TO THE ISLANDER:

Criticisms of Lee County Government are rampant these days. Just to keep the record straight, recent criticisms by this observer describing the condition of local government in Lee County did not single out the County Commission, but referred to the entire aggregation of agencies that comprise Lee County Government. The latter, the whole glob, is a classic example of what political scientists characterize as "traditional county government." A major barrier to modernizing county government is lack of understanding by voters as to what we now have and what is possible.

It may be timely to note that whether Sanibel incorporates or not, there will continue to be some kind of county government in Lee County. Regardless of the outcome of the Sanibel study of "home rule" possibilities, the residents of Sanibel, Captiva, and the rest of Lee County will be better off in trying to cope with galloping urbanization if a modernized county government replaces the archaic, traditional form that persists thanks to a combination of certain vested political interests and vast voter



apathy and ignorance.

In fairness, it should be pointed out that the agencies under the authority of County Commission --- and remember that many important ones are not --- are coordinated by the County Administrator, Lavon Wisher, who is well qualified by professional training in business administration and much practical experience dealing with politicians. Even within the existing overall structure, which I repeat is archaic, the Administrator probably could contribute much more effectively toward solving some of our many problems in Lee County if the Commission would delegate more authority to that office and refrain from trying to manage the operations of Lee County Government themselves.

Perhaps the image of incompetence that some of the Commissioners continue to convey to the public would not be so sharply etched if they could learn to allow the County Administrator to manage their bureaucracy. In the process, instead of being caricatured as clowns, the Commissioners might even accrue some credit for the good things that some believe they are doing.





This Week at the Sanibel Library

Perhaps the message contained in "The Corporate Eunich" would find a more ready made audience in a New York library than on Sanibel Island where overworked executives are outnumbered by retirees, but you will find it fascinating reading, especially if you have ever been a runner in that metropolitan rat race for success. O. William Battalia and John J. Tarrant, the authors, have analyzed the new executive life style and the picture they paint is not always a pretty one. A section devoted to corporate wives — their problems and strategies — may hit the mark with some Sanibel wives. Too bad every young man who is married to his business instead of his wife and family cannot read this thought-provoking book.

I note just another complication of the Supreme Court's decision to do nothing about setting standards for pornography, to leave it all up to "local standards." In Drake, N.D., the school board and some of the citizens decided to have a bookburning. They destroyed all copies of James Dickey's "Deliverance," "Short Story Masterpieces" which included Hemingway, Faulkner, Steinbeck and others, and the best-selling Kurt Vonnegut novel, "Slaughterhouse Five." With the great popularlity of Vonnegut's new book, "Breakfast of Champions," the Sanibel library was encouraged to stock all of Vonnegut's best sellers, not only "Slaughterhouse Five," but "God Bless You, Mister Rosewater," "Welcome to the Monkey House," "Cat's Cradle" and "the Sirens of Titan." Incidentally, didn't Hitler do a bit of book burning in Germany at "one point in time?"

Joyce Carol Oates is a very popular author with patrons of the Sanibel Library; and her new one, "Do With Me What You Will," is in circulation all of the time. It is the story of Elena Howe, a story with a contemporary setting reflecting today's social upheaval and shifting morality. Ms. Oates won the National Book Award for Fiction in 1970 for her novel "Them," which is available at the library. Also on our shelves are her "Marriages and Infidelities," "A Garden of Earthen Delights," and "The Wheel of Love and Other Stories."

For readers intent on the political scene, we have on our non-fiction shelf Dr. Hunter S. Thompson's "Fear and Loathing on the Campaign Trail 72." This book tells it "like it was" to an eminent reporter who covered the 1972 campaign. Thompson, in an interview, declared: "Teddy White is a very nice fellow, but we moved in different circles. I'm sure his account of "Campaign 72" will be different from mine." That it is! Thompson's book is a bizarre, irreverent and highly personalized book which gives off sparks. But this is the way Thompson saw it.

Also in the non-fiction department, we have that controversial "Soverign State of ITT" by Anthony Sampson. Basically, the book covers three fields of ITT action: San Diego and the Republican convention; anti-trust negotiations; and Chile. Sampson shows some of the "inexorable pressures" brought to bear by ITT on the administration, both to modify the anti-trust settlement and to adopt a hard line toward.

