva. However, I think it would be unwise to consider it ahead of the countywide plan and separately from the countywide plan.

James Fortiner, a real estate dealer and planning commissioner, warned that individual adoption of the Sanibel-Captiva proposal "could create a hodge-podge" and it might "prove unfair to other sections of the county."

Vernon McKenzie said: "The people of the islands were led to believe the plan would be approved, and would consider it a breach of faith if it was rejected. The plan is more advanced than other areas and could be used as a guideline."

Listed as goals and objectives of the plan are to:

- Retain the South Sea island atmosphere at the Sanibel-Captiva planning area.
- Provide for a low population density on the islands.
- Maintain a significant amount of recreation area and open space.
- Improve the transportation network by developing a new major thoroughfare parallel to Periwinkle Way, completing Gulf Dirve by connecting the present paved stretches of the road and upgrading critical intersections on both islands.
- Expand the central water system and to provide adequate sewage treatment in the future.
- Prohibit destruction of vegetation, particularly red mangroves in land development.
- Promote additional public acquisition of land adjacent to the Ding Darling Wildlife Refuge.
- Encourage development of public park land adjacent to the Sanibel Is'and beaches
- Minimize the potential flood damage on the islands by encouraging proper styles of development in proper locations.
- Provide adequate commercial development located in such a manner as to ensure convenience, accessibility and a minimum of travel on the area's major thoroughfares.

This covers such things as: Early preparation, when warning comes, preapre outdoors, when warning comes, prepare indoors, preparing to leave, after the storm, and if help is needed.







REALTOR NEWS by Betty Davis

Young people, or older people hawho have rented housing all of their lives, sometimes would like to own real estate, but know little about the process of acquiring it. Most of us remember the things we are interested in. If deeds, eminent domain, easements, zoning and taxes came up in school when we weren't interested, the facts could get fuzzy after test papers were turned in.

The most common method of acquiring property is by purchasing it from an owner or through his agent. Two types of agents are licensed specifically to represent owners or buyers of real estate. These are real estate brokers and real estate salesmen. A salesman must always work for a broker, the broker being responsible for his salesman's actions.

Licenses are issued by the state after the candidate has passed on examination. In Florida, real estate salesmen are required to have a minimum one year experience before becoming eligible to take the broker's examination.

The term Realtor is a registered service mark which may be used only by a broker who is a member of the local real estate board and of the National Association of Real Estate Boards, both voluntary organizations.

An agent may also be a licensed

An offer of purchase is most commonly made through use of a document known as a deposit receipt (Contract). This contains all the terms and conditions of the purchase of the property.

When the offer to purchase has been accepted and the buyer and seller have both agreed on terms and have signed the deposit receipt, a deed must be signed and acknowledged by the seller and delivered to the buyer and recorded at the office of the county official who keeps such records.

Details of searching records to be sure the grantor has the right to sell are done by a title insurance company. When satisfied that the property can be sold, the title company issues an insurance policy protecting the new buyer against loss because of any cloud on the title that later may come to light.

Details of drawing up the deed, recording, financial arrangements and similar routine are handled by an escrow company.

They have the advantage of being a disinterested third party, holding the transaction in suspension until they make sure all legal requirements are met. After you are an owner, you should be aware that there are certain public rights that apply to your property. There is the right to tax, to acquire your property for public use through eminent domain, as is done for freeway rights-of-way. Police power may affect your property, as will the right of the state to promote health and the general welfare.

There may be easements that go with the property. This is a right granted by a previous owner to put a utility line, for instance, over the back of your lot. There is the right of escheat, which means that if there are not legal heirs to your property, it reverts to the government.

There may be a covenant applying to the property, either one you agreed to on buying, or one you may impose on selling. A covenant is an agreement that the property will not be used for certain purposes.

The most common right is that of someone loaning money to you for buying the property to sell it if you default. Such mortgage rights are known as liens. Liens may also be against the property for unpaid taxes or to satisfy judgements by the court.

Zoning restrictions are a special kind of public right, dictating to what use the property may be put. Zoning restrictions are decided by a zoning board and when they are changed are always subject to public hearing. You can also apply for a variance, which means you want to put it to a use not allowed under the zoning then in effect.

Interpreting the factors that apply to a particular real estate property is the business of a Realtor or other real estate broker. Besides having a day-to-day knowledge of property price trends, he can also guide the buyer and seller through the steps necessary in transferring ownership.

GHOST CARS MAY BE CLEARED AWAY

A pair of wrens hopped from the diapidated back seat of the old car onto the jagged glass of a once-window.

