### PTA RECEIVES REWARD



**AL MUENCH** 

Al Muench was born in Syracuse, New York. He married in 1939-- a union which produced five children in the succeeding years. Before moving to the Island in 1964, Mr. Muench was in the lumber business and worked as a building inspector for the town of Manlius, New York.

Immediately upon moving to Sanibel, Mr. Muench built the Periwinkle Trailer Park, of which he is the owner at this very date. According to Mr. Muench, "With the magic name of Sanibel, the park became an instant success." At the present time, the park is managed by his sons, Gerald and Richard, leaving him free 365 days out of the year--days he hopes to put to good use serving the people of Sanibel.

A past president of the Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Muench is currently a member of Sanibel Tomorrow, the Community Association, the Chamber of Commerce, the Action Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, and the

Sanibel-Captiva Platining Board.
When asked his reasons for running for city council. Mr. Muench said: "There are now twelve Muenches on the Island, six more in the United States Air Force, whose home base is Sanibel, and that's eighteen good reasons to make the quality of life better on Sanibel. We can't go too far this way or too far that way-- we've got to have an even balance. You've got to compromise and cooperate."

For the better part of his working life, Mr. Johnson has been in the printing and bookbinding business. An air force Veteran, he was a four-engine flight instructor while in the service.

Mr. Johnson first visited the

Islands in 1968. In 1971 he built a house on Sanibel and decided to move his business down here from Winnetka about a year and a half ago. He has been the owner and manager of Learning Laboratories, Inc., for the past eight years. The firm is presently stationed near the airport in Fort Myers.

Mr. Johnson is married and has three children: a boy of twenty-tive years. a boy of twenty-three years, and a daughter twenty-one years old who is in college at the present time.

Mr. Johnson is on the Vestry of the Episcopal Church and on the Board of Directors of the Community Association.

In reference to his candidacy. Mr. Johnson stated: "We all moved here for a pretty good reason. I first came to Florida when I was four or five years old. Later, we came to Longbow Key outside of Sarasota and there were two or three hundred residents there at the time. Today it looks like the New York skyline. Not a stitch of foliage to be found. I wouldn't like to see that happen here. But I'm not for blowing up the Causeway Bridge either. There's got to be a happy median and I think planning is the key.'

#### POST OFFICE REMINDERS

Thanks to everyone for the splendid cooperation you have given us during the past year. Once again the Christmas season is here and indications are that this one will be the largest ever. With the prospect of a volume of mail greater than ever before, we request that you mail as early as possible, early in the month - early in the week - early in

As in the past, postal regulations require that, during the month of December, all greeting cards and letter mail placed in rural boxes have the postage affixed. Also, please remember that this year there is a new regulation that requires that cards without postage affixed be returned to sender.

Labels for "Local" and "Out Of Town" bundles of mail are available at the post office or from carriers, if needed. We urge you to use them as they will help to speed delivery.

Christmas greeting cards require a minimum of 10 cents. As most cards

will weigh under 1 ounce, they should be sealed to be treated as first class mail. Cards weighing between 1 and 2 ounces should be marked third class unless additional stamps are attached. Third class will either be forwarded or returned to sender if undeliverable at first address. Customers are reminded to be sure that sufficient postage is on foreign mail. If in doubt, please contact the post office for rates.

In order to avoid delays in the movement of your mail, it is most important that you use zip codes. All parcel post must have zip codes and return addresses. Please check your parcels for zip codes before getting in line at post office windows. A directory is available at the lobby desk for your convenience. Be sure parcels are well wrapped and proper cushioning used. We suggest that you enclose an extra address label and a list of contents inside of the package.

Remember to be sure that your

return addresses (house number and street for rural route customers or P.O. box number for lock box customers). We have observed that many correspondents use the return address to update their address lists.





#### DISTRICT FORESTER LONG INFORMS GARDEN COUNCIL

Urban forestry is a new field geared primarily to helping make a quality urban environment in which people can work and live, according to District Forester Michael Long, who spoke at the Fort Myers-Lee County Garden Council meeting Nov. 15 at the 1st Federal Savings and Loan auditorium on Pondella Road.

Long thanked the garden council for its support in retaining Lee County's urban forestry program.

(The program is partly statefunded and Lee is one of a limited number of Florida counties approved for the program.)

