QUANTUM PHYSICISTS AGAIN GATHER ON SANIBEL

Quantum Physicists are meeting on Sanibel for the 14th year, under the organization of Prof. Per-Olov Lowdin of Upsala University in Sweden and the University of Florida in Gainesville. More than 200 hundred of the world's greatest scientists have gathered at Island Beach Club, where symposium meetings are held most of the day. Some have brought their families with them to enjoy the beaches while prominent fathers and mothers meet to discuss such things as quantum mechanical methods for the freatment of large molecules, quantum biology, and atomic, molecular and solid-state theories.

Several Nobel prize winners are among the famous group. Representing the Institute De Biologie Physio Chemique de Paris, France, are husband and wife feam. Prof. Bernard Pullman and Prof. Alberte Pullman, Nobel Prize winners: Prof. John Bardeen of the University of Illinois and Prof. Ivar Glaever of the General Electric Company's Research and Development Center. Prof. Stan Ulam is visiting graduate research professor at the University of Florida: Dr. Ralph E. Christoffersen is from the University of Kansas: Prof. W. C. Nieuwpoort of the University of Gronigen. Netherlands, Dr. John R. Sabin, Assf. Prof. of Theoretical Physics at U. of Fiorida. and a host of others have been sandwiching some good swimming, tennis, beach bathing and other great pastimes enjoyed by all visitors to Sanibel, but the schedule of meetings is rather hectic and time consuming and frequently ends after dark, with some scheduled for later on in the evenings. Though most are middle aged, there are some very youthful scientists too. The meetings will continue until January 26.



PROPOSED CHARTER SHAPING UP

The Sanibel Home Rule Study Committee met Thursday and introduced the new planning consultant, Aileen Lotz. Mrs. Lotz presented a step by step program for a charter schedule which will be presented to the group on Jan. 28 at the 9 a.m. meeting in St. Michael's and All Angels Episcopal Church meeting room. This schedule must be adhered to if the charter is to be on the legislative docket. Ralph Zeiss, chairman, explained that it was necessary to have the charter complete for presentation.

Mrs. Lotz urged the charter for city government, otherwise the committee could continue working with the county commission, try to establish a special tax district or coast for another year of inaction. A special tax district could give the county commission ruling powers with a state appointed or elected board. "But," said Mrs. Lotz, "they are giving out fewer independent tax district approvals, preferring to keep governing power centralized as is."

January 28 will be the time for final approval of the charter by the committee if a Feb. : deadline is to be met for presentation to the State Representatives by Feb. 18. The committee agreed that a report was needed by the last week in March for alternatives to incorporation.







KNOW YOUR NEIGHBORS: "OLD-TIMERS" SAW 1926 HURRICANE

Dr. & Mrs. W. W. Kimball of Palm Lake Drive are settled in their new home, having recently retired to the islands from New Port Richey and Chicago, III. They have been vacationing here for the past 40 years or so.

"Dr. Kimball recalled, "we were here in the terrible hurricane of 1926 when the islands were practically on bare land until the eye of the hurricane went over. All the water that had been blown all the way up the Caloosahatchee came rushing back with the passage of the 'eye' and inundated the whole island. People in Punta Rassa who had climbed 20 foot coconut trees to escape the water were still drowned. Four thousand people in all died in the worst hurricane ever. That is why Lake Okeechobee is now diked so that this can never happen again, but our islands are still terribly exposed, still terribly vulnerable. We hope that another such hurricane will never come again, but if it does the only thing to do is to evacuate the islands.

"Donna, the Sept. 10, 1960, hurricane came close to being as bad as the 1926 one. Winds were up to 200 miles per hour, and nothing can withstand those for long," said Dr. Kimball, who is president of the Board of Directors for stockholders of the Island Inn Association.


Last Of Old Inns

TO THE ISLANDER:

This is a plea for visitors and residents to practice conservation and protect our seashore life. During the next few months mollusks (shells) and crabs are breeding and come into shallow waters for this purpose. Unfortunately for them, we are in the shallow waters too, and all too often we take them as pretty items for a day's collection --though soon forgotten and discarded. The conchs, whelks, and crabs are utterly defenseless, and many of them are egglaying females doing their work of producing more of their species. They enrich our shores and they need our protection. Dead and empty shells are fine for collectors, but living animals are a NO-NO.

