

Sanibel housewife and resident of 20 years - We have been shafted again by the county. It all started with the bridge; why can't they give us a building moratorium at least until they come up with a sensible, workable plan?

Resident, old timer - Guess we'll just have to secede from the state. A moratorium




Restaurant owner - I naturally need business but feel a building moratorium is needed so that sensible zoning and planning can be accomplished.

This Week at the Sanibel Library

About 10 years ago, I read a revealing book that had a great influence on my personal philosophy regarding the ceremonies and rituals that are often considered "standard procedure" after death. The book was "The American Way of Death," written by Jessica Mitford. I venture to say it changed the thinking of many people because the book became a best seller and a source of great controversy between funeral directors and their clients. The funeral industry is still smarting under the

Today, it has company. Jessica Mittord has now set her sights on "our great 'know-it-all' on prisons," the American Association of Wardens and Superintendents. The new book is "Kind and Usual Punishment," and, keeping the title in context with the earlier Mitford book, Time Magazine suggests that it could be sub-titled "The American Way of Injustice."

In a methodical and relentless manner, Miss Mitford attacks the American prison system. One by one she takes all the arguments in favor of prisons and crushes them with a mountain of statistics and reasons. For example, she attacks the argument that prisons keep off the streets such criminals as rapists, muggers, drug fiends and the like. She points to the fact that out of 9,000,000 crimes committed in a typical year, only 11/2 percent are imprisoned.

Miss Mitford deals strongly with the argument that prisons rehabilitate. Indeed, she contends that prisoners may have been better off when they were regarded as sinners than now, when they are labeled sick individuals in need of treatment. She feels that "physical degradation is replaced by psychological degradation," and she predicts that the system will get worse before it gets better.

An amazing statistic offered by Miss Mitford is that the cost of keeping a man in San Quentin could send him to Harvard. Of that total annual expense (about \$5,000) Miss Mitford figures that about 5 percent is budgeted for "rehabilitation." Most of the taxpayer's money goes to security, she contends.

Naturally, the author is not proposing that prisoners be sent to Harvard, but in making such a comparison she brings home the tremendous cost to the taxpayer in maintaining prisons and their occupants.

AS IF BY MAGIC, by Angus Wilson. (Viking, \$8,95.) Hamo and Alexandra, two delightfully comic English eccentrics, set out to test their serious ideals in the world, with chastening results.

DO WITH ME WHAT YOU WILL, by Joyce Carol Oates. (Vanguard, \$7.95.) Another of Miss Oates's powerful excursions into the innerworld of feeling, telling of the dumb, dreamy, intermittently panicked progress of Elena Ross into existential risk and sexual aggression.

SEARCHES AND SEIZURES, by Stanley Elkin. (Random House, cloth, \$6.95, paper, \$3.45.) Three novelettes that exfoliate an art founded on assaults against the reader's habits of association and good manners and that are both wrenchingly funny and oddly moving.

THEOPHILUS NORTH, by Thornton Wilder. (Cass Canfield/Harper & Row, \$7.95.) A novel made up actually of closely-related short stories unified around the character of Theophilus North, a sort of habitual Good Samaritan who enters and alters the lives of others.

#### GENERAL

THE FOURTEENTH CHRONICLE, edited by Townsend Ludington. (Gambit, \$12.50.) Letters and diaries of John Dos Passos covering the period when some of his best work was coming out and pouring out his zest for writers and writing, his hopes and fears for mankind.

GOODBYE, MR. CHRISTIAN, by Richard Dougherty. (Doubleday, \$7.95.) McGovern's press secretary in a funny, revealing memoir that is the best effort yet on the campaign to emanate from the Sen-

THE GO-GO YEARS, by John Brooks. (Weybright & Talley, \$10.) A lively history of the stock market during the bullish sixties, full of verve, color and deja vu and some marvelous one-liners.

IN SEARCH OF ALI MAHMOUD, by Vivian Gornick. (Saturday Review Press, \$8.95.) In quest of the culture that formed her Egyptian friend, Ms. Gornick is embraced into the riotously human world of his family; her book is a rich panoply—warm, open and observant.

LETTERS OF ANTON CHEKHOV, edited by Simon Karlinsky. (Harper & Row, \$17.50.) One hundred eighty-five letters presented in their entirety with restorations; the translation is immediate and idiomatic.

THE UNFINISHED QUEST OF RICHARD WRIGHT, by Michel Fabre. (Morrow, \$15.) A scrupulous reinterpretation of the man and his books that challenges many traditional notions of Wright, as well as traditional ways of looking at Afro-American literature.

