We don't have much night life; one small movie that seats 250 people, that's all. And, of course in season, Ruth and Philip Hunters' Pirate Playhouse that used to be an old schoolhouse and is now their arena theater. Here, plays are performed using local actors directed by the Hunters who bring a bit of Off-Broadway to On-Periwinkle



Way. Nothing startling, just homey and fun.

We don't have bickering and restless natives, only a vibrant Community Association of neighbors interested in one another. They get together once a month at a meeting and old fashioned polluck supper and sometimes if you're last in line you're not too lucky. Like one prominent resident who whispered in my ear as he wnet by with his plate, "I got seven kinds of beans."

We don't have much entertainment, just local talent and plenty of that especially at Christmas and other times. And talent thrives at craft shows and bake sales. Fascinating folk are here from all walks of life --- sort of like one big family.

There's not much noise, if any; only peacful bird sanctuaries, butterflies and bees, but maybe you might shout at a passing cloud, all billowy and fluffy.

Our skyline hasn't tall buildings. The only things over 35 feet are trees and flying pelicans.

No, we don't have much to offer unless you love the extraordinary ordinaryness of a life with sun-drenched days and star-filled nights, plus blue water all around.

We don't have much --- just paradise.

SANIBEL GROUP BIDS FOR BANK

A group of Sanibel residents has applied for a national bank charter to start a bank adjacent to the Sanibel Island Post Office.

The filing with the Atlanta Regional Office, Comptroller of the Currency, calls for capitalization at \$1 million. A total 50,000 shares of stock would be sold at \$20 a share.

Organizers are Francis Price Bailey, Jr., Porter Johnson Goss, Derroll Reah Johnson, Stanley Earl Johnson Jr., John Konstantio Kontinos, Priscilla Angela Murphy and Charles Allen Nave. Legal representative is Travis Gresham Jr. of Fort Myers


The application was madelastweek based on a representation filed in March and approved. The organizers have a two-acre site picked out on the northwest corner of Island Inn Road near Periwinkle Way, Stanley Johnson said.

Another group filed earlier this year for a state bank charter, Edward M. Henry, Fort Myers banker and one of the organizers, said the application is before the State Comptroller and is scheduled for a field survey.

The state bank would be named the Bank of the Islands, sited on a 3.5 acre lot at the intersection of Casa Ybel Road and Periwinkle Way. The national bank group has proposed "National Bank of Sanibel-Captiva" as first choice of a name, but the comptroller will make the actual decision.

The state bank proposes capitalization of \$600,000 with 30,000 shares at \$20 per share. J. E. Scholefield at 4646 Rue Bayou on Sanibel is agent for the organizers.

Organizers are Henry Scholefield, Robert C. Haynie, G. Byron Kirby, Walter Woodhams and bankers James W. McFadden and Frank H. Sexton. The state bank would not be related to Southwest Florida Banks Inc., a holding company headed by

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




EDISON COMMUNITY COLLEGE

ISLAND WATER ASSN.

The Island Water Association, Inc. reports that Mr. James Evans has deeded an easement to the Association to drill a well on land he owns and is developing on Rabbit Road. Mr. Evans has indicated a willingness to grant another well location on his property upon completion of the well now being drilled.

Well No. 1 is located on Association property behind the new plant. Well No. 2 is on the east side of Rabbit Road on land owned and being developed by Mr. Paul Stahlin. Another well site was partially cleared but work was halted until it is determined if the Water Association has a valid title.

All of the well sites have been deeded to the Association at NO CHARGE and the gentlemen mentioned above deserve the thanks of all Islanders. The Water Association will call on others who own property on the Sanibel-Captiva Road near the water plant and along Gulf Drive near Rabbit Road for future well sites. Well should be located no closer to each other than 1000 feet but in such a way that piping is minimized.

The desalinization plant is 89 percent complete and still on schedule. This paper must go to press before the results are final. However, it is expected that the Farmers Home Administration will make the loan for almost 1½ million dollars Monday morning at 10 o'clock in the Lee County Bank Board Room. All parties concerned seem certain that the mountain of forms are properly filled out and executed.




TIME TO GROW

Palms are typical of Florida's semitropical climate according to the Florida Nurserymen and Growers Association (FNGA)._Most nurserymen carry at least one to ten varieties of palms. This is the month that you should consider planting palm trees. Palm trees, unlike many of our shade trees have fibrous root system and are easily moved during the rainy season of the summer. Once you cut a palm tree root it does not grow further from that point. A new root must be initiated from the base of the palm. This is the reason why you see rather small balls on cabbage palms, queen palms and others. Don't fret at your nurseryman if the ball seems a little small. Palms, like other plants, thrive better if they are cared for properly. At this time of year you should be giving your palms an application of a good mixed fertilizer such as a 6-6-6 at the rate of one pound for each inch of trunk diameter. It is not necessary to punch holes in the ground to feed palm trees. In addition to the fertilizer, manganese sulfate is required by most of our palms. On a large tree 20 feet tall you would apply approximately 6 lbs. On a small tree 3 to 5 feet you would apply approximately 2 lbs. Manganese Sulfate applications should be made once a year to all palm trees, according to the FNGA.