Just as quickly they skittered away from the car, abandoned for years on a side road in Sanibel. There are more than 150 of these metal hulls scattered about the island, useless and rusting, but under a plan initiated by Dick Workman of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation they all may be cleared away.

A Fort Myers junk dealer has agreed to crush and tow away all the cars free if enough cars can be located.

That's Workman's problem. Locating all the vehicles strewn about the marshes on both public and private land

More than 150 have been found on the island already, many just a few steps off Periwinkle Way, and as many as 50 or 60 have been discovered piled in broken heaps in the midst of the Ding Darling Wildlife Refuge.

"A lot of the cars accumulated in the Sanctuary before it became public land," Workman said. "To dispose of anything on the island, especially with a toll road, costs a great deal of money.

"It has been a tradition to dispose of unwanted wastes on backroads when no one is looking," he said.


He said this program could improve the appearance of the island without any expense.


"To make this economically feasible we have to get great numbers," Workman said. "If we get all but 20 cars then we would have to pay to get them taken away. It's pretty important to get them all now."

Permission must be given for vehicles to be towed from private land and Workman said he hopes anyone wanting a car disposed of will call him at the Conservation office.

TO THE ISLANDER:

Well, here I am again. This time, writing in reference to the Friday early evening news, June 8, channel 11. A humanitarian, Shirley Walter, was getting her hands slapped because of trying to save the lives of birds that were injured by the progress going on, on Sanibel Island, or because they were

The issue seems to be that there were complaints about her having such a CARE CENTER on her premises, which is zoned residential and therefore, does not allow her to maintain such an operation. It seems that no one knows what to label her efforts under. How to classify it. Whether it is a zoo or veterinary hospital, because there has never been such a place for such a need, anywhere in Lee County. Since no one can decide what it should come under, why not call it what it obviously is? A BIRD AND NATURE CARE CENTER! A wildlife Care Center! This woman is not operating it for profit! She is acting out a humanitarian feeling and love of the island! Isn't that also what Sanibel Island is anyway? A wildlife and bird sanctuary? isn't that what the Ding Darling Reserve is? Shouldn't this Center be therefore labeled under the Federal Game and Wildlife Reserve?

If she has a neighborhood problem about the animals, why did they move to the island in the first place? Her yard, I noticed in the TV interview was nicely fenced in and the yard looked immaculate and the animals looked well cared for and happy. If it was neighbors who made the complaint, why didn't they have the decency to approach her directly, to talk to her about it and try to work something out with her, for the welfare of these birds and removal to a better place, if they found their residency, on her property, so offensive. That would have been a better neighbor than to go running to City Hall, causing a

If her yard was strewn with garbage, would they have complained? If it was some one who made a complaint, why aren't they directing their efforts to

make complaints about the pigs who come here to the island and litter it with all their garbage, as I wrote about in my previous letter to you.

If such people have such energy to go around complaining about helping helpless animals, think what all their energy and efforts might accomplish if they turned it to more pertinent matters on the island, such as maintaining the island and seeing to it that visitors do too.

Another thing, I've read in the Islander that our pier was built with the help of private donations. This surprised me very much because my thought was that a federal grant was made for the building of a new pier. A federal grant, I believe, was made for the repair and building of Fort Myers Beach pier. Is Sanibel Island the step-child? What and where does all the funds go to that is collected on the causeway bridge? Three quarters of it should be returned to the island, for maintenance of the island. If some of those funds were appropriated to the island, it would help to build an appropriate place on appropriate property, for the care of injured and sick wildlife on the island, among other needs of the island.

If this is deemed a wildlife sanctuary, which I recall reading in many popular books and magazines, that it was, and is, then why shouldn't there be a center to care for the wildlife here? What could be more appropriate for the island?

My hat is off to Shirley Walter for her efforts, interest, and love of the island and it's original inhabitants. The wildlife. It is always outsiders and progress that destroys the beauty of such a place as Sanibel. If people don't like wildlife, natural tropical plant life, the sea and everything else that Sanibel has, or rather had, to offer, then why do they bother to come and move here. They don't need Sanibel. They need the mainland. City life. Asphalt jungle life.

Perhaps the best thing for Sanibel would have been to have kept the ferry boat and never to have built the causeway bridge at all. Sanibel is one of the very few natural reserves left, that are very fast disappearing. Soon all these

How'd you like to take a fast spin around the island in that shiny, yellow powerboat with the 350 hp Chevrolet engine? Man, can that go! You would? Well, first you better meet the man at the wheel --- what should you call him, pilot? Captain? Officer Shulte? Because he's the Lee County Sheriff's Marine Patrol in a sharp, green uniform; with plenty of official insignia on that 23' long Thunderbird Formula boat.

