



WHO'S WHO AND WHY


We had an utterly charmed visit with JACK VAN BELL, one of the more colorful island residents. Jack, whose far-out house is about to be completed, treated us to some minutes of reverie and nostalgia for the good old days on the islands, when everybody as "a real character." Jack says of his house: "It's a glorified chicken coop, a cedar shake house on pilings and the most unconventional around but just what I want and need in the way of a house. The entrance will be into my workshop and from there you can proceed to the large living room, and even larger kitchen. I love to cook." He then introduced us to the largest chopping block ever seen which will be assembled on casters, so that it can be moved where needed. "I plan to make apple streudel whenever 1 get the notion," says Jack who is famous for the most delicious streudel this side of the Atlantic. What most people do not know is that Jack was a famous hotel chef, and that is just one of a whole culinary repertoire.

Years ago when Jack first came to the islands he worked as chef in a restaurant located on the perimeter of the Island Store. PAUL EVERETT, who had earned his Ph.D at Columbia after graduating from Phillips Exeter, worked with Jack and was cashier and dishwasher when not entertaining the dining clientele. "Whenever we had an accident in the kitchen, all the diners would rush to the kitchen to see what had happened. Anyhow, they were always in the midst of kitchen, participating in preparations. We would just tell them to stand aside and go on with our cooking, but they were always a real part of the whole procedure, giving suggestions, tasting, etc. Sometimes they would lick the mixing bowls before they were put in the sink for the dishwasher. We had an artesian well, a gas reinigerator and oil

"And when PAUL STAHLIN and his wife, FANETTA, had completed a list of all island residents. Hurricane Donna came along. PAUL. FANETTA and BICK and PAUL KERNS got out the disaster list and, realizing that Captiva was completely devastated, worked their way over failed Australian pines and an almost impassable road to find us. When they did we were all /MAE and BILL SHANNON, PAUL EVERETT, BELTON JOHNSON and I) enjoying the biggest piece of porterhouse steak ever cooked on Captiva and a bottle of liquid refreshment to take the place of the poliuted well water. So we had to share it with the newcomers."

Jack is still deeply interested and concerned with weather phenomena. "We are about three years overdue for a real hurricane," he states. "And 1 believe that the 8th of January and the 11th of February are very critical dates to remember and mark on your calendar, because a combination of high tides and a full moon plus other weather indications forecast a flooding tide on those dates." We have duly noted them on our calendar and plan to get our flood insurance out right away.

Jack is employed at Knudsen Realty on Sanibel and he will probably have our head for quoting him, but we do it in love and affection.

NO MORE OUTSIDE FIRES

According to Chief Alan Nave of the Sanibel Fire Dept., in compliance with the rules of the Department of Pollution Control, no more individual burning permits will be issued on the Island after January 1, 1974. 


NATURE FILMS TO BE SHOWN







SOCIAL SECURITY ANNOUNCES SUPPLEMENTAL CHECKS TO BE **DELIVERED EARLY IN MONTH**

The first supplemental security income checks will be delivered in the mail the first week of January, according to Tom Camps, social security district manager in Fort Myers.

Supplemental security income is the new State-Federal program establishing a national income floor for people with little or no income and limited resources who are 65 or over, or blind, or disabled.

The amount of the checks people get will depend on other income they might have," Camps said. "Eligible people with no other income at all will get Federal payments of \$130 a month for one person and \$195 for a couple. People with other income may get smaller supplemental security income checks.

For people 65 or over, or blind, or disabled who have been getting public assistance payments, Florida will add to their payments when necessary so they'll get at least as much under the supplemental security income program as they received in December 1973.

Florida has arranged for the Social Security Administration to include the added State payment in the Federal checks. The consolidated payment means Florida will not have to pay administrative costs, according to Camps.

'People who expect to get a supplemental security income check but don't receive it during the first week in January should call social security to find out about their payment," Camps

The Fort Myers Social Security office is at 2124 Clifford Street. The phone number is 334-2147.

