## Goings On About Town (FM)


Well they certainly have been busy in Fort Myers this week about the Island. Yesterday (too late for our deadline) Zee Butler presented a request for the incorporation referendum for Sanibel Island to the County Commissioners. If the commission approves the referendum will be placed on the November 5 election ballot. More about that next week.

On Monday the Lee County Zoning Board approved a request of Gordon Tracey and Velma Ridge for a 95 unit travel trailer park on 22 acres next to the Sanctuary, over the objection of the Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board. Oh well, it looks like somebody up there is really pushing.

## Sanibel-Captiva Lions Clean-Up Day

About 30 dedicated Lions and volunteers developed their own version of the "Sanibel Bends" Saturday, August 24, as they participated in the semi-annual Lions Clean-Up Day. They weren't rewarded with a prize shell for their bending efforts -- their reward was knowing they had helped make Sanibel a bit cleaner and safer for everyone.

The workers met in front of Bailey's Store at 9 a.m., Saturday, and received their



bags and assignments from Bob Potts. Then they fanned out to the main roads and beach areas of three-fourths of the Island.

About 32 bags of trash were collected and taken to a waiting garbage truck donated by Sanibel Disposal.

## Applications Now Being Accepted for Children's Center

The Children's Center of the Islands aunounces that applications are now being accepted for the morning pre-school for the 1974-75 school year which begins Wednesday, September 4 at 9 a.m.

The pre-school is for children ages  $2\frac{1}{2}-5$  years of age. The program is open to children of the Islands, children of people working on the Islands and children visiting the Islands for a month or more.

The Center is located at Bailey's old store on San Carlos Bay. Applications may be obtained by writing the Children's Center, Box 352, Sanibel, FL 33957 or by contacting Mrs. Sandra Kessler at the Island Apothecary. The first month's tuition of \$60.00 is \*payable in advance and should accompany the application. Full or partial scholarships are available. The Children's Center will also conduct "Island Adventures," an afternoon recreational program for young children, which will begin Monday, November 4, 1974. The hours will be from 1 to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. This program is open to anyone living on or visiting Sanibel or Captiva Islands. The fee will be \$2.00 the first hour, and \$1.00 every hour thereafter for those not enrolled in the morning pre-school. Information concerning either program may be obtained by contacting the Center or by calling 472-2651.

Incidently, the Center can use volunteer help on a daily or weekly basis to assist the two teachers with the school.





### 8-29-74 POST OFFICE ANNOUNCEMENT

Sanibel Postmaster Paul Adams announced that in keeping with the Postal Service policy of improving service to customers that effective Satuday, August 31, 1974, there will be four rural delivery routes instead of the present two routes.

This will mean that most customers will get earlier service. A few will be a little later than at present. It is suggested that outgoing mail be placed in your boxes for carrier pickup no later than 10:30 a.m. until you learn your carrier's new schedule.

The only proper addresses are one of the following:

1) A county assigned street address. 2) A Post Office box number or letter.

3) A motel or condominium complete with unit or apartment number.

4) An established business.

5) A trailer park (with assigned box number if applicable).

6) General Delivery (for short time transients with no other local address).

If customers do not have county assigned street addresses an application may be obtained at the Sanibel Post Office.

### MEET YOUR CANDIDATES FOR LEE COUNTY COMMISSION

4) Will you support protection of wetlands, both fresh and salt water, for water retention, recharge flood protection, fisheries and wildlife production, and recreation for man?


5) Will you vote to maintain present zoning in all mangrove areas, particularly in Estero Bay (Troutman's properties)?

### Preparing and Cooking your snook

Now that you have your snook home and weighed, you can begin the fun part, cleaning him. You'll need a sharp fillet knife and a place to work. If your fillet knife doesn't have a point then get a separate skinning knife with a good sharp point.

Put the fish on his side and make a cut just below the gills with your fillet knife. Be careful not to cut through the backbone. Watch out for the sharp gill plate which can badly lacerate your hand. Have the upper part or dorsal fin facing you. Now zip up along the backbone with your knife and cut off the whole side. Hold onto the tail of your fillet and insert the blade between skin and meat. Just cut along the skin and it will peel right off.

Snook should always be skinned and never scaled, as the skin, when left on, makes the snook taste terrible. I am told that years ago, when snook were caught, they brought them home to use as fertilizer. Finally someone discovered that they tasted great when skinned.

Your fillets can be wrapped in freezer wrap and stored for a few months before they loose their freshness. Wash them in fresh running water before wrapping or eating them.

Below are some local recipes for snook.

### **Fresh Captiva Fried Snook**

Wash and cut snook into serving size pieces

Roll in a mixture of half cornmeal and half flour, season to taste

Put about 1/2 inch of oil in a frying pan and heat

Add snook and cook until a fork slides through them easily, turn once

When serving, offer local key lime or calamondin halves, to enhance the flavor and make it a truly local treat.

#### Snook Salad

There are as many recipes for snook salad as there are for chicken salad. Any chicken salad recipe can be used. We use the following method:

Poach one fillet of snook and let it cool. In a mixing bowl, place about 1/4 cup of mayonnaise, a few tablespoons of pickle relish, one chopped onion and a stalk or two of chopped celery. Add bit size pieces of the cold snook. Stir and season to taste. Add more mayonnaise if you like. Serve on a bed of lettuce.

