Water Board Members Re-elected

Board members of the Island Water Association were re-elected almost in toto at Monday's meeting, with the addition of C. Ronk. Watter Ammons is the new general manager of the company.

The company will be enlarging and extending operations to take care of new users on the islands with a \$1.4 million expansion program. A new desalination plant is planned and the Association plans to seek \$1.1 million through the Farmer's Home Administration for this expansion program. They will be enlarging pipes and the distribution system plus adding a 200 million gallon storage tank.

\$3000,000 in hook-up fees from new owners will be applied and it was decided after discussion that the Lower Hawthorne Aquifer will be used. This is an underground river extending out and under the Gulf of Mexico.

Studies made by the company indicate the aquifer may have its beginnings even in Georgia with a zero point at the beginning and deepening to 700 feet below the Gulf where it will be tapped. The river only moves 1½ to 2 inches per year and so could provide a much needed source of water for the area.



Zeiss Resigns Chairmanship; Committee's Main Job is Done''

In a statement to the Sanibel-Captiva Islander, Ralph Zeiss has said that he will present his resignation as chairman to the Home Rule Study Committee at their next executive meeting this week.

"Now that Representative Paul Nuckolls has clarified his position on the charter bill, and this matter has been brought to a logical point of completion," he said, "I feel that I can lay down my responsibilities and return to the quiet life for which I had brought my family to Sanibel." He will continue on as a member of the committee.

Two main possibilities await the committee: a) thathaving performed the study and brought the matter of incorporation to vote for the public, the committee may disband, or b) it may continue as a kind of watch-dog organization over the growth of the islands.

Rhea Nichols, who with Anina Hills, shares the vice-chairmanship, said that the committee will certainly continue until the bill is introduced to the legislature which will probably be some time in May.

"An understanding has been reached with Representative Nuckolls," he said,

"that he will introduce the bill with other local legislation."

The committee will continue to be available for information either for local citizens or for the legislators. After a decision on the bill has been made, the committee will get together and decide on its future role in the community, if any.

Audubon Elections Followed By Program

Tonight, Thursday, April 11, the Sanibel-Captiva Audubon Society will hold its annual meeting at 8 p.m. in the Sanibel Community House. Following the president's and treasurer's reports, members will vote on the slate of candidates submitted by the nominating committee, which includes: Marion F. Hutton for president; Griffing Bancroft for vice-president; and Shirley Walter for secretary-treasurer.

No new directors will be elected this year because the terms of those serving on


the board do not expire until 1975.



WOLF TRANSPLANT FOR MICHIGAN

Conservationists are attempting to trap a family of five timber wolves in northern Minnesota for release in the Huron Mountains of Michigan, the Wildlife Management Institute reports. Cooperating in the project are the National Audubon Society, Huron Mountain Wildlife Foundation, Northern Michigan University, U.S. Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, and the state departments of natural resources in Minnesota and Michigan.

Wolves once roamed Michigan's upper peninsula and the project is an attempt to see if they can be reestablished. L. David Mech, a BSF&W biologist and wolf specialist, is helping coordinate the project. The transplant is part of a plan encouraged by BSF&W to expand the wolf's range.

School News

SCHOOL'S OPEN HOUSE PLANNED FOR APRIL 23

"The learning center is developing as planned," said Mr. G. B. Runnels.

Some will be starter beds for plantings to be used around the school grounds and on the nature trails. Some well known horticulturists on the islands will help identify the plants, and over the Easter holidays the area around the outdoor classroom slab will be sodded so that the grass will have a chance to take hold and grow.

The school will hold open house on April 23 so that the environmental center, nature trail and open classroom can be viewed. The 23rd is PTA meeting night, and of course the meeting will be open to the public as usual. Invitations have been sent to all the Board of Education officials to come and see the new project.

Superintendent Ray Williams, the department heads, and assistants have been invited from many other Lee County Schools, including the heads of the Elementary School Department, the Environmental Center, Industrial Arts Department, School Plant Planning and the Early Childhood Supervisor.

