Density Discussion Held

Density discussion was held yesterday regarding motel and condominium limits on Sanibel Island at the Lee County Commission meeting. The ordinance as proposed calls for a reduction in motel density from 22 to 20 units per acre and a reduction in condominiums from 18 to 12 units per acre.

Islanders for reduction want to help preserve public services and protect Sanibel's beauty. Developers who are against the ordinance say their profits will be cut.

Water Hookups Banned During Emergency

The Island Water Association has banned all new system's connections which will probably last through the '74-75 tourist season until the water emergency which is presently existing on the Island is over. This will not apply to customers previously granted a permit but will apply to those who have only signed up.

Multi-family units could come to a fast halt while private builders can possibly get a well for a single family unit.

Lee County Commissioners ruled the Island's water problem is not severe enough to immediately construct a million gallon storage tank.

Association officials attempted to bypass the Zoning Board claiming demands of the tourist season couldn't be met unless construction of the tank was begun this month. The Commission's decision was that the Association must first apply to the Zoning Board for a variance to build in a prime residential area, and this decision means the commission won't hear the case until mid-July which will be too late to start the tank before fourist season begins.

The Island Water Association has to fulfill its obligation to members now on the system : hence, this is the reason the Board has taken this drastic action.



HOST FAMILIES NEEDED FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

More than 2,000 high school students from Europe, South America, Japan, and the Philippines will be arriving in the U.S. in August. These students are participating in the Youth for Understanding International Student Exchange Program, and will live and study in the U.S. for one year. Youth for Understanding is inviting families interested in opening their homes to these young students to write for applications.

We can never understand the nature of another country until we come to see it in that country's terms and experiences, consequently. Youth for Understanding feels that host families provide the key to better international understanding. The daily living experience encountered by ihe student through his new family gives him an insight and awareness of the U.S. that is difficult to duplicate.

Being a host family means sharing daily activities, plans, and ideas with a high school student from another country. These students are eager to experience life with an American family. As they grow to know one another, gradually the family and the students become more aware of each other's culture. Along with the family living arrangements, the students enroll in local high schools, and take part in school and community activities. The host family may find its life enriched as each member gains something special from the new family member; they are able to discover and investigate other parts of the world through the experience of their 'son' or 'daughter;' bridges of communication are built across language and cultural barriers; and the living experience can make it possible for the family and the exchange student to see and understand their own country through another's eyes. By the end of the year, new and lasting friendships have been created reaching into many corners of the world. BREATH OF LIFE CHAIRMAN NÁMED

As soon as volunteers are recruited, Mrs. Kontinos will conduct a house-tohouse appeal throughout the community. Those persons wishing to volunteer




ARE SUBSTITUTE FOOD BETTER?

Many new-fangled substitute foods are reaching the market in the form of meat-like breakfast links, pattics resembling sausage and Canadian-style bacon slices, as egg and buffer substitutes and others. Processing companies which make these textured vegetable protein products (TVP) boost them as having no animal fat and no cholesterol found in natural meat and their aim is a people who fear heart attacks.

Some comparisons have been made between the substitute breakfast products and the real thing by the National Livestock and Meat Board and the results are teresting. Compared were real eggs and pork sausage and buttered toast with egg substitutes, TVP breakfast links and toast margarine. (The National Livestock and Meat Board says the breakfast comparison would have been more complete had it included real fruit juice versus a synthetic product). In the analysis of the test, it was found that the typical real breakfast had almost five grams more protein, over 200 milligrams more phosphorous and nearly an equal amount of fat. Substitutes compared well with the real thing in terms of A and B vitamins. A major difference according to the comparisons between the real breakfast and the TVP products was that the substitutes have 242 milligrams more of sodium than the real thing, and doctors advise heart patients to cut down on their sodium intake or eliminate it altogether to control high blood pressure, which is a leading contributor to heart trouble. I think it is clear, based on these facts, that the natural, real thing animal protein products can continue to have competitive advantages over the substitutes in terms of total health in bidding for the consumer's dollar. They can compete also in terms of cost and total value. That's the way it should be.

BEWARE-THE BLACK BOX

A black box is the latest gyp to hif Southwest Florida, according to the Customer-Business Relations Division of the Fort Myers-Lee County Chamber of Commerce.

It works this way: a salesman will stop by your house selling a black box. This box reportedly will, when connected to the lead-in wire located before or near your electric meter, give appliances and all motors a more productive and longer life and, at the same time, conserve electricity. This gimmick, in use, claims to reduce the overall electric bill by leveling the electric surges that normally occur when an appliance is turned on.

Don't you believe it! It has no usefulness because, in reality, it is connected to nothing.

The outside of the black box has a decal "UL" approval in plain sight. (Underwriters Lab has no information and no schedule for examination.) IT'S A FAKE, and at a cost of about \$100 or, if you prefer, you may make monthly rental arrangements.