CHET AND ELLEN SMITH RETURN FROM WESTERN TOUR

Chester and Ellen Smith have returned from the grand tour of the western part of the U.S. with glowing tales, and how happy they are that they took the trip before the fuel pinch! Chet and Ellen own the Jade Butterfly and are numbered among our most distinguished settlers. Chet is a retired professor. They started out on a camping trek, but ended up in motels and hotels due to the severe weather in places like Yellowstone, where it can go below freezing at night, even in the mildest weather. In all, they covered 9,000 miles and visited such interesting points as Mesa Verde, the Black Hills of South Dakota and the Jade Mines in Wyoming. Chet has a foot long block of Nephrite jade as a memento. "Many of the beautiful jades that had been brought to the U. S. from China have been purchased by lade collectors from Japan who are hungry for the now scarce gems," said Chet.

They visited Virginia City where the Comstock lode is located. The old ghost town has been restored and is a tourist spot for former gold and silver mine buffs. They also visited Reno and hiked down into the Grand Canyon, Imagine our fragile Ellen afoot in the mile deep canyon, but she loved it.

They saw famed Lake Tahoe, drove across the desert and on to San Francisco, then on down the California coast through Monterey, Carmel, Big Sur and San Simeon. At El Paso they visited Carlsbad Caverns and were most impressed by the many National Parks, some of which are extensive but not well known.

MANY EXCITING SIGHTS

They were much interested In Meteor Crater and the San Francisco Peaks, the Grand Tetons of Wyoming, those massive jagged peaks of high mountains which are almost always snow capped, and they remarked on the vastness of the West. The Wind River Mountains and Wind Cave National Park were very beautiful with its wildlife, some nearly extinct. "We saw prairie dogs, trumpeter swans, pronghorn antelopes, by the thousands, moose, bison and coyote," remarked Chet.

At Flagstaff they visited Sunset Crater, an extinct volcano located in a national park with an impressive national monument and another called Wupatki. "We found the ruins of old pueblos particularly interesting, because they were not too far removed from our modern condominiums. They had high rise Indian apartments built in the mesas. Even the remains of an old ball park where the Indians played were there. Archeological diggings and tree ring interpretation show that these areas were abandoned 800 years ago when Sunset erupted. Now we seem to be going back to the cliff dwelling age. Surely our high rise buildings are copies in many ways of the old Indian pueblos! muses Chet.








The Loxahatchee National Wildlife Refuge, established in 1951, lies in the southeastern part of Palm Beach County, Florida, occupying a part of the legendary Everglades. The refuge provides habitat for many rare and endangered wildlife species, thousands of wading birds, and both resident and migratory waterfowl. It offers a convenient site for Florida's "gold coast" residents and tourists to fish, hunt waterfowl, observe nature, and enjoy other recreational activities.

Historically Loxahatchee Refuge lands and the Everglades were once under the sea. The growth and decay of plant and animal life eventually raised this large body or organic matter above sea level. The Everglades basin forms one of the largest fresh-water marshes on our continent.

When the United States Corps of Engineeers began the construction of extensive water retention units north of the National Park, the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife leased one of the Conservation areas and established Loxahatchee Refuge. Here long-legged wading birds, waterfowl, fish, and several endangered species find their habitat and protection. The sandhill crane, osprey, alligator, great white heron, bald eagle, peregrine falcon, Everglades mink, Florida panther, masked duck, and fulvous tree duck are present on the refuge from time to time. But by far the most exciting species that is being managed and protected by the refuge is the endangered Everglades kite, a hawk of southern Florida that is being exterminated by the loss of habitat of its food source, the apple snail.

MANY ENDANGERED SPECIES PROTECTED

In 1964, the only known nesting Everglades kites were at Loxahatchee Refuge. The managers at Loxahatchee are approaching the kite dilemma from a position of habitat management. The destruction of alkaline waters containing an ample supply of submerged vegetation, the apple snail's habitat, came with the drainage of wetlands in Florida's land boom. With its habitat greatly reduced, the apple snail



populations declined, and with them the Everglades kites. The kites are so specially adapted to feeding on apple snails, their beaks are specifically designed to extract the snall meat from its shell, that they have not become adept at feeding on any other foods. When the apple snail is gone, so too will be the Everglades kite. To manage the kite, the apple snail is being encouraged at Loxahatchee by permanently flooding parts of the refuge, encouraging specific submergent plants for the snails to utilize in breeding, and introducing snail populations into management areas devoid of the creatures but providing suitable habitat. The goal of the refuge is to provide habitat and food for 50 adult Everglades kites.

