### GALA BENEFIT FOR P.T.A. ANNOUNCED

For thepast five years, come February, Mario Hutton has offered the premiere of his latest 'photo-verse' compositions to Sanibel. The occasion has always been a gala benefit with all the proceeds going to a worthy local cause. The tradition will be maintained in 1974 and this year the organization to receive the total proceeds from admissions and other sources will be the Sanibel-Captiva PTA which will use them for much needed improvements to the Sanibel Elementary School's facilities. As in past years, the event will be repeated on two successive evenings, in order to accommodate 600 persons.

The program, to be presented under the general title of "Serenading Sanibel." uses a novel technique created by Mr. Hutton for blending his artistry as a noted nature photographer with that of a sensitive poet. His technique met with instant success eight years ago and since then has been acclaimed at conventions of the Smithsonian Institution, the National Audubon Society, the Nature Conservancy, the Wilderness Society, and before appreciative audiences in over 30 Florida cities.

As implied by its title, the new show will include a well balanced selection of features covering the unique aspects of Sanibel's beauty. Not only famed landmarks, such as the Sanibel Lighthouse and the Ding Darling Wildlife Sanctuary, but the lingering charm of the island's remotest spots will unfold through a series of haunting color slides against the backdrop of the versified commentary that is Mario's specialty. The wildlife that still thrives on our shores and in the backbays will, of

course, figure predominantly in many inspired or whimsical essays. And the splendor or the drama of sunrises and moonlit nights, storms and red tide will offer an unforgettable tribute to the fragile loveliness of our land.

However, one new feature will be a distinct departure. It is entitled "Words are a Sword," and deals with the magic power of language, seen as perhaps man's greatest discovery. The infinite significance of the spoken or written word is graphically

So the Library Board, headed by President Robert C. Haynie, decided it was time to invite the public, especially the many hundreds of persons whose contributions made the new building possible.



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


ZELDASEIGLER is home visiting her mother, Mrs. ZELDA BUTLER at Captain's Walk between semesters from Columbia College in Missouri.





### School News

#### HOME RULE COMMITTEE MEETS

The Home Rule Committee met at the Community House on Sanibel on Thursday morning with Ralph Zeiss presiding. Dick Workman reported on his contacts with Tallahassee, and as a result of the following discussion, it was moved that Sanibel and Captiva be designated critical areas of land use. Though there are, as yet, no penalities for land use violations, the group agreed that it would be good for all those on the islands interested in control of land use to band together with the Chamber of Commerce, the Home Rule Committee and the Sanibel Captiva Planning Board to send a joint letter to Tallahassee. The group's many related interests, such as the up-dating of building permits and water hook-ups were discussed, and Vernon MacKenzie is working on these problems.

The new Flood Insurance laws and setback laws are being studied, and a letter in support of the flood wash law of 1972 is to be drafted by Paul Howe to the Dept. of Natural Resources. A charter concerning Home Rule should be ready by April with passage by May and then with public hearings plus a thirty-day delay, the earliest date for self determination of home rule for Sanibel would be in November. A report of Jim Robson, chairman of the Personnel Committee, presented Aileen Lotz for consideration as the consultant on planning and study for Home Rule. She was endorsed.

### LEGISLATIVE HEARINGS TO BE HELD ON FEBRUARY 18 AND 19

Representative Paul Nuckolls has been elected chairman of the Lee County Legislative Delegation as of Jan. 8, 1974. The 1974 Legislative Hearings will be held on Feb. 18 and 19, 1974, at various locations throughout Lee County. The exact times and locations will be announced at a later date.

Any governmental agency, individual, or group of citizens, may introduce proposed legislation to the delegations: however, it should be prepared in draft form before being placed on the agenda.

Because of Rep. Paul Nuckolls' belief in Home Rule and legislation passed in prior years relating to Home Rule, legislation will not be heard at the Public Hearings that could, otherwise, be handled by local governing bodies. Rep. Nuckolls feels that the state has gained too much power over local government and that all matters perfaining to local government should be handled locally to prevent any further encroachment of the state's powers.

### Letters to the Editor



#### TOTHE ISLANDER:

In reference to the scare stories about our spending the remainder of our lives with inadequate fuel supplies, please consider that the United States Geological Survey has estimated that we have a 500-year supply of petroleum and a 300-year supply of natural gas in the continental shelf of our Atlantic Ocean area, Gulf of Mexico and Pacific coasts, in Alaska and in deep mainland areas. We have coal reserves for 1,500 years. We have capacity and raw materials for an almost inexhaustible supply of nuclear energy. Government Geologists estimate that

> there are two trillion barrels of highgrade oil in shale rock, an amount six times greater than all proved resources of crude oil on the entire earth.