He smiles and gives you a huge helping hand aboard, "Just call me Dick." He's a big, easy-going man with freckles on his nose and red hair who just looks like he comes from some place called Auburn, Iowa, and learned, about the time he could walk, to run a boat on the Racoon River which he does and did. For all his warm grin, he seems a bit on the serious side, perhaps because he is so aware of the water and its hazards and because he conceives of his job even more as a "protector of persons" than as an enforcer of laws, although, of course, he is both. He patrols the waters of Lee County, but particularly those around the Beach, every weekend and holiday, watching for reckless boating, negligence on the water, overcrowding of boats and other dangerous practices. He has undoubtedly saved many persons from the consequences of their own or other people's folly.

There! Look at that 16' run-about tearing under the bridge as if the devil were after it. Spray flying, motor roaring and wake churning! If another boat had been pulling out of San Carlos Marina, no matter how slowly or carefully, it would have undoubtedly been creamed. Dick snaps to instant attention, eases forward on the throttle and the big, yellow boat zooms forward as if the rest of the world is standing still. He hails the run-about which slows up, stops and three anxious faces turn this way. "Hi, there," says

Dick with a slow, pleasant smile. His relaxed manner has its effect and the three men look more sheepish than alarmed. After he checks the driver's license, the boat registration and gives them a calm and friendly admonishment concerning the dangers of speeding through the bridge, he lets them off with a written warning rather than a ticket. Their relief is visible as they chug away, all smiles, at a more sensible pace.

Dick was in charge of the Safety Patrol for 8 years in Miami, supervising about 35 races a year including the Orange Bowl Regattas. He's only too aware of what boats can do to people, but his pet peeve is people who buy high-powered boats for their kids and then just turn them loose on the water. He doesn't think much of letting kids ride up on the bow of the boat either, having seen what a whirling propeller cna do to someone who's fallen overboard.

The most common infractions, however, are boats going too close to swimmers or whizzing past docks and moored boats with too much wake. So many boaters seem incredibly unaware of the rules of the road or even elementary good seamanship. Dick, and many other concerned persons, wish that it were a law that every boat owner or driver had to take the Coast Guard or Power Squadron course in safe boating.

Dick doesn't only look after the safety of boaters, however. He keeps an eye out for swimmers who venture in dangerous places, like a rip tide, or who paddle too far offshore on their inflated tires and rubber rafts. He rescued one lady last season who had floaated ³4 mile offshore. She was sleeping soundly, headed for Mexico aided by current and wind. Since she could not swim a stroke, it was fortunate that her raft had not sprung a slow leak as many of them do. Another time he rescued an 18' boat


which had broken down. There were ten people aboard, five of whom were children, no life preservers and the owner, who had just bought the boat, had never run one before and had no idea of what was wrong or how to fix it. But enough of the horrible examples.

As you whip across the Gulf to the end of Sanibel, the wind whistling in your ears and the engine purring softly, you look enviously at Dick who is obviously enjoying himself. You ask how he got such a great job and he laughs again. "I was a friend of Snag's and he needed

someone so he asked me to do it for a favor. Then when Wanicka was elected, he asked me to stay on. so I did. They're both fine men, and I like the chance to help out."

Indeed, he must like it because he has a thriving business of his own during the week, Custom Kar Tops, located just off the South Tamiami Trail. His schedule doesn't leave him much time for loafing around, but there are some men who just don't know when to quit. He even taught his wife to run a boat and all I can say is "more power to 'em both."





SUCCESS IN MARRIAGE by Professor of Marriage

DEAR PROFESSOR WILLIAMS: My wife and I seem to be quite happy and compatible. We've been married ten years. However, I would like to be made aware of certain "signs" which can indicate a marriage could be heading for trouble. Could you help me on this?

PROFESSOR WILLIAMS: This is a very good question. Yes, I can give you some help. The following points can indicate a marriage could be heading for trouble:

- 1) One of the spouses pays less and less attention to the other in showing consideration, love, affection, and respect.
- 2) Arguments are increasing in numbers and intensity.
- 3) Lack of communication on the part of one or both in discussing family problems or other situations that can directly or indirectly affect the family.
- 4) Sexual indifference or even coldness.
- 5) One or both spouses never wanting to do anything or go anywhere together.
- 6) Excluding the other spouse more and more from one's activities and interests.
- 7) Developing new friends who may not be acceptable to the spouse.
- 8) Increasing evidence of untruthfulness, lack of compassion, possible unfaithfulness, and general lack of regard on the part of one or both spouses.

