Dry weather and heat are contributing factors for the decline of St. Augustine grass. These two factors also set optimum conditions for chinch bug invasion of your lawn, according to the Florida Nurserymen and Growers Association (FNGA). Chinch bugs are approximately one-half inch long. The adult has white wings with a grayish black body. The young generation range in color from bright red with a white band across their back to a dull, brownish-gray. In the heat of the summer chinch bugs reproduce rapidly. Eggs laid by the female will hatch in 10 to 12 days and the cycle begins again.

Chinch bugs have sucking mouth parts. They insert the long, slender mouth part into the grass and withdraw the juices. This causes the blades of the St. Augustine to assume a cocoa-brown color and to become very crisp, much like straw. There are several controls on the market for chinch bug eradication. They are Trithion, Diazinon, Aspon, and a few combinations of other materials. These materials should be applied to the lawn in liquid form. Of course, water should be mixed with the concentrated material and each 500 square feet should have a least 15 to 20 gallons of water applied with the material. This amount of material will carry the elements down into the thatch where the chinch bugs live. All of the chemicals are residual and may last up to 60 days. In the southern part of the state where St. Augustine is widely planted the chinch bug is a proverbial problem throughout the year. Sprayings must begin early in the spring and continue to late in the fall.

Chinch bugs may be found in other grasses such as Bahia, Centipede, and even in Carpetgrass, but as far as entomologists have been able to determine, damage is slight or none at all. Generally these insects are migrating or hiding because of the lack of grass covering in the surrounding areas.

There is an insect that resembles a chinch bug and is called the false chinch bug. It is about twice as large, so do not confuse this one with the real thing.








TO THE ISLANDER:

Long before the present developers discovered Sanibel and Captiva, they were famous islands, known world-wide for the beauty, variety and availability of their sea shells as well as other natural assets. Naturalists John J. Audubon and John Bachman knew about Sanibel in 1833 and a small library could be collected of the books and periodicals that have extolled the islands since then. If they are just another piece of real estate to Mr. Knutson and those he represents, it is only because they want it so. They and others who oppose the county's plan to somewhat restrict the development of these islands are saying, in effect, that nature-oriented people must bet off the earth because there is no place for us in their own highly commercial objectives. For the good of all humanity, we cannot let this happen.

The Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board helped collect the data for the Comprehensive Plan; we did not prepare it. It is the work of an official Lee County committee composed of Commissioners Shirey and Sweeney, two men from the County Building and Zoning Dept., two from S-C Planning Board and one each from U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the Sanibel-Captiva Chamber of Commerce, and Sanibel Community Association. A more representative or knowledgeable group would be hard to find. The Lee County Planning Commission knows this and should act accordingly.

We ask that everyone who loves natural beauty, and respects the right of the people of a community to direct their own lives, support us by letters and-or his presence at the public meeting July 26 at 7:15 p.m. Without the proposed master plan, we will surely die. Elinore Dormer

ARRIVE ALIVE

Leisure time to Americans more and more often means boating or camping. This usually means towing a boat or camper, or driving the camper itself in the case of self-contained units.

The hazards of highway driving are injected into every outing, and deserve special consideration, says J. Dan Wright, director of the Governor's Highway Safety Commission.

A boat should be properly positioned on its trailer with the weight evenly distributed. Too much or too little weight on the trailer hitch itself creates a dangerous condition.

Trailer tires come in for special consideration. Since they are smaller than standard automobile tires, they become overheated easily and must be properly inflated to prevent a blowout.

A burned out wheel bearing can be not only aggravating, but extremely dangerous. Motorists towing trailers of any type should take the precaution of touching the hubs of the trailer to test for telltale heating each time they stop along the way.

Wheel bearings should be repacked regularly especially in the case of boat trailers.

Taking time to safety check equipment before the trip will usually save time on the road. More importantly, it will give everyone a better chance to ARRIVE ALIVE.







THIS WEEK AT THE SANIBEL LIBRARY by Hal H. Harrison

(Note: This week's guest column was written by Rhode (Mrs. W. Buel) Franklin, former librarian, who now lives in Hendersonville, N.C.) Dear Sanibel Library:

In February, while visiting the Island, I had the privilege and pleasure of seeing you again and I was amazed at the great strides you have taken in a short time. Just about nine years ago you were an idea birthed by the Minister of the Community Church and a few public minded friends. Your first home was a nook in the Community Association Building with a few volunteers to look after you.

Within a short time you grew out of your quarters and were moved into an empty shop in the Town Square which Hurricane Agnes in her wild swirl demolished. Fortunately, before this happened, several trucks and many volunteers moved you to the building you are in now. Many interested people donated time, books, shelves and money to turn you into a very active and useful public servant.