The proposed development and management of the Loxahatchee Refuge will serve to increase waterfowl populations and wading bird production, maintain indigenous wildlife populations, improve habitat and nesting conditions for many species of waterfowl and marsh and water birds, assure habitat for endangered species, improve off-refuge hunting opportunities, and provide for 1,000,000 visitors ∈ach year.





MAN AGAINST THE SEA by Edward J. Bennett

CAPTIVA - A long-time winter resident tossed a piece of driftwood into the Gulf the other day and remarked, "And that's about where I could stand on the beach surf casting a decade ago."

Old-time Islanders here, be they fishermen, shellers or beach lovers, probably can all come up with some siliar point of personal reference to illustrate man's losing battle with the sea.

More recent visitors to Captiva wonder out loud about "those cement things which spoil the beach." Older residents recall the sometimes bitter controversies stirred over placement of the "dogbone" groins more than ten years ago which made walks along the beach a circuitous path and running either circuitous or "taking the hurdles."

Painful indeed can be physical contact with the "dogbone" groin, whether on land or swimming. Now, with much of the beach groins under sand, or nearly so, it's possible to walk or run the beach as the crow flies for the first time in many years, but under water, swimmers beware!

Erosion is man's natural enemy as erosion is a destroyer of man's property. The curse of erosion has been fought by man in various ways for hundreds of years. For these centuries the engagement has been fought out along the lines that an immovable object ought to be created which can defeat an irresistible force — the sea. So we have witnessed, and still see, man erect walls, jetties, rip-rap cribs and groins for the battle against the sea, the never-to-be-ended war against the invasion of man's priceless possession-land.

If erosion were a predictable opponent the battle of man against it would be far simpler, but unhappily the odds are greatly against man. Naturally, man is tempted to dream that what Mother Nature is robbing will, by some miracle, wash back upon the shore one fine day, building up lost beaches. But Mother Nature is not usually forgiving, particularly when her crueities to man and his properties are partially of his own ignorance and his own making.

Man has forever built walls to keep unwanted things, or other men out. The Great China Wall. The Maginot Line. The forts of Liege and Verdun. And seawalls to keep back the sea. Most have crumbled. Most have failed.

In his battle against the sea man has developed other strategies. One is wisely to admit defeat; to acknowledge that walls won't combat waves. So why not take back what has been taken? Why not dredge and pump back to the beaches the precious white sand captured by the sea?

DREDGING ONE WAY TO RESTORE BEACH

Such a dredge and pump operation in underway at the north end of Captiva. And, for the first time in dredging history, "Sterile" sand --- i.e., sand of the same consistency as the present beach --- is being used. How much sand can be dredged and pumped to the beach is one matter. How much will "stay put" is another.

Unhappily, history tells us that getting back sand is one thing, keeping it is something else. All too often vast mountains of reclaimed sand have, overnight, been seized back by the sea. Mother Nature is cruel and she is no respecter of man's pump and man's dredge. It is a truism that vertical objects, no matter how small, stuck into the sand, will retard the outflow of sand, thus retarding erosion. These, whether natural plant life or sophisticated (or not-so-sophisticated) groins are known as permeable objects; objects which allow another matter to pass throug!, around and back out again.

The beachcomber will find pieces of coral, permeable in that water passes through. He will also always find in coral another commodity: Sand. How to keep it. How to capture it, once gone. Man's ageless problem, perhaps never to be solved.

red. In a paper prepared more than ten years ago the traditional groin, or series of permeable barriers was described. "One groin, standing alone, is doomed to failure for a violation of nature is involved. Sand will accumulate on the weather side where the prevailing winds are a factor, but more erosion will be induced by a scouring action on the lee side. This is overcome by building yet another groin at a determined distance so that the sand on the weather side of the second groin replaces that stolen on the lee side of the first groin. Then, in theory, with a series of groins, as are in evidence at Captiva, some measure of protection will be experienced, but not beyond the first and the last groin."