Most palms stand strong winds if they are healthy. Palms are rarely struck by lightening, according to the

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
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
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
DING'S THINGS

The secret of any successful wildlife management program is sound land management. In fact, other than such undertakings as censusing, stocking, protection, researching, and hunting and fishing, most wildlife management techniques are concerned with land management. For instance, consider a waterfowl refuge in the Central Flyway where ducks, geese, and swans migrate from the Arctic to the Gulf of Mexico over the western states. This refuge probably includes in its management plan some sort of activities for enhancing the waterfowl populations. They may do some banding to determine where and when migration begins and ends. They may census the populations to get a trend estimate of numbers of birds. They may provide opportunities for citizens to harvest the flocks or they may allow no hunting. Each of these works upon the waterfowl resource already existing.

The important consideration is that existing population — what factors caused these birds to be? Researchers have analysed breeding habits of waterfowl to find out what habitat characteristics encourage the production of young. When these factors are discovered, then the matter of land management is considered. Refuge managers begin manipulating the land to manage the land's wildlife. Potholes may be blasted in the prairie provinces for ponds, dikes built to impound water, aquatic plants encouraged as waterfowl food, nesting cover, food, and water spaced to the greatest advantage. So that, given a breeding population with all the necessities provided for rearing young, a new brood of young will be on the way.

Land management is also a tool of those refuges which serve as wintering grounds, and often many of the same practices occur. Impoundments, food production areas, and cover are encouraged and managed to their maximum benefit; so that when the spring migration to the breeding grounds begins once more, healthy birds are the result of good land management during the winter.

For the next several weeks, some of our nation's refuges will be considered and their importance in the refuge system will be illucidated.

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
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
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THIS WEEK AT THE SANIBEL LIBRARY by Hal H. Harrison

A book stolen from one library was returned to another library via a box of donated books, and promptly returned to its rightful owner. The book was titled "The Professional Thief."


One novice library clerk of German heritage thought that a patron who asked about Audubon magzine was referring to information on German's super highway system.

TO THE ISLANDER:

In today's Islander was an article by Elinore Dormer re the request by the Dunes developers to have the County vacate Bailey Road where it passes the property sold by the Buells to the Dunes.

I would suggest a further reason for denying this action.

Prior to the Dunes present

management taking over, a request had been made, and denied by the authorities for a marina and access from the present Dunes area to San Carlos Bay.

Subsequent to the takeover of this property by the present developers a mosquito control ditch was being dug from the Dunes property toward the main canal of Water Shadows on the

west, due to the alertness of the people in Water Shadows, the State stepped in and forbade the completion of this ditch. One might ask why after all these years was such a ditch suddenly needed? Also one might wonder how long the ditch would remain a ditch had it been completed as it has been explained that a property owner may quite legally enlarge a ditch if he owns both sides.

This brings up the fact that there is on the Buell property portion of Bailey Road a drainage, or control ditch over which traffic may pass on a crude, county constructed bridge. If vacated, one wonders how long this bridge, ditch, canal or whatever, would remain its present size?

It is an intriguing thought, affording as it might, if done, egress to the bay for the Dunes, also egress for tons of nutrients to help choke the bay from the fertilizers of hundreds of homes in this huge development, where lawns are required per the prospectus, also a golf course.

TO THE ISLANDER:

It appears the Islander has unwittingly abetted a new threat to the ecological well-being of Sanibel-Captiva. The threat takes the form of a large, illustrated advertisement for trail-bike rentals appearing in recent issues.

Two points in the ad suggest a warped sense of appreciation of the islands. First it advises using a trail-bike to see "all of Sanibel and Captiva Islands in their natural and beautiful forms." Perhaps motorcyclists in their unnatural surroundings of dust, fumes, and noise are unaware of their impact on natural and beautiful forms. Also, they may not realize how much they detract from the enjoyment of others who have reached quiet, out-of-the-way places on foot. But maybe the motor freaks do wonder what happened to all the wildlife they expected to see.

Second there is an enthusiastic appeal to the pioneering spirit, "go where cars and manually powered bicycles cannot." This is insidious because it encourages beach and dune erosion; threatens rare vegetation, nesting birds, and frightens wildlife; increases the incidence of back-country littering and fires; and infringes on rights of property owners. Similar ecological vandalism has become widespread in New England, due to the proliferation of snowmobiles, and in California, from the use of allterrain-vehicles of every description. The trail-bike craze should not be allowed to establish itself on Sanibel-Captiva.

It is also ridiculous to think that these motorized tenderfeet, swarming like noisy insects over the landscape, are roughing it in any sense. Let's save the off-road areas for those who enjoy using their muscles and go in silence. Hikers and canoeists, having expended some effort to see the quiet places, will be more apt to respect them. Trail-bikes should be restricted to the roads like any other motor vehicle. Inveterate thrill seekers hould be redirected to the nearest drag strip, or perhaps Disney World.