This is a plea that living mollusks, horseshoe crabs and other seashore life be left alone --- please do not take them alive but enjoy them in nature's natural aquarium.

TO THE ISLANDER:

It came as a shock and a surprise that Mr. Wilson Wright was "disturbed" by my well-meaning effort to alert the public mind. Perhaps his stream of thought was diverted by the inadvertent typographical error in the last words of my brief submitted as "incredibility gape," not "gage" as published. His misreading set off a series of linguistic crochets recently published in the Sanibel-Captiva Islander. Indeed, it was startling that a high level professional economist, with years of experience in the language and thought of the corporate mind, would assume such a bizarre stance. His special background should have enabled him to sort out fact. from fiction. Perhaps it was just the inexorable workings of Murphy's Law. An emigrant from the mid-West, he has a generous dearth of pertinent information regarding what has actually happened on the East Coast of Florida and, hence, has confabulated the gap of his knowledge, 1 did not assume. He presumed. I am, indeed, a "refugee"

I am, indeed, a "refugee" from the East Coast where I saw and left the frenetic hustle and bustle in the cement canyons of Fort Lauderdale; I was appalled by the ever-enlarging gape on the faces of its inhabitants which plainly said, "We can't believe we allowed this whole thing!" A small town vanished in a megalopolis! Can Mr. Wright's trenchant wits be so scrambled into self-delusion as to overlook Sarasofa's fateful bid to join the Southwest Region rather than be swallowed up by the Tampa area? Or to ignore the imminent prospect of a port in Cape Coral or Charlotte Harbor?

His tangential slant, which coined a canard against our Commissioners, distorted my reference. I made no reference whatever to our elected officials. My remarks were directed at the powerfully entrenched bureaucracy which, like Caesar, determines and directs the destiny of the taxpaying residents. How long, Lord, how long, does the common citizen render unto Caesar that which is not Caesar's? Mr. Wright sees levity where none exists. The conclusion is inevitable that he, himself, has gone to the polluting well of corporate esurient philosophy once too often. He sings joyful praise in a black mass to the "mistakes made by the Commissioners." It is ironic but not surprising that this disciple of the hierarchical creed (there is no scientific or other evidential proof that corporations have a body or a soul) which intrinsically perceives its own people as stackable, should concern himself with the possible "errors" in the minds of the common consumer. It comforts the latter little that any man who hates "Big Money" can't be all bad.

To Whom It May Concern: This is to notify you that no matter what you do to my property on 966 Main St., Sanibel Island, I will not sell. You can hurt me with repeated damage to my mobile home, hurt my physically, mentally, and financially, and you certainly have, but you will not drive me out. Your ridiculous lies told to every board in town you can think of does not hurt me at all. You have only inconvenienced the man who must come out to investigate, only to find there is no truth in your tales. Everyone who knows me knows I do nothing without the permission of whomever is necessary.

For those who have no idea what this is all about allow me to tell you. I left the island on June 12th after 7 years living among you. Of course I left my place so once again I could come for days off and really enjoy the island as I had for so many years in the past. My mother, who lived directly across the street, joined me in Miami on Sept. 29, a Sunday. On Wednesday night the very same week I received a call from a friend to tell me someone had broken into the extension on my mobile home, wrecked two outside doors and screens, then kicked in the locked door into the actual mobile home shattering the frame and lock and spreading it all over my bedroom. I went over, sick at heart, and had the outside door covered with hardware cloth and returned to Miami. I then realized that what I was afraid of was true, I was not going to be able to leave my place empty for my own use. I had already checked with zoning in May, 73 and been told of course I could rent it if I wished.

The beginning of December, I answered an ad that had run around 5 weeks in the Islander for a small rent. A lovely couple, John and Sue Duncan were looking for a inexpensive rent for a close friend, Richard Gage, who was coming to help them in their new restaurant in Periwinkle Place. They were getting desperate to find a decent place Richard could afford. We agreed I would rent him the front part of my mobile home. It took me three trips over there and considerable money to fix it nicely for him. He had no more than moved in, went out for around 4 hours on Jan. 6, once again a Sunday, came back to find 13 windows and all four doors and screens practically demolished, and both kitchen faucets turned on full blast with a resulting flood in the front end. Someone had taken a iron pipe, gone all around both mobile home and extension smashing and tearing windows and doors and screens to shreds, glass inside and out. He did what he could with the damage, called the police and me, and at this time the damage has been repaired, but that was two days ago. What now? I wonder? Needless to say I have lost my tenant and he has lost a nice place to stay that he was delighted with.