He said the county's urban forester will advise home owners, developers, and commercial enterprises on types of trees to plant and the maintenance program required; will work with civic bodies on tree protection and landscape ordinances; on the development of recreational sites, and with environmental education in the schools.

Long noted that a research program currently underway is studying the possible use of the common "punk" tree as a source of wood for furniture and gun stocks.

Insect and disease diagnosis and control is another facet of the urban forester's work, Long said.

"if you have a tree that appears to be dying, call us. Don't wait until your tree is dead. Maybe we can help you save it," he said.

According to Long, the pine bark beetle is widespread in the area at the present, but it can be controlled is appropriate measures are taken soon enough.

During the business meeting following Long's talk, Mrs. E. H. Harrington, council president, announced that Gulf Federal Savings and Loan had underwritten the expense of printing the schedules for the up coming area flower show to be held March 19 and 20 at the Fort Myers Exhibition Hall. They were distributed to delegates at the meeting.

# For Your Dining and A Different Sort of Journey

Homeward bound on the S.S. Universe Campus. Getting back on a ship which has been your home for quite awhile, you feel like a baby chick with Mother Hen, safe and cozy! Not long after we sailed out of Hong Kong, the weather kicked up and the sun went in. This was a great time for the ship's library which was quite extensive being from Chapman College. And it's a treat to dig up long ago information such as the career of the illustrious Clare Boothe Luce. And I never knew that Theadore Dreiser's brother was a famous song writer. He called Dreiser "Thee".

After a long walk around the deck there was fresh hot popcorn to eat, while you looked out at the black ocean to see the ship's lights catching the waves. Several journeys before our's a young man was leaning against the rail, lost his balance, and fell into the ocean. The girl he was with threw him a lifesaver and ran to the bridge to yell to the Captain "Man overboard!" The flare on his life ring came on strong and so the ship was able to find him several miles back. What a lucky guy but I think he took some other girl to the prom when he got

There were some new passengers to meet who had boarded the ship at Hong Kong. I liked one old couple who called each other "dear" and "honey". That was the one thing that stood out in this voyage, the deep concern wives and husbands had for each other, whether they were newlyweds or married for decades.

Our first port was Kaoshing in Taiwan. Here Chinese children have little tricycles with a back seat so that a little boy of three takes care of his sister age two. Kaoshing's big hotel is the Kingdom. All the girls are dressed in beautiful red brocade and so are the bell hops. There's fountains and gardens but one would surely find it uneasy to enjoy this luxury when people only a block away are so poor. I saw one young woman trying her best to untangle a huge pile of what seemed to me a worthless lot of twisted wire. In Kaoshing you can buy the most marvelous feather dusters. I wonder how they make them for there are no birds in sight except chickens running in and out of little stores.

Back on our ship, I read all about Sun Yat Sun and the revolution in China and the next night Philip and I put on a performance of the Reluctant Debutante. We had David Sloan as our narrator, a retired Royal Air Force Colonel. The Dean of the College, Leroy Lewan, and his assistant, Robert Partridge were curtain-pullers for our act. We were well rewarded with much enthusiasm for our performance, which made us very happy.

The harbor in Guam (our next port) was beautiful, long and rocky. The bow of a big ship was lying on the shore with turbulent waves crashing over it. Passengers had conjured up some nice stories about a long ago shipwreck as it looked so picturesque. But we found out a big ship being towed had broken loose the day before our arrival and broke up in three pieces. The wreck made for some good pictures and the Coast Guard was frantically figuring how the big hunks of ship could be taken away for Guam is a busý harbor. At Guam's Cathedral we attended a wedding - a most unusual one, the bride was from Philadelphia and her groom was a native of the Island of Polar. His dress shirt with his formal attire was bright blue which matched the gowns of the three bridesmaids and a contrast to his long brown hair. The small ring bearer (his brother of five years) wore a tiny blue dress shirt too, and the pillow with the ring was bright blue velvet. We were lucky to celebrate our 49th wedding anniversary aboard the S.S. Universe Campus. There was a party and a speech by Captain Loui-John-Shaw, champagne and a cake so big we could give every passenger aboard, a generous size piece. The maitre de made sure ours had big pink roses on it.




Possibly you could bribe him with a new toy but the only kind of toy that might bribe Cap'n John is a boat, so that brings us back where we started.

