

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

AUDUBON ACTIVITIES PAST AND FUTURE

1973 was a busy year in the historyoff the Sanibel Captiva Audubon Society, and 1974 again promises to be one richin worthwhile achievements. The activities cover a variety of subjects related not only to Audubon's traditional goals, but also to broader objectives, that today make defense of the environment and orderly development an essential part of vital local issues. The well balanceti series of indoor and outdoor programs and events, held from December 1972 through April 1973, attracted a record number of viewers and participants, including not only local residents, but hundreds of winter visitors. The purpose was thus served of better informing and alerting an ever increasing number of concerned people on a variety of timely

In keeping with the policy of not restricting, attendance to members, all events were open to the public, and this policy continues to pay off, not only in terms of attracting greater general interest, but also of effectively increasing the membership. This has been proven true year after year, as new applications are received from those attending lectures of field events.

At the beginning of 1973 a new, very successful Bird Identification Basic Course was held for the first time, conducted by Charles and Ella Newell. Over fifty interested persons followed the course; consisting of five indoor classes and five brief field trips. So many requests for the continuation of the course have been received that it will be repeated starting on January 15, 1974, and will again be open to all. The regular 1973-74 season will open on December 20, and again all evening programs will be held at the Sanibel Community House, at 8 p.m. on Thursday, featuring a number of noted speakers, film and slide shows. Outdoor events will include an open house at Woodmere Preserve, a bird banding demonstration, and ticipation in the Sanibel Shell Fair with

an Audubon Stand on March 7, 8 and 9. One of the most appreciated activities has always been that of assisting and cooperating with Audubon Chapters and other associations visiting Sanibel. For example, during the past few weeks escorted daytime tours and evening programs have been held for the benefit of the Royal Palm Audubon from Boca Raton, the Pelican Island Audubon from Vero Beach, students from Vermont's Wyndam College, and the Delaware Environmental Education Center. In September of 1973 and again on December 8 and 9 our Chapter cooperated to assure the success of Environmental Seminars for teachers, held on Sanibel under the auspices of the Florida Audubon Society, Needless to say, closest cooperation has and will continue to be maintained with the Sanibel Captiva Conservation Foundation and other local organizations. A number of appearances and written recommendations have been introduced before national, state and Lee County agencies whenever warranted. All told, in mese cruciel nines, our Auduben will continue to work for the true welfare of those who find our islands a clean, enioyable habitat -- including decent human beings.


GREETINGS TO ALL FROM WILDLIFE REFUGE STAFF

THIS WEEK AT THE SANIBELLIBRARY by Hal H. Harrison

You could bardly call them Christ mas books, but I think your children will enjoy a set of four books about animals that we have just received at the library. They are called Ranger Rick Books and are published by the National Wildlife Federation. I suspect that this marks the beginning of a series of similar books. The first four titles are "The White-Tailed Deer," "The Big Bears," "The Froxes," and "The Beaver's Way." If the stories are too advanced for your toddler. the beautiful illustrations (photos and paintings) may catch his eye.

With Christmas only a few days away, you may be coming under that holly and misfletoe spell of goodwill and good cheer. If so, let me remind you again of the library's hope that many friends will be moved to start an annual tradition of giving the library a book for Christmas. We need many subjects in all fields so you can choose a book that appeals to you. We will be happy to receive the book, or, we will make the purchase of your choice if you wish. In the front of any gift book will go a book mark with your name as donor. As Tiny Tim might have said, "Let the spirit of

the season rest upon you."

By now, you have sent your Christmas cards (the post office hopes!) and you are conscious of the fact that one of the two U.S. postage stamps issued this year is a replica of a beautiful creation in needlepoint - a trimmed Christmas tree. If this has inspired you to try this craft or renewed your interest, we can help you at the library. "Needlepoint For Everyone" has all the information needed to get started and it follows through to the creating of handsome and satisfying pieces of needlepoint, "McCall's Needlework Treasury" also has a section on needlepoint. Books on kindred crafts include "Good Housekeeping's Complete Book of Needlecraft," "Adventures in Stitches," and "Design in Fabric and Thread."

