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



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4 ISLANDER 12-13-73 DR. PAUL H. SCHWEITZER ON SANIBEL

Dr. Paul H. Schweitzer, who is vacationing on Sanibel at the Moorings, may well have the answer to gas rationing. Dr. Schweitzer has invented a little electronic gadget which buzzes when you reach a speed over 55 mph. He was also instrumental in having this year's cars labeled in showrooms for their tuel economy.

Dr. Schweitzer of State College, Pa., was a Professor of Engineering there before his retirement, but he really did not refire at all. He is in private business in the electronic field with his main office at the Optimizer Control Corp. in Minneapolis, Minn. Dr. Schweitzer is vice president of this company which specializes in transitorized circuits.

Much interested in the gas and fuel shortage, he has sent a letter to each of cur congressmen recommending (1) reduced speed in driving, (2) no pleasure or Sunday driving, (3) curtailment of all unnecessary driving, (4) installation of a speed monitor on all new cars.

Dr. Schweitzer is not new in the invention field, and his partner, Dr. Carl Volz, of Schweitzer, Hussman, consulting engineers, also engineered the optimizer control system of spark timing and the polimiter, which retards spark. Both inventions are the basis of emission control devices scheduled to be used on most vehicles and all new cars, but which may now be scrapped.

The speed alarm is as simple as the seat belt alarm system used in all new cars. The inexpensive speed alarm system can be installed for as little as \$1.00. He hopes that they will be mandatory on new cars to conserve gas. "They could even be dispensed by the government, free of charge for older models, at a cost of approximately \$100,000," he states. The alarm is inactivated while the vehicle remains inactive, but when the car reaches the maximum speed for which the alarm is set, a steady and persistent buzzing occurs until the speed is reduced. Dr. Schweitzer explained the simple device so that even a layman can understand. It measures the engine revolutions by counting the pulse of the spark of the engine. Dr. & Mrs. Schweitzer occupy a suite in the Sanibel Moorings Condominiums overlooking the Gulf. "We would love to call Sanibel our second home and can only wish it will stay as it is, but of course further development will spoil it in the end," he remarked wistfully.



Wildlife Notes

One of our care, fast disappearing falcons has been sighted several times on the islands recently. It is the pigeon hawk, or merlin,

This interesting bird is about half way in size between two better known members of the genus, "Falco," the smallsparrow hawk or kestrel and the large duck hawk or peregrine falcon. The bird seen here, assuming it has been the same one each time, is a mature female.

Falcons have intrigued humans for centuries. The sport of falconry, indulged in by kings and nobles of old, is still practiced by some people in this country today. The trouble is that devotees of the sport are running out of the principle players: the birds. The noblest of the falcons is the big peregrine which hasalmost disappeared from the entire eastern United States. It is doubtful that any nest in this big area any more. What few nests are left, out west or far to the north, are often illegally robbed, hastening the end of the bird. The falconer must obtain young birds which he can train, and about the only source of these are nests in the wild. But the peregrines, what few areleft, are protected as an endangered species, so the aspiring falconer must either break the law, find some other bird, or give up the sport.


Theonlyfalcon at all commonin this country is the little eight inch kestrel. This bird is quite abundant over most of the United States and can be seen here during the winter usually perched, falcon fashion, on a hunting post or often on a utility wire along the roads.

But the kestrel is hardly asubstitute bird for the falconer. The larger falcons live mostly off other birds and when trained can be loosed by their masters to make their tremendous dives upon many varieties of large birds. The kestrel, however, eats mostly large insects. It wouldn't seem very exciting to train one and then have him bring back nothing but grasshoppers.

The merlin, the medium sized falcon sighted here, also has disadvantages. Only a foot long itself it will tackle birds as big as it is, like pigeons and small ducks, but securing a nestling merlin presents difficulties. In the first place the bird is rare, or at least uncommon everywhere and usually nests far to the north in inaccessible places.

Altogether, falconry may be a dying sport. For information about bird tours call MacIntosh Book Store, 472-1447.



Next year we plan to visit the Near East countries."

A massive wardrobe of hand-carved wood is from England; chairs, tables and a pair of beautiful old doors too are some of the lovely old pieces displayed. A table is set with delicate Haviland china and an ornate mirror with fancy gold edging makes a conversation piece. In Mombasa on the Indian Ocean, they found a young American from the Peace Corps helping natives develop their own arts of wood carving and weaving, and they brought



back some jewelry fashioned of gourds, old coins and banana fibers, mostly made by the crippled, blind and others who were formerly considered unemployable before the Peace Corps.

