ISLANDER 5-9-74 SIGN ORDINANCE NEEDS TEETH by Vivian Hinternhoff

The sign ordinance affecting Sanibel and Captiva which went into effect March I, is raising quite a few waves, not to mention some eddies and minor whirlpools, on the islands. Quite a few of the island businesses have obeyed the ordinance at a considerable cost. The four main items are: no new direction signs after Feb. 1; no signs larger than 10 ft. x 10 ft.; one sign per business except in shopping centers were there may be direction signs no larger than 2 ft. x 3 ft.; and no off-premise signs.

The enforcement of the ordinance is up to Don Malloy of the Building and Zoning Department. Working with the department is the Sanibel-Captiva Sign Committee with Benton Blair as the present chairman. On the committee are Bernard Le Roux, Winifred Iurka, Ed Conrad, John Ryan, Paul McCulloch, Norman Chambers and John Rushworth.

The committee which met at Island Inn Monday night has no powers of its own, said Blair; if is an advisory body and has found that most people like the idea of the sign limitations. Although many of the businesses have already complied, those who have not are liable to a fine of \$500 a day if the ordinance is enforced.


Blair went out with a deputy, at which time violators were given two-week's notice. After this, the cases were reexamined and non-compliers were given a three-weeks' extension. Nevertheless, many businessmen who have changed their signs at considerable effort and expense are feeling understandably resentful. "We really need more enforcement of the ordinance," said Blair, "although I must admit that a \$500-a-day fine would really be painful to the businesses which do not comply with the ordinance."



TO THE ISLANDER:

The reluctance of the County Commission to adequately uphold the sign ordinance leaves us no alternative but to do it ourselves. We have a hardworking, much abused committee but it is hampered by a few businesses which would take unfair advantage of their competition by retaining illegal signs. Such non-compliance can only create chaos and an early end to today's signlessness - so attractive to the eye. Is this what islanders really want?

While there can be valid reasons for a variance, being new is not one of them. No one going into business now can be unaware of the provisions of the ordinance, thanks to the efforts of the S-C Chamber of Commerce which sponsored it. Three Stars, beset with problems, bent over backward to eliminate signs while Island Apothecary, Capt. Doug's, Chicken Holiday and Seagrape Antiques eagrape defiantly replaced an illegal off-premises sign which had been removed from county right of way. For the good of the islands, we must throw our support to the conforming businesses and our own people who take all kinds of guff as they work for compliance to the law. The newspapers could help. We suggest that the Reporter and The Islander publish pictures of nonconforming signs. This would discourage the spread of such things - and provide a handy guide for prospective customers. NEW DIRECTORIES OUT; GETTING FATTER YEARLY

Fort Myers, Fla.-Door-to-door delivery of United Telephone 1974-75 Fort Myers area telephone directory began this week and will continue through April 30.

J.M. (Mike) Dalton, district commercial manager, requested that subscribers begin using the new directories promptly on May 1 to avoid the use of numbers that have changed during the year. Also, he said, proper use of the book could help hold down the heavy load of calls normally handled by the company's Directory Assistance operators.

Dalton said that customers who have not received their directories by May 2 should contact the business office on Lee Street.

United Telephone's colorfully-clad 1974-75 Fort Myers Area directory is a book that bears only a passing resemblance to its predecessor of twenty years ago.

This year's best seller contains, for instance, some 57,000 listings within its 176 white pages, compared to a mere 5,300 listings on 27 pages back in 1954.

All told, today's book has 628 pages compared to yesteryear's 132. But--the 1954 total also included Charlotte, Collier, Hendry and Glades Counties in addition to Lee County telephones. Quite a striking contrast.

According to J.M. (Mike) Dalton, district commercial manager, this new directory contains a total of 92 more pages (24 white and 68 yellow) than last year's edition, reflecting a greater Fort Myers area telephone growth rate in excess of 17 percent during 1973.

Customers should check their directory carefully and use them after May 1, said Dalton, due to many new listings and changes attributable to mobility of the local populace. He indicated that the company's installers had connected or disconnected more than 50,000 telephones in Lee County last year, while gaining a total of 12,000 new phones.


A further glance at Lee County's directory listings of 1954 reveals only two banks versus more than a dozen today. There's also a complete absence of listings under condominiums compared to several pages today. But, there's a Packard auto agency.

Not surprisingly, you can't find a single pizza parlor either.

