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





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TO THE ISLANDER:

We write as the eight owners of the Sandy Bend Apartments on Gulf Drive, and in response to the letter from Elinore Dormer published in your issue of November 8

Ms. Dormer, commenting on opposition to a proposed building moratorium exhibited at a public hearing on October 31, stated that petitions against any kind of such moratorium were circulated by "Woody Anderson, Sandy Bend Apts., and others," and were presented at that public hearing; and, further, that "Mr. Anderson personally attacked those of us who have stuck our necks out."

We firmly disavow any such actions and statements of Mr. Anderson as expressing the sentiments of the owners of the Sandy Bend Apts. Mr. Anderson is not an employee or agent of Sandy Bend Apartments, nor has he been authorized to serve as our spokesman in this or any other area of interest or concern.

As a matter of fact, the owners of these Apartments are deeply concerned about the pressures being exerted to intensify the development of Sanibel and Captiva and to increase the density and use of these delightful and unique islands. We most certainly do not want to be considered as allies of those forces and interests seeking even heavier use.

Our own actions should corroborate our attitudes: in building on our own 2acre tract, we limited the occupancy to nine units; and one of our members, at substantial financial risk to himself, acquired the 2-acre tract on our West, imposed a building set-back line off from the beach and a unit density limitations, and then put the tract back on the market for re-sale subject to these limitations.

We strongly e idorse and support Commissioner Shirey's efforts to establish building and zoning regulations on the islands, and a building moratorium until a plan can be approved and adopted.




try to). Up there, towns seem to think they have the power to plan for the future, but you know New Englanders, always planning for the future, never living for today!




Leigh Bair & Harry lurka waiting for a cognac to warm them against the bracing air from the Matterhorn.

This Week at the Sanibel Library

Many readers will remember "The New Centurions," a first novel by Joseph Wambaugh, a cop turned writer. It reached deserved best-seller status and was followed by a second novel, "The Blue Knight," which, although not up to its predecessor, enjoyed a wide circulation. Now, Wambaugh has turned to non-fiction and has come up with a winner titled "The Onion Field."

This essay is a true-to-life chronicle which has been compared to Truman Capote's fine crime narrative, "In Cold Blood." "The Onion Field" is a kill-for-thrill story of the execution of Officer Ian Campbell and the mental disintegration of his partner Officer Karl Hettinger. The title comes from the fact that the murder occurred in an onion field where two psychopathic killers had taken the policemen at gunpoint.

Dan Wakefield, author of "Going All the Way," has a second sure-fire hit on his new one, "Starting Over." In this powerful, funny and compassionate story, Wakefield tells of the trials of a divorced mar who starts searching for the "right woman," What happens to the protagonist as he moves from one disaster to another could happen to anyone. You will find a lot of sadness in this book, but you'll enjoy some fun too.

That breezy, hard-hitting newspaper reporter, Jimmy Breslin, who cleaned up a half million on his ''The Gang That Couldn't Shoot Straight,'' is back on top with a new one, "World Without End, Amen." This one is also a story about cops but a much more serious approach than The Gang. This time, an Irish-American cop gets into a jam and takes time off to visit Ireland. The adventures he finds in Northern Ireland among Irish Catholics like himself makes quite a story

Three new books have "The Devil" in their titles but they are worlds apart. One is "The Devil We Knew" by May Dikeman, a story of a Catholic priest who struggles furiously against great odds to make some sense of his life and ministry. The second is "The Devil To Pay," by the author of Parkinson's Law" --- C. Northcote Parkinson. This is an exciting sea story set in the last years of the 18th century when the French Revolution had plunged Europe into war. The third book is Jerry Kosinski's most recent contribution, "The Devil Tree." If you have read any of Kosinski's previous books ("The Painted Bird," "Steps," "Being There") then you have an idea what to expect in this one. It is no better nor worse than the others, if you know what I mean (and I am not sure that I know either).

In non-fiction, we have one of those self-help books that is always hitting the mark and winding up on the best-seller list, such as "Dr. Atkins Diet Revolution," or "The Joy of Sex," or "I'm OK, You're OK." This one is "How To Be Your Own Best Friend," written by a married couple, Mildred Newmand and Bernard Berkowitz, with the help of Jean Owen. I should add that the Berkowitzes are also professional psychologists, a fact that lends authority to their observations. The book is a sort of psychiatric pep talk in which the reader is assured that he can change much of the unpleasantness in his life if he will only exert the effort. It reminds me of the adage proposed many years ago by Dr. Emile Coue, a French psychotherapist, "Day by day, in every way, I am getting better and better." And if you remember Dr. Coue, your age is showing.