From Greece, they brought back bread molds which create a fancy design on bread and pastries for special holidays. They brought back old Coptic crosses, silver jewelry and even do-ityourself jewelry from the Arabs, and spindles and spinning rods and spindle bases of carved wood, Mr. LeRoux is well versed in Coptic religious history and it is a joy to have him refresh one's sketchy historical memories. GEESE CARRY ADDRESSES IN MAKE-UP OF FEATHERS

Research has uncovered a technique to determine the origin of geese by the minerals in their feathers, the Wildlife Management Institute reports.

Most wild geese grow flight feathers while in the vicinity of their breeding grounds. As these feathers grow, minerals ingested with food and water become incorporated in the keratin of the feathers. Biologists have shown that the quantities of minerals ingested by geese reflect the mineralogy of the local area and the origin of the birds can be determined on the basis of mineral patterns of the main flight feathers. The technique has been over 90 percent accurate.







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SOME INSURANCE QUESTIONS ON CAR POOLS ANSWERED

With growing concern in Florida over the possibility of gasoline rationing and the lack of gasoline availability, the interest in car pools for work and school is reaching its highest point since World War II. Joining a car pool can be a convenience and a time and money saver, as well as a way of improving the quality of our air, but many people are reluctant to enter such arrangements.

Florida residents are hesitant to expose themselves to car pools because of questions concerning their auto insurance coverage. The Insurance Information Institute advises that, in terms of insurance coverage, car poolers probably have nothing to worry about. However, a few words of caution and explanation are in order.

Insurance on a privately owned, pool-shared vehicle is placed in jeopardy only if the pool is operated for a profif. In the situation where everyone in the pool uses his car an equal amount of time there is, of course, no problem. The problem most often arises when one of the car pool participants does not share in the driving chores and thus pays a regular fee.

To preserve insurance coverage, the Institute points out, any car pool fee should not be more than the fair share of the gas, oil, and general depreciation on the car. A simpler way for the nonsharing passengers to reimburse the pool members is to give a gift sometime during the year to the drivers. This divorces the concept of "fee" from the privilege of riding in a car pool and leaves the insurance protection intact.

In the case of car pools involving children, the Institute stresses the importance of wearing seat belts, not only to protect the children in the case of an accident but also to prevent the kind of antics that might distract the driver's attention. Car pool participants will be covered by their auto insurance in almost any situation which might arise. Florida residents would be covered under their insurance policy in one of two ways. If a passenger in a car pool were an automobile owner in the State of Florida, he would be covered by his own no-fault coverage in the event of an accident. If a passenger in a car pool owned no vehicle in Florida, he would be covered by the policy of the driver of the vehicle.

Property damage liability coverage, which protects the motorist against claims resulting from damage to other people's property, is not likely to be affected by involvement in a car pool since the number of passengers would not ordinarily contribute to the amount of property damage done by the car in an accident.

ISLAND WATER CHARGES DISCUSSED AT MEETING

An additional connection fee to pay for extensions of and improvements to the water distribution system is now being charged, according to a report given by the Island Water Association Inc., at its December 6 meeting. Sixty-six members were present and endorsed the fee which will now go to the Lee County Commissioners for final approval and in' the meantime the monies collected are being held in a special escrow account.

Those not present may wish to know that the charge was derived by adding the total of all living units now being served by the system and dividing this number into the book value of the exisiting distribution system. The result is \$214.00 each. With this charge new users coming on the system will pay for needed additions rather than being subsidized by members already on the system. This is the same method used previously to cover the cost of plant expansions. Your Board of Directors has invited bids for doubling the size of the plant just, completed and expect to sign contracts about the end of the year. The membership will be glad to hear that the money for this expansion is in hand and no additional borrowing will be needed at this time

Some time in the future, additional financing may be needed for new lines and for increases in the sizes of mains. The \$214.00 charge may not cover the entire cost and may not come in before large improvements are neccessitated.

At the membership meeting some concern for well-flow was expressed by Mr. Walter Emmons, President. It has since been found that a well pump was installed backwards. This situation has now been corrected and the plant can be run at capacity. Another well is to be started at once with others planned.

Taste changes in the water have been noticed and can most likely be accounted for because of lime deposits built up inside all mains and pipes over the years. The new water is much purer and may be dissolving the mineral build-up inside the lines.