BILL FILED ON STATE'S REAL ESTATE TAX POLICY

Two Republican state senators have filed a bill which would attempt to change the state real estate tax policy which they say now forces property owners to sell or develop their land because of high taxes based on its speculative value. The bill would limit ad valorem taxes to the value of the property at its present use even if property is adjacent to that sold for large apariment or condominium developments or for shopping centers and other commercial developments.

Sponsored by Senators Thomas H Johnson of West Palm Beach and John T. Ware of St. Petersburg, the bill would amend state law to limit factors to be considered in deriving just valuation to present use of the property and stop forcing high density growth in Florida.

The proposal, they said, would delete references to the tax evaluation at the highest and best use to which property can be expected to be put in the immediate future which encourages intensive development and discourages people who want to keep vacant or low density use of their property.

would also provide for consideration of present depreciated value of improvements, and of the character of the area in which the property is located.

The senators said their bill would assist those who may own homesteads or vacant property that might not qualify for agricultural exemptions who find themselves being adjacent to property sold for development and have to pay increased taxes on their property despite the fact they may not want to develop it.

"What we are witnessing," the senators noted, "is that many individuals -widows and widowers - who are now on limited income and have lived on their properly for many years at reasonable tax rates, but now find themselves being heavily taxed because of adjacent developments. These individuals are forced to sell because they can't pay the laxes

"This will help relain more open green space we need in fast-growing metropolitan areas and help curtail growth in a realistic way." They said.

A companion bill has been tiled in the House by Rep. David C. Clar, R West Paim Beach.

This time of year one has a moment to breathe and look around at all the native beauties one overlooks in the

mic. I of the tourist season.

Some very beautiful trees and shrubs are blooming now, such as the heavenly blue Jacaranda, orchid trees, golden showers, and bougainvilla in all shades and hues. Cypress has put on its light green feathery needles, and yucca is holding out its white torches.

Underfoot many tiny flowers such as the pink mallow, yellow calendua with their dark eyes, peach cactus, purple thistle, cucumber vines with their gold flowers and bright orange fruit, beach morning glories and many others are putting on their best for we do have spring here too. The days become warm and dreamy but the nights remain lovely and cool.

The roseate spoonbills have returned to the Ding Darling Refuge in large numbers. One must look back in the mangroves to see them for they are shy as always and the wood storks and ibis too. A few galinules and mergansers, along with myriads of other lesser shore birds, wade in the shallows of the sanctuary.

We even saw young eaglet whose head had not yet turned white. Though we made every effort to keep moving so we would not disturb him, he kept a wary eye on us until we were out of sight of his high perch on a telephone pole. We did not see the osprey in the nest, but we did see father osprey far above keeping watch.

Would you like to adopt a swan?

The opportunity to become a toster parent of one of these beautiful birds is being offered by a group of Chesapeake Bay scientists.

Of course you might never see your big white slep child, but you would be kept informed of his, or her, movements. And they are long range movements.

The bird in question is the whistling swan. Once almost hunted to extinction, the whistler, like the only other native American swan, its western cousin the trumpeter swan, has slowly been making a comeback. The scientists, working out of Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, are trying to learn more about the whistler's habits, travels and domestic arrangements.

For this work they trap some of the wild birds and put plastic collars around their necks. Devising these collars was quite a job. They are in different colors, to designate where the birds were banded, and then have numbers to indicate individual birds.

The trick was to make the collars large enough so the numbers could be read at a distance with a telescope, but not so large as to interfere with the bird's ability to eat and carry out other normal activities.

They report this has been worked out and they they are now building up records of individual whistlers' movements by being able to read their numbers without disturbing the birds.

The whistling swan is a long range migrant. The birds these scientists are working with nest in far northern Canada and Alaska and winter around the Chesapeake Bay and south. They are observed, numbers read, and dates noted on the breeding grounds, at stopping places along the way, and on the wintering grounds.

These observations have confirmed that the swans, like most geese, mate for life and that families stay together on migration and probably through the winter. Pairs have been noted travelling with their cygnets all the way from the northern slope of Alaska (where oil was recently discovered) to Maryland.