And, twenty years ago, there were fourteen churches listed in the phone book. Today, you can count more than 150 listings under churches.

Maybe we're doing better than we think.





This Week at the Sanibel Library by Hal H. Harrison

Man, do we have books! New ones! Best sellers!

Right on...we have 'Alive' by Piers Paul Read, one of the greatest survival stories of all times, a documentary of the Andes crash survivors. You will recail the news headlines: the flight from Uruguay to Chile over the Andes, the charter plane carrying the Rugby players, which crashed into a mountain peak. Some were killed instantly, but those who remained faced death and starvation. The tale of hardship and horror is a gripping one. It seems cruel to call this book 'entertainment' when life depended upon the decision to use the bodies of dead companies as food or to join them, but the suspense is never-ending. Seventy days after the crash, two men reached help, and 16 of the original 40 passengers and five crewmen were saved.

I'm sure that many of you saw the dramatic TV epic. 'The Wild Dogs of Africa. Now we have the story of 'Solo,' the adventures of the African dog puggy that tugged at your heart in the TV show. It was written by Hugo Van Lawick with an introduction by his famous wife, Jane Van Lawick-Goodall (Remember her? 'In the Shadow of Man'). As in the TV documentary, the book tells of Solo's fight for survival.

Back to the best-seller list: We have Studs Terkel's 'Working.' In this book, people talk about what they do all day and how they feel about what they do. Terkel spent three years talking to people in a wide variety of occupations. The result is a book that describes America as it is, and in some ways, perhaps, as it has not been seen before. If Studs Terkel is new to you, pick up his previous best seller, 'Division Street: America,' at the library. He is a Chicago radio and newspaperman who knows a good yarn when he hears one.

I was really amazed to note that 'Cogan's Trade' by George V. Higgins landed on the ten best list of the New York Times. I read it, and it can only be there by riding on the coattails of Higgins's previous hit, 'The Friends of Eddie Coyle.' The story is good enough. I had trouble sorting out the four-letter adjectives and verbs that kept pilling up over the nouns. It was like reading Shakespear. for the first time. You need someone to interpret the language. I don't mind four-letter words in context, but Higgins had a field day.

Everyone seems to be fascinated with 'The Secret Life of Plants' by Peter Tompkins. This is the controversial account of the physical, emotional and spiritual reactions between plants and man. The idea that plants have emotions similar to ours, communicate with each other, and are connected with humans by some mysterious extrasensory perception is the thesis. Since I have always hated anthropomorphism in animals, my reactions to this one may not be the same as yours.

The TV addicts of the soap opera sessions are going to grab for 'Pat Loud, a Woman's Story,' for Pat is the first lady of 'An American Family,' In this book, she tells all...what went wrong with her American dream? For her millions of fans, here is the dramatic story behind the story.

Speaking of fans, we have a book for those who never missed one of Drew Pearson's columns: "Drew Pearson, Diaries 1949-1959" edited by Tyler Abell. This is the first volume of the diaries of this public watchdog whose big stories and news scoops made journalistic history. Here are stories that made headlines and some that never saw print.

Do you know what a duck stamp is? If you're a hunter, you undoubtedly do because it is illegal to shoot at migratory birds without one. If you're not a hunter, you won't want one because they cost \$5, are good for just one year and are not good for postage.

The very first stamp was designed by our own J.N. (Ding) Darling in 1934. The criginal drawing was given to the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation and is on display at the Sanibel Library.

Just recently the Library bought one of the original stamps. Darling's original drawing will be re-framed to show both the drawing and the stamp.

The stamps, officially known as 'Migrafory Bird Hunting Stamps,' cost SI in 1934, but like everything else have increased in price gradually since then. They are issued by the Department of Agriculture and sold at most post-offices -- but not Sanibel's. You can't shoot ducks or anything else here, you know.

Proceeds go mostly for purchase of

refuges where birds can pause safely on their annual migrations. Some of the money went into the Sanibel sanctuary now named for Ding Darling.

SPPCIAL EDITION OF TRIBUNE DONATED TO SANIBEL LIBRARY

Howard Wood, retired chairman of the Chicago Tribune, who has had a home on Gulf Drive, Sanibel, for many years, has presented the Sanibel Library with a copy of the Tribune of May 1.