The supplemental security income program will be run by the Social Security Administration, an agency of the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. "But supplemental security income payments will be funded by general revenues, not by social security contributions," Camps

beach. As they recede, new sand is taken off the beach. This process is repeated again and again as waves move along a coastal area.

If the volume of sand deposited and removed from the beach is roughly equal, the shoreline is known as a "live beach" and remain stable. If more sand is deposited than is taken away, the beach grows; this is known as accretion.

Conversely, if waves breaking on the shore do not contain as much suspended sand as is taken away, the beach recedes — this is known as erosion.

SAND FLOW ALONG THE GULF ISLANDS

Along the Gulf Islands of Southwest Florida the prevailing current flow and wave

action normally causes a slow drift of sand from north to south.

At several places the normal southward migration of sand filled waves is interrupted by strong currents flowing through several passes as Pine Island Sound empties and fills with the tides. Where this occurs, water and sand that is migrating slowly southward is pushed rapidly out to sea or into the bay. As water is moved very rapidly it holds virtually all suspended sand. When it finally slows down, most of the suspended sand is dropped. This creates huge sand bars such as exist outside all the passes along the Gulf Islands.

After the water drops its suspended sand it resumes a southward migration. Since the waves contain no sand, the beaches directly to the south are subject to "starvation" --- no sand is deposited by waves breaking on the shore, but sand is taken away as the waves recede.

Further southward along the shore a more typical pattern occurs with sand being washed to and from the shore with the direction and intensity of the wave action determining the stability of the shoreline.

SAND FLOWS ALONG CAPTIVA

Very large sand bars have built up at the north end of Captiva as a result of swift water flows through Redfish Pass interrupting the normal southward sand migration. As a result, the beaches on Captiva have been subject to starvation. This has been particularly significant in areas just south of the sand bars, like along the 5th hole at the South Seas Plantation golf course. In other areas an average shrinkage of 1 to 3 feet per year has resulted from the cumulative effect of "empty" waves hitting the north end of the island.

CORRECTING THE IMBALANCE

South Seas Plantation is sponsoring a beach nourishment program to correct this situation.

The program is based on a very simple concept — putting sand back on the starved portion of beach so that "empty" waves striking that area will have an extra supply of sand to carry down the beach. Periodic nourishment of the starved area will provide a continuing source for "refilling" the empty waves moving south from the sand bars. The objective is to create a stabilized condition along the entire Captiva shoreline.

This program is the result of careful study by the Florida Coastal Engineering Laboratory and the Captiva Erosion Control District. It involves pumping sand from the sand bars outside Redfish Pass to the beach at the north end of the island. The sand pumped from the bar areas is of the same weight and composition as that on the beach. Thus, it will blend with the beach sand and migrate naturally down the shoreline with normal wave action. This is important because sand of a dissimilar nature would be prone to simply washing away rather than migrating slowly.

This nourishment program can be carried out on a continuing basis with modest cost, because it relies on natural wave action to move the additional sand along the beach. At points of specific problems (such as along the road south of the Post Office) direct nourishment can be used to supplement the normal migration from the area of renourishment at the north end of the island.



This is a copy of a letter mailed to Dr. Robert Anderson, Chairman of the Lee County School Board which was sent to us for publication.

Dear Dr. Anderson:

We would like to protest the time change for the school hours as of January 7 being set ahead by one hour. We do not feel this is necessary even if the nation is going on Daylight Savings Time.

It will only be for an 8-10 week period and we feel for those parents who are concerned that their children will be in the dark (of which we are some) there are several alternative measures which could be used during this short time period. Such as, on a dark corner, get a street light installed; use your local PTA to form a rotating parent for each school day at the stop; where there is no PTA, use your older students, again using a rotating system. We are sure that if Student Councils or local school clubs (such as Key Club) were asked they would be willing to help; go to your local service clubs, Lions, Kiwanis, League of Women Voters, etc. We are sure they would be willing to help for this short time. If all else fails, then the parents of the children involved could get together and each take their turn being present at

We do not feel that this change will be all that "energy saving" and will disrupt far too many lives. Not only working mothers but what about the working students? These jobs mean a great deal to the students involved. Also, what about outside activities, such as sports, dancing lessons, piano lessons, YM & WCA classes, club meetings, band practice. And the people involved in giving these classes.