> The editor of an oil industry magazine predicted in 1962 that the present situation would be brought about unless the methods and morals of the oil industry were changed.

> Presently, we have an extremely bright future in relation to oil supplies from Alaska. At any moment Standard Oil of Indiana may announce the discovery of their fantastic oil well at the extreme southwest tip of Alaska on the Cathedral River. This may be one of the discoveries οf outstanding generation. Furthermore, such large oil discoveries as Prudhoe Bay on the north slope of Alaska are not isolated pools. For that reason, it can be expected that the total reserves in Alaska will amount to 100 billion barrels of oil. Thus, Alaskan fields alone would provide two thirds of the known reserves of Saudi Arabia.

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

#### KNOW YOUR NEIGHBORS: TWO LIVELY LADIES AT CASTAWAYS by Fran O'Callaghan

Whether Betty Gardiner and June Henry, the new owner-managers of Castaways Resort on the tip of Sanibel, are such interesting people because they've lived such interesting lives or vice versa is a moot question. Ms. Henry was born in Palmer, Mass., attended Sullins Jr. College in Bristol, Va., and received her B. A. Degree from the

University of South Carolina. At age 22, she built and operated the first drive-in restaurant on Cape Cod and also owned and operated a gift shop there. Then she enlisted in the U.S. Air Force, and after 21 years, retired with the rank of full colonel last July. 





#### WILDLIFE NOTES by griffing bancroft

Sanibel has lost -- at least temporarily -- one of its finest nature spectaculars. The hundred of birds who have regularly roosted in the Bailey sanctuary have suddenly

For many years, fifteen to this writer's knowledge, people have been able to come into the sanctuary in the late afternoon and watch small flights of white ibis, snowy, cattle, and great egrets: Louisiana and little blue herons, and at the times other birds which scared in to settle on the big mangrove clump and sleep out the night.

Or, even more spectacular, the birds could be seen in the pre-dawn hours almost literally turning the mangroves white. One could watch them awaken, bestir themselves, falk to each other, and leave, the herons and egrets in small groups, the ibis all together in huge flights.

Now this activity has shifted elsewhere, and why or where to no one knows.

There are large roosting areas in Pine Island Sound where pelicans, cormorants and other birds are mixed in with the herons and ibis, and chances are the Bailey birds suddenly decided to join one of these more remote colonies accessible to man

The birds may still be seen, of course, throughout the islands, feeding or roosting, but the big accumulations in the evening may no longer be seen by those on foot.

The white ibis were the first to be discovered missing from their usual roosting place. For a few nights thereafter, the herons and egrels continued to sleep in the sanctuary and then they, too, started going some where else.

Whether they will return cannot be predicted. Some evenings, after the roost had been deserted, small flights of white ibis were seen coming in and then flying about as though searching for companions and, finding none, soaring away. For these are intensely social birds. Wherever they are sleeping now you can be sure of one thing -they gather each evening in large flocks.

For the past several years the birds have also used the Bailey roost as a nesting

place in the spring. Perhaps they will return for this.





I'm not much for beer. To me it tastes pretty much (I imagine) like the Japanese beetles my sister kept sampling the summer she was 14 months old. She'd pick one off her play-pen, bite off its head, make a terrible face, spit it out and then try another one. But by and large, beer drinkers are a pretty jolly crew. And you can find a nice variety of them sitting around at Rankin's Anchorage most anytime of day. It's a warm, friendly little bar, never crowded but rarely empty, where you can walk in, stranger or habitue, in your best bib and tucker or hot and sweaty right off the dock, and feel perfectly at home. Somehow even the cokes taste better there --- flavored as they are with salty conversation, exotic adventure tales of the high seas, and somewhat suspect advice on everything from how to unfreeze your outboard motor to how to sleep 8 on a 4-passenger sailboat.


