# Sanibel - Captiva Plans Ahead

The Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board is studying a change in by-laws to elect a new president from among the board members rather than an incumbent as the bylaws state. Also two new directors are being considered to replace Joseph McMurtry who resigned for health reasons and George Tenney. First vice president Vernon MacKenzie is acting president until the new elections in two weeks.

MacKenzie suggested certain goals for the Planning Board in the coming year. He suggested that the board continue to press for a land-use plan that would be acceptable to the county, for support of incorporation and for action declaring Sanibel and Captiva an area of critical concern in the state.

He also asked that the board develop a new hurricane emergency plan and suggested they work toward obtaining a better building code for the islands as the present code is far too lenient.

The Planning Board will study impact fees to control the cost of the expanding population on the islands. Lastly, he asked that the board press for action on the disclosure of the conflict of interest act for public officials.

MacKenzie was given a vote of thanks for his service. Another meeting will be announced for a later date.



# **Audubon Elections**

Hutton, president; Griffing Bancroft, vice president; Shirley Walter, secretary-treasurer. In accordance with a recent decision of the board, the president presented Shirley Walter and Jessie Dugger, leaders of C.R.O.W., a check in the amount of \$2,000.00 in recognition of their untiring, invaluable services in favor of Florida wildlife, and to assist them in purchasing an area for expanding the capacity of their bird infirmary.

Castaways had a full-to-the-brim Happy Easter. The newly painted white cottages with marine blue trim and shutters look like big Easter eggs themselves.





#### BUS SERVICE ENDS: AT LEAST FOR NOW

Free bus service which carried 20,000 visitors from Sanibel up to the tip of Captiva, and around the islands, will cease on April 22, the end of the season, according to Allen Ten Brock of the Chamber of Commerce.

The \$750 cost per week was borne by island businesses and if it appears warranted later on in the "little" summer season, Jim Ailes of Tropic Transit on Fort Myers Beach will be consulted about resuming the service which found great tavor among businesses during the gas shortage.

The Chamber of Commerce established a taxi service on a paying basis between Page Field and the islands which will continue.

The County Commission will hold a hearing in two weeks on the action of the Chamber of Commerce about the bus service on the islands.

As a public service, the Fort Myers-Lee County Chamber of Commerce is running recorded messages on Lee County radio and television stations urging local residents to review how vital our visitors are and to show a willingness to SHARE THE SUNSHINE.

This program is a test program for the entire State of Florida and the messages being run now will quite likely be run through all Florida in the months to come. The arrangements for this were conceived by the Florida Department of Commerce and the Fort Myers-Lee County Chamber of Commerce and were consummated when Don Bottorff attended Tourist Appreciation Day in Tallahassee this month.

#### RESOLUTION FILED TO RECONSIDER FLOOD ACT

Representative Ted Randell of Fort Myers, joined by Senate President Mallory Horne of Tallahassee, filed a resolution in Tallahassee this week urging the Congress to reconsider the Federal Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973. The two legislators have become alarmed over the impact of the congressional action.

Randell and Horne are concerned over the stringent standards being placed on private citizens under the quise of more liberal federally subsidized flood insurance. In a joint statement by the Senate president, Randell asserted that the Congress obviously did not know the devasting effects last October when the passed the Flood Protection Act. It seems impossible that our Cone could be hoodwinked into passing a document which will place in Jespardy the economy of the entire country. Randell and Horne noted that the construction of a \$30,000 home could be increased by as much as \$12,000. Required insurance could cost the same homeowner as much as \$1,600 per year in premiums. If compliance of the federal mandate is followed, the majority of new nomes in Southwest Florida would be built on stills or mounds of dirt between 10 and 13 feet high. The legislators noted also that the unbearable dictates of this congressional act would NOT be confined to coastal construction. Virtually every one of Florida's 67 counties would be directly affected with more than 300 communities such as Fort Myers, Naples, Punta Gorda and Clewiston fatling under the lederal mandate. A major crises. Randell said, would surely occur in the construction, financial and real estate fields throughout Florida and the nation. Employment and land values will be critically affected. Senator Horne intends to alert the legislature leadership throughout the United States in an all-out effort to have this measure reconsidered.





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

#### INSURANCE INFO OFFERED TO CONDOMINIUM OWNERS

A booklet to aid the condominium owner in meeting insurance needs adequately and economically is ready for public distribution by the Senate Commerce Committee, Senator Lew Brantley, D-Jacksonville, Chairman, announced today.