#### **Deep Fried Snook in Beer Batter**

Snook should be cut into narrow strips with the grain. Batter:

2 eggs beaten until fluffy 3/4 cup flour 1 Tbs. cornstarch 1/2 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. baking powder Mix all the ingredients, a few lumps won't matter. Heat some oil to 350 degrees. Dip snook in batter with a slotted spoon or tongs, let it drain a bit and then drop it into the oil. The batter should be rather thin. Cook a few at a time, turning to brown on both sides. Drain on paper towels and eat as soon as possible. This can be cooked at the table, Japanese style.

Snook can also be barbecued and smoked. Try some of your own family recipes, using snook. It's hard to go wrong.





## This Week at

## the Sanibel Library

This week's column could be sized up rather accurately as a potpourri. We have something for everyone.

The first is an announcement of more than usual significance, especially for library friends who remember Bernard DeVoto's controversial column that ran in Harper's Magazine for 20 years. It was called "The Easy Chair," and the title of Wallace Stegner's biography of DeVoto is a play on the column title as a metaphorical view of DeVoto's life --- "The Uneasy Chair." The book is an attempt by Stegner to recreate Benny DeVoto as he really was --- flawed, brilliant, provocative, outrageous, often wrong, often spectacularly right, stimulating, infuriating, but never dull. The book is particularly useful for one who wants to follow a popular thinker's mind through American intellectual trends of the '30s, '40s, and '50s.

Next is quite a change of pace from DeVoto: "The Four Seasons Cookbook" by Charlotte Adams with special consultant James Beard. This is a beautiful book and it reveals recipes of the famous Four Seasons Restaurant; and, like the restaurant's menu, the recipes are arranged according to seasons on the idea that certain foods are best enjoyed in their own time.

Speaking of beautiful books, we now have "The Marvels of Animal Behavior," published by the National Georgraphic Society. With 419 illustrations, 390 in color, and with an understandable text, the book tells of wonders as tiny as amoebas forming a society, or as massive as the migrations of beasts and birds.

Still on the theme of beauty, we are indebted to John S. Williams, of South Winds, Sanibel, for five incomparable books published by the Sierra Club. They are: "Summer Island" by Eliot Porter; "Everglades" by Patricia Caulfield; "Ansel Adams, the Eloquent Light" by Nancy Newall; "No Man Apart," photos of the Big Sur Coast; and "Time and the River Flowing: Grand Canyon" by Francois Leydet.

From the unique collection of the Smithsonian Institution comes a priceless photographic chronicle of a proud and abused people: "Indians," by Joanna Cohan Scherer. This Book-of-the-Month Club Alternate reveals North American Indian life, 1847-1928 in 140 extraordinary photographs with full descriptive captions.

Politicians and statisticians will both love our new reference book on politics: "The Almanac of American Politics, the Senators, the Representatives, Their Records, States and Districts, 1974." In 1,240 pages you will find out everything you want to know (well, most everything) about anybody in Congress. According to a review in the Miami Herald, the Almanac compilers did a poor job in updating Florida politics. "Whoever wrote the revised profile of the state could not, or so it seems, quite figure out what to say," the Herald declares.

With the popularity on tennis as an active or spectator sport constantly on the increase, we thought some of you might enjoy a useful little book, "Tennis, Anyone?" by Dick Gould, who is tennis coach at Stanford University. In addition to being a "how to" book, it has several very informative chapters such as "Background to Tennis" and "Glossary of Tennis Terms." Oh, yes, there is a bibliography too.

Here's one for the ladies: "The Goss Women" by R. C. Cassill. The author explores the relationship between sex and power. In portraying Dean Goss, Cassill has created a flesh-and-blood character of a famous artist who uses his sexual and emotional involvements with women to renew his energies and his art. Goss finally comes to grips with the reality of his life when he falls in love with his biographer, Susan Vail, and her uninhibited daughter.



Such embarrassing contretemps would not occur IF there had been a flag to fly indicating "Do Not Disturb," and IF Colonel Blimp had known what the flag meant. Unfortunately, it would seem that many boaters don't know what flags to fly, when to fly them, where to fly them or what they mean when they see them on other people's boats.

There's an old gag that if you want to live dangerously, float a diver's warning flag near where you are diving or on the boat that's anchored to "watch over you." Sure as shooting at least one other boat will come buzzing up to find out what the red flag with the diagonal white line means. And that means that underwater you run the jolly risk of being chewed up into small bits by his propeller.

There is also the unofficial but universally recognized custom of flying the U. S. Ensign (the flag, not the guy) upside down to denote distress and the need for help. When I say "universally" I mean all over the country, not that everyone recognizes the signal. All too many persons are ignorant of distress signals including those people who will cheerily wave back as they speed past a disabled boat where the skipper is waving his arms over his head for help.

Boats are small and marinas or yacht clubs are often crowded. The courtesy and consideration which true sailors expect from and give to each other are not just arbitrary affectations. They are a time-honored way to communicate, to respect, to assist and to enjoy your fellows of the sea.



Charles F. Chapman, whose classic book, "Piloting, Seasmanship and Small Boat Handling" is often called the sailor's bible, has many pages on the proper use of flags, including how to "dress" your boat for official or gala events. It also includes such wry comments as 'Striking colors' is a naval term meaning surrender. Never use in yachting." He even gives you the details, as for instance that flags must be hoisted smartly, but lowered ceremoniously.

There are certain persnickety attention to details - necessary for official or naval boats - that really need not concern the average boater. But that doesn't mean you should deprive yourself altogether when you "read" the flags on another boat and realize how much they tell you about it. Sometimes, of course, you can look at the dirty, tattered rag flapping on the bow of somebody's boat, and you don't need flag-code to tell you that he's probably got gas in his bilge, barnacles on his bottom and more good intentions than good sense.