DINNERTABLE HAZARDS

Thanksgiving dinner means gravy family get-togethers. But dinand nertable talk can be hazardous to your health

Talking and eating, simultaneously, can cause havoc. Ordinarily, both food and air go into your upper throat. But at a critical point they take two very separate pathways. If there is a mixup in directions, the results can be disastrous.

Just before you swallow anything, including food or saliva, you take in a little air and then hold your breath. Without even reali. ng it. When you do, this closes a valve in your throat called a glottis. Then, everything you swallow is forced down the tube to your stomach. Only after your swallow is finished does the glottis reopen. You start breathing again.

On the other hand, when you breathe, the air goes through your nose or mouth, down your throat, then into your windpipe. From there, it moves into two main tubes, called bronchial tubes, which branch into smaller and smaller passageways. The passageways end in hundreds of millions of air sacs, where oxygen and carbon dioxide are exchanged.

The minute you talk, you start to breathe. Try holding your breath and see how hard it is to talk. Then food can "go down the wrong way." If food completely blocks the windpipe and cannof be dislodged in minutes, then Thanksgiving dinner and everything else is all over. Steak and big portions of food are the major offenders. If the food travels past the windpipe into the air passageways, it can cause a lung disease called bronchiestasis.

To survive Thanksgiving and all other meals, be sure you talk only after you finish swallowing. To find out more about breathing hazards and lung disease, contact your lung association. And use Christmas Seals to support the fight for life and breath.

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WILDLIFE NOTES by Griffing Bancroft

In these days of often vanishing wildlife it is a pleasure to report on at least one species that seems to be extending its range.

This is the reddishegret, a large member of the heron family. This fascinating bird has never been common anywhere in recent times, and as late as two years ago it was extremely rare in this area.

Now it can be seen on the islands regularly, in both its color phases and often engaged in its comical "canopy feeding."

The reddish egret in the last century was a fairly common breeding bird as far north as Tampa Bay. Then it was almost exterminated by the plume hunters. Only a few were left, in the Florida Keys and in Texas.

Then, in March of 1970, a party of us found a pair nesting in a heron colony in Pine Island Sound. This was reported in the AUK, official publication of the American Ornithologists' Union, since it was the first time in this century the bird had been found breeding anywhere in Florida outside the Keys.

Subsequently several pairs have been noted in the Pine Island Colony and the bird has become a year round resident in this area.

The reddish egret comes in two distinct color phases --- reddish blue and pure white. It was at one time thought these were different species, the white phase being called Peale's Heron.

But Ornithologists discovered that the two interbred freely and, instead of producing hybrids as they would if they were separate species, their offspring were either all dark or all white and remained so all their lives. Often both dark and white babies were found in the same nest. So Peale's heron was thrown out and the white bird declared a color phase.

I might report here parenthetically that the same thing is now happening to the great white heron. You can take him off your life list. He is now officially deemed a color phase of the great blue heron. There will be more on this in a subsequent column

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


AUDUBON WILDLIFE **FILM LECTURE**

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


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
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
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
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
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Goodbye to Switzerland – Boarding plane at Zurich

A trip to the little island of St. Georgio was to be rewarding. The Cloisters, which we had really come to see, for some reason were closed. So we visited the beautiful old church in which hangs the masterpiece of Tintoretto, "The Last Supper." At the altar knelt a beautiful bride and her groom exchanging their vows. Outside the church we were delighted to see a gondola arrive, richly appointed, beautifully painted in gold and laden with bouquet of flowers. Seated among these was another lovely bride-to-be, her affianced and, we guessed, their parents. The gondoliers, dressed in crisp white uniforms and big red sashes completed the sentimental picture. Those of us who missed this quite made up for it by watching an exciting gondola regatta.

We left Venice by boat again to the mainland on Sept. 17, driving across Italy's northern plain with a brief visit in Verona to the House of the Capulets and Juliet's balcony of Shakespeare's fable. Then on to Milan for lunch which proved to be somewhat of a fiasco. But Milan was not a total loss by any means for we were able to visit the old Gothic Cathedral with its exquisite architecture and lovely stained glass windows, and also managed to see the famous La Scala Opera House. We reached Lugano and the Hotel Excelsior on lovely Lake Como.

The next morning was wet and foggy so window shopping seemed to be the best choice. Later, however, the skies cleared, so after a lunch of the most delicious lasagna ever, we took boat trips to a miniature Swiss village and a rather unusual fishing village.



