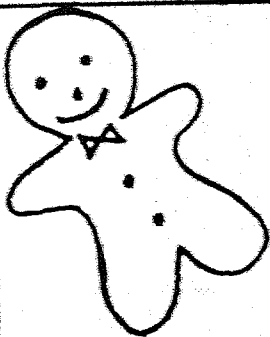

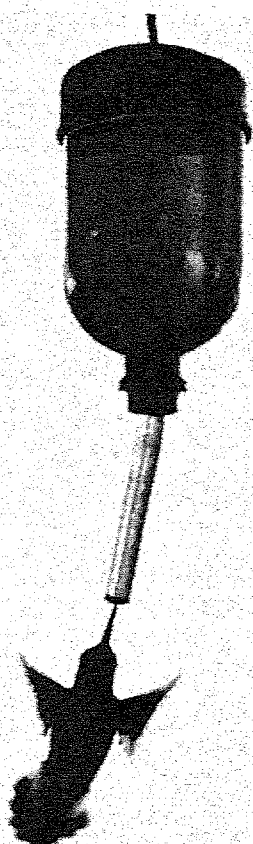

Whatever the Reporter's reasons for headlining the gripes of former Directors Holland and Chambers, we cannot see that it serves any useful purpose. Surely, it is embarrassing to Mr. Taylor to have it pointed out that twice he has been rejected by S-C Planning Board members who do not agree that he is a man of "proven planning ability." To accept this assessment would be to accept his Sanibel Moorings and the other appalling condominium complexes along Sanibel's eastern end as standards of excellence. Obviously, the membership does not want directors who so clearly demonstrate that they put the profit motive above other considerations.

It's true, of course, that this organization has a certain conformity. Why else would it have incorporated? While the present directors span the years from the 20's thru the 60's and include real estate agents, a developer and business men and women, all share in the pursuit of an ideal: to plan with nature, looking to long range gain rather than immediate profits. To bring in those with conflicting objectives would neutralize the Board and back it up to a kicking foot.

Perhaps we are unduly cynical, but we believe that the large developers would like very much to take over Planning Board, not for the ideas and the purpose but for the reputation and the membership. In such sheep's clothing, how easy it would be to direct and control Sanibel and Captiva.

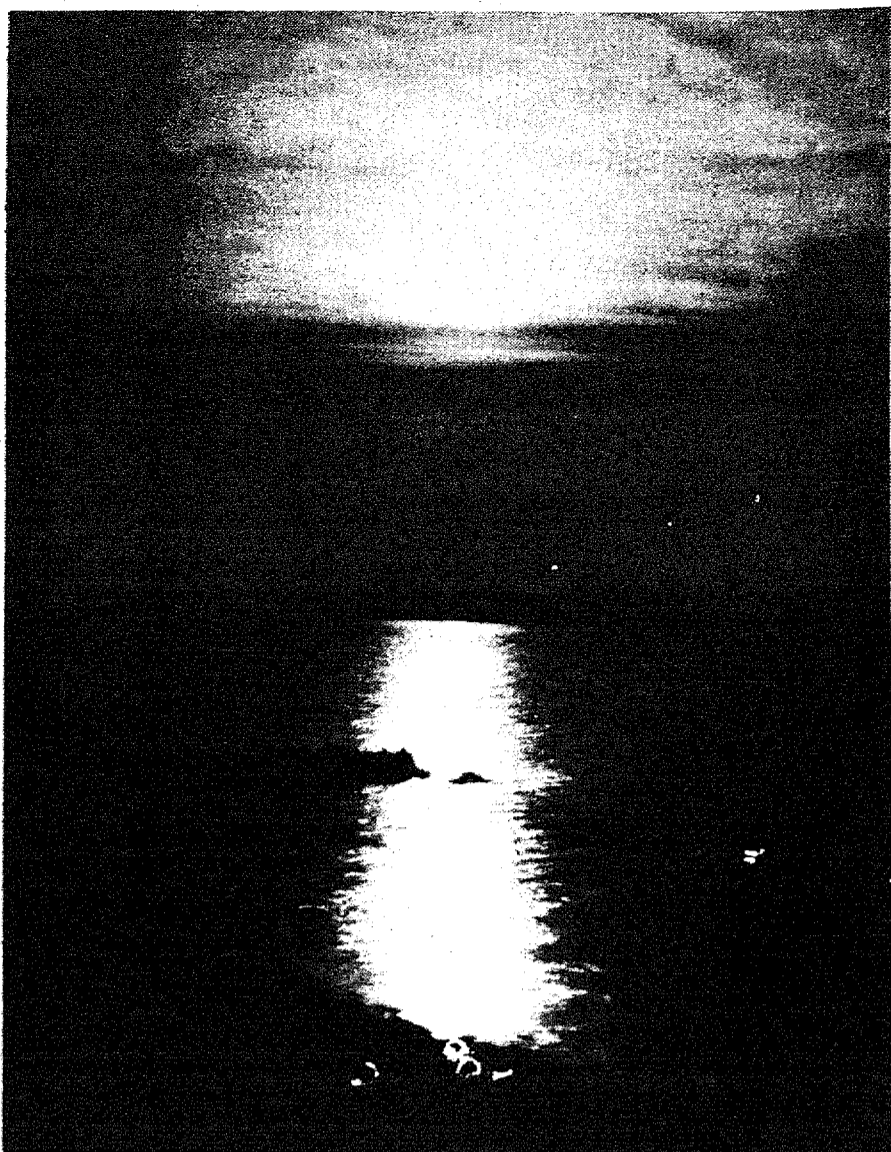
Will appreciate a reply as to how to make contact with Maybelle Stamper -- I married since that time, so my name is now Triantos.

