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Action Committee Holds Fact Finding Meetings

The Action Committee of the Sanibel-Captiva Chamber of Commerce held two fact-finding meetings this past week. Tuesday (too late for our deadline) they met with Mr. Harris of the County Planning Board to continue discussion on the Islands' density situation, and last Friday, they held a fact-finding meeting to garner more information about the Water Association's needs and action.

"In Friday's meeting," said Frank Vellake, vice chairman of the committee, "we discussed the situation with Jim Robeson. Of course, Dave Holtzman, on behalf of the Chamber of Commerce, had endorsed the Water Association's action at the County Commissioners' meeting two weeks ago.

"We (the Action Committee) actually do not endorse any action by anyone." he continued. "It is our function to find facts and make recommendations to the

Chamber Board. They either then ask for more information, or act, one way or the other, on our recommendation."

For those who may have been on vacation or in hiding for the past few months and weeks, the Island Water Association asked the County Commissioners for permission to build another water tank to ensure an adequate supply of water for consumers next season. The Commission refused.

The Water Association then placed a moratorium on all future connections, which, in essence, stops building. The reason for this was that the Association's prime responsibility is to its present subscribers. It will honor all commitments made before the moritorium ... if the connection fee has already been paid, the connection will be made. Other than that, no water connections can be made until the second tank is installed.



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



SANIBEL POST OFFICE BECOMES FIRST CLASS

Postmaster Adams announced this week that, effective June 22, the Sanibel Post Office will become first class. This new classification is based on increased receipts and consequent volume of mail. Each year the volume increases by approximately 30 over the previous year.

Adams states that Sanibel is growing so fast that it is no longer possible for clerks to know each customer and where he lives as it was not so long ago. Mail must now be sorted by address. Postal regulations do not provide for directory service on ordinary first class mail so it is mandatory that all letters be properly addressed to achieve timely delivery. Post Office Box customers should have correct box number, and those receiving their mail by carrier should use their county assigned street number. Condominium customers mail should bear the customer's name, condominium name, unit number or building number or letter and street address.

Adams further stated that Sanibel has more than its share of customers with the same name and initials, not just Smiths and Jones either; surprisingly enough there are several with uncommon names. "Imagine," Adams said, "when these customers' mail arrives on Sanibel with no street address or box number the dilemma for our friendly and dedicated postal clerks at Sanibel Post Office.

The Postmast went on to say that rural route and box numbers are no longer valid addresses. Now street addresses are assigned by the county. Applications for street addresses may be obtained at the Sanibel Post Office. Some customers have moved to a new Sanibel address, or been assigned a street address, or have rented a post office box but have not advised their banks, publishers, correspondents, creditors, utility company, social security administration or retirement system of their new correct address. Forms for this purpose may be obtained at the Sanibel Post Office. Cooperation in this matter will aid the Sanibel Post Office to give the best possible postal service.

STATE ATTORNEY SEEKS RE-ELECTION

State Attorney Joseph D'Alessandro, announced yesterday that he is seeking re-election as State Attorney of the Twenthieth Judicial Circuit of Florida. D'Alessandro was appointed State Attorney in July of 1969 after having served from 1967 to 1969 as Assistant State Attorney in Lee County. In 1970, he was re-elected to the full four year term without opposition from either party. The State of Florida Jaycees in 1970 named D'Alessandro Florida's Outstanding American. In 1972, he was elected to the board of directors of the Prosecuting Attorneys Association and in 1973 was elected secretary to the State Attorney's Association of Florida.

in announcing for re-election. D'Alessandro stated that in addition to prosecuting criminals in court he had expanded the operation of his office into investigation of white-collar crimes, welfare frauds, and consumer frauds committed upon the citizens of this area. He stated that he felt that he had created an energetic staff upon which the citizens of this circuit could depend upon and had included his office obtaining the first illegal dredging felony conviction in Florida, and the filing of various civil injunctions to protect the public waters of this state. He stated that he would continue in his efforts to get stronger legislation to protect the citizens against the criminals.