Merits notwithstanding, erection of groins on Captiva spoiled the natural beauty of the beach. Until recently, on what beach is left remaining, a straight line walk was, and in some places is still, impossible.

ALTERNATE SOLUTION PROPOSED LONG AGO

About 40 years ago a native Floridian, Sydney Makepeace Wood devised and developed the concept of a single pier-type groin which could thrust out into the sea, yet not impair the beauty of the beach. Then, and perhaps today also, both Federal and Florida erosion "experts" frowned on Wood's concept; in fact they rejected it. Wood's notable and mostly wholly successful groins have been constructed in the West Indies. Once, about to construct a Makepeace Wood groin in Florida, Wood was told to cease and desist because he carried no Florida engineer's license, although fully accredited in another state.

It has been said that Makepeace Wood groins have never failed when built according to his specifications and located where he designated. While Wood's groins resembled piers, the similarity of construction ended there. Wood called his construction "increasingly permeable." The opening through which the waters flow in Wood's groin are smaller at the land end, increasing in size towards the water end; also the openings are smaller at the bottom of the groin and are graduated larger toward the top.

More simply stated perhaps, the Wood groin is two parallel walls with concrete members between, on which lugs have been cast to give the degree of permeability desired. Generally, a top deck is added to form a recreation and fishing pier.

Does the Makepeace Wood groin work? History tells us that it invariably has; that where there have been failures there have been departures from Wood plan, Wood technique.

Makepeace Wood was once asked, "Would one of your pier-groins, built exactly to your specifications and design, survive one of our severe Gulf storms on Captiva, or even a hurricane."

Wood replied without hesitation: "Yes, if built right and installed right, nothing short of an earthquake would shift the pilings or do more than some surface damage." Sydney Makepeace Wood was just one man waging the frustrating battle against the sea, against erosion. Men, at times bitterly, have disagreed on strategy in this war. Mother Nature has always been on the offensive; man is cast in a defensive role.

Have Captiva's "dogbone" goins done any good?
Who can readly say what the beach would be like today if they had not been in-

stalled more than a decade ago?

And how about Mr. Wood's groin? Had one, or more, been erected on Captiva Island would we have more, or less beach? Or no beach? Or would things be about the

same?
Who can say, really? We may have our firm opinions. Or we may just gamble on a guess that may please us.

The secret is locked in the sea.

And the sea is trying to tell us something.

Time, as well as sand, is running out.


VETERANS ARE ELIGIBLE FOR M.P. LIFE INSURANCE

Persons who receive a VA grant for specially adapted housing are eligible for Mortgage Protection Life Insurance. Those eligible may buy an amount equal to their outstanding mortgage balance, or \$30,000 whichever is the lesser said W. B. Mackall, director of the State of Florida's Division of Veterans Affairs.

This decreasing term amount stops when the mortgage is paid off, or the property is disposed of so the veteran no longer has a mortgage, or he stops paying the required premiums or he reaches age 70.

A low cost premium has been made possible by the Government paying the administrative costs, as well as the claims costs which exceed the premium payments. For those receiving compensation, premiums will be deducted by VA; otherwise, the veteran pays directly.







Wildlife Notes

by Griffing Bancroft

People on bird tours, and even some veteran Florida duck hunters, often ask if male and female red-breasted mergansers have similar plumage.

The answer is no. Like most ducks, notably excepting our local mottled duck, the male is much more handsome, with a striking green crested head and a brilliantly colored back.

The trouble is that here in Florida we virtually never see one. The female redbreasted mergansers have now arrived in good numbers as they do every winter, and you certainly can't miss them. They are reddish with a long slim unduck-like bill, serrated for holding the fish they eat.

They are the most active of the ducks here, usually feeding in flocks and often pursuing their prey along the surface or with fast, shallow dives in the inland waters and in the Gulf.

Usually other birds, particularly herons, egrets and ibis are seen with these mergansers, trying to catch some of the panic-stricken fish fleeing from the ducks.