LANDSCAPE AWARD GOES TO PERIWINKLE

The Fort Myers-Lee County Garden Council certificate of honor for the most outstanding landscaping of a commercial enterprise in Lee County was given May 17 to Periwinkle Place, shopping and office complex on Sanibel Island. The award is presented by the garden council each year.

Periwinkle Place was one of four contenders for the award this year.

It was nominated by a Fort Myers garden club. The nomination cited the developer's efforts to blend the complex into the island's natural beauty.

One member of the judging committee commented, "They almost did too good a job -- we drove past, admired the property, and only then did we realize that it was Periwinkle Place!"

Judges were impressed by the use of existing trees and plants in the basic landscape plan which has been augmented by the use of compatible shrubs.

They were also interested in the large number of trash receptacles designed to be readily available but esthetically pleasing, since "litter control" is an important project of garden club groups nationwide.

LIBRARY BENEFITS FROM MATCHING GIFT PROGRAM

"Art students are asked to bring a portfolio of their work, and a letter of recommendation from the high school art teacher would be helpful," according to Dr. Murphy. Robert L. York, art instructor, will conduct the selection of art recipients.

Drama students should come prepared to audition with Mrs. Muriel Bartholomew, drama instructor, and will be asked to demonstrate their talents with readings or brief dramatic sketches.

Music students will audition with James A. Cain, music instructor. Dr. Murphy states accompanists may be brought to the auditions, but that this is not necessary. Instrumental and vocal musicians are invited, he stated.

ECC Board of Trustees members requested the scholarships for promising young artists to help balance the college's fee waiver policy. According to Dr. Murphy, waivers have been offered for scholars in academic areas, for students in need of financial assistance and for athletes, but it was felt that students who have artistic potential should have greater opportunity to develop their talents at the college.

Waivers cover payment of tuition for Sessions II and III (August, 1974 through April, 1975) for 10 music students, 5 drama and 3 art students.

Recipients of the waivers will be selected on the basis of past performance in their chosen artistic field, preference for the chosen field, and artistic promise. They are expected to perform in college music, drama or art programs as appropriate, Dr. Murphy states.





POST OFFICE SOLICITS BIDS FOR TRANSPORTATION OF MAIL

The Sanibel Postmaster, Paul Adams, has announced that solicitation for transportation of mails between Fort Myers, FL, and Captiva, FL, for a period beginning July 1, 1974 and ending June 30, 1978, was posted in the Sanibel Post Office lobby on May 11.

Adams stated that bids or negotiation packages are available to interested parties at the following locations: Postmasters: Fort Myers, FL 33902; Sanibel, FL 33957; Captiva, FL 33957.

Each year giant loggerhead sea turtles nest here on the beaches of Sanibel-Captiva. After they nest, many of the eggs are collected and transplanted into this hatchery compound. Young turtles are then hatched from eggs that would have been destroyed by erosion, predators, or man. This conservation project was initiated in an attempt to gain knowledge in possible ways to eliminate the continuing steady decline of sea turtle populations.

The eggs often number 150 per nest, are covered by a white leathery shell about the size of a ping-pong ball, and hatch in approximately 52 days. The young turtles are marked and most are released along the Gulf beach. Others are held in special facilities until they are several months old.

Sea turtles, their nests and eggs are protected by Florida law. It is unlawful to molest turtles or their nests on the beach.