Home owners of Sanibel and Captiva, the October 18 Fort Myers Press Newspaper, Section B, page 1, it was stated that they are thinking of giving us windshield stickers at the cost to us of \$100.00 per year.

As a year 'round resident and taxpayer, home owner, I am against this or any other fee to us and move for a NO fee sticker for us! This bridge has collected enough money to pay for itself and ten more, at least.

My letters to the Islander have been greatly missed by many people. They have been asking me repeatedly what has happened. Why aren't there any more letters. Well, I have been ill and in the hospital with a heart condition. Every once in awhile it catches up with me, but thankfully, I am feeling a lot better now and up to writing again.

On Nov. 14, they are going to hold a hearing on the bridge toll for Sanibel residents. I plan to be there and hope many of you will be there too. But before we go, I'd like to hold a protest "march," with our cars, against a fee for us, by getting ten to fifteen cars to line up and in a very orderly fashion, pass through the toll gate refusing to pay the toll in protest for us having to pay ANY fee to get to our

Remember, it is going to cost you \$1.50 to go over to City Hall so you may have the "privilege" of voicing your opinion or protest at the hearing.

Do you want these fees to continue for such and all our necessities every time we cross to the mainland? If we didn't have the price of \$1.50, we would be deprived of passing over the bridge and Therefore deprived of our CON-STITUTIONAL RIGHTS to have a free voice; free speech, at a hearing that is vital to the people who are home owners and taxpayers.

My opinion is to give year round home owners FREE passage at ALL times. Let the people who work here from the mainland, and other business trucks have the quarterly sticker for a price and let the tourists continue to pay the \$3.00 fee. If the bridge people want more money, they can up the tourist fee to \$5.00. That should give them the revenue they want and they could turn some of it back to the island for maintenance and improvements, without crying the 'blues'' of bigh costs for such. It has been learned, from a virtually unimpeachable source, that Sanibel has been under consideration as the site for the new international jet port. This information is causing concern among a number of residents.

The advantages of the location are obvious: the island is long enough to accommodate the large runway required; the level terrain would not require the movement of much earth; planes could approach and depart over water (a safety factor not available at other sites); and residents could emplane for London, Hong Kong, Athens, and New York with great convenience. Passengers could arrive and depart in automobiles, busses, and boats. Sanibel would be the only international airport approachable by boat.

Despite the obvious advantages of placing the new jet port on Sanibel, there is some local opposition. One person has mentioned the possible imparement of fishing. Jets sometimes are noisy.

It is difficult to oppose progress. Nobody wants to impede the advance of civilization. Yet, it would be prudent for the residents of Sanibel to consider both the advantages and disadvantages of building an international jet port on the island before the project is finally adopted. On October 23 the Lee County Zoning Board approved a revision to the existing zoning for the South Seas Plantation property on Captiva Island. The new zoning, as requested by Mariner Properties, Inc., owners of the property, allows multi-family type development on the entire property but under a special limit of 3 units per acre. This is a downzoning of approximately 75 percent from the existing zoning. Bob Taylor, president of Mariner Properties, says that "The new zoning was requested to allow continued expansion of the resort facilities and the flexibility to develop small clusters of single family beach homes and villas on the remainder of the property over a 5 to 7 year period. Such cluster development will allow presentation of all mangrove and bayou shoreline areas at South Seas."

# Ding's Things

Eight national wildlife refuges are found in the State of Texas, five of them bordering on the Gulf of Mexico. One of these is Laguna Atascosa, "Redhead Capital, USA." This refuge lies in the Lower Rio Grande Valley, an area steeped in rich heritage. At the time the valley was occupied by the American Indian and was being explored by the Spanish, game was abundant. Brush and grass grew lushly over the lowlands; river channels and shallow lakes were bordered by dense woodland; millions of geese and ducks wintered there. As settler began to infiltrate there, agriculture and cattle raising became important business. However, overgrazing soon occurred and the grasslands were lost. Later, land development companies were attracted by the rich topsoil of the area. Woodlands were cleared and wetlands were drained for crop raising. Nearly all the natural vegetation was removed and with it went the rich wildlife populations.

Yet, in 1946, the last remaining tract of natural habitat was set aside as Laguna Atascosa Refuge, a 45,150 acre oasis for valley wildlife. No geese winter anywhere else in the valley. Unusual waterfowl species nest in the resacas; shorebirds utilize mud flats; geese, deer, and sandhill cranes feed in refuge croplands. Wildlife is abundant, but even so, the habitats on the refuge do not support as many animals as they could. The lack of water limits refuge wildlife. Rainfall is usually insufficient to produce bumper crops, potholes and ponds go dry, and the resacas hold water in only a few spots. What water is available to the refuge is contaminated with agricultural chemicals which destroy plants and animals. As a result less food is produced in permanent refuge waters and fewer animals find sufficient food.