Someone is terribly, terribly sick. I'm worried about what he will do next but I am also worried about him. The viciousness of this attack must harm him as well as me. I am writing to tell him no matter what real or fancied hurts I have done him this will not work. I will not sell out no matter what. I love my land and have worked too hard on it for a period of 10 years to give it up now. This cannot be the work of a passing vandal, not twice, and not with the pattern that is forming. Someone knows exactly when the property is empty. You know who you are, I believe I do too. You will be caught you know. Is it worth it????

I ask the many good friends I believe I have made there to just once in a while at your convenience drive down the road and take a look. The sooner I know about damage done the sooner I can avoid further. I would appreciate it till my dying day and John Peurifoy can not do it

We have our own good men, tried and true, mending away right here on the Beach --- and hard put to keep up with the demand as it is.

A Grain Of Sea Salt

If you get up bright and early while the mist is rising on the water and the dark is still a hush over the back road, say about 6:30, you will catch Capt. Tom Pfister skillfully working away at a huge net in the big shed near the docks. If you show up'long about 8 o'clock, he's willing to slow up a spell, let you pull up a little hassock, the kind shrimpers sit on when they head shrimp, and listen spellbound as he tells you all about nets.

"All!" He laughs at the word. "Why I've had fellers come in here and want me to spend a day teachin' 'em all about nets. Hah! I been atthis for many a long year and there's still more to know." His pride in his expertise shows as he looks around at the nets, some just mended, some sorely chafed and ready for retarring, some new and in the process of being put together. He spins a little yarn about those long fuzzy fibers you see hanging from the end of the shrimp nets being lures to stir up the shrimp, and then he laughs at his own story and assures you that he was just kidding.


Actually the fronds are attached to a kind of skirt that surrounds the bottom of the funnel-like net; as they fray against the rough bottom, they form a thick mat which protects the inner netting from chafing a hole and letting the shrimp escape. The nets come in widths up to 70 feet depending upon the size of the boat they're for, and tapering them down to the end of the "funnel," with wings up the sides and about a 10 foot overhang to prevent those "mobile little water grasshoppers" from leaping out, is a real art. The gradations for the cuts in the mesh have to be figured out on paper and an error at the start is painfully multiplied by the finish.

The three basic nets for shrimp are ilbs, two- and tour-seam balloons, but Capt. Tom and his co-worker, Luther Hallquist, can mend or make up just about any kind of net you might want. After they're put together, Tony

Rodriguez puts them in a giant extractor which looks as if it came from the Jolly Green Giant's laundry room (on a very grubby day) and pumps it full of bubbling hot far. After the net has soaked a while, he pumps out the tar, whirls the ex-tractor to rid the net of excess tar and then hangs the net up a while to dry. T: 3 treatment seals the millions of strands of monofilament in the meshes and helps to keep it from chafing. Thousands of dollars worth of precious pink critters can be lost with a poor quality net or one that isn't hung right and lets too many shrimp escape. Even with the best possible nets, says Capt. Tom, you can only catch 10 percent of the shrimp you raise --- and then when you consider that a new net costs about \$500, that the four 'doors'' on each side of the boat to which the net is attached will run about \$1200, it's small wonder that shrimp are such expensive little hor d'oevres.

And if Capt. Tom is right, perhaps we won't have any shrimp at all. "You spend your lifetime learning about nets," he says, "why Luther here's been at it for 47 years, and then when you've learned all there is to know, you're ready to die. And nobody wants to take your place." Fortunately, Capt. Tom is only 67 years young and works every day from sunup to sundown. He lookslike he'll be around a while yet, so if you want to learn "all about nets," you might look him up the next time you have a spare ten years or 50.


WATER CO. LOOKING AHEAD

At a meeting of the Island Water Company last week, Jim Robson reported that the water was cut off Firiday in order to make a new pipe connection from Spooner Place to Ferry Road. The new connection is about 50 percent complete as of this writing.


A new well is being dug around the clock to meet the water needs for February as the Islands are already exceeding the amount of water the company can supply right now, one million gallons per day.