Just before her death last spring, Pearl S. Buck's publishers released a Christmas book by this famous author. It seemed a strange time of year to offer such a title as "Once Upon a Christmas," but this is the first Christmas since its appearance and many of you may want to borrow it. The book contains 14 stories gathered from Ms. Buck's own tales and from her personal reminiscences of a lifetime. It is both fiction and non-fiction, much of the material relating to China. It is a book for all ages.




DON'T BELIEVE WHAT YOU READ UP THERE WE DO HAVE GAS DOWN HERE

So please, dear thousands of northern readers --- don't put off your pleasant days (or months) in the sun --- come on down, yawl, heah?
















Rumors of fuel shortages have given a few of the airlines the excuse to cancel certain non profitable runs, but the profitable flights you will note will never be cancelled. Especially flights from Florida and to Florida are not affected.

We will admit that airline flights are full but that's what they are designed to be There is no way for an airline to stay in business with half-full flights.

We have not had any problems getting air reservations to or from the islands, not even in this busy Christmas season. We have people call us from all over the north in the past week stating they can't get air reservations but with a little extra effort we have had no problems in their behalf.

Everyone gets up in the air when they hear all these rumors. Our advise is not to believe all you hear unless you hear it from an approved travel agent or an airline.

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



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SANIBEL HOME RULE GROUP MOVES AHEAD WITH PLANS

The Sanibel Home Rule Group, Inc. met Thursday morning at the Community House to set a list of priorities and to read the Articles of Incorporation.

The first Article of Incorporation designated the name of the organization: The Sanibel Home Rule Group, Inc. Article 2 gave its purpose: "The purpose of the organization shall be to initiate and conduct studies of the pros and cons of alternative methods for obtaining a form of local government that will provide voters of Sanibel Island the right of self determination and effecuation of their aspirations for cintinuing the unique and scenic character of the island and to implement an improved proposition that could be presented to the voters." Article 3 stated that all persons owning property or residing on Sanibel shall be eligible for membership. Additional eligibility requirements may be added to the articles from time to time.

They also discussed the various aims such as traffic control, establishing rapport with the existing government, drinking water supply, sewer service, solid waste disposal, enforcement of existing laws, use of beaches, bridge tolls, air and water pollution, public transportation and beach setback lines. A sampling of community organizations brought out the above problems and questions and answers the group is

Presiding officer at the meeting was president S. Ralph Zeiss who was elected December 7. Other elected officers are: 1st V-P, Anina Hill: 2nd V-P, Rhea Nichols: secretary, Zelda Butler; and treasurer, J. Cecil Rhodes.

An information office is open at the Sanibel Community House five days a week from 9 until one. The telephone number is 472-2155. Contributions are still being accepted, as at present only 1/2 the \$20,000 pledged has been received. The Articles will be presented to an attorney for finalization. Meetings will be held each Thursday morning at 9 a.m. through January. After January, they are hoping to have a planning consultant available.



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



ST. MICHAEL'S TO OFFER TRADITIONAL MIDNITE MASS



WATER APPLICATIONS TO BE CAREFULLY REVIEWED

The Island Water Association advises that all new applications for water hook-ups to the system will be reviewed by the entire Board of Directors before approval. The Water Association wishes to assure all residents that there is a sufficient supp p of water from the wells and treatment plant to supply everyone with ample water for the first time in

Problems have occured with the new equipment but as they have occured they have or are being resolved as provided under the guarantees. The treatment plant uses large amounts of electric power and shortages in this area could cause restrictions.

Building continues at a steady pace on the Islands and the County Commission is providing no guidance as to the future density, therefore it is the judgement of the Board of Directors of your Association to review all applications carefully.

PLANNING COMMISSION BUSY

The Lee County Planning Commission met Thursday and again made sweeping changes in the Sanibel land-use plans. Although most of the Gulf front, east of Rabbit Road, will be multi-family zoning, which is the way it is now, they ruled that north of that, west of Dixie Beach Road and south of Periwinkle will all be single family dwellings. Commissioner Bill Hammond, a very busy man who wears many hats, objected to the zoning plans saying, "If only 50 percent of what is zoned is filled to capacity, we will be well over the 50,000 mark.