My first contact with you was to join a group who were anxious to find out how a library functions. From this class of eight persons, I graduated to the fascinating job of typist. At that time, it was a never-ending task and I now look back at those stacks of books, waiting to be processed, with horror. However, your workers all loved you and took the many changes, sometimes catastrophic, in their stride with very few complaints, and those just a murmur.

My first introduction to Sher Mayer was that he was the man who had taught many of CMCS' best sallors (like Tom Gore of the Aquarius) to sail, and that he himself was a fine sailor and an excellent teacher. When I met him in person, he turned out to be a lean fellow (it must be more than co-incidence that most sailors are lean!) with extremely blue eyes and a direct, warm manner that puts an anxious neophyte immediately at ease. His obvious love for the sport (or should I say art?) and his relaxed confidence are catching and it's not just that "when he does it, it looks so easy." Before you know it, he's managed things so that when you do it, it seems easy. And that's a BIG step forward.

"Let the sail out until it luffs on the forward edge," he says, showing you how and then letting you do it. "Now pull it in until it shapes up nicely and firmly," again letting you do it --- showing no dismay if you pull too far or not enough. "That's all there is to it," he says with a smile and, although you know there's a little more to sailing than that, you understand just what he means and your confidence soars.

"Seriously," he continues, "any sincerely motivated person can learn to "sail" in a week or two. But the great thing about sailing is that it is always a challenge. You never go out without learning something new. And if you sail for a lifetime, you probably never know all there is to know because something is different every time." The tide, the current, the season, the state of your boat, your own state of knowledge or physical development; there are a million variables. But you can still enjoy sailing --- very much, I can testify --without being an "expert."


Sher was raised on Sanibel and after a few lessons, taught himself to sail when he was in Japan as a pilot in the Air Force. He gives the impression from

little comments now and then that he feels a certain kinship between flying and sailing: a certain exhiliration, physical challenge and sense of freedom.

He sails a Venture 24, called Capt. Venture, which is a neat little boat. I am no expert but even to my insecure touch, it seemed very stable and responsive. At one point Sher said, "Let go of the tiller and see what happens." I did, and Capt. Venture went round in a very elegant little circle. "See," said Sher with a twinkle in his eye, "She loves people so that if you were to fall overboard, she'd come back and pick you up." The thought tickled me and it still does. I've always had a weakness for anthropomorphic dogs, cars and boats!

Lest you think that he is perhaps. more poet and artist than man of action, let me assure you that he was very active as we winged up the middle of the Caloosahatchie in a stiff breeze and he decided to put up the Spinnaker all by himself; and I none too steady on the tiller. He wasn't even winded. "There you see," he said, "it takes practice, but it's nothing to be afraid of. You'll soon be able to do it yourself." And for some reason that's not too obvious. I believe him. Since I'm the kind of sailor who has barnacle scratches on her knees from falling overboard, you can see how inspiring he is.

He did also tell me that if I bought a new sailboat it would be a great investment because they do not depreciate as rapidly as cars. In fact you probably lose less than 10 percent in three years and he told me that GEICO (Government Employee Insurance Co.) will lend up to 70-90 percent of the purchase price over a 5-year period. Now I'm determined to have me a sailboat, but you know, it's not really because of these interesting and sound financial facts. It's because I simply can't WAIT to take on that challenge!






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COOL POOL RULES HELP PREVENT BUMMER SUMMER

The temperature is up in the 90's. You had a bad day at work and you've just sweltered your way home through rush hour traffic. So the first thing you do is shed your work clothes, don your swim suit and head for a long, cool dip in your backyard swimming pool.

Backyard swimming pools are becoming increasingly popular, and as temperatures begin to soar, Floridians begin to dive. The Insurance Information Institute warns, however, that your dive may end in disaster unless a few safety precautions are followed.


Across the nation, as many as 600 persons drown in swimming pools each year, and about half of those occur in private home pools. Many more suffer serious injuries in pool mishaps.


Here are some rules the Institute suggests be enforced to ensure that private pools do not become the site of tragedy:

Never allow anyone, including adults, to swim alone.

Clearly mark the depth of all sections of the pool.

Keep all electrical appliances and sources of household current at least 10





feet away from the pool.

Keep close at hand an ample supply of safety equipment, including flotation rings, life belts, a long pole to aid in rescues and a first aid kit.

Discourage excessive roughhousing around or in the pool. Also provide adult supervision when children are swimming.

Keep diving boards and ladders in good repair.

Be sure the ladder leading into the pool is either removed or is of a type that can be made inoperable when the pool is not in use.

Be certain an unattended pool is NEVER accessible to young children.

