Tax District Give-Aways Could Cost Us More Dough

Want your taxes raised?

This could well happen if Senate Bill 614 and House Bill 3256 which are now up in committee in Tallahassee are passed. These bills transfer the tax districts of the County including Sanibel, Captiva and Ft. Myers Beach which are at present under our own rule to the jurisdiction of the County Commission which would then have the power to raise the millages on the taxes of these districts.

Commissioner James Sweeney, commenting on the two bills, said that he felt officials of these various tax districts were doing a wonderful job in their own districts. He said the County Commission was not in favor of the bills and had sent a resolution to oppose them to representatives in Tallahassee.

At present the Erosion control tax district on Captiva is: general fund_2.073 mills, interest & sinking fund_1.769 mills, the Sanibel Fire Control district_4.81 mills, the Captiva Fire Control district_4.26

mills, the Ft. Myers Beach Fire Control district (which includes the Rescue Squad)—1.784 mills, Beach Library district—2.06 mills, Beach Lighting district—.195 mills, and Beach Mosquito Control district (1973)—0 mills.

With the control of these districts passing to the County Com-

With the control of these districts passing to the County Commission if the Tallahassee bills are passed, each district could have its taxes raised to 10 mills each. Think what that would do to your tax dollar!

The whole question was discussed last Friday afternoon by a special meeting of representatives of the various Beach tax districts held at the Beach Mosquito Control Board Hdg., on Lazy Way with Chief Al Hill and Phil Fike of the Fire Control, Mrs. Herb Richards, Beach Library Board District, from the Beach Library, Inc., Ada Bee and Mildred Bassett, Mosquito Control, Travis Cowart, Doc. Townley, Pete McCagg, and Dr. Ronald Lea.

They were concerned with the difficulties which could arise by any transference of control to the County government, especially with the dangers of the possible added tax rise. In '72 the Beach Mosquito Control District tax was .09 less than 1 mill. Due to efficient handling, the millage rate for mosquito control last year was

"And that means we have been saving the taxpayers quite a bit of money,' smiled Travis Cowart.

Travis attended the State Mosquito Control Convention last weekend, held in Key West at which it was his intention to bring up the question of these two state bills.

CHILES SPONSORS CONFERENCE ON PUBLIC SCHOOL EDUCATION

How effective is public schooling? What are the shortcomings and strengths, and what direction should public education in Florida be taking?

This is the basic thrust of a Conference on Education to be held by U.S. Sen. Lawton Chiles (FL) at Florida Southern College in Lakeland, May 6.

'It is rare that people involved with education on the local, state and national levels have an opportunity to come together to gain better understanding of each other's problems and to explore new courses of action," Chiles said in announcing his sponsorship of the

"I want to stimulate exchange of experience and ideas by all those concerned with education-teachers, education officials at all levels, parents, legislators."

Invitations to participate are going statewide to educators, school board members, local school board instructional and supervisory staff members, Florida Education Assn. leaders, state legislators, PTA officials, Leagues of Women Voters, Florida congressional delegation, businessmen and women and environmentalists.

Topic Areas

In order to target areas for discussion, the conference will offer seven different group meetings on community education, education for the disadvantaged, career education, environmental education, exceptional child education, health education and consumer education. A closing general session will present a summary of the findings in the seven group discussions.

"This conference will provide a forum for people interested in preschool, elementary and secondary education to discuss the challenges we face," Sen. Chiles noted, "but it will also help me and other congressmen fulfill our roles in education. There are now several legislative proposals Congress which may have a profound effect on our educational system. I hope to gain insights that will guide me in dealing with such legislation."

The one-day conference will get under way at Florida Southern's Branscomb Auditorium registration starting at 8 a.m.







This Week at the Sanibel Library

Of all the 'Kennedy books' that have flooded the market during the past few years, we now have the only one written by a Kennedy about the Kennedy family: 'Times to Remember' by Rose Fitzgerald Kennedy, the former First Mother, who has set down her memoirs in a best-seller, the Literary Guild selection for Spring. Covering the events of over eight decades, making use of family letters for authenticity, this is Rose Kennedy's own story of the Kennedy and Fitzgerald families, her own busy, full life, and the multitude of people she has known. There are more than 50 pages of family pictures, almost all unpublished before. The manuscript and production of this book cost Doubleday one and a half million dollars, but the Joseph P. Kennedy Foundation receives all of the royalties.

And now that you are sure that the Kennedy book to end all Kennedy books has just been written, let me assure you that Kennedy books will go on forever. For example, Funk and Wagnalls has just announced the August release of 'Joan: The Reluctant Kennedy.' This one will tell you about Ted's wife's struggle to find her place among the Kennedys. If you are in a hurry, you can catch it in the Ladies' Home Journal first.