Furthermore, as we are all working mothers our time with our children is very limited — with this time change we would be deprived of our short morning hours together, plus due to some of us having early working hours this would leave our children getting themselves off to school alone. AND, what about dinner, with some of our students getting home after 7 p.m. this cuts out family dinners, besides any evening activities and in some cases not much time for homework or extra studies.

We, again, cannot tell you how much we are against this time change. We would appreciate your re-considering your first decision. Thank you.

A resourceful man, encouraged by a trusting wife and dire necessity, he fixed it himself whereupon they took off hopefully toward Newport where the American Cup races were being held. About 8 miles south of the harbor, the engine quit altogether, but the ever-resourceful Casazzas rigged up a sail from a 120-sq. ff. tarpaulin by fying it to the radio antenna and a spare bamboo pole, and soon found themselves sailing along in rather overwhelming company. (The didn't win the race, but then they weren't officially registered either!)


Eventually the Coast Guard towed them in and until the erring motor was fixed they snuggled up in the harbor among some very high class sailors, next to the English 12-metre boat "Sceptre." Somehow the atmosphere, the conviviality of the rag-men reached deep into the hearts of the susceptible Casazzas, and finally when all fired and disheveled one day they saw a couple in their 70's just glide their 35' sloop in against the wind, saw the dear little white haired lady just drop the anchor overboard and the sloop fall back nice and gently on the hock -- his words are not actually on record, but they must have been historic. And that was the end of powering for the Casazza who decided there had to be a better way.

Warren took some sailing lessons in Oyster Bay, Long Island: they bought a little sloop and did a lot of weekend sailing and a lot of thinking about what to do when he retired. Ginny doesn't sail as much any more, because now she "minds the store" while he's out winning the races and showing what his boats will do. They both seem happy with the arrangement, and their customers do too, but one word of warning. Of course, any boat you buy from Warren Yachts can win all kinds of trophies, but the trouble is that when you buy one of his boats, you don't get to keep the captain





OYSTERS AND CLAMS ARE NOW AT PEAK IN TASTE

Ovsters and clams from approved sources are safe to eat in Florida say health officials of the Florida Dept. of Health and Rehabilitative Services

(HRS).
"Since this is the time when oysters and clams are at their peak as far as taste and quality," said Wilson T. Sowder, M.D., director of the Division of Health, "we want people living in Florida and our visitors to know that shellfish

harvested from state approved harvesting areas both in and out of Florida and processed in state approved processing plants are safe for human consumption, as long as they are purchased from reputable dealers and retail outlets or sold in inspected food service establishments such as restaurants. Yet, we strongly recommend that people do not eat oysters and clams from unarproved sources, for we have no way of assuring their safety."

"To make sure shellfish sold in

Florida by approved outlets are safe, they are constantly monitored by county health department sanitarians from the growing areas through the processing plants. Sanitarians also check retail outlets to make sure the shellfish offered for sale is fresh and safe," he said.

"Consumers can check shellfish in stores by looking for the Division of Health certification number. It is stamped on the cans or marked on packages. The number is preceded by the abbreviation "Fla."

"OLD FOLKS" CAN STILL HAVE TEETH STRAIGHTENED

Not too long ago it was thought that after a person reached a certain age they could no longer have their feeth straightened. But in recent years orthodontists and the dental profession have learned that orthodontic treatment can be rendered at any age.



WILDLIFE PROGRAM IS TONIGHT

Tonight, Thursday, January 3 1974, at 8 p.m., the local Audubon will present its third program of the season at the Sanibel Community House. It promises to be unusual and very interesting, and is entitled "Nature's Creatures, Wall to Wall."