The Laguna Atascosa wildlife populations are impressive. Over 250,000 geese and ducks winter there, with 60 percent of these being redheads. This is three-fourths of the continent's redhead duck population! Thirteen other duck species can be found there also. The geese are Canadas, snows, blues, and white-fronteds.


Thirty-two threatened species frequent the refuge lands and the areas they use are being preserved to ensure their survival. Bald eagles and peregrine falcons, prairie falcons, reddish egrets, spoonbills, masked ducks, chachalacas, groove-billed anis, black hawks and many other threatened birds are on the refuges' bird list, which, by the way, is the largest in the entire Refuge System with 330 species.

Mammals and other resident wildlife include deer, javelina, rabbits, turkey, raccoon, coyotes, armadillo, rattlesnake, skunk, bobcat, mountain lions, and ocelot.

To improve refuge lands for the wildlife, more water is needed. Dikes and water control structures are in use now and will be improved, while new lakes and potholes are planned. Winter wheat, other crops, and domestic grass plantings will be continued for food, and efforts will concentrate on minimizing water and wind erosion and increasing soil fertility.

This refuge is a good spot to see and photograph wildlife at any time of the year. The staff at Laguna Atascosa offer two auto tours and are planning other interpretative facilities—displays, trails, photo blinds, and observation towers.

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
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
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

#### HOW TO SAVE ON FOOD SUBJECT OF NEXT MEETING OF SANIBEL COMMUNITY ASSN.

"How to Grow Your Own Vegetables and Fruits," will be covered by Mr. Robert Curtis, County Extension Director, Mr. Curtis will talk on such things as "How to deal with Nematodes," "Problems of growing vegetables in Southern Florida," "How to get the most out of Mini-gardens," "The most profitable and productive vegetables to grow," "The Fabulour Japanese tomatoring," etc.

Patsy Simmons, who put this program together for the Community Association explains that, while Dorothy Classon's talk will be chiefly for the women, Robert Curtis will be talking to

In addition to the above talks there will be an exhibit of instructions on how to prepare a Japanese Tomato Ring, how to plan a raised garden, how to layout a Mini-Garden, for those who do not have much space, and other ideas for Sanibel

To add to the fun of this meeting on How To Save, all members of the Association are being urged to prepare and bring what they have found to be their most economical dish, and at the same time to bring their recipe for that dish. These recipes will then be collected and issued in bulletin form to members of the Association at the next meeting. Each dish will be numbered (if the person bringing the dish wishes to enter the contest); the members will then vote on which dishes should be given a prize. Since everyone can't sample each dish several prizes will be given

"I'm sure," says Patsy Simmons, "that many of our members have found delicious ways to stretch the budget by preparing unusual dishes. Now we are asking them to prepare such a dish for this meeting to then let us have the recipe. These dishes can be ways to stretch meat (other than Hamburger Helpers), fish, chicken, vegetable, casseroles, salads, even desserts. I think it can be fun as well as helpful in these days of high prices and scarcities. We also hope some will bring recipes on how to prepare dishes from native plants, fruits and vegetables.

The "How To Save" part of the meeting, talks, etc., will be at 8 o'clock, following the regular dinner and business meeting of the Association and will be open to the public. The dinner meeting for members and their guests only starts at the usual time, 6:30. The meeting is held at the Community House on Sanibel.



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




#### **BECOMING BETTER PATIENTS**

It takes at least two to cure an illness. The doctor and the patient. Seeing a doctor soon about symptoms that don't go away, like a cough or breathlessness, is one good way to help prevent long-term lung disease.


Too many people postpone seeing a doctor because they hope in vain that their symptoms will disappear. When the symptoms persist, they are embarrassed about their delay and sometimes are less than truthful with the doctor once they see him or her. Patients may also say they drink or smoke less than they do. And they may hesitate to volunteer facts that could help the doctor diagnose the illness. To help, doctors need all the pertinent information they can get.

One way to be a better patient is to organize your thoughts and the history of your illness before you see the doctor. This gets the picture clear in your own mind, and you're less likely to overlook pertinent points to tell the doctor. It also helps the doctor get to the cause of your problem sooner. And if the doctor's explanations are not clear, ask questions. Doctors don't know when you don't understand if you don't tell them.

Too many patients do not follow the doctor's instructions. Many stop taking medications once they feel better. That may not be long enough. If you have a TB infection, for example, you must take pills every day for at least a year in order not to develop TB illness. Skipping pills, failing to come back for follow-up visits, not sticking to a recommended diet, all these wipe out the good care your doctor wants to provide.

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

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
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