"The Island Water Company passed upon a total of 87 new connections at their last meeting which indicates they will be making 1,000 new connections in 1974, at the present rate of application. On the basis of last year's records, single family hook-ups were only 12 to 14. The balance were multi family hook-ups, and there is no reason to believe that this trend will not continue. At present, the principal task is to serve the Lighthouse Condominiums which will be demanding 100 new hook-ups in phase one of their building operations. Four hundred new connections for the Lighthouse will possibly be needed by the end of the year," reported Robson.

"The 1974 budget will include \$700,000 for capital improvements and will be reaching into projection for 1977 and 1999. Another nationwide motel chain has already projected a 123-unit motel at the Causeway, and the company must look forward and plan ahead," he said.


AUDUBON TO PRESENT "AFRICAN WILDLIFE" PROGRAM

Tonight, Thursday, January 24 the Sanibel-Captiva Audubon will present a program titled "African Wildlife" at 8 p.m. at the Sanibel Community House. Featured will be a fascinating panorama of birds, big game and other fauna found only in some of the remotest regions of Africa.

The beautiful color slides illustrating the show were taken by Dr. Oliver Hewitt, who will present them in person. He recently spent over two years in East and South Africa, directing the research of several graduate students, and serving as visiting professor at the University of Pretoria.

For over 25 years Dr. Hewitt taught wildlife ecology at Cornell University and at the present time he is a senior research associate at the Placida Station of the Mote Marine Laboratory of Sarasota. He is now studying bird populations in the Charlotte Harbor area as part of a project which includes the study of water chemistry and a survey of local flora and fauna.

In 1973 Dr. Hewitt was appointed "resident naturalist" aboard the SS France during the period of its winter cruises in Caribbean and South Atlantic waters. As usual the program is open to the public, and all are cordially invited.

NEW WRINKLE IN GAS BUYING

The Internal Revenue Service announced that the practice of pricing and selling gasoline by the half-gallon is not in violation of Phase IV petroleum regulations.

Jack L. Evans, IRS district stabilization manager for Florida, noted that many Florida motorists are new encountering gasoline prices for one-half gallon.

"This results from many of the gas pumps at Florida service stations not being equipped to register prices above 49.9 cents," Evans said. As their legal selling prices exceed this amount, many station operators are switching over to half-gallon prices.

The posting of the maximum selling price on each gas pump, as required under Phase IV rules, should continue to reflect the price per gallon.

Mr. Evans also reminded Florida tenants that rents are exempt from controls under Phase IV, federal controls having been removed more than a year ago.



WILDLIFE NOTES By Griffing Bancroft

Recently we wrote about the increasing number of starlings on the islands, a bird few people welcome.

But do you know whose fault it is that we have starlings in this country? You could say it was William Shakespeare. Yes the great bard himself who died more than three centuries ago.

For here is how it happened. Several rather half-hearted attempts to introduce starlings from Europe into the United States were made during the latter part of the last century. None was successful until the last decade of the century when a persistent group got into the act.

The leader of these tamperers with nature was a wealthy New York drug manufacturer named Eugene Schieffelin. He was a lover of Shakespeare. In fact he so admired the great poet that he and his associates formed what they called the American Acclimatization Society, duly incorporated in Albany.

The principle objective of this organization was to import into the United States all the birds mentioned in the works of Shakespeare.

So agents in Europe started sending over crates of chaffinches, nightingales, skylarks -- and starlings. Only the starlings were able to compete with native birds and get established.

In 1890 they freed a hundred starlings in Central Park in New York. At first it appeared these birds would fail, too. But gradually they began to be reported spreading around the country, mostly in the cities and towns. As far as is known every starling in the country today came from these one hundred birds.

As for Shakespeare, according to the Folger Library in Washington, only once in his entire works did he mention the starling.

He was enough of an ornithologist to know that the starling like many birds, was a good mimic. So in the first part of King Henry IV, when the King accused Edmund Mortimer of being a traitor and decreed his name should never be spoken in his presence again, Edmund's brother-in-law, Lord Percy, known as Hotspur, decided to defy the king. According to Shakkspeare he said:

"... I will find him when he lies asleep, And in his ear I'll holla 'Mortimer! Nay, I'll have a starling shall be taught to speak Nothing but 'Mortimer' and give it him To keep his anger still in motion."

If only Shakespeare had had Hotspur think of some other way to defy the kind think what we might have been spared.