At the last local delegation hearings, D'Alessandro had proposed several new criminal laws which included increasing the penalties against anyone convicted of breaking into an occupied house in the night time. He stated that he believed that the trust that law enforcement had in his office was well shown by the numerous joint cases that he had worked with local, state, and federal law enforcement agencies including investigators from the saff of the organized crime subcommittee of the United States Senale.

In 1973, the State Attorney's office became a member of the Florida Intelligence Unit which is a unit of 56 state and local agencies in Ftorida involved in the investigation of organized crime and smuggling of bulk narcotics.

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

FIRST ANIMALS BORN AT SEA WORLD OF FLORIDA

There's a big blue box in a corner of the Mamology Lab at Sea World of Florida. If you sneak a peak inside, you'll come nose to bill with the park's fir-stborn: two tiny Canada Goslings (that's Webster:an for baby geese.)

Open the door and they'll come peeping and waddling out to greet you on tiny legs that require plop-down rest periods every three seconds. And it you offer an open hand, the little yellow fuzzballs will come climbing aboard for all the cuddling and cooing you care to

Itchee and Naco were born recently to parent Canada Geese who are residents of the wildlife exhibit adjacent to Sea world's Pacific Tide Pool. The don't seem bothered in the least by having very unCanadian names: Itchee is Japanese for Number One and Naeco is Ocean spelled backwards. They were named by Mammology Dept. staffers at the park.

Because the exhibit where they were born is inhabited by dozens of varieties of ducks, geese and swans, the babies were removed after hatching to the safety and

special care of the laboratory. Here they will grow in ideal physical conditions while becoming "imprinted" to man. When the pair is returned to their exhibit home, they will be in constant contact with park guests, feeding tamely from out-stretched hands.

The Canada Goose is second only to swans in size and is easily recognizable with its brownish-gray body, long black neck or "stocking" and white cheek patches.

It is widely respected by bird lovers and followers of Audubon who attribute it with sagacity, wariness, strength and fidelity -- characteristics collectively possessed in the same degree by no other

The Canada Goose mates for life and is believed to live without a mate should its partneradie or be killed. They are highly protective of their young, and ganders have been known to commit suicide by dive-bombing at would-be nest intruders.

,At present Itchee and Naeco have no such heavy problems on their minds. their biggest challenge seems to be getting out the aviary door without having a wayward foot edge into the water dish. Unlike most waterfowl, Canada Geese are quite terrestrial with some spending considerably more time on land than in the water. Having wet webbed feet is just not their cup of tea!

Itchee and Naeco will soon be on display with their mom and dad at Sea World of Florida, open 365 days a year at the intersection of Interstate 4 and the Martin Anderson Bee Line Expressway, just six minutes north of Walt Disney




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Children's Center Opens

*To anyone strolling along the bayshore near the Sanibel end of the causeway there would seem to be a whirlwind of activity around the faded white frame building that has sat there idly for so long. Workmen, carpenters dashing in and out, painters busily plying their trade have created a transformation. Inside a small puppet stage and a corner loft, perfect for sitting with a story book, are only two of the charming new features.

If it hadn't been for a (astminute hitch due to the lighting fixtures not being installed in time, the Children's Center of the Islands would have opened Monday, June 19, as scheduled.

Nevertheless, "one day lat e is just in time" thought twenty-five excited 214 to 5-year-olds, as they trooped in the doors on Tuesday to begin the Center's first six-week program entitled "A Child's Summer on the Islands."

Plans for a permanent center for young children on the Islands to complement Sanibel Elementary School have long been in the making. But without the combined support of the entire community, the Children's Center would have been impossible. Donations and contributions have poured in. A dinner-dance held in April at the Island Beach Club and a recent ice cream social at Periwinkle Place netted \$2000 for the fund. And the frantic-paced renovation of the site into a bright. imaginative place for young children was largely accomplished by assisting island and off-island businesses.