Commissioner Pat Wasson was all for showing existing zoning maps for public hearings, but Chairman Don Fink was very adverse to allowing another public hearing, where heavy criticism of the board generally occurs. Harry Rodda and James Fortiner suggested they follow present zoning in areas already under development and encourage low density in as yet undeveloped land, and that they suggest only general trends, not real boundaries.

County Commissioner Dick Sayers asked for review of a five acre tract, but the County Commission has long objected to reviewing individual plans, so the rezoning application was refused. The Planning Commission ended on a note of frustration with Pat Wasson saying, "How can we review anything to see if it fits with our county plan when we don't have a county plan?

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SANIBEL PHOTOS

Mr. & Mrs. Ben Pickens of Sanibel Photos are no strangers to the photography world. Ben was 15 years old when his family came to Sanibel in 1952 with the Jim Pickens. He went to Fort Myers High School and then earned his Bachelor of Science degree in Photography at Sam Houston State University in San Antonio where he met his wife who also holds a BS degree in photography. Between here and there he joined the Armed Services. "Ralph Woodring was a classmate of mine and we both joined the Air Force at the same time," he states.

He was assigned to the Kennedy Space Center with Technicolor Corp., serving as a cameraman, then in the photo laboratory, and later as manager of the Still Photo Lab for the Kennedy Space Center and the Air Force Eastern Test Range, with 36 people working under him. Ben mentioned the peacetime uses of satellite photography, as in agriculture. "Often you can spot a disease by satellite photos before it has even happened, because days or weeks before the onset you can see its progress on film, enabling the farmer to treat the disease before it gets a death grip."

Susie, his cute and vivacious wife, has been a real asset to him. Not only has she been a busy housewife and mother to Robin, 8, and Karen, 5, but she helps operate the shop, and they perform a really bang-up job in fulfilling photography needs on the islands. They do custom black-and-white processing and offer fast photography service in Kodak and GAF film processing sent out by air courier. Sometimes the prints come back in 48 hours, and the work is quality plus. There isn't much the Pickens don't know about cameras and photography equipment.

In his spare time, Ben is much interested and involved with the Men's Slow Pitch Softball League in Fort Myers. The team plays twice a week in the Fort Myers Commercial League, and they are constantly on the lookout for new players and monetary support. So if you have a talent in pitching or hitting, see Ben.

MARINE RESEARCH LAB PROPOSED FOR THE ISLANDS

The Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation met on Captiva Wednesday, and Bill Hammond of the Lee County Environmental Education Center talked of the planned marine research laboratory the Foundation is hoping to set up on their 22 acre tract at Wulfert near their Sanibel River land. The proposed laboratory would cost in the neighborhood of \$500,000 and would provide a place for all serious students and marine biologists to study and gather data about marine life and ecology firsthand. Dormitories would be available and several colleges have already made inquiries about field research. After the buildings are up, a fee could be charged to make the operation self-supporting, and federal funding might even be available. Right now, however, private donations and foundation grants are the only resource, Hammond said. Posters featuring a pelican roosting on mangroves noted nature photographer Dam Roth will soon be on sale by the Foundation.

Charles LeBuff gave a talk about the Caretta Research Program, recapping the work of the past year, which has been vigorous. He spoke of the many stations throughout Florida located on the main beaches where loggerheads are known to nest. Mr. Le Buff showed a series of slides showing how the turtles were tagged as they came ashore to nest. Now a year old, the tagging procedure has begun to pay off as turtles that were tagged on the east coast are showing up here on the west coast thus indicating their travel routes. Since the furtles are among the endangered marine animals the whole process has been of much interest to all islanders who have observed them fir-

The next scheduled meeting for the

Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation will be for Board members on January 8 at which time the Board will decide on the feasibility of the Marine Laboratory. They will meet at the

Sanibel Library at 3 p.m.