GAS PRICES STILL CONTROLLED

Jacksonville, Florida -- The Internal Revenue Service today reminded Florida service station operators that price controls on petroleum are still in effect.

The IRS reported that a number of station owners recently contacted around Florida assumed that controls on gas prices would be lifted with the expiration of the Economic Stabilization Act.


'This simply isn't so,' said Bob Newell, acting IRS stabilization manager for Florida. 'It is still illegal for a station operator to adjust his gasoline prices as he wishes.'

Price controls administered under the Economic Stabilization Program expired at the end of April. However, petroleum prices are new controlled under Federal Energy Office Rules. Mr. Newell pointed cut. Under the present system, dealers are allowed to 'pass through' price increases penny for penny.

Mr. Newell said that the IRS will continue to enforce petroleum prices through June 30, 1974, with the Federal Energy Office then assuming that responsibility.

FLA. STONE CRAB SEASON OVER

A closed season for the taking of stone crabs in Florida's waters will start May 15 and continue through October 15, Harmon Shields, executive director of the Department of Natural Resources, announced today.

Shields warned that violation of the closed season, or any rules and regulations concerning stone crabbing, may result in revocation of a stone crabbing permit.

Enforcement of the closed season will be under the administration of Cliff Willis, director of the Department's Division of Marine Resources. He said the Marine Patrol will enforce the closed season regulation for stone crabbing.

Willis said all persons possessing

stone crabs at the beginning of the closed season must file with the executive director of the Department of Natural Resources an accounting of the number of pounds of stone crabs in their possession.

During the closed season, he said a report must be sent to the director on the 1st and 15th day of each month showing the amount of stone crabs sold during the previous two-week period and the balance on hand. He said the total crab meat on hand plus the meat sold should at all times equal the total amount declared at the beginning of the closed season.

For declaration blanks, contact the district office of the Florida Department of Natural Resources' Marine Patrol or the Department of Natural Resources in Tallahassee.





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

The merits of small dinghys vs. rubber rafts were discussed for landing on the islands until someone laughingly remarked that either way it was a swimwiting


knowing what equipment to take."

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

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

THAT'S POLITICS, BY GEORGE! by County Commission Chairman George Goldtrap

As I am sure you remember, the Lee County Commission, with its new Republican majority, cut your tax bill last year by almost three mills. Every effort is being made by my office to continue that trend as we go into budget season for this year.

At the same time, we increased the salaries of Lee County employees by over one-half million dollars. The principal is simple. Get good people, pay them more, and you will need a smaller staff. The economies that will then result are the use of time and materials.

There is a plaguing paradox, however, that skims the goodies off the surface -- inflation. Many factors contribute, certainly not least is the federal budget. No matter how much money we save you locally, if Uncle Sam takes it, you're no better off.

Your family's tab for running the

federal government next year figures to be about \$4,362, if the proposed \$304.4 billion budget pases in Congress. The average American household's share in the 1975 federal budget outlays is more than double the same cost ten years ago, a jump of 108 percent.

Based on a S3 billion budget in 1929, the increase in federal spending over a span of 46 years exceeds 10,000 percent. Meanwhile, our population was growing by something like 75 percent. (From the Florida Chamber of Commerce and the Bowling Green-Warren County (Ky.) Chamber of Commerce)

Add to this the federal government's hunger to compete with free enterprise and to regulate the rest out of business, and you can see why the cry for more and better local government control is justified.

Airport Rules

We finally got around to the final public hearing on the ordinance regarding rules and regulations of conduct at the Lee County Airport. I had mentioned to you before about this 'wordy' document and my efforts totrim it down. I am pleased to tell you that I was at least partially successful. The final form of the ordinance will be available to us in a few days and will take effect around the first of June.

Traffic Computer

The application of Lee County Computer Service to our traffic court is good news of recent date. Add to this the County's determination to let the violator pay his own cost, and you have a pretty good package of local legislation. It works this way. Each violation is computer recorded. If it is a minor infraction, the violator can elect to plead guilty and mail the fine to the Clerk, thus skipping the court procedure.

If he prefers to plead innocent, he can ask the Clerk for a trial schedule. In either case, much time and paper work is saved over the former method. Upon coming to trial, or upon paying the fine, the computer spits out the violator's record, if any, for consideration in the

New Carpet




Fairness Commended






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
BILLS KILLED, THANKS TO FLOOD OF LETTERS BY Vivian Hinternhoff
