The Sanibel Community Association is planning a big political rally for Tuesday night, November 26 at the Community House for 8 p.m.


All registered voters are urged to come and meet their candidates face to face. Every candidate who has filed to run for City of Sanibel Commissioner has been invited to attend and all have accepted. Each candidate has been given a list of questions to be answered and three minutes in which to do so. No questions will be allowed from the floor during the meeting. However, all candidates will remain after the formal meeting to meet individually with anyone who would like to ask specific questions.

"We are doing this as a public service," states Dr. John Willard, president of the Community Association. "We realize there are a lot of new voters on the Island and a lot of these candidates are new and now that we have decided for Home Rule we need to get acquainted on a first name basis with those who will be running our Island. That's why the directors of the Association held a special meeting after last Tuesday's dinner meeting and decided to do it. We have asked John Shepherd to organize it and act as moderator."

Special arrangements have been made to handle the parking as a very large crowd is expected. Tuesday, Nov. 26, 8 p.m. at the Community House.

In this and next week's issues of the ISLANDER, we are presenting all (or at least as many as we can get hold of) candidates who are running for city council in the Dec. 3 election.

Many moons ago, 'way before incorporation was even a gleam in anyone's eye, we told Francis Bailey that if he ever ran for mayor, we'd support him. Outside of that original statement, the ISLANDER is presenting all candidates without prejudice. We're not doing any endorsing, since we figure that's up to you to do with your votes.

Gordon Tracey is a young man of twenty-five years who was raised and who has lived his entire life on Sanibel A very outspoken young man, Mr. Tracey purports to represent youth and the working man on Sanibel.

Mr. Tracey graduated from Edison Community College with an A.A. While enrolled there, he served as President and Vice-President of Circle K, freshman and sophomore Señator in the Student Senate, Inner Club Council Chairman, and he is listed in 'Who's Who of American Junior Colleges."

After receiving his A.A., Mr. Tracey attended Stetson University in Deland, Florida, from which he graduated last year with a B.A. in History and Political Science.

He will be part owner and manager of the New Sanibel Trailer Park, which, barring complications, should open by next fall. At the present time, Mr. Tracey is night watchman and construction office manager of the New Trailer Park, where he resides.

When asked about his motives for running for city council, Mr. Tracey stated: "It's common knowledge that I was against incorporation because of the red tape involved. I'm completely behind planning and zoning; don't get me wrong. I'd just like to see the people have more of a say in terms of repealing taxes and ordinances. I'd like to see the council and the people in general have more control of their city manager. The way it's set up in the charter, they can't. We voted for home-rule - I want to see home-rule run by home-people."

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


TO THE ISLANDER:





CAPE PLAYERS KEEP 'EM LAUGHING

The climax of 'See How They Run,' as performed by the Cape Players, was evidenced by the audience's laughter. The play is a very complicated comedy with all sorts of misunderstandings - several people hiding in the closet, a man in his skivvies chasing a Russian spy through the house, three men each saying he's Penelope's husband, and a Bishop (Penelope's uncle) coming to visit amidst this confusion.

Betty McCharen, who plays Ida, the maid, is positively dynamic. Even her quickest glance and gesture are in character. She's a cross between the wit of Carol Burnett and the housekeeper of Maude.

Nancy Murin, from the first lines, is such a righteous (yet hinting of gossipy) citizen that you really become aggravated with her. She smacks of old-maid "auntishness." Although, as Miss Skillon, she's never had anything to drink before that night, as a novice drunk, she has probably the most convincing and comic drunk act I've seen since Dean Martin.

In the role of Penelope, Penny Blom made her debut. This must be why she spoke her lines so mechanically, devoid of any expression. A person viewing this can't get lost in what's going on onstage, as one's constantly reminded that it's just a play. Perhaps with more experience she'll be able to have some personality come across.

A parody of Sherlock Holmes was played by Hal Stott. Of course his tone portrayed this, but more important to this part were his movements. He slowly. decisively stepped up and leaned into his witnesses while asking his questions (in the same manner) when trying to establish the identity of the Russian.

Most actors were in character throughout the play. Excluding Miss Blom, it was a professional performance. It's too late for you to see "See How They Run," as it ran last weekend, but I would urge you to see the Cape Players in 'Hello, Dolly,' in January. You'll see some outstanding performances.

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
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
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
NEW SANIBEL TRAILER PARK

In the weeks to come, operations will be progressing more rapidly on the new Sanibel Trailer Park. The park stretches from Dunlop Road to the back of the Martin property on Pine Ridge Road and is bounded by the Ding Darling Wildlife Preserve on the back side. The entrance road is off of Dunlop Road, across Periwinkle Way from the Gasparilla Restaurant.


The 22.8 acre tract of land is to be divided into 95 units with each having a 2500 square foot lot. The building architecture will be designed to give the impression of a Polynesian or tropical island setting. Aside from the four-acre lake for swimming and boating, the new Sanibel Trailer Park will feature full recreational facilities such as a heated swimming pool and a recreation room complete with ping pong tables and other divertissements.

The proposed trailer park passed the County Zoning Board with a four-to-one recommendation this past August. At the October meeting of the County Commissioners, the project was once again approved by a vote of four-to-one. The final plan approval is still pending. This requires that building permits, drainage permits, and the like be submitted en toto for perusal and final approval. The mechanical drawings of sewer systems and other technical fine points are being handled by Howell F. Davis and Associates, engineers.