Brantley said the booklet "Insurance - Questions and Answers for the Condominium Owner," outlines the insurance needs of condominium owners, informing them of the different arrangements in insurance, and provides a working knowledge of the coverage offered by the condominium unit owner policy. It also suggests action that can be taken prior to and after a loss is suffered.

"The key area emphasized is adequate and economical coverage," Brantley said. "These needs are met by obtaining an accurate delineation between the unit owner's sole interest items and common elements items which belong to the condominium association.

"The condominium form of ownership has produced some new and unique situations in acquiring unit owner coverage, and I feel this guide is must reading for all who own or have an interest in condominiums. The information provides the consumer with a working knowledge of the condominium insurance situation. The booklet will be a great aid in dealing effectively with the condominium association and insurance agents."

Brantley said the booklet is developed on a question and answer basis and the information presented is based on the new policy forms published in January by the Insurance Services Of-



# Wildlife Notes by griffing bancroft

### Have you ever watched a vulture soaring overhead and wondered where she lays her eggs and raises heryoung?

Do you know where to look for the well hidden nests of the only two warblers that breed on our island --- the yellowthroat and the prairie warbler? Or what their nests look like, or how many eggs they lay and what the eggs look like?

Do you know which birds lay round eggs and which lay cylindrical eggs? And which lay white eggs and which lay colored or marked eggs? And how birds often can be identified by nests and eggs, and of the wonderful variety of the markings on eggs and of the construction of nests?

Well, all these questions and many more will be answered for you next winter ---in time for you to go out looking in the spring to check for yourself.

The answers and a wealth of data on the nesting habits of birds will be in a book now being written by Sanibel's own Hal H. Harrison. It will contain more than 200 color photographs of nests and eggs, all taken by Hal through more than 12 years of painstaking work.

The book is to be published by Houghton-Mifflin Co. as one of the well known series of guide books initiated by Roger Tory Peterson. It will be the Peterson field guide to nests and eggs of birds in eastern United States.

Hal, a life-long naturalist, photographer, lecturer and writer has travelled throughout this area getting and storing up his photographs, taking them on tree tops, in swamps and mangrove islands, in holes in trees and in holes in the ground.

Hal, as you know, keeps you informed with his column in this newspaper about books in the Sanibel Library. He has previously written "The World of the Snake" and other articles and books and will now have another important addition to the Library to his credit.

A field note: two extremely rare birds for this area were sighted in the Darling Sanctuary. They were whimbrels, formerly called Hudsonian curlews.


They are majestic shorebirds, larger than our abundant willet whom otherwise they resemble except for browner spottings and a much longer down curved bill.

They stood beautifully for inspection by the side of the road before flying off. Undoubtedly they had come up from the south on their long-range migratory trip to breeding grounds in the Arctic.

#### THAT'S POLITICS, BY GEORGE! by County Commissioner Chairman George Goldtrap

As a general rule, this column is devoted to an analysis of current Commission action. In view, however, of our not meeting during the week of April 7, 1 have decided to use the space to appraise you of several projects around the county.

One report has recently crossed my desk that I find especially encouraging. The Lee County Division of Welfare and Social Services recently received the first repayment of an assistance grant to a local citizen. This was made possible under the provisions in the new welfare ordinance dealing with liens against recipients' property. The ordinance has been in effect for two months and is a compliment to the work of our Welfare Director, Jackie Hornsby. Its effectiveness in this first test case is demonstration enough that there are still honest people who need help but who are willing to stand on their own two feet when they can.

You will also be interested in knowing that Shady Rest, the Lee County nursing facility, has almost completed the construction of all its new facilities.

Lee County now has two new van high-top ambulances. These will, of course, be added to our already heavily worked fleet. To give you a sample of how these ambulances are used, the month of February saw our medi-teams make 528 runs to save lives. This amounts to almost \$16,000 worth of business.

Speaking of business, here are two monthly reports that might interest you. Both pertain to February. The Vehicle Inspection Station performed 9,020 inspections and collected \$21,000 plus, showing a 10.8 percent increase for this department. The Building Department, on the other hand, showed a February loss of \$6,909 from the January figures. No doubt the Florida Cities Water problems and flood insurance requirements will continue to effect this area which would normally show growth.

Mailacha can look forward to more and more use of its recently completed Community Center. Nor is this the whole of Lee County's building efforts. A new Crime Lab for the Lee County Sheriff's Department is virtually completed and was sorely needed. May should see completion of our new Purchasing Warehouse.

If you regularly attend Commission meetings you know how bad the acoustics are in our meeting room. In our continuing efforts to solve this problem, we have ordered carpets and drapes. We hope this, combined with the new mike system, will help.