Another merganser, to be seen locally, is the hooded. It is much less common but in its case, as with most other ducks, the males as well as females winter here. Only the red-breased merganser has this peculiar migratory pattern, along the east coast. They nest mostly far north in Canada. When nesting is over in the fall both sexes migrate south to the coasts of New England. There the males remain. Observers around Cape Cod for example report seeing red-breasted mergansers all winter --- almost all males.

We here see them all winter, too, almost all females — for, while the drakes stop off in New England, the females continue on south. Only about one in a thousand around here is a mature male. In the spring the females will return northward. They rejoin the males in New England and there have their courtships and form pairs. Then both sexes go further north to the nesting grounds.

About all you can say of this performance is that there is a great deal about bird migration we do not understand.

A Grain Of Sea Salt by betzi abram



Some time back I told you how to teach your wife to sail. Now I'm going to tell you how to teach your husband to fish for trout. (And I can do it too, because I caught one once.) Upon re-reading that sentence I see there is already some confusion about who you is. I'm really referring to two yous --- one female and the other male. OK? Have I made that perfectly clear? --- as Dick would say.

First I'd like to warn you that trout fishing is not as simple as might be inferred by the light, airy way that some men toss off the remark, "I think I'll go catch some trout today." It is a long, slow process and must be warmed up to, the way you get ready for a prize fight. When you have taken 3 deep breaths, studied your bank book carefully, and instructed your husband to consult 4 or 5 of his buddies in his favorite bar, 2 of whom may have actually caught a few trout, you send him out to buy a trout-fishingboat. Not a shrimp boat or a snapper boat or a mullet boat, not a skiff, a scow or a sloop, but a small, sturdy, flat-bottomed job with an inboard motor. You see, trout have very good ears (heh, heh, heh, you didn't know THAT did you!) and, reasonably enough, they are quick to skedaddle when they hear some monster outboard motor chugging in their direction. (You would too, wouldn't

These little nothings-of-a-boat (no superstructure, no built-in head, no chrome or teak, not even a built-in seat) which appear to be worth about \$50, cost around \$1,000 new and stripped. Don't even bother to tell the old man what it would cost to buy the poles and other goodies he'll need. What's more if you want a new one and the hell with your bank balance, you'll probably have to wait 6 morths or more. There's a famous fellow on Pine Island named Beck who makes 'em but if you go ask him, he just smiles. But if your husband is still set on trout fishing and patiently hunts, he may find a nice used one in a month or two. It will look old and beat up but the owner will tell him that it runs like a doll, that black smoke pouring out of the engine is wouldn't even mention if I were you.

normal, it uses hardly any gas and all that water in the bilge is nothing but leftover rain. He will find out for himself that the poles are too brittle, the lines are too short, the hooks are rusty and the sediment bowl is full of rust. It is at this point that you must be exceptionally careful; one discouraging word and he will choose to remain permanently at the bar dispensing advice to other would-be trout fishermen.

Now assuming that he has discovered, or you have told him, that trout like to feed in shallow water over a grassy bottom and that he is smart enough to know shallow water when he sees it (don't laugh --- there are a lot of bent props around here to prove that many men don't) and assuming that he has got the boat outfitted properly --- for example a 25-gallon ice chest to hold 50 lbs. of ice for the 6 trout he may catch --then all he has to do is find the right spot and start trolling. Of course, if he's not sure of the spot he can troll all around the back bay and Pine Island Sound until he finds something, but that way it may take

Be sure to explain to him that he must not troll too fast or too slow because trout are very fussy about the speed of their dinners; that he must be sure his lures are attached properly as the spooky fish are highly suspicious of anything unusual; that he must expect to catch 10 lady fish, 15 lacks and 4 undersized trout to every one that's big enough to keep. Furthermore, once he's hooked one, he must pull it in ever so gently because they have tender mouths and the hook will rip right out with an overly zealous tug. If he does get a bite, pull it in slowly and carefully, ease it over into the boat without falling overboard in excitement, he will know the thrill of the success that comes from patience, determination, and hard work and in spite of good advice. And you will have the joy of cleaning a very pretty, silvery, spotted fish with a delectable flavor, plus the knowledge that you were a good teacher. And that's only salt-water trout. Fresh water trout is a whole 'nother can of worms which I