Should a guest be injured in a private backyard pool, the homeowners policy, which covers personal liability and medical payments to others, will protect the owner, within its limits, against financial loss. To be sure, however, you should check your policy to learn to what extent you would be covered in case of a pool accident.

Enjoy your pool. It can provide recreation, relaxation, and a great place to cool off. By following these simple rules, you will save yourself a lot of worry and help assure that your summer will be safe as well as enjoyable

FOUR ABOARD BOAT REACH PORT


A 22 foot boat with four persons aboard that was reported broken down 25 miles off Sanibel Saturday afternoon made it to Fort Myers Beach under its own power later that day.


A spokesman for the U. S. Coast Guard at the Beach said the boat pulled into the Deep Lagoon Marina about 7:30 p.m. after the Coast Guard had spent most of the day searching for it.

The Coast Guard said the boat, the Yellow Bird, is owned by J. M. Tarbon of Cape Coral but the names of three others aboard were not known.

The boat radioed it was in trouble 25 miles off Knapp's Point on Sanibel about 1:30 p.m. Saturday. The Coast Guard said the message reported the boat's engines were overheating. A helicopter and Coast Guard boat searched the area but could not locate the bright yellow craft.

According to a spokesman for the Coast Guard the search continued until 11 p.m. Saturday, $3\frac{1}{2}$ hours after the boat arrived at Fort Myers Beach because no one notified the Coast Guard that the boat had made it safely to port.







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SUCCESS IN MARRIAGE by Prof. J. Kenneth Williams

DEAR PROFESSOR WILLIAMS: Sould a couple planning marriage tell each other about his or her past behavior with others, sexual or otherwise?

PROFESSOR WILLIAMS: Some feel they should tell a bout his or her past and reveal all intimate details. It is felt, by those subscribing to this thinking, that there should be absolutely no secrets, past, present, or future. By revealing all, then the couple starts married life with a clear conscience and secure in the feeling that each is completely open and honest with the other. This position may be fine and good if everyone can assure himself or his loved one that, by revelation of all details in the past, it will not cause feelings of distrust and suspicion in the future.

I THINK that a couple entering into marriage SHOULD be honest in every way with each other. By the same token, most of us have certain things in our past that may be best un-said. We all have made mistakes; to reveal everything could contribute to mistrust later on.

My answer to this question, is a definite "no." By having a "confession session" before marriage often lays the groundwork for distrust and doubt later on. Personally, I wouldn't want someone I loved admitting certain things. I'll admit, that it might be interesting but I would hope to be mature enough to realize we all make mistakes. On the other hand, I would judge her on the basis of our interaction. If she gave me no reason to distrust her and had always been truthful and honest, then, this is what is important, not what she may have done before we met. If she had told me a lot of things that she may have done, I probably would build up an attitude of doubt and distrust even though she were perfectly honest and faithful to me. The saying, "what you don't know doesn't hurt," I feel, is very appropriate here.

Accept the person you are planning to marry on the basis of your experience with, and knowledge of that person. After all, that is what is important, not what may have happened in the past.

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

Edison Community College has received gifts of \$2,000 each from Rutenberg Homes and First Development Corp. to be used for construction of a dome to house a telescope which had been donated to the college. Charles J. Reisdorph, president of Rutenberg Homes, and Carl Preuss, president of First Development Corp., presented the checks to Edison Community College President David G. Robinson, expressing the hope that these donations would help repay the students of the Fort Myers-Naples area which has been so receptive to the two building concerns over the years.






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SCHOLAR SHIPS OFFERED IN SCOUT PHOTO CONTEST

Registered Scouts who have earned the Photography merit badge are eligible for Scout Photo Scholarship Awards, according to Charles Stiles, Commissioner of the Southwest Florida Council, Boy Scouts of America.


The contest, sponsored by the Eastman Kodak Company, has two categories; black-and-white and color. Scouts may enter a maximum of three pictures in each category, Stiles said.

Prizes will consist of scholarships for each of the two categories. First place, \$1,000; second place, \$500; and third place, \$250. In addition, a certificate of merit will be awarded to entries demonstrating photographic excellence or unique applications.

Requirements to enter the contest

are that boy must be a registered Scout at the time of entering the contest, must be age 11 through 15 as of October 1, 1973, must have earned the photography merit badge prior to entering the contest, and must submit pictures taken after Oct. 1, 1972. The official entry from which must accompany photos is available from the Scout Service Center, 2050 McGregor Blvd., Stiles said.

Entries must not be mailed before Sept. 1, 1973, but must be postmarked no later than October 1, 1973, and received by October 7, 1973, Stiles said. Photographic experts appointed by the Boy Scouts of America will serve as judges, and the entries will be judged on the basis of originality, composition, and good camera technique.







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
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