Lee County's recently employed Personnel Director, John Goddard, has put several new and valuable services into effect for County Personnel. John has the basic structure complete for a County Credit Union, new medical physicals are becoming available to a limited number of employees, and a newsletter for employees is now produced monthly.

If you ever wonder why a Personnel Director is needed for the County, take into consideration our nearly 700 employees and their problems, plus the 30 or more who come and go each month.

While this is by no means a thorough



and in-depth report of your county government's programs of work and services, it is a somewhat overall sketch when added to those areas presented in this column tast week. One of the Sanibel Library's greatest benefactors is Burnett Ball, a former Harcourt Brace Jovanovich executive who is now retired and lives on Whelk Dr. Every so often, Mr. Ball backs his car up to the library door and unloads a big box of brand new books. It is always a red letter day at the library. Well, he has done it again, and here are some samplings:

#### INFORMATION TO HELP STOP RAPE OFFERED TO LOCAL CIVIC GROUPS

An all out statewide "Help Stop Crime!" campaign to attack the problem

of rape in Florida was announced today

by Governor Reubin Askew. The Governor said, "This is just about the most terrifying crime category of all. We must attack the problem with every professional skill and resource at our command."

Nearly 300 law enforcement agencies throughout Florida will participate in the 'Crimes Against Women'' program. Its purpose is to educate women in ways to avoid potential rape situations and what to do if rape occurs. It encourages women to report all rapes.


Project officers from each agency will conduct seminars for women's groups and clubs, showing a new film, 'Report Rape," and distributing more than two million pamphlets on the subject. For information or to arrange a program for your group, call Prudy Taylor of the Lee County Sheriff's Department at 332-3456.

The film and pamphlets were previewed in Tallahassee, Orlando, Tampa and Miami by Attorney General Robert L. Shevin, chairman of the Governor's Crime Prevention Committee.

Attorney General Shevin told local civic, government and law enforcement leaders in each of these cities that, "In Florida last year, a forcible rape occurred every 4.5 hours on the average. This crime category alone, more than all others combined, is probably responsible for the pleas we hear for safe streets."

Research by the Governor's Crime Prevention Committee shows that a reported rape occurs in the United States every seven minutes, or as often as a baby girl is born in this country. Estimates by police officials indicate that nationally, four out of five rapes go unreported.

The new materials were developed and produced by the Governor's Crime Prevention Committee in Tallahassee. The program is funded jointly by the State of Florida and the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration.




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


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




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

With a look very close to disgust, she dropped the thing into the trash and furned away covering her nose with a snow white hanky.

My curiosify just carried me away, and peering about to make sure no one saw me, I fished (an appropriate term) the offending item out and hurried away to see what had so upset the good woman. It was, indeed, a ship's log and such an intimate expose of the pleasures of boating from one point of view that I thought for the sake of any of my readers who are D.O.M. I really ought to give you the highlights.

Ship's Log of the Jo Ann III

3-16-74 Saturday - Left the Anchorage at 12:45 p.m. First mate seasick at point stopped for heave. Arrived Little Shell. Capt wanted to throw mate overboard in favor of salad girl. Lapped up 3 beers, invited company aboard. Had supper. So dam quiet we can't sleep. Nuts!

3-17 - Left for Okeechobee. Had ham and eggs in can. First mate threatened mutiny due to captain burning eggs. Rough water, fought wake of boats for three hours. Arrived Fort Myers. Didn't stop, as beer still holding out. Fell in line with power squadron from Cape Coral on drinking party. Would not share beer with squadron so proceeded upriver fo first lock.

3-18 – After blowing horn about 15 limes and cussing everybody, proceeded in locks. Gave tender a beer and he invited us home for supper. Due to overstock of canned groceries, we went on. Arrived at Lock No. 2. First mate asleep, refused to get up. Captain refused to handle slimy lines, so tender had to. Left Lock No. 2 on way to Moorehaven. Could not find town or any people so went through Lock No. 3. Talked to Smithy, the lock tender who looked us over and advised us strongly to proceed to Clewiston ...so went on.

Arrived at Clewiston after several controversial talks with irate fishermen due to our speed. Were treated like two southern gentlemen-girl at restaurant offered us key to city, but we did not accept due to having to break in new salad girl on the boat. Went back to boat. Chills due to cold spell. Woke up in night but so cold could not make it to head ... all in all was a helfuva miserable night.

3 18 Left Clewiston followed by Seminoles and big black flies. Ice breaker ahead. Passed ice breaker. Went up north rim canal past Moorehaven locks . . . 12 miles nothing but horses, cows and weeds. Weeds so thick had to turn around. Went through locks. Tied up at Lakeside marina. Walked 3 blocks to nearest bar for refreshments to gather strength to go to restaurant - crawled to boat, slept 2 hours. All in all a very nice day.