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36 ISLANDER 12-20-73 ISLAND PROJECTS STUDIED

At Wednesday's County Commission meeting Peter Goss, representing Bill Taylor, special committee chairman of projects for Sanibel and Captiva, presented a folder on proposed projects for the islands to be funded by Causeway tolls. The County Commission in accepting the folder referred the committee to Mrs. Lavon Wisher, County Administrator, inasmuch as some of the projects are already being implemented. In this category is the improvement and elevation of McGregor Blvd. from the toll plaza to College Parkway. This project, already budgeted at a cost of \$1.03 million dollars per year is incorporated in another county project for a loop road linking McGregor Blvd, to a road system rougly paralell and eventually joining a route to Ortiz Ave. in East Fort Myers, now under construction.

Commissioner Walter Shirey said the recent survey by Coverdale and Colpitts of New York was used in a support study, and that now it would be advisable to validate a bond, which would last for a year. Mrs. Wisher elaborated on this point and said that some of the projects requested by Islanders, costing approximately \$11 million, may not be permissable from toll revenues.

A date was set for the island committee to meet with Mrs. Wisher and review the entire program with a further hearing before the County Commissioner scheduled after a thorough study of the proposals. Some that may not be permissable from county funds but might be funded from other sources were: bike paths, the fresh water recreation area, beach nourishment, and others. There was reason to believe that some of these might be acceptable in review by the county legal officer.

The sparsely attended meeting marks another step forward in the struggle by the islands to obtain some local benefits from funds collected by bridge tolls and we shall be looking forward to further developments from this committee's reports.

County Commissioners who were present besides Shirey were James Sweeney, George Goldfrap, chairman, and Dick Sayers.

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





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You won't see the horses or the snow on Captiva, but you may meet their owner and driver, Edward J. Bennett of New Hampshire, winter resident on Captiva and consultant for The Islander. One of Mr. Bennett's team of matched Belgain draft Morses is pictured above during a logging operation on his farm. Note the scoot loaded with snow covered logs which are drawn by the horses to a skidway where they are taken to the sawmill. During spring, summer and fall the horses are used for other farm work and are taken to county fairs to be shown. Other Bennett-owned horses are trained only for competitive pulling contests.

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LOCAL MAN'S UNUSUAL HOBBY APPEALS TO HORSE LOVERS

A New Hampshire advertising and public relations consultant, former daily newspaper publisher and state senator spends his summer and autumn evenings and weekends with a hobby that could stump the experts on "What's My Line."

Edward J. Bennett, 48, winter Captiva resident and consultant for The Islander, is proud owner of three teams of draft horses which are driven by Bennett and a partner, Arthur Durgin of Croydon, N.H., at country fairs all over New England.

The name of the game is "horsepulling" and Bennett owns one of the top teams of pulling horses in the northeast. In fact, "Dan" and "Bill" won the Northeast Draft Horse Association's 1972 top trophies in both the 3,000 pound and 3,200 pound weight classes.

In the season this team won 26 blue ribbons and were "in the money" in every pulling contest entered at virtually every county fair in New England.

In 1970, these horses won a pulling contest on Marthas Vineyard, being transported by ferry to the island from Woods Hole, Mass.

Bennett says that the key to his success has been proper feed for his teams, tender loving care and very hard work, but "no actual pulling at the far-

As weather permits, Bennett and Durgin work the teams at least three hours daily, seven days a week. This is done by driving the horses, hauling homemade scoots or drags, around a half mile up-and-down hill dirt track.

A combination of oats, whole corn and special horse feed is a regular diet for the horses, with limited hay of highest quality, usually Canadian, and no green

Due to a woods injury while logging in 1971, Bennett had not driven any of his teams at pulling contests. Until this year, the driving has been left to Durgin who is recognized as one of New England's top teamsters.

This year, however, Bennett has driven a newly-added large team of Belgian geldings weighing nearly 5,000 pounds. These were pulled in the "freefor all" division where there are no weight limitations. His other teams competed in the 2900, 3000, and 3400 pound classes and next year he hopes to purchase an additional light horse to qualify for the 2800, or lightweight class.

Bennett's prize teams in 1972 earned

him about \$5000 in premium money in addition to an abundance of ribbons and a shelf of trophies. But he says that expenses are high.