The place is clean as a hound's tooth, the bar itself a handsome wide one lovingly crafted by Al Rankin who built the place himself with care and precision and often presides over from behind a pair of huge, dark glasses which rumor has it he removes only when he showers. Sharing the chores are Vi, his wife, a small elegant woman, whose ladylike demeanor in no way hinders the firm way in which she quashes any one misguided enough to use bad language (as distinguished from lively

colloquialisms!) or to show a flash of bad temper --- and George, an agreeable ow with an unbelievably luxuriant p of white hair and a sunny disposition

Tucked away in its own little bend of e bay, redolent of tar, brackish water, tresh sally breezes and an occasional whiff of some unidentifiable but ungettable odor, the Anchorage is just about the next best thing to being actually afloat. The waves slap against the dock, through the windows you can dreamily contemplate the swaying masts of the boats anchored there or indulge in a bit of covetousness for the handsome houseboats or the big cabin cruisers. Palm trees grow down to the sea wall, hibiscus bloom in the grass and the sun dapples the water where the pelicans


Conversations flow and ebb; how to paint your boat, how the fish are running, how to solve the energy crisis, what the customs inspectors are doing ("crawling over the docks like cockroaches" --- I mean no disrespect, I only quote) who needs a rig-man and what happened to the Molly D. You can learn the alcoholic content of near beer (1 half of 1 percent), how to describe a dachshund (2 dogs long and half a dog high), where to get a good hair cut (next door), and at least a half a dozen nostalgic jokes that you haven't heard since kindergarden. A lot of good natured kidding goes on but there's always a helping hand if you have a problem, not just advice, but the loan of a tool or a sturdy back or some hard-to-find little gizmo without which your motor won't go or your boat will sink.


Your drink is cold, the bar stool comfortable, the service prompt but relaxed. Outside you can hear a fellow scolding a friend in a flowing stream of cuss words that have almost a poetic lilt the fluid rhythm of, say, Shakespearean pentameters --- which bring a smile to the faces of the listeners; not because they're cuss words but because they're so beautifully delivered. And best of all, you're almost sure to run into someone who says, "Hey, I'm just about to go for a little sail. Wanna come along?" And we all know the answer to





### PAYMENT MADE ON LAND ACQUIRED FOR REFUGE

On January 9, 1974, Refuge Manager Glen Bond presented a check in the amount of \$17,035.72 to George Goldtrap, chairman of the Lee County Commission.


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
impressed on the viewer in a kaleidoscopic sequence of fanciful images, each symbolically related to the accompanying text. The result is most unusual and thought provoking.

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### This Week at the Sanibel Library

by Hal H. Harrison

Among the non-tiction best selling books at this time is still another of those inside the White House" disclosure tomes, but this one has no political overtones. J. B. West, chief usher of the White House, 1941-1969, tells what it was like to spend his days with the First Ladies in a book appropriately titled "Upstairs at the White House." Profusely illustrated, this is the anecdotal and intimate memoirs of a man who was responsible for running the White House for six presidents and their wives.

A short swift novel by May Sarton, "Kinds of Love," deals with an old woman trying to keep alive in a nursing home in a remote rural community. The situation is traggic but the effects of Ms. Sarton's writing is to challenge compassion and imagination where the old are concerned. She deals with problems that most of us would rather close our eyes to.

Trevanian's sequel to "The Eiger Sanction" is enjoying a big circulation at the library. This one is "The Loo Sanction," and its protoganist is the same Jonathan Hemiack, the art collecting professor. This time Hemlock goes to England for a rest and runs right into British Intelligence which badly needs his skilled assistance. He most take the assignment or be "framed" for murder. His mission: to locate a set of secretis made films incriminating a number of high ranking officials.

If you liked "The Eiger Sanction," I'll bet you will also enjoy "The First Deadly Sin" by Lawrence Sanders. Here is another crime novel about mountin climbing that affords some chilling adventures. An evil alpinist finds fulfillment in splitting the skells of strangers with an ice ax. The defective is Capt. Edward X. Delaney, whose work, along with the climbing scenes, is convincing. This is not a whodunit but rather 'Why we do it." Sanders is also the author of "The Anderson Tapes."

A fale of high adventure in which the riddles of an ancient African culture conceal menacing dramas of love, hate, violence and death --- all of which lie in wait to ambush the minds and bodies of an unsuspecting team of archeologists --- that's "The Sunbird" by Wilbur Smith. The author, a Rhodesian educated at Rhodes, also wrote another book in the library, "When the Lion Feeds."

Ed McBain is my favorite detective story writer. In my library I have all 29 of his books about the famous 87 Precinct. In the years that it took McBain to publish that many cliff hangers, he never made the best seller list. Maybe he never will. But if he is ever going to make, it. I think it will be thanks to his new one, "Hail to the Chief." In this one. McBain has served up an unusual surprise --- a clever, devastating surprise that has political overtones going far beyond the mystery of six bodies lying naked in

Col. Edwin E. "Buzz" Aldrin, Jr., gives us the first candid inside look at the human side of the space program in "Return to Earth." This is Aldrin's story of how he returned to earth from the historic first landing on the moon to begin a long and trouble odyssey --- an ordeal that involved a secret mental depression and the near dissolution of his marriage.