Leaving Lugano on the 19th, with the sun now shining brightly, we crossed Lake Maggiore by boat ferry, boarded our coach once more, driving along the beautiful winding Simplon Pass to Brig. Here we bade farewell to our driver and boarded a sort of controversial cog noncog railway which was to take us to Zermatt. Here we were met by stage coach and horse (no cars allowed in Zermatt) which took us to the renowned Hotel Mont Cervin. Small as the town is most of us could see all of it in an hour or two. A trip up the Gornegut by a real cog railway provided unbelievable views of the Matterhorn covered with snow. Some hardy individuals got out of the train at various station stops and walked up the rest of the way. Occasionally a small mountain deer was to be seen. When the train arrived at its final destination we all got out, slushed around in the newly fallen snow, sat in the warm sunshine sipping brandy and stared in wonder.

There is an interesting museum in Zermatt dedicated mostly to the famous Whymper and to all the other successful or unsuccessful climbers of the Matterhorn. Here are to be seen all the various types of equipment for climbing past and present. An Altogether nice experience was Zermatt.

On the 21st, our little cog non-cog railway took us back to Brig again where we greeted our faithful "Mundy" who was awaiting us with the bus. We drove along the Rhone Valley with its acres and acres of grapevines making it not too difficult to see why this part of the country is famous for its wine. Later in the day we approached Lake Geneva and Montreux one of the most beautiful lakes and towns in Switzerland. In front of our

hotel, facing the lake, was the "Quai Des Fleurs," well named, for on each side of the walk was every kind of plant and flower imaginable beautifully maintained by the city. This walk stretched from the town to the Castle of Chillon immortalized by Byron in his poem "Prisoner of Chillon."


We left Montreux on Sept. 23 to have lunch in the city of Berne, appropriately named after the first animal to be hunted and killed when the city was founded in the 12th century. It was unexpected to see a town of this size so bedecked with flowers. Even the large buildings were positively blooming with window boxes. Luckily we arrived just in time for the ancient clock in the square to strike the noon hour and for the twelve small figures to appear and move around in a circle. Everyone, of course, had to feed the bears, always kept in the big pit in the center of town.

At the Kornhous Keller were were served Zurcher Geschnetzel, specialty of the house. Veal once again, but better than ever!

Leaving Berne for Interlaken, young Claus entertained us with some very funny local jokes and gave us a short course in languages. As we approached Interlaken we had a good view of the Jungfrau (Virgin). The air by this time had grown somewhat chilly and we were grateful for the blazing fire which greeted us in the salon of our hotel where we sat sipping our pre-dinner drinks.

The next day appeared wet and cloudy but nonetheless 12 of our party braved the trip up the Jungfrau by mountain rail. Once at the top the fog lifted from time to time affording fantastic views. The remainder of the group either rested, ate more food, shopped, or took the small cable car to the Heinwehfluh Bahn where the largest model railroad in Europe was displayed and in working order.

And so, back to Zurich on the 26th, over the Brunig Pass and wonderful sights below of toy villages, waterfalls and grandiose views of lakes Lunger and



Sarmen. We noticed that in this area many of the chalets were faced with shingles resembling fish scales.

Happily we were to visit Lucerne once again for lunch and found at the "Old Swiss House" we were greeted as old friends. Afterwards, back to Zurich and the Hotel Continental. Will we ever forget the fat, pompous sommelier who tasted "only the good wine!"

Now we had a chance to tour Zurich, the old beautiful buildings, the porcelain museum harboring a most rare collection, St. Peters where were the famound Chagall stained glass windows. Driving up through the wealthy residential section of fown we were rewarded at the top of the hill with a fine panorama of the city. The balance of the day was spent as is usual with a frantic last minute shopping spree and one more glance at the 5,000 different watches which Switzerland produces.

All this brings us to the last **wight** and the wonderful farewell dinner given us by the MacIntoshes at the renowned Kindle, Food, wine and lots of music was the theme along with some sad farewells.

No trip is worthwhile without a few minor tragedies --- two lost pocketbooks complete with traveler's checks and passports (both recovered), a broken tooth in Bled, a sprained ankle along the way, a lost room key in Lugano (later found in N.Y.), a pair of slacks accidentally dropped into a tub full of water shortly before bags had to be packed (a well-placed tip got over that hurdle in a hurry), and one wonders if anybody realized that the little bars of chocolate so thoughtfully left on our bed pillows at a couple of hotels were not just ordinary bars of chocolate? The translation of the blurb on the wrapper was obtained too much later. In view of all this it all added up to a great tour.

So, with the Alps behind us as an ever pleasant memory we flew up and away to our various destinations with anticipation of more good trips to come. (The end)



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
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