Keeping up with best-sellers that bounce up and down like yoyo's keeps us alert, but we now have No. 2 on the non-fiction list, 'You Can Profit From a Monetary Crisis' by Harry Browne. This is Harry Browne's advice on how to protect yourself, and even make money, from the shattering events that seem to hit us day by day...dollar devaluation, soaring price of gold, failure of traditional investments, inflation, etc.

'The Kappillan of Malta' by Nicholas Monsarrat is already a best-seller in England and may be headed that way in America. Monsarrat's credentials are impeccable; he wrote 'The Cruel Sea' and 'The Tribe That Lost Its Head.' The new book is two dimensional in form: a portrait of humble man who brought faith, hope and comfort to a stricken people, and a story of an island whose violent history began with the Phoenicians and which suffered its most terrible trial in the agony of World War II. The man is a priest, a Kappillan, and the island is Malta.

One of man's most haunting fears is that the forces of nature might someday rise up and overpower the human race. Arthur Herzog in his tense novel, 'The Swarm,' makes it happen and the result is terrifying. It starts with an almost unnoticed news story about a family being attacked and two of them killed by a swarm of bees. More people are attacked and killed in isolated incidents. Terror spreads into a national panic. It is a horror fantasy that raises a lot of questions...such as who shall inherit the earth.

We now have that controversial biography of 'Thomas Jefferson' by Fawn M. Brodie. The sub-title is 'An Intimate History,' and I would say that it lives up to that classification. The author's speculations about Jefferson's private life make for interesting reading in many more ways than a revelation of his intimate association with Sally Hemings, a mulatto. If not always based entirely on fact, the speculations do raise some interesting questions. The book is a gift from the Rev. Father James Hubbs.

A beautifully illustrated and well-written biography of Edward VII' by Keith Middlemas is now available. It's a lively portrait of the monarch in all his guises...a dashing young Prince of Wales, an understanding father, and an outstanding statesman.

Postscript: That book with talking rabbits, 'Watership Down' has been bought for a movie. But don't moan. It won't be another seagul story. This time, the critters will be animated. Richard Adamson the author, will do the screenplay.

No Night Tours at Kingsley by Audrey Barr

Most old houses are said to have ghosts, and Kingsley Plantation on Fort George Island near Jacksonville probably is no exception. Although Mrs. Frances Duncan, museum guide at Florida's oldest plantation, has never witnessed the episode, islanders say it happens.

"See that window up there," she said, pointing to a large oval-shaped opening on the second floor of the McQueen House, a cottage built in the late 1790's by a former owner. "Well, they tell me that sometimes at dusk a tall Negro woman appears, dressed in white and wearing a white turban.

"She stretches out her arms, and begins calling a long list of African names. The figure remains for awhile, disappears and then returns, and goes through the same per-

formance.

Well, you know, of course, that Zephaniah Kingsley, the Scottish owner of Kingsley Plantation, was a trainer and seller of slaves, but he married an African woman, Anna Jai, and she lived in the McQueen House, separate from the manor house.

"Anna Jai helped Kingsley train the slaves, and when he was away on business, she ran the plantation. At the end of day, she would call the slaves by name from that second floor window, and ask each to give an account of his day's work. If some were absent, she would keep coming out until each slave had appeared before her."

Mrs. Duncan lowered her voice to a confidential level. I don't know if what the islanders have seen is the ghost of Anna Jai, but I try not to stay around the office too long after I finish work, and I am glad we have no night tours of Kingsley,"she said with emphasis.

HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE IS AMERICA'S SECRET KILLER

Sanibel Island

Florida 33957

(May has been designated National High Blood Pressure Month by federal and voluntary health groups to step up activity against a major threat to life. This article was prepared with the help of Fiorida Heart Association.)

"More people in this country die from conditions closely related to high blood pressure than from any other cause," says Dr. Gerold Schiebler, President of Florida Heart Association.

Untreated high blood pressure is a factor in stroke, heart attack, congestive heart failure and kidney failure, he added. These are the major elements in the group of cardiovascular disease which cost year.In human terms, stroke, heart attack and heart and kidney failure cause much illness and suffering and claim approximately 900,000 lives annually.

A tragic fact is that heart attack and stroke hit people at premature Schiebler explains. ages, frequently in their most productive years. Twenty-five that rises and falls between heart percent of all heart attack deaths beats. There are normal ranges occur under age 65, as do more than (numbers) for this. In some people, 15 percent of deaths from stroke, these numbers may go up for a while

disease.

"Much of this loss could be avoided or at least delayed, "said Dr. Schiebler. 'Research has given us the drugs to control most cases of high blood pressure and save life. And now there is evidence that treating even mild rises in blood pressure, which most physicians used to ignore, can prevent the development of serious problems." Dr. Schiebler adds:

There are two factors that get in the way of finding and helping people with high blood pressure. Half of the 23 million Americans estimated to have it don't even know it. And many of these who do find it cut, don't follow through on treatment. In both cases, the problem is that they just don't feel sick and can't accept the need for treatment.