Any one or two or even three of the above points does not necessarily mean the marriage is in trouble; however, more than this could spell trouble. To make a home a desirable place will require much patience and understanding. But, if this is done consistently and with perserverance, it can be successful.

DEAR PROFESSOR WILLIAMS: How important is home life in the development of a child's personality. My husband and I have heard that the home is the key to one's mental and physical development. Would you comment?

PROFESSOR WILLIAMS: According to the latest knowledge in socialogy, the kind of early home environment is the very basis for the development of personality. The type of personality traits one has is a direct reflection of the kind of early emotional interaction he has had within his family group. Whether one is dependent or independent, self; centered or othercentered, introvertive or extrovertive, and optomistic or pessimistic, depends upon the way he was treated or perceived this treatment in his early childhood. It is thought that one's personality is formed by the time he enters kindergarten and is not subject to any great modification. The changes in personality often referred to are really changes in social attitude, not personality.

Parents should provide a home atmosphere for their children free from arguments and other behavior that can become upsetting. Love and affection should be daily occurrences and the children should know, although disciplined from time to time, that they are accepted and very much desired in the family group.

The advertisements indicate a need for employees and state that no experience is required and that applicants will be trained. The source of these advertisements is two firms operating out of Indianapolis, Indiana, utilizing seven different names; the approach is the same and offers the enticement of high pay and no requirement for experience

plus training.
When application is made in response to the advertisements, the applicant is then requested by phone to send in a sum of money, usually \$195, for training manuals. The manuals are of little value or not sent at all and employment in the trades through these companies simply does not materialize.





DINGS THINGS

Just as the Ding Darling Refuge provides protection and habitat for fourteen creatures on the list of endangered and threatened wildlife, so do many other areas in the nation. The U.S. Dept. of Interior, through the National Wildlife Refuges and National Parks, has devoted its energies to the preservation of species facing decimation. These efforts have taken the form of monies expended, lands purchased, research financed, and environmental awareness programs. In 1966, a special program was initiated in the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife for investigation of and research for endangered species. This endeavor was the Patuxent Wildlife Research Center and its goals are twofold: to learn to propagate certain animals in captivity, and to seek factors which threaten certain species. These goals have led to experiments with many of the 35 endangered species on wildlife refuges. (Note: "endangered" refers to species which are so threatened as to need assistance if they are to escape extinction. All told, there are 100 such endangered animals in the United States. Other categories such as "peripheral" and "status undetermined" include many more species.)

However, in addition to the increasing emphasis on endangered species protection, the refuge system also recognizes its responsibilities to other forms of wildlife. The many species of waterfowl known to U.S. hunters have definitely influenced the refuge system. Migration routes and the rigors encoun tered along such have often determined the location of a refuge, in a pot-hole area of the northwest, in a swamp on the Atlantic coast, or even, as at Ding Darling, at the end of a flyway where winter food and cover are abundant. These refuges involved in migratory waterfowl management give the birds a series of "stepping stones" to aid them in their travels.

Bighorn sheep, bison, longhorn cattle, avocets, geese, pelicans, ferrets, eagles, alligators, whooping cranes, teal, mallards, canvasbacks - each of these species and others have their requirements considered in management plans on refuges they frequent. Each is important, no more or less so than any other.

Mark Twain said he wrote without motive, moral or a plot in the "Adventures of Huckleberry Finn" but Huck Finn and Tom Sawyer are immortal on the Mississippi.

"Jane Eyre" and "Wuthering Heights" may make much better reading on a summer day than many of the new Gothic novels because of their authenticity. Another old love story to be enjoyed is "Pride and Prejudice."

Remember Natty Bumpo and Hawkeye? Our pictures of the North American frontier were formed by James Fenimore Cooper's "The Pathfinder," "The Deerslayer," and "The Last of the Mohicans."

You might again follow the careers of David Copperfield; Oliver Twist; and Philip Irip of "Great Expectations" through their great difficulties. Dickens always brings you to a happy conclusion.

Rudyard Kipling takes you back to the India of British Imperialism in his story of "Kim," a young English boy raised as an Indian, subjected to racial, religious and national prejudice. Kipling is equally interesting as he tells the tale of "Captain Courageous," a book inspired by his stay in America and time spent with Gloucester fishermen.