Co-owners Velna Ridge and Gordon Tracey are hopeful that the new Sanibel Trailer Park can be open for operations by the fall of 1975. Mr. Tracey plans to manage the park himself.

POSTAL SERVICE REITERATES UNPAID DELIVERY POLICY

Postmaster Paul Adams today reminded customers that effective Sunday, November 17, the U.S. Postal Service intends to discontinue delivering mail on which there is no postage.

Postmaster Adams said the new policy was instituted because of the high costs being incurred by the Postal Service in its attempt to deliver such mail. Officials estimate that such costs total approximately \$18 million annually.

In announcing the new policy last month, Postmaster General E. T. Klassen said, "It is unfair to burden the vast majority of mailers with costs created by the few who mail without prepayment of postage.'

After November 17, letters mailed without postage will be returned to sender if there is a return address, or to the dead letter office, instead of being delivered to the address as postage due mail as has been the custom. Postal officials will attempt to find the sender of unpaid mail and return if for a slight fee, if there is no return address.

"Naturally we realize that someone could inadvertently forget to put a stamp on a letter or that a stamp could come off prior to cancellation, so we urge mailers to be sure to include a correct return address on their mail," Postmaster Adams said.





Its members are so involved, its officers so dedicated to enlarging the opportunities and the satisfactions. They not only have racing under NAYRU rules with CMCS handicapping, but they offer the smaller boats a chance to compete under other handicapping systems such as M.O.R.C. Now they have added another trophy in the Windiammer class.

The handicaps for this class will be established by a rather simple and free measurement factor and will not affect the regular CMCS handicap rating. Performance ratings will not be a factor for Windjammer handicaps which will be established by LOA. LWL and three sail measurements which can be made on your lawn with a tape measure. If you have a production boat, the manufacturers LOA and LWL are acceptable --and there are no restrictions as to boat length.

For an additional fee of about \$1.00, you indicate your choice of competing for the Windjammer trophy when you send in your CMCS race entry

form. You will, in effect, then be sailing two races in one as it is not possible to enter the Windjammer class only. An added bonus is that you CAN win in both



Francis Balley

Francis Bailey, co-owner and manager of Bailey's General Store, has lived on Sanibel all his life. The elected Commissioner of the Lee County Mosquito Control Board at present, Mr. Bailey is the only candidate for city council to hold an elected post.

Mr. Bailey also serves the community in his capacity as Board member of both the Sanibel-Captiva and Ft. Myers-Lee County Chambers of Commerce, Board member of the Sanibel Community Association (of which he is also past president), member of the Conservation Foundation, and member of the Audubon Society.

In the past, Mr. Bailey has served as a Cub Scout and Boy Scout leader, as Director of Lee Memorial Hospital, as Director of the Lee County Electric Cooperative, and has contributed to the Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board.

When asked his reasons for running, Mr. Bailey replied: "I wouldn't be running if I didn't want to see this island a success. I'm for planned growth, but that doesn't mean I'm for stifling commerce."



Vernon MacKenzie

Vernon G. MacKenzie has lived on Sanibe! for five and a half years. Mr. MacKenzie is the Assistant Surgeon General (Retired) of the United States Public Health Service. He has an engineering degree from M.I.T. and a certificate in Advanced Management from the Harvard Graduate School of Business Administration.

Mr. MacKenzie has worked for more than forty years in planning, carrying out, and directing environmental control programs. After twelve years of engineering research and design in the fields of water pollution control and other sanitary works in Chicago and Detroit, he joined the Public Health Service in 1939. During World War II he was assigned as liaison officer and consultant to the War Production Board on materials allocations for health and sanitation purposes. He also supervised a program to assess and provide national needs for sanitary engineering services and facilities in support of the war effort.

Post-war, Mr. MacKenzie was assigned to the American Mission for Aid to Greece with responsibilities for planning and conducting post-war rehabilitation of health services in Greece.

Greece. From 1948 to 1954, he served as

Officer in Charge of the Sanitary Engineering Center in Cincinnati, Ohio, the major national laboroatory and center for field studies in environmental programs pertaining to health. Mr. MacKenzie spent the last fifteen years of his federal service in Washington, where he served successively as Chief of Environmental Health Research, Developer and Director of the National Air Pollution Control Program, Dleputy Director of the Bureau of Disease Prevention and Environmental Control, and Deputy Administrator of the Consumer Protection and Environmental Control Service.

Mr. MacKenzie also served on various interdepartmental committees and boards, was chief of a scientific exchange mission to the U.S.S.R. in 1962, and served on international committees for development of cooperative environmental research with Germany and Japan. He was a consultant to the World Health Organization from 1960 to 1973.

Since coming to Sanibel, Mr. MacKenzie has been active in the Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board, of which he has served as president for the past three years. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the American Lung. Association of S.W. Florida and has worked in the formation of the Ecological Confederation of S.W. Florida. He is also a member of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, the National Audubon Society, the Nature Conservancy, and the Wildlife Federation.

With respect to his candidacy and his hopes for the Island, Mr. MacKenzie said: "The Islanders have spoken overwhelmingly in the referendum vote for the need to control their own destiny. Members of the new city council will have heavy responsibilities to provide a land-use plan for the Island and to implement it, as well as to gradually improve the municipal services necessary to keep the Island a good place to live."




Mrs. Claire T. Walter