The tourists are beginning to arrive, and from all reports, the people doing the best are the bait catchers. In spite of this, people are coming in to report their catches, and in the canals there have been redfish taken on shrimp. There are sporadic reports of snook, reds and trout along the causway. There again, shrimp is the bait they are taking.

At the end of Dixie Beach Blvd., good sheepshead and a few snook and

reds are being taken, all on shrimp. The trout are biting well along the power lines, but they are running very small. Blues and mackeral are just beginning to be caught off shore, trolling with #3 spoons on the center span of the causway and at Blind Pass there are a lot of big flounders being caught. This is the first time in several years that we have run into this.

Mr. & Mrs. Ledbetter came in to report some good snook and reds on

jumbo shrimp off the causway. They were fishing with Mrs. & Mrs. Fred Fergus also from Tennessee. The trout from Pine Island Sound were caught by Joe Petrie from Cincinnati and Walter Gordon from New York. These were hooked on small to medium sized shrimp.

Mr. Thomas qualified on November 19.




Zee Butler



At forty years of age, M. William Frey is the father of three school-age boys. His wife is a family economist. The Freys moved to the Island from Massachusetts a year and a half ago.

A highly learned man, Mr. Frey holds a number of degrees, among them a Ph. D. in Administration and Economics, from Penn State University, a B. S. from Penn State, and an M. A. from the University of Connecticut. He has taught Administration and Management at Penn State for seven years and at the University of Massachusetts for three years. While residing in College Township, Pennsylvania, Mr. Frey served as chairman of two zoning boards, during which time he was instrumental in the development and adoption of zoning ordinances.

Mr. Frey's forte is city planning and management. He has authored a book on finance which describes the capital budgeting process in detail and has edited a number of books dealing with management and administration. Mr. Frey is a past president of the Eastern Academy of Management and is currently on the Board of the National Academy of Management.

The owner of Sanibel Homes, Mr. Frey is a state certified class-A contractor

Marvin Post became the last man to qualify for city council candidacy by a matter of minutes on Tuesday, November 19. He barely made the noon deadline because he was forced to wait in his car until a good Samaritan passed by and helped him into the Lee County Courthouse. Mr. Post was involved in a roofing accident some weeks ago, but as of last weekend he seemed to be recuperating quite nicely, albeit slowly, in the comfort of his own home. Mr. Post, his wife, and their three sons reside in the Sanibel Gardens development on Sanibel Boulevard.

A native of the Chicago area, Mr. Post served in the Army and has since worked as a general contractor and as a tavern keeper. Selling seems to have been his specialty — he has sold real estate, used cars and vacuum cleaners in his lifetime. Currently, he is engaged in building a restaurant on Tarpon Bay Road, near the intersection of Palm Ridge Road. Mr. Post came to the Islands a year or so ago from Hazelcrest, Illinois, a Chicago suburb.

Mr. Post is the treasurer of the Sanibel-Captiva American Legion at the

of 1958. Before moving here, he was with the Bureau of Commercial Fisheries studying the red tide in the Gulf of Naples. He has been with the United States Fish and Wildlife Service ever since moving to Sanibel. In his capacity as biological technician at the J. N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Pre-



Of course I realize that there are some big men on Sanibel who haven't forgotten their beginnings, and I hope that some of them get elected to the council."



All outstanding Series E and H Savings Bonds are still earning interest, regardless of their age. Savings Bonds now on sale enjoy a 10-year extension privilege beyond initial maturity -- 5 years for E Bonds, 10 years for H Bonds. Older E and H Bonds have had their "lives" prolonged by one or more 10-year extensions. And U. S. Savings Notes -- Freedom Shares -- have been granted a 10-year extension beyond their initial 4½-year maturity.

Certain series of Savings Bonds have been removed from sale, however, and are no longer earning interest. They are -- Series A-D, which were issued from March 1935 through April 1941, final-

issues of which stopped drawing interest on April 1, 1951; Series F and G, issued from May 1941 through April 1952, final issues of which ceased earning interest on April 1, 1964, and Series J and K, which were issued from May 1952 through April 1957, final issues of which stopped drawing interest on April 1, 1969.

While most of these obsolete Bonds have been redeemed, Americans still hold some \$31 million worth, on which they are no longer earing interest. The withdrawn series should be redeemed. The proceeds, of course, may be reinvested in Series E and H Bonds, which now yield 6 percent, compounded semi-annually, when held to maturity of 5 years for E Bonds, 10 years for H Bonds.