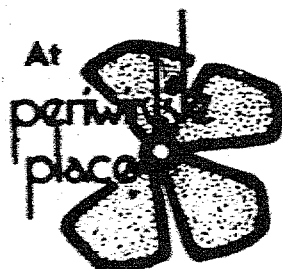

THIS WEEK AT THE SANIBEL LIBRARY

While I have been going on and on about the great new books, the best sellers, that have been arriving almost daily at the library, Ruth Clark, Children's Librarian, has been assembling a great list of new books for children. So, it is high time that we turned this column over to Ruth to tell you about her 'best sellers.' For most of these books, we are indebted to the Sanibel-Captiva Kiwanis Club for a \$100 donation.

The 5 to 7 age group will enjoy "How the World Got Its Color" by Marilyn Hirsh. It is based on an Oriental legend: The Gods gave paints to an artist. His daughter went outside and painted the flowers, the sky, her dress. Each page has a bit more color. It is simple and it is charming.

"Mushrooms and Molds" by Robert Froman is a 'Let's-read-and-find-out-science-book' for beginners (6 to 8 years). In addition to the 'finding out' several interesting experiments with spores are described. The art work is outstanding.

The trials and tribulations of friendship are told in "George and Martha Encore" by James Marshall. The characters are two fetching hippopotami in some fine very short stories for youngsters 4-6. It is fun because such delicate spirit is enclosed in such outside bodies.

Teenagers will enjoy "Professor Egghead's Best Riddles" by Rose Wyler. This one is great for parties or for the child who is in that 'show off' stage. Here are jokes and jests from American folklore. And, in the same category but for younger children (5-8), we have "The Electric Radish and Other Jokes" by Susan Thorndike.

"The Giving Tree" is a parable of acceptance and love of a boy and a tree. The tree gives its shade, branches, apples, trunk, and finally its stump to fill the needs of a boy who grows to old age. It is for 8 and older --- a theme that declares that when man destroys nature he destroys himself.

A real exercise in imagination, fantasy and humor is offered for the 8-11 age group in "The Remarkable Journey of Gustavus Bell." Gustavus has a rare disease, he is becoming half as large as he was before. He has many weird adventures with smaller and smaller animals.

Paul Villard introduces the 8 and up children to "Insects As Pets." What are insects? How do you capture and care for them and observe them? All such questions and answers are in this well-illustrated and informative book.

The author of the prize-winning "Adam of the Road," Elizabeth Gray Vining, has now given us "The Taken Girl." It is the story of a 'taken' or servant girl in a Quaker boarding house. There she meets John Greenleaf Whittier and other Abolitionists. It has a Philadelphia setting for good historical writing. Ages 12 up.

Teenagers will enjoy the scary tales of graves, sounds, and strange happenings in "Monster Tales: Vampires, Werewolves, Things." This book could be a great incentive for the non-reader to start.

Very timely is "Pro Football Heroes of Today" by Berry Stainback. It tells the story of Larry Csonka, Bob Griese, Joe Namath, O. J. Simpson and many others. Many photographs and lots of background for teenagers who are ardent football fans.

Remember "A Day No Pigs Would Die"? Well, Robert Peck, the author, has a new one, "Millie's Boy," the story of a boy whose mother was killed and whose father is unknown. This 16-year-old boy treks the Adirondack wilderness of 1898 where he hopes to find answers to his identity. Lots of action here and particularly good for boys.

Librarian Ruth Clark has many more new books, so stop at the library and bring the youngsters. We'll bring you another list later.

You cannot get flood insurance unless you can prove you are in compliance with government restrictions pertaining to the "One hundred year" flood plain. In other words, you are controlled by finances, finances are controlled by the government. You must comply with arbitrary congressional dictatorship, or get this act repealed.

Local, County, and City governments, as well as lending institutions, are being forced to join in the flood insurance program. The alternative is financial disaster for everyone. Our economy is totally dependent upon financing. Without compliance, absolutely no financing would be available. The government has made this very clear, but the government has not made it clear that subsidized flood insurance will only be available for a limited time.

At present, government subsidized flood insurance is 25 cents per \$100., or about \$87.50 per year for \$35,000 coverage. Un-subsidized flood insurance costs \$1,000 to \$1,500 per year for \$35,000. What happens when government subsidized flood insurance is no longer available, but the requirement to have flood insurance remains. Can you afford to pay it? Is this another effective method of achieving a stated purpose of the act to discourage people from living in this area?



Effective January 1, 1975, the new Federal Flood Insurance Program requires that the "living area" of Sanibel and Captiva homes be constructed at least 13'2" above MSL. What does this really mean? It means a radical change in island architecture! Most Sanibel building lots are 3' to 6' above MSL.