Through colored slides and a live commentary by Rosemary K. Collett, it will show life at Casa de Felicidades, home of the Wildlife Federation of the same name at Venice, Florida. Shown will be rescues and releases of wildlife patients, cormorants and herons in the bathtub, hawks and owls on the dining table, pelicans cavorting in outdoor wading pools, and bottle-fed babies in all stages of growth.

Mrs. Collett is author of several books on animals and conservation and has been featured on national television. With her husband, George, she operates the bird infirmary that will be the subject of tonight's program.

As usual, the program is open to the public, and all are cordially invited.

ISLAND GATORS ON INCREASE

Alligators, are true reptiles, and because they look like something from prehistoric times, hold a real fascination for many. Because their skins were valuable for the making of shoes, handbags, belts and other wearing apparel, they have been added to the endangered list, but they are making a big comeback here on the islands. Indians found that the tail, legs and throat make very good eating, and so the Seminoles are now raising the amphibians commercially. They have found that, generally speaking, alligators in semi-captivity shun people rather than attack them. But if you offer an alligator a tidbit, he will take it and quite likely the human hand offering it too, for both look the same to him. Therefore, don't feed any alligator. And don't let your dog run near where they might live, as they are very fond of dogs. They drag the animal under water, drown it and haul it off to their lair for dinner for their offspring. And speaking of offspring, don't let them go near a gator for the same reason.

Alligators have twenty teeth in the upper jaw, and twenty in the lower: their feet are webbed to about the middle, they can travelas fast as 40 miles per hour on land in short spurts. Needless to say in water, their element, they can swim swiftly and stay under water many minutes. They are almost omnivorous but prefer meats. They lay eggs, about tiffy rather leathery-looking ones in a hollow in the sand layered with leaves and grass in the Spring so that the sun can hatch them. Right now an estimated 100,000 live wild in the State of Florida. and they used to be found all the way up to the Dismai Swamp in North Carolina. but they are now exfinct morth of Georgia. They are protected by conservationists and the Audubon Society alike, but many islanders are finding that they are more fun to read about than to live with, as they have killed dogs, ducks and other animals. They have been known to bite humans, inflicting a gouge which needs a skin transplant to repair. So enjoy them from afar, with due caution and respect.

KNOW YOUR ALLIGATORS SUBJECT OF TALK JAN. 8

If you want to see close-up (a real live alligator is expected to be present), and learn first hand about real live alligators, come to the Sanibel Community Association Building at 8 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 8 when George Weymouth will talk on "Sanibel Alligators and the Danger They Present."

Weymouth, a former member of the staff of the Ding Darling Wildlife Refuge and an authority on Sanibel alligators, will give a 30 minute slide film lecture on the life, habits, and dangers of our overpopulous but most popular reptiles, and what should be done about them.

Weymouth, at present an independent operator, conducts regular scheduled tours through the Refuge for residents and Island visitors. He has made a special study of alligators which have no predators other than man and are protected by law from being hunted or killed. While with the staff of the Wildlife Refuge, he assisted in tagging the critters, studying their habits and conducting an annual census.

At the meeting he will attempt to answer such questions as: "How dangerous are they really?" "Why they should NOT be fed?" "How long do they live?" "Of what use are they?" "How fast do they grow and how long do they live?" "Can they ever be tamed?" "How far do they travel and why?" "How many are on the Island now, and how fast are they multiplying? Where do they seem to be endangering people as newly developed areas drive them from their natural habitats?" What about their offspring?" "What part do they play in the wildlife cycle?"

These questions and many more will be answered on Tuesday after the regular meeting of the Association. While the dinner meeting at 5:33 is for members and their guests only, the general public is welcome to come and hear Mr. Weymouth's talk at 8 p.m. All members attending the dinner meeting are urged again to bring plenty of food, as this cold weather produces big appetites.

WILDLIFE NOTES by Griffing Bancroft

There is no doubt that at least one species of bird is on the increase on our islands -- the starling. This will not be altogether welcome news to most people, since many bird lovers love all birds, except the starling. And many would also except the house sparrow and the pigeon.

These three species usually reverse the normal trend. When more people arrive in any given area it usually means fewer birds in the immediate vicinity of cities and densely settled places.