"There's grain and hay all winter, bills for the veterinary which no one can budget, harness repairs, and operating costs for a large van which can transport seven draft horses weighing a total of 12 tons," he explains.

Stripped of technicalities and complicated rules, the object of horsepulling competition is to win by pulling the "mostest the furthest."

Horse pulling has attracted New Englanders since the country was founded. It's more professional now, but the idea is still the same.

Each contesting team has three tries or "hitches" to haul a load six feet in one continuous pull and thus qualify for the next heavier load. The horses must stay between log rails that form the pulling

Cement weights are loaded on a flat, wooden, "stoneboat," 31/2" x 8" long. The weight of the load is increased after each team makes its "draw."

The six foot pull is the most common in New Hampshire. Rarer is the distance pull, the 12-foot pull and the so-called "dynameter pull," mostly found in New York State and the midwest.

Depending on conditions in the "pit" and the weather, as well as the conditioning or fatigue of the horseflesh, Bennett's 2900 pound class team has pulled as much as 12,500 pounds of stone "on the boat" six feet. If this is done on a final pull it is called "crossing the load." It is at this point that enthusiastic fair crowds cheer.

Bennett resides on a 65 acre farm in Goshen, located about a mile from Sunapee, N.H. State Park.

Bennett was publisher of the Claremont, N.H. Daily Eagle from 1961 to 1970 when the newspaper was sold. Prior to that he owned and edited two New Hampshire weekly newspapers.

He served two terms in that state's State Senate and has held numerous other public offices including that of chairman of the Board of Selectman of his town.


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
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
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Going through my desk the other day, shoveling it out might be nearer the truth, I found the back of an old calendar, 1956, on which are recorded some "interesting facts about the tides." They are indeed, and so full of goodies that I must share them with you, although I regret that I cannot give the original hardworking complier credit. I'll bet you thought the tide was water coming up on the Beach and going back (more-or-less) didn't you? Well, there are tides in the earth and tides in the atmosphere as well as in the water. In fact the technical definition of tides doesn't even mention water. A tide is "the alternating relative motions of the matter of a planet, satellite or star, which are due to the gravitational actions of external bodies."

We know a little more today than King Canute who commanded the tides to stand still (and lost considerable face when they did not) but did you know these little tid-bits? The distance from the high point of a flood tide to the low point of the ebb tide is called the range. One of the least ranges is the northern shore of the Gulf of Mexico where it is less than one foot, but in the Bay of Fundy, in Nova Scotia, it averages 40 feet and has occasionally reached 70 feet. When the tide advances like a huge breaker up some broad rivers, it is called a bore. The Severn in England has had bores as high as 9 feet and one of 25 feet was reported on a river in China. To my knowledge, none of noticeable size has been seen in the Caloosahatchie.

Since both sun and moon exert a gravitational pull, the oceans tend to heap up in the areas on the earth directly facing or away from the moon. Areas between those points experience low tides. Since the earth revolves every 24 hours, one would assume that high tides would arrive every 12 hours, but because the moon revolves around the earth also, the calculations change to approximately 12 hours and 24 minutes. Thus the tide ebbs for 6 hours and 12 minutes and flows for 6 hours and 12 minutes. Since the moon is closer and exerts nearly 21/4


times as much force on the earth as the sun, other variations result. When sun and moon are in line with each other and the earth, the increased pull results in a higher than average tide, called the spring-tide. When the two bodies are at what seems to be right angles to each other, a lower than usual tide results, called a neap-tide. Thus the range of the tide varies from day to day, being high twice each lunar month at New and Full Moon; low twice each lunar month at First and Last Quarter. When the moon is nearest the earth an unusually high tide, called a perigee, results; when it is farthest away an unusually low tide, called an apogee, results. The path of the earth is not a circle but an elipse and this too affects the tides.

And now that you know all these exciting factors, you can figure out for yourself when to go fishing or sailing and you won't have to get those great tide schedules from Garl's or out of the paper — maybe. On the other hand, if you're as weak in calculations as I am, you'll just throw this article away and drop by the drug store. In any event, happy sailing!