Much of the enthusiasm is prompted no doubt by the Center's peaceful. spacious setting. When Francis Bailey made his old General Store available, one of Sanibel's oldest landmarks. closed since 1966, was put back into use. Until the new causeway was built in 1962, all the mail came by boat to

Bailey's store. Today the old pier on San Carlos Bay is a favorite spot for anglers, and many come just to watch the gulls, egrets and other shore birds darting along the wharf.


Now the grounds around the store shaded by fall coconut paims have been turned into a large cutdoor play area with a merry-go-round. Inside children learn their numbers and letters in the old mail room and store.

The Islands themselves offer ideal learning situations, and head teacherdirector, Elizabeth Frothingham, intends to use them to the fullest. Weekly trips to the Sanibel Public Library for story hour, nature walks through Ding Darling Sanctuary, and visits to the Lighthouse and to the beaches are scheduled.

But the Islanders are another important resource as well, explains project director, Judy Workman. "The Islands are loaded with so many talented people. We want our children to learn about the Island from them."

The Center is in capable hands with Ms. Frothingham and her staff. She brings with her over ten years of experience setting up and directing children's schools. With a M.A. in feaching from Harvard University, she was the founder of International Play Group, Inc. in NY, which today has over 600 children from 112 different nations.

And after this summer session, what lies in store for the Children's Center? Ms. Frothingham enthusiastically outlines a full year program beginning in September with afternoons set aside for older children on the Islands, including thase just visiting. Then hapefully the Center could become a Learning Resource Center, making its learning materials available to other schools in Lee County.

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



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

Like everything else about the Library since the move last October to the new building on Palm Ridge Road, registration for the children's program was higher than ever before; 20 last year was the previous record.


Because the new building has so much space, and a handsome conference-exhibit room, the children were divided this year into two groups.



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
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


TALLAHASSEE - Good clear thinking and common sense play a great part in the rules of the waterway. We would like to impress you at the beginning to keep in mind one important signal. The

danger signal where inland rules apply is four short blasts or toots. When you hear this signal, you must slow down and maneuver as necessary or stop until the danger condition, or confusion, has been resolved. Another boat that has the right of way at all times is a sail boat under sail, reason: they lack the means of complete control that may be required for decisive and timely action. Again common sense; the sail boat does not have the right of way over large vessels.

There are three types of



situations between two approaching boats that require whistle signals to be given. These are: meeting, crossing, and overtaking. Meeting headon or nearly so, as in driving a car, you stay to your right. One boat gives a short blast and the other boat answers with the same signal. Now each skipper knows what the other is going to do; and they have confirmed it. Control your wake and proceed. keeping in mind when meeting

head on, always pass port to port if possible. (Port and Starboard; facing the bow of your boat, starboard side is to your right, and port side is to your left).


There will be times when passing from a head-on course it will be impossible to pass, port to port without completely changing courses. When this situation occurs, don't count on the other skipper to know this; instead, give him two short blasts. He'll answer with two, and you'll both be relieved that you understand each other, and

then pass starboard to starboard, controlling your wake. If there is a confusion about the signal or intent, remember four short blasts is the danger signal, and each boat must come to a stop until the situation is clarified.

A crossing situation is similar to meeting another car at an intersection that has no stop sign. As ashore, the vehicle to your right is privileged, in fact, he must continue his course and common sense speed. Inland rules do not require signals in this situation, but the boat on the right (privileged) should signal his intent to maintain his course by one short horn blast. The burdened boat should reply with a short blast signalling his intent to slow down, and-or change course to pass astern of the other boat. A safe skipper always avoids horse-play. He is a quick thinker and uses good common sense; he avoids situations that could cause an accident, therefore, to him, Safe Boating Is No Accident.