OF THINGS TO COME: An agreement to publish the dramatic story of former Vice President Spiro agnew has been signed by Viking Press and the Washington Post. The book is scheduled for March release.

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

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A. J. O'Donnell, Jr., Internal Revenue Service district director for Florida, today encouraged many Florida taxpayers to use special local telephone numbers for ordering their tax forms.

Mr. O'Donnell urged taxpayers in Fort Myers to call 332-3289 for ordering all tax forms. Citizens living outside these areas may use the following tollfree numbers for obtaining tax information: Area Code 305, 1-800-432-7575; area codes 813 and 904, 1-800-342-8300.

Many Florida citizens who do not have enough taxes withheld are required to pay their final installment of 1973 estimated Federal Income Tax no later than last Tuesday, January 15. Also due at that time were amended estimates from citizens whose 1973 income changed substantially during the last quarter.


"Many taxpayers first met the requirements for filing a tax declaration during the last three months of 1973," said Mr. O'Donnell. "Taxpayers are generally required to file an estimate if they owe the IRS more than \$100 not covered by withholding. The estimates in this case are due January 15.


"There is one exception to this rule." he said, "and that's when the taxpayer files his return and pays all tax due by January 31. In that case the final 1973 installment is not required, the amended declaration is not required nor is an not January required." declaration

Farmers and fishermen who have not filed their 1973 declaration of estimated Federal Income tax must have filed and paid that tax by last Tuesday, January 15. The sole exception to this rule is if they file their income tax return and pay the total tax due by March 1.

Farmers and fishermen are defined as those persons who earned at least twothirds of their 1973 gross income from farming and fishing.

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
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
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

One of the great adventure stories of all time, the rescue of the rare Lipizzan horses from the Russian army during the last of World War 11, will be called to mind when the Royal Lipizzan Stallions of Austria perform in the Edison Stadium at the Fort Myers High School on Sunday, January 20, at 2:30 p.m.

A fiving legend, and the star of the show, is Colonel Oftomar Herrmann, who smuggled out a group of Lipizzans from under the very noses of the Russians in those perilous times, riding at night and hiding by day. During the show he gives a short speech, with a heavy Austrian accent, telling his experiences.

"We move out in the night with nothing," he remembers, "only a handful of horses." But the horses he saved, he declares, were more precious than jewels.

At about the same time Colonel Alois Podhajsky took out the Spanish Riding School horses. Both sought the protection of General George Patton. Colonel Herrmann gives a stirring tribute to Patton and Podhajsky during the show.

The way the rare breed was saved was told in the Walt Disney movie, "Miracle Of The White Stallions." One of the stars of the show is Wolfgang Dellefont, formerly as instructor at the Spanish Riding School, and the first rider behind Robert Taylor in the making of the Disney movie.

The Lipizzans that Colonel Herrmann saved represented blood lines that had been in his family for generations. The Hapsburg Austrian emperor, Ferdinand 11, gave Lipizzans to one of Colonel Herrmann's ancestors, the Knight Ritter von Schoebel. Hapsburgs gave Lipizzans to the nobles leading their armies as a mark of special favors.

Von Schoebel fought in the bitter Thirty Years War, which devastated central Eurpoe between 1618 and 1648. His magnificent Lipizzan stallions fought the enemy with their hooves and teeth, while he fought with a sword. Using the "airs above the ground" which were originally battle maneuvers, the stallions did caprioles, courbettes and languages, devastating the enemy.

courbettes and langsades, devastating the enemy.

The art of training the "airs above the ground" was passed on from generation to generation. When gun powder made the "airs" just one more obsolete weapon, they were refined and performed for just their aesthetic beauty.

Colonel Herrmann is considered the greatest trainer of "airs above the ground" alive today. One of his stallions, Flying Falcon, leaps a hurdle on his hind legs, like a man. He is the only horse in the world that can do this. His rider is Harry Herrmann, one of the Colonel's sons.

Other of his Lipizzans do the famous triple capriole, the speciacular high capriole, the courbette, langsade, levade, and the whole repertoire of the almost lost art, the "airs above the ground" of the middle ages.

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
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
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
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