But it usually means more starlings, house sparrows and pigeons. And they in turn, especially the starling, combine with humans in driving other birds away.

There is a reasonable explanation for this. These three birds, which get along

better with humans than others, were all imported into the United States from the Old World. Usually when a bird is artifically introduced into a new area he fails to get established because he is not as well equipped to cope with the problems in that area as are the native birds. They have been there longer and thus have more experience with local conditions.

But from an evolutionary point of view, human cities and towns are quite new in America. Thus native birds have had a relatively short time to try to adjust to the presence of human civilization.

But the starlings, house sparrows and pigeons have had many centuries of living with humans in the Old World. Thus when they were introduced into this country they immediately became concentrated around the cities, and with their longer experience in such areas, were able to compete with and even drive away the native birds. And they have stuck right to those places where they are best able to compete. I don't think I have ever seen a starling or a house sparrow, and rarely a common pigeon, very far from human habitation. The wild areas are still dominated by the native birds.

Just a few years ago, when these islands were sparsely populated, there were none of the introduced birds here. Now more people have arrived and with them starlings and house sparrows. Pigeons have not yet appeared in any numbers, but they probably will.

We may not love these birds, but they love us.

This Week at the Savibel Library

Nothing like getting the year off to a good start; and at the library, that means having shelves full of good books that YOU want to read NOW. We have them.

Let's start with Agatha Christie's new one, "Postern of Fate." Incidentally, that title was changed at the last minute from "Postern of Death." It is a new adventure that brings back the detective duo, Tommy and Tuppence Beresford (you will recall their adventures in "N or M?" and "By the Pricking of My Thumb").

If you liked Dan Jenkins' "Semi-Tough," you can't miss on "North Dallas Forty"

If you liked Dan Jenkins' "Semi-Tough," you can't miss on "North Dallas Forty" by Peter Gent. It is cut from the same cloth — pro-football. It is a story of eight harrowing days in the life of the author, a former offensive end for the Dallas Cowboys. This book reveals the devastating truth about professional football; a world of drugs, pain, sex and incredible savagery.

If you follow Jack Anderson's column in The News-Press daily, we have this Pulitzer Prize winning reporter's own story, "The Anderson Papers." Anderson reveals not only how he broke the recent stories which have been headlined, he tells this story in unprecedented detail. The book is a provocative and disturbing investigation of power in politics, a hard-hitting energetic narrative which goes behind the headlines.

Have I told you that Lillian Hellman's "Pentimento" is available? The title is an artist's term for an old image that reappears through later repainting done on a canvas. It is appropriate for the book is a self portrait of the author, a collection of her memoirs. The seven chapters deal with diverse periods in her tumultous personal and professional life. You will recall that Lillian Hellman has enriched the American theatre with "The Little Foxes," "The Children's Hour," "Toys in the Attic," "Watch on the Rhine," among eight other Broadway plays.


In a poll of its editors taken for the Christmas issue of the New York Times Book Review, only three books emerged as "significant" among those published in 1973. One of those was "The Summer Before the Dark" by Doris Lessing, a book concerned with the situation of present day women. Specifically, it is the story of a 45 year old woman no longer needed as a wife and mother. It is a confrontation with the threat of annihilation, the terror of old age and death. The other two books on the N.Y. Times list: "Gravity's Rainbow" by Thomas Pynchon, and "Macaulay: The Making of a Historian." We do not have the latter but we have the other two.

Finally, to get you off to a good reading start in 1973, we have Wilma Dykeman's "Return the Innocent Earth." In this book Ms. Dykeman resumes her themes and the Southern Appalachian locale of "The Tall Woman" and "The Far Family" --- continuing the saga of the Clayburn family.

Addenda: In summing up the "best books" of 1973 for the New York Times Christmas issue, John Leonard finishes his list with a well deserved and well placed piece of sarcasm. He writes: "A copy of this list will be forwarded to Drake, North Dakota, so that the next time the school authorities there need something to burn in their furnace, they will know which books to look for in the lockers of their high school students."