Of course this work requires financing and that is where potential foster parents come in. If you wish to adopt a swan you can write for application forms to: Whistling Swan Adoption Program, Chesapeake Bay Foundation, Inc., 17 State Circle, Annapolis, Maryland 21404.

Then for \$15 a year, a swan with a certain number will be designated as yours and you will be informed of its movements, breeding success etc. And some of them do wander as far south as Florida.





THAT'S POLITICS BY GEORGE!

The Internal Improvement Fund is at it again, conducting, or at least trying to conduct, business involving Lee County at a time and place which makes it rather difficult for Lee Countians to attend. This time the meeting was scheduled for all day, Wednesday, March 27 - Lee County Commission meeting

A very frank discussion between Joel Kuperberg and myself resulted in the meeting being moved to April 22. The place, however, remains in Tallahassee. The Lee County Commissioners voted recently to ask the Governor, if necessary, to have this important meeting involving the Estero Land Projects moved to Lee County, as promised previously by the Cabinet.

One of my favorite subjects to tackle has been welfare abuse. America has reached a low state with regard to the attitudes of the poor toward assistance. We've somehow reached the notion that it's a disgrace to be poor, or that "poverty can be eliminated". Such is not

A great teacher once said, "The poor you have with you always." He also recognized that there are some who simply will not work. These, nevertheless, have needs, especially medical. For that reason, the Lee County Commission recently passed an ordinance (73-2) granting the Lee County Health Department the authority to charge and collect fees from those who had aforeused free public services.

How Much and By Whom?

While this is certainly an attitude in

ordinance disturbs me...the "pay-as-youcan" provision. The question which looms forward is who is going to determine how much can be paid and who should pay it. I'm skeptical of anyone having that authority. My doctor certainly doesn't bill me for medical services in any such fashion. He doesn't even tell me in advance the eventual cost of services. I go to him for help, he provides It, which is more than I can do for myself, and then he bills me accordingly, with no regard for my financial well-being. Rightly so, since it's not his responsibility.

Obviously, aid must be available, but charges, however much adjusted, ought to be equally and fairly shared. A man who can provide his family with a television or himself with liquid refreshment ought to assume responsibility for his medical bills. If absolutely no money at all is available, why go to the expense of billing, attempting collection, and then writing off the total loss through bookkeeping?

Neighborhood Disputes

Many problems come before the Commission that ought to be settled in the neighborhood. Recently, we heard of a dispute between neighbors and businesses, all well acquainted, in the Sunset Vista Drive community. While no neighborly friendships were broken, they certainly could have been, without courteous and careful negotiations. Without discussing all the details, let me simpley suggest that you might solve many of your own problems this same way. Go together, you and the "offender" "complainant", and visit your Commissioner. If you can work out the differences, a neighborhood relationship

has been salvaged. Come before the full Board only if all else fails.

The Lee County Health Complex is becoming a reality. Final plans were approved at the March 27 Commission meeting. The new building is to include space for the now much-crowded Welfare Division. This Division and the Health Department work so closely together that this proximity is highly desirable. The new building will appear within a year, we hope, on Michigan Avenue near the Lee County Area Vocational School.

Incorporation

For years the County vs. Metro debate has lingered. In Lee County two "cities" exist and several other unincorporated communities. The term, "stepchild", is often applied to these outlying communities, usually because they have never really looked at what they're getting for their tax dollar.

Likewise, they forget the potential cost of "city citizenship". Look, for example, at the cost of routine service to the Island of Sanibel where relatively few citizens live. Then ask yourself, "Would it be cheaper to go it alone?"Lee County Projects and Expenditures For Sanibel island:



In coming weeks I will present similar figures for other outlying communities.

Finally, you should know that we have wired the Governor's Office for permission to replace the Matheson Avenue Bridge over the Imperial River in Bonita Springs, Florida. We hope to skip much bureaucratic red tape in order to replace this bridge before complete failure takes someone's life.






PTA FLEA MARKET MAKES A PROFIT