This Week at the Savibel Library

Annie Dillard's "Pilgrim at Tinker Creek" may become a classic that will stand beside the works of Thoreau or Rachel Carson's "The Sea Around Us." And then, it may not. But regardless of its destination, oblivion or immortality, it is a book sorely needed in our times, a book of beauty written by a strange girl who is obsessed by an insatiable desire to "see" the world around her --- everything from the roar ofa flood to the emergence of a moth. Annie Dillard lives by a creek, Tinker Creek, in Virginia's Blue Ridge. Of herself she says, "I am no scientist. I am a wanderer with a background in theology and a penchant for quirky facts --- in nature I find grace tangles in a rapture of violence; I find an intimate landscape whose forms are fringed in death, I find mystery, newness, and a kind of exhuberant, spendthrift energy." That she does; that she does! The book is not fiction. It covers a year in the author's life; a year far removed from any year that you and I have ever known.

To leap from Tinker Creek to "Connally, the Adventures of Big Bad John" seems almost sacrilegious, but a library has no choice. It caters to the tastes of its patrons. Charles Ashman, an independent investigative biographer, is the author who tells the story of John B. Connally, Jr., the Texan who may aspire to the Presidency. The book is written with all the verve of Ashman's last outing, "Kissinger," and it probes deeply into the life and career of this poor boy turned millionaire, Democrat turned Republican.

We have just received a second biography of current interest, "Just a Country Lawyer," by Paul R. Clancy. This one tells the story of Senator Sam Ervin the North Carolinian folk-hero of the Watergate hearings. The biography is objective and gives us a comprehensive account of Ervin's life and career. Clancy is a Washington correspondent for the Charlotte Observer.

The sub-title in "Tender Loving Greed" sums up the object and thrust of the book -- "How the Incredibly Lucrative Nu, sing Home Industry is Exploiting America's Old People and Defrauding Us All." The author, Mary Adelaide Mendelson, has an impressive list of credentials a yard long, guaranteeing her observations to be serious and believeable to the reader who lacks background for judgment. This book is of particular interest to us here in Florida where nursing homes abound in every city and hamlet. It may answer a lot of questions you have wanted to ask and did not know to whom you should go for answers.

We finally reach the lighter side of the week's library news with "Slayride," a novel of suspense by Dick Francis. This British writer of race horse mystery novels takes us to Norway for the setting of his latest adventure. An official investigator for the English Jockey Club is looking into the disappearance of a British steeplechase jockey who took with him the day's receipts from Ovrevoll track. The result is a blending of sex and violence, revelation and mystery.

"Creative Divorce" deals with the gut feelings of men and women facing the need to build new lives in the wake of loneliness, guilt, anger, rejection, and a sense of failure. Author Mel Krantzler, a divorce therapist, takes a new and positive approach to this painful period, perceiving it as a time of transition that can lead to growth. Of "Creative Divorce" the publisher declares "it can save your marriage --- the next one."

A woman's battle against her husband's alcoholism is the theme of "A Sensitive, Passionate Man" by Barbara Mahoney. It is a novel of love and frustration, a survival story.



Two miles up Sanibel Island from the Causeway Road



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
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

A Grain Of Sea Salt by betzi abram



The winner of the first annual Grain of Sea Salt contest is Charlotte Russell of Fort Myers Beach. Mrfs. Russell is a seasoned sailor (if you'll forgive the expression) and has even planned menus for several trans-Pacific voyages. I will tell you more about her next week. In the meantime, her list:

Here goes for a good list for a fairly good-sized boat with a crew of four, ice refrigeration only but ample storage space. Plans include several stops for extra ice and food, an occasional meal at a restaurant and expectations of good fishing and plenty of conch for chowder. Seasonings and flavorings:

Salt, pepper, mustard, curry powder, ketchup, horseradish, sauce, thyme (for conch chowder), Karo syrup, French dressing, 2 large jars mayonnaise, Crisco (for frying fish), flour for gravies, pickle relish, dill pickles and olives.