If you remove the plug at the bottom, a "transistorized circuit panel" can be seen. In taking the box apart you'll find a granite hard substance covering two resistors and a circuit not connected to anything, so --- BEWARE THE BLACK BOX!

What will the society of gyp artists think up next? The Customer-Business Relations Division warns you not to be a victim of fraudulent schemes. Investigate before you invest.


NEWS FOR VETERANS

Educational training under the GI bill is not limited to classroom type learning says W. B. Mackall, director of the State of Florida's Division of Veterans Affairs.

There are many good paying jobs for which specialized skills are required, so the GI Bill offers a program of apprenticeship and on-the-job training. While you are learning, you are also earning, and receiving Veterans Administration payments to supplement your income.

For instance, if you are single and take on an approved program of apprentice training, the Veterans Administration will pay you \$160 a month for the first six months. In addition, your employer will be paying you regular wages for that job. Together they add up to a program of on-the-job training that is hard to beat. If it has been less than eight years since you left the service, and your GI Bill entitlement has not been used, you may be eligible for up to two years of on-the-job training or an unlimited trade apprenticeship.







THIS WEEK AT THE SANIBEL LIBRARY by Hal H. Harrison

Are the brand new books that arrived at the Library this week any better than the ones that arrived last month, or three months ago? It ain't necessarily so. And one of the most worrisome problems that I have in writing this weekly column is to try to pack into this brief space as much news as possible about the books available to you. I fall woefully short. Looking over the books that we have had for awhile, I realize that I have neglected to tell you about some darn good ones. Here's what I mean:

Peter Matthiessen's "The Wind Birds" will delight Sanibel bird-watchers. It is an extensively revised edition of a text originally published in 1967 as part of an illustrated book in large format, "The Shorebirds of North America." Robert Gillman has added 25 new drawings and the text is updated. Peter is the son of Matty and Betty Matthiessen, Captiva residents.

Also for birders: Jean Piatt's "Adventures in Birding, Confession of a Lister." Like so many of us, Jean Piatt and his wife are devotees of that widespread sport of tracking down new birds to add to our "life lists." With 671 to their credit, the Piatts are 'way out in front of most of us on Sanibel, but it is inspiring to read how they did itfrom Alaska to Hudson's Bay to Florida to Mexico.

They say that family reunions are chancy at best. The one in "Back to Fire Mountain" by Richard Scowcroft is a catastrophe. Here is a totally unpredictable comedy of human misunderstandings with a blend of fantasy and realism. The reunion occurs on a dark and stormy night at a long-abandoned Fire Mountain lodge in Eden Cayon.

We have the third edition of "A Field Guide to Shells of the Atlantic and Gulf Coasts and the West Indies" one of the Peterson Guides from Houghton Mifflin. The big feature here is the addition of West Indies shells. There are 1,033 illustrations.

William Snaith, a transoceanic racer, tells of his adventures aboard the Figaro 111, a 46-foot yawl with a crew of eight, in his book, "On the Wind's Way." It is the story of an Atlantic race from Bermuda to Sweden over 3,000 miles of open sea, a blend of high adventure and a profound human experience.

Want to cook 14 meals in two hours without getting exhausted? Want to suddenly phone guests for dinner on a moment's notice? Want to create an endless stream of recipes and menus without using precise instructions? Well, that's what is claimed for "The Liberated Cook Book" by Arlene Caddoza. She claims that she will show you how to be a guest at your own table. Make her prove it. Read the book.

Appropriate for Sanibel: "Hurricanes, Weather at its Worst" by Thomas Helm. This is a combination of personal experience with an eye for scientific detail to make the reader more familiar with the forces of nature that man has learned to understand but never to master.

"The Summer Meadows" a fictional memoir by Robert Nathan, author of "Portrait of Jennie" and "The Enchanged Voyage" is a delicate and entrancing novel of a man and his wife on a magical journey.

In "Retreat With Honor," by Josephine Lawrence, a spirited widow of 51 is persuaded to supervise a retirement community for people of moderate means. What follows is a lighthearted chronicle of the community's struggle during its first five years. If you like Ms. Lawrence's work, we have four or more of her books in the library. Help yourself.

Postcript: The recent death of Columnist Stewart Alsop from terminal cancer brings into sharper focus his highly readable and courageous book, "A Stay of Execution: A Sort of Memoir," which has received considerable circulation at the library since we added it to our shelves several months ago. You may find it thoughtprovoking and even inspirational.

Dr. J. Patrick Figley will occupy the pulpit of the Sanibel Community Church the two coming Sundays, June 16 and 23. Dr. Figley got his B.A. degree from Stetson University in 1961, and his Master's Degree from Lexington Theological Seminary in 1968. He received his Doctor of Ministry from the same school in 1973.

He is now associate director of the Episcopal Counseling Center, Tampa, FL, where his responsibilities include therapy-marriage, family, group, individual, public relations and program development. He comes highly recommended by some of his parishioners who attended his services in Tampa and now tesides on Sanibel.