*We've got to convince them that the nation an estimated \$20 billion a this disease is a silent killer which usually doesn't have any symptoms and can exist unknown for years doing damage to vital organs. The only way to spot it is by a fast, simple test that calls merely for the patient to roll up a sleeve," Dr.

Everybody has blood pressure once considered an older persons' and then come down. But when

pressure goes up and stays up, then can be fatal. patients have hypertension or high blood pressure.

The heart must work harder to move the blood. This can enlarge the


heart and reduce its efficiency, starting a cycle that affects the kidneys' ability to remove water: from body tissue, which places still more of a load on a weakening heart. Artery walls also are damaged by high blood pressure pounding and

it becomes easier for fatty deposits to find a place to settle in, narrowing ,the passageway for blood, and eventually shutting off supply to the heart, the brain or the kidneys. The end result can be heart attack, stroke or kidney failure, all of which

Since high blood pressure often gives no warning, the best defense is a regular medical checkup, Dr. Schiebler stresses. An added value to early detection is that certain slight rises in blood pressure can be treated without drugs--sometimes by simple weight reduction or cutting down on salt used in foods.

But there's no way the patient can be sure and his best bet is to see a physician and follow professional







A Grain Of Sea Salt by betzi abram



This week I am announcing the first annual Grain of Sea Salt Contest. And when you read what it is, please don't laugh and think I'm joking because I'm completely serious, and I even plan to give a real prize to the winner. It will be guaranteed to be not worth more than one dollar, but I feel that the honor involved (ahem) and the concomitant publicity will be so great, that the winner(s?) will more than get his (her, their) effort's

11 started becausepreparatory to taking off for the Abrams' historic three-week cruise through the Bahamas on our Venture 22-1 have begun to make lists. It is my firm belief that one of the most important things in sailing aside from the anchor, compass and first aid kit is a collection of lists: what to take aboard, what's already there, what has to be mended, collected, repainted, borrowed, bought, what to wear, what to sleep on, what to eat...which brings me back to the point.

For this contest, imagine that two of you are going to sail three weeks in the Bahamas, stopping only for fresh water or local booze, as needed. You have a monohuli sailboat between 24 and 32 feet, with no refrigeration and will be sailing in areas where ice for coolers is not available. You have fishing gear but a fairly limited amount of tackle, lures, etc. You have a Coleman, twoburner propane stove, a frying pan, double boiler and coffee pot plus other minimal galley-ware-knives, forks, plates, etc.

Imagine that neither of you has any particular wild food hang-ups, but that you do want relatively wellbalanced meals so that you will not succumb either to total palateboredom or incipient scurvy.

Assume also that the amount of booze is not a problem, but consideration must be given to how you are going to drink it, in what, with what or however, as well as any additional beverages other than water.

With these factors in mind, make up a list of the food and associated supplies needed for the trip. Include the amount of each item, the kind of package (can, box, bottle, etc.), and the approximate cost. Recipes are not necessary, but if you include some rather unusual item or quantity-such as 21 bottles of horseradish-it would increase your chances of winning to indicate in what manner you envisage using it up. Where important, give brand names and tell why that choice.





Wildlife Notes by griffing bancroft

tically all the birds that breed in as birds do. southern Florida is now in full swing and, as in many other areas, a lot of of empty beaches on the islands birds are having more and more trouble finding suitable places for their eggs and young.

Birds are conditioned to seek catchers. certain sites and to build certain types of nests, or to use just the for this area and all normally make ground or a hole in a tree or cliff without any nest. Nature has granted them very little adaptability. If they cannot find the proper place for nesting, they usually don't nest at all.

Many areas are now being set aside as sanctuaries and refuges for nesting birds. For those that nest in swampy areas, or gardens, or the least tern, the fairy-like little remote places this is an effective bird often called the sea swallow. help.

But there is one group of birds for which it is becoming increasingly difficult to save nesting areas. These are birds that nest on sandy beaches. The reason is quite

Not so long ago there were miles where a variety of birds could nest: least tern, Wilson and snowy plovers, black skimmers, oyster-

All of these are breeding birds little hollows in the sand where they lay their eggs.

As more beaches have become more populated with people, most of these birds have been forced to go elsewhere to find ne sting places. But some have struggled to stay with us, making unusual adaptations.

Leading the way in this has been When the causeway was first built these birds found the sandy sides of the road comparable enough to beaches to nest there, despite the hazards of traffic.

In other places on the islands

where developers or settlers put in fill on lots prior to building, the birds used some of these places for nesting.

The trouble with this has been that it is good for only a year or two. Even if building isn't started at once, vegetation grows up in these places and the beach-loving birds do not like to nest there then.

The reason for this was discovered recently when a colony of skimmers nested one year too long in a sandy place which has become overgrown. Like all these birds, their young will wander away from the nest when quite small.

Many of the babies were found so entangled in burrs and other vegetation that they could not survive.