Another good yarn of thesea is Conrad's "Lord Jim." And then there is that great classic, "Two Years Before the Mast" by Richard Henry Dana.

The "Three Musketeers" and "The Comte de Monte Cristo" are French history told by Duman's washbuckling heroes, Dantes and d'Artagan.

Thomas Hardy's "Tess of the D'urbervilles" and Bathsheba of "Far From the Madding Crowd" were considered very indiscreet and immoral by his Victorian

One little paperback contains Henrik Ibsen's four major plays: "A Dell's House," "The Wild Duck," "Hedda Gabler" and "The Master Builder," some of the first plays to give us real people in real situations.

If you are in a serious frame of mind read "Crime and Punishment." Destoyevokys anticipated many of the psychological problems we face today.

In a more youthful mood, read and love again "Heidi" and "Rebecca of Sunnybrook Farm." Good summer reading, all in paperbacks on the library shelves.





A Grain Of Sea Salt by betzi abram



Picture a guy, lean almost skinny, deeply tanned with clear, light blue eyes and a full head of hair, crew cut so short it must have been measured in thousandths of a millimeter, who looks like a healthy 55 year old in tip-top condition but says he's 72. A guy who is a bachelor but has 24 grandchildren; who graduated from Princeton and studied architecture in Europe, but made his career in N.Y. advertising; who has skinned elbows and scratches on his knees like a 10-year-old boy, but who has a salty and sophisticated sense of humor. If you can, you'll get a glimmering of the complexity and fascination of Harry Strong, a fellow who just sailed his 40' steel ketch from Palma de Majorca across the Atlantic Ocean via the Canary Islands and Antigua to the Virgin Islands and thence in a meandering course to Fort Myers Beach. Hs boat, bought in Holland, is named the Nina, after Columbus' famous ship, draws 5' and has a 13'+ beam. The Nina has no automatic equipment aboard and, in fact, Harry expressed considerable disdain for that "junk" which he thinks is more trouble than it's worth. "I was raised in the days of the sail," he says emphasizing the last word, "and that's what I do -- sail! You just let your mains'l fill nicely and then fiddle with the jib and the mizzen until the boat swings gently from port to starboard and back, then you tie the tiller down and the boat will sail by itself."

His Atlantic trip was a sheer pleasure cruise. When asked if there were any emergencies or crises, he snorts. "I have NEVER lost a mast or busted a cable ANYWHERE. You see a lot of battered boats and you hear these wild stories, but it's not necessary. I never lost a mast because I don't keep enough sail up to bust it. When you see a storm coming you reef in or take your sails down, put out a sea anchor and ride it out." When asked about reefs, he grins, "Never go near 'em. If you keep far enough away, you can't run into 'em. I wouldn't think of sailing around in those Bahamas. They're just another bunch of islands and they have too

many reefs". His favorite island is Majorca, though he has called many places home, from Dallas, Texas, to Kotzebue, Alaska.

To make his ocean voyage he enlisted three German boys on Majorca where he has lived since his retirment in 1956. They stood 8 hour watches, got a full night's sleep every night, headed into the wind every day at noon with a sea anchor out and went for a swim (leaving one man aboard on watch.) After a hearty meal, they could set sail again in the afternoon. He's now looking about for new companions on the trip home, but first he is planning on sailing up to Gloucester, Maine, where he spent his boyhood summers and where some of his family still reside

Apparently he did not particularly choose to visit Fort Myers Beach, but just put in here at Mid Island Marina to have his boat bottom scraped, having been at sea since 1968 when he left Parma. Then he made his way up to Hap's welding shop, next to Erickson & Green in the back bay, to have some minor repairs and to have his "windows" welded in. (That's what he called them. Obviously he doesn't care whether he sounds "properly" nautical, just so you know what he means!)

While here he picked up a 1945 diesel Hercules motor which has been a stand-by motor in a Fort Myers shop for 40 years. "Of course, it's an inboard," he answers a question emphatically. "What dja expect? I wouldn't HAVE one of those outboard things. You get a following sea, one wave comes over and drowns them out and you've had it. I just laugh when I see those little stinkpots!" As for the Hercules, "It just purrs," he states with the kind of pride known only by people who understand what it is like to be a 40-year-old motor. But age doesn't bother him. "I don't care how old I am," he says firmly. "I am what I am, and as long as I can do what I want to do, it's OK." And if I ever saw anyone who was doing what they wanted to do, it is Harold L. Strong, sailor, of Maine and Majorca.




