Audubon Tonight

The Sanibel-Captiva Audubon Society will hold its seventh program of the current season at 8 p.m. tonight, Thursday, January 30, in the Sanibel Community House. Featured speaker will be Dr. Andrew J. Meyerriecks, Associate Professor of Zoology at the University of Southern Florida in Tampa. He is considered nationally one of the foremost authorities on American herons, and is especially known because of his in depth study on the Great Heron.

In past years Dr. Meyerriecks has conducted three very successful programs under the auspices of the Sanibel Audubon, and on the occasion of his fourth appearance here he will be undoubtedly welcomed by his many island friends. His program is titled "The Urbanization of the Yellow-crowned Night Heron," and will be illustrated by a number of color slides. It is particularly interesting because, while we are all familiar with the common urbanites of the bird world, such as pigeons, English sparrows and starlings, this program deals with winged city dwellers including "exotic species." Among them are quite surprisingly "urban" herons and related forms, and Dr. Meyerriecks will dwell in particular on a colony of Yellow-crowned Night Herons nesting in the heart of downtown Tampa.

As usual, the program is open to the public, and all are cordially invited.

same Island motif as Spectrum Development's other complex on Sanibel, Coquina Beach. Villa Sanibel's twenty units, which run anywhere from \$53,500 to \$85,900, depending on their location and relative proximity to the Gulf beach, feature the same quaint extras that have made Coquina Beach so popular --- the natural wooden facades, shake roofs, open beam ceilings, authentic paddle fans, and of course, the picturesque lofts featured in second story residences. A wide variety of recreational facilities, such as tennis courts, beachfront, and a spacious heated swimming pool, are offered on Villa Sanibel's one and a half acre plot which runs from Gulf Drive to the Gulf.

The landscape design for Villa Sanibel was done by Mr. George Causey, husband of the famous Ft. Myers artist, Mrs. George Causey. The architect was Barry Sugarman and the contractors for the project were Southern Atlantic Construction Co.

"What I'm trying to build," said Keith Trowbridge, president of Spectrum Development, "are places of which people can say, 'All development is not bad.' With care and a little concern we can build a place that people will enjoy, in keeping with Island customs." Mr. Trowbridge went on to say, "In the future, I think there will be more condominium-style living, because of the conveniences it affords, but less of the large concrete condominium apartment buildings. A condominium doesn't have to be big."

Mr. Trowbridge and Mr. Bill Byle are starting a beach renourishment program for Villa Sanibel and for Coquina Beach, utilizing sea oats and other beach vegetation. Coquina Beach, by the way, is nearing completion and the owners are beginning to move in. In

Hilton Hardship Denied

Tuesday morning the Sanibel City Council denied the Edward Dworetzky's request for a hardship variance building permit to build the Hilton Hotel Restaurant and Lounge.

The planned hotel had 104 units and a 200 seat restaurant and lounge, which met Lee County Zoning standards in October 1973, at which time the original permit was issued by the county. At that time, Lee County had a 22 unit per acre density regulation. The county has since changed their requirements to 20 units per acre, but the City of Sanibel is aiming at 18 or less units per acre.

Dworetzky's hardship plea was based on the financial fact that he had already invested \$1,444,000 in actual cash, which figure includes purchase price of the land, money paid to the Island Water Association, architect's fee, materials and the building contractor. He also stands to lose a \$2,700,000 mortgage.

He offered one more reason for his hardship plea --- the fact that he employs 12 Sanibel residents. In conclusion, he said he would comply with and be advised by the Council in all landscaping and construction procedures, including changing units to suites to comply with the lower density requirements.

He asked that the injunction be removed from the project and that he be allowed to continue work under Vernon MacKenzie's supervision, if Mr. MacKenzie was willing.

While the Council members silently considered the plea, members of the audience set up a heated discussion which ranged in comment from "I like trees, but his work is good" to "If it were put to the citizens of Sanibel in a vote, it would be turned down overwhelmingly!" and much more so forth.

After about 15 minutes, Mayor Porter Goss called for order. In response to a question from Mayor Goss, Dworetzky said the property was owned by Sanibel Gulf Properties, and the construction would be done by Sanibel Gulf Properties Construction Company, both of which are off-island firms.

Vernon MacKenzie, after due deliberation, observed that we live in a free enterprise society, and "That the loss of an entrepreneur's money does not qualify as a hardship case."

Dworetzky replied that if the case was turned down he would definitely be forced to abandon the project.

Zee Butler then moved that the hardship request be denied without prejudice (which means it can be

DALE and IONE TERRY from Ottawa, IL, are here for the winter and love it.