Beverages: 3 lbs. drip coffee and 4 jars of instant, 2 large jars instant tea with lemon, 2 jars Pream, powdered milk, 2 lbs. sugar (in a jar); six-packs of juices: 4 Clammato, 4 grapefruit, 6 apple juice, 1 prune juice; a dozen cokes, dozen gingerales and a dozen Tang. Canned Fruits:

4 cans grapefruit sections, 4 Kadota figs, 4 baked apples, 4 applesauce, 4 peaches and 2 pears.

Fresh fruits & vegetables:

Bag of oranges and grapefruit; bananas, onions, lemons, potatoes, 2 iceberg lettuce, carrots, cabbage, corn on cob (use up first), and tomatoes.

Breakfast and lunches: I box pancake flour, I of grits; 4 nipped beef (make with mushroom oup), 4 canned beef hash (we brown one side, turn over, make nests for the eggs, cover with foil and poach). 2 pkgs breakfast sausage, 1 lb. fresh bacon; 4 cans bacon, 4 doz. eggs, 1 jar apple butter, I jar peanut butter, marmalade and jam, 2 cans brown bread, 2 loaves unsliced pumpernickel (keeps well), 5 pkgs English muffins, 4 pkgs cornbread mix (can be cooked on top of stove), 4 white bread (Bahamian bread is delicious; buy it in Bimini, Nassau. etc.), a coffee cake for first morning out. crackers - saltines (small pkgs keep fresher), sea biscuits in a tin, other snack crackers of your choice, tinned potato chips, large round of good cheese, I doz. sardines, half a dozen funa

fish, 2 cans salmon, 2 canned corned beef for sandwiches - also good steamed on top of boiled dinner of potatoes, cabbage, carrots and onions; and one Libby's luncheon tongue. Dinners:

Bring a baked ham, a sliced turkey ready to serve and a large pot roast or stew ready to heat for the first night out. Also a frozen steak (or a corned beef simmered the day before; 2 canned hams, 4 canned whole chickens, 4 chili without beans (excellent in a new spaghetti) 4 beef stew, canned shrimp (curry it in mushroom soup). Try grilling a large piece of steak fish brushed with mayonnaise and mustard. A Chinese dinner, 3 cans port and gravy, 3 beef and gravy and 4 chicken ala king.

There are freeze dried combinations, some quite good, that can be purchased at Army and Navy stores. These are particularly handy when storage room or weight is a problem.

Rice, noodles, spaghetti, sweet potatoes (canned), 6 canned green beans (Del Montes are well flavored), 6 cans whole tomatoes (good chilled on a hot day), 6 cans peas, 6 corn, 4 lima beans, 3 Hanover beans, 4 asparagus, 4 kidney beans, 4 beets (the last 4 items good for salads), 6 onions, 4 cans baked beans, dates dried mushrooms, peanuts, cookies, one pound-cake, 2 canned Brandy cakes (Terrara) candy, cooking sherry, pudding mixes, snacks cans, etc. Souos:

Onion soup mix, vegetable mix, 3 Snow's clam chowder and 3 canned shrimp soup (just add the left over fish from your big catch in either of the last two), 8 mushroom, 6 chicken, 6 cream of celery soup for sauces, curries, etc., a iar of bouillon cubes and half doz. consomme (for Bull shots!?).

My response to this grocery list for 3 weeks sailing in the Bahamas was "Yum, yum, when do we start eating!" It's even a good list for home in the hurricane season. Casazza, Seyfarth and Nellis were unanimous in judging it a balanced, nutritious and INTERESTING assortment of foods --- Warren even joking that he might not lose the 15 lbs. he usually lost on such a trip if Charlotte Russell went along as Chef, and Fritz commenting that the only possible addition he could see to such a list was a remedy for snake bite - which turns out to be Rum!

YET ANOTHER NOTE ON FLOOD INSURANCE