3-19 - Ran out of beer - crew panicstricken. Threatened mutiny so shifted to V-8 juice and vodka until beer available. Made coffee, boiled eggs and weenies. Left for Owl Creek. Got lost, picked up trail of beer cans left on way up. Everything A-ok. Stopped at LaBelle. Went to tavern to juice up. Crew happy now. Proceeded to Owl Creek but due to way crew smelled, dockmaster would not allow us to dock. Suggested we tie up in open channel. Crew did not object due to happiness of having fresh supply of refreshments.

3-20 Woke early, fogged in. Ate breakfast. Snook all around boat. First mate going crazy, no hock. Now out on stern throwing bread in water and trying to brain fish with boat hook. Tied up at Little Shell and bartender suggested we sit on porch, saying it was much cooler there. Think he was trying to tell us something diplomatically. Pulled into Port Comfort for gas, ice and beer. Again invited to sit on dock. Left Port Comfort, headed for home. Arrived at Anchorage. met by wife and sundry others. They stepped back out of respect. RESPECT HELL! WE WERE UPWIND.









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EARLY ISLAND "ARCHITECT"



Two young men from Fort Myers, chosen by U. S. Rep. L.A. "Skip" Bafalis to compete for appointment to the U. S. service academies, have been selected to join the class of '78.

Selected for the Naval Academy at Annapolis was William H. Mankin III, a student at Fort Myers' Cypress Lake High School and son of Mrs. E. G. Mankin. To attend the U. S. Military Academy at West Point is Russell A. Ogrinz, a student at Fort Myers Cypress Lake High School and son of Peter Ogrinz of Cape Coral.

In announcing the appointments, Bafalis said, "The competition for these appointments was stiff but these young men really showed their mettle by being selected.

"I am delighted to be able to announce these appointments," the Congressman said.

#### NEW HOSPITAL OPENS FOR "GUESTS" IN MAY

Southwest Florida's newest hospital, Fort Myers Community Hospital, will open for the first patients in early May, which is 60 days earlier than the original projection.

The first phase incorporates 170,000 square feet at a cost of \$6.5 million. The second phase, which will start construction in the near future, estimated at 3.5 million, for a total cost of \$10 million.

Phase I will have a capacity for 205 medical and surgical patients and 6 operating rooms for surgical procedures with the latest equipment available on the market. Both intensive and coronary units have an electronic monitoring system for all patients with a computer diagnostic cardiogram wired directly to the computer at the University of Florida at Gainesville. Fort Myers Community Hospital will be the only hospital in Southwest Florida providing heart catheterization services.

Phase II will be constructed in such a way as not to interfere with the present facilities. This addition will begin in late 1974, with a completion date anticipated by 1976. When phase II is completed, the hospital will have a 405 bed capacity furthering our services to this community.

This hospital was built without any expenditure of public funds and will pay corporate income and real estate taxes as would any other local business.

Patients, termed as "guests of the hospital," will be admitted with the least possible wait in order for their needs immediately to be taken care of and treatment to begin.

The Dietary Department has specialized in the "Heat-Keeper" tray system for meals to be taken to the patients' rooms and delivered hot. Very few convenience foods will be used as most of the preparation and cooking of meals will be done in their own kitchens. China and stainless steel flatware is used rather than the disposable service.

At the disposal of more than 80 physicians who cover all major medical specialties - anesthesiology, cardiology, general dentistry, dermatology, ENT (ear, nose and throat), general practice, general surgery, gynecology, internal medicine, medical oncology, neurology, oral surgery, opthalmology, orthopedic surgery, pathology, plastic surgery, radiology, thoracic surgery, and urology nest diagnostic ar tra equipment available on the market today. This includes radiographic and fluoroscopic rooms, three nuclear medicine rooms with competent and qualified people staffing them. A sevenday work week in the Medical Records Department will be available to the physicians for their transcription service with sophisticated dictaphone central dictating system. Last, but not least, the Pharmacy Department will be staffed by three will registered pharmacists and supervise the ordering, preparing and administering of medications according to the precepts of a well-planned unit dose medication system. This system is in cooperation with the Department of Nursing Service. The nurses, in accordance with their training and unique team nursing croanization will deliver a high quality of individualized patient care. One of the most unique service offered by the new hospital will be the individual attention given to the patient, such as individual pillow-speaker television sets and direct inward telephone dialing is soon to be offered. This will be installed as soon as the equipment is available toward the end of this year and people will be able to call direct to the bedside.