EMINENT BANKER RETIRES

New to the Islands and to retirement is Dr. Karl R. Bopp (pronounced Bope to rhyme with cope). Dr. Bopp was retired president of the Federal Reserve Bank of Philadelphia, and his impressive resume is large enough to fill a book. In fact, one has been written about him, over 260 pages by prominent colleagues in the banking system.

Dr. Bopp is far from pretentious, and he was most modest about granting this interview. He and his charming wife, Ruth, are Missourians. He was born in Kirkwood, and received all his degrees, A.B., M.A. and Ph.D, from the University of Missouri. He taught there from 1931 to 1941. He has received honorary dearees from Temple University in Philadelphia, the University of Missouri and Cedar Crest College as well as a Citation of Merit from LaSalle College. While holding various positions as vice president and president in Philadelphia banks, he served on the faculties of various schools of banking including the University of Pennsylvania, Princeton, Columbia, Rutgers and the School of Banking at the University of Wisconsin.

With it all he has found time to author two books: The Agencies of Federal Reserve Policy (1935) and Hjalmar Schacht: Central Banker (1939). He has held offices and membership in the American Economic Association, Statistical Assn. Sunday American Club (Philadelphia) and Breakfast Cosmos Club (Washington, D.C.(, He has also held Directorships in the American

Academy of Political and Social Science and the Atlantic City Electric Co.


Dr. Bopp was technical secretary of the Bretton Woods Monetary Conference and he assisted Thomas B. McCabe when President Truman appointed McCabe chairman of the Federal Reserve Board. He was active in the Federal Reserve System when it supported President Truman's Bond market before the 1951 Accord, and he was a policy maker at the Federal Reserve during the 1960-1969 Kennedy-Johnson prosperity.

Dr. Bopp has had an active and eminent career and his retirement to the islands is the islands' gain. The Biographical Section of the 1973 Edition of the International Year Book and Statesmen's Who's Who contains a biographical sketch of Dr. Bopp listing a paragraph of 50 lines of his memorable accomplishments. The Bopps live at 851 Angel Wing Drive on Sanibel.

This Week at the Sanibel Library by Hal H. Harrison

If you enjoy stories of the "old South," you'll enjoy Lonnie Coleman's best-selling "Beulah Land," a Literary Guild fall selection. The title is the name of a rich cotton plantation in Georgia, and this is the story of its golden age from 1820 to 1861. Kendrick White is the white master of 150 black slaves, but who was master and whowas slave are questions with which the story deals.

We get a "sleeper" at the library once in awhile --- a book that is great reading for everyone but fails to get adequate publicity and does not realize the circulation it deserves. Such a book is "All Creatures Great and Small" by James Herriot. This is a story of an animal doctor in northern England which is filled with humor, pathos, superb tale telling, and a love of life. The veterinary's patients range from kittens to race horses and his anecdotes range from lying on his back in a stable with his arms inside a cow, trying to turn a calf into the proper position to be born, to calming a wealthy dowager with an overfed Pekingese, to comforting a lonely old man whose only companion, a dog, has died. You'll like it. I promise you.

What Charles Wright describes in his "Absolutely Nothing to Get Alarmed About" is what America is doing to its own. Wright sets forth his encounters with poverty, drug addiction, prostitution, murder, race riots and frustrated rage. He has been called "the aristocratic poet in residence of America's seamy side."

If you would like a realistic (and scary) trip into the workings of international finance, I can think of no better book for your education than "The Billion Dollar Sure Thing" by Paul E. Erdman. The story involves billions of dollars, and the actiontakes place in the arena of international finance --- where Swiss bankers tangle with speculators from the Near East; where Russia takes on the U.S. in a powerstruggle over the future of gold, the dollar and the ruble.

I should have reported long ago that we have "Ninety-Two in the Shade" by Thomas McGuane. This may be of particular interest to Floridians because the setting is Key West: Young Tom Skelton and Nichol Dance, two rival fishing guides, are the principals. It is a grim comedy in which two entirely opposite personalities bead for an inevitable collision. The tale takes the reader through a multitude of oddball characters as well as the lives of the two protagonists.

Another great book long overdue for announcement in this column is Morris. West's "The Salamander." This is a story of conspiracy in high places with a background in modern Italy, the dark underworld of big cities, and the highsociety of politics and finance. Incidentally, the title comes from a legendary beast that lives in lire and is the symbol of man's survival in time of peril. It is also the code name of a cullionnaire who is the center of a plot that adds up to a suspenseful novel.