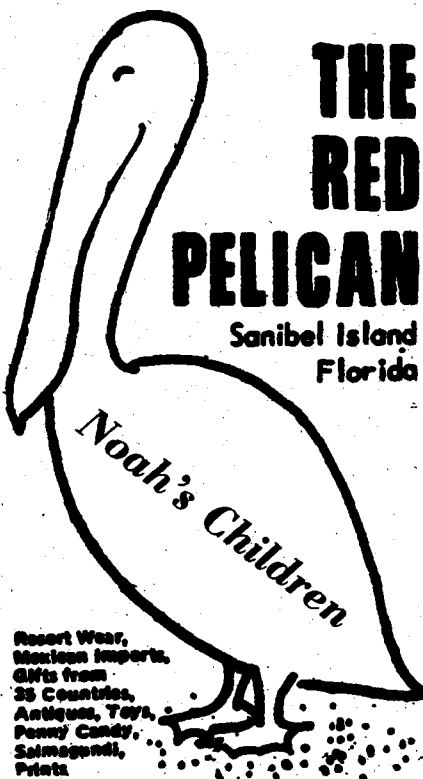

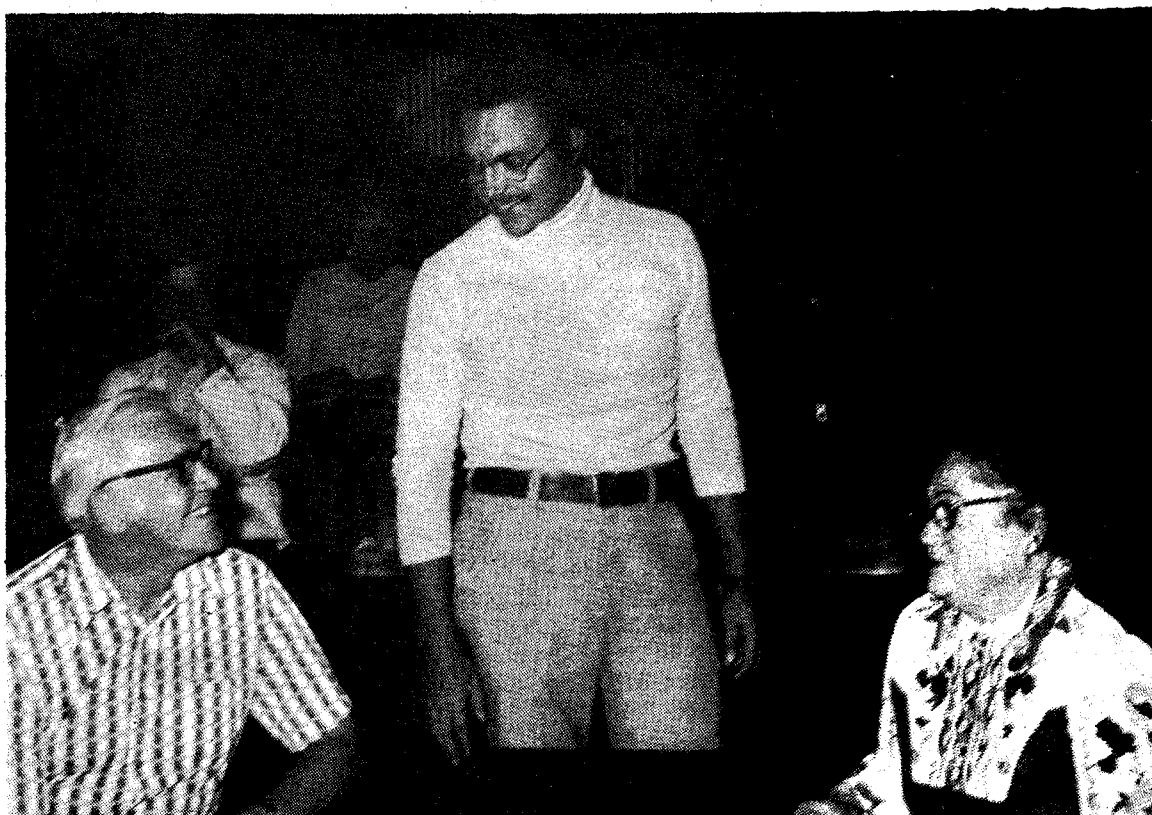



Finance Committee Meeting

Last Thursday morning at 9:30 a.m., the Advisory Finance Committee met at Sanibel City Hall. The committee was officially established by resolution 75-3, which was passed by city council in an emergency meeting on the night of January 21. Present at Thursday's meeting were Carl Bopp, John Cook, chairman Jim Robeson, ex officio member Zee Butler, acting city manager Dave Bretzke, and Judy Workman, the secretary at City Hall.

The committee decided to begin soliciting loan bids for the sum of \$250,000 that the city is authorized by the charter to borrow in the first year of operations. This move is intended to establish a line of credit for the city. The Bank of the Islands, Barnett Bank, and Lee County Bank in particular will be approached, inasmuch as they submitted bids for the city's initial loan of \$50,000, which will be repaid by the end of the year. According to Mr. Bretzke, borrowing the money in one lump sum

will save the city money in the long run.

The committee deliberated at some length upon the matter of the city's budget for the first year. Unofficially, the figure arrived at by the committee was \$208,500 for the first year — a sum considerably less than Sanibel Tomorrow's proposed figure. Both budgets break the city's expenses up into the categories of general government, public safety, and road maintenance. Mr. Bretzke will draft an appropriations budget for the period through September 30 and a cash flow budget for the period ending November 30, both of which will be presented to the committee before going up for council's approval.

Mr. Bretzke reported to the committee that he has met twice with the accounting firm of Taylor, Edenfield, Gilliam, and Wiltshire, who have assigned Mr. Dave Higgins to aid and advise the city on the preparation of the budget. The firm's proposal has been accepted by the council. Mr. Bretzke and Mr. Edenfield interviewed an applicant for the position of deputy city clerk last Friday. By the end of the week, Mr. Bretzke hopes to have arrived at salary allocations for the offices of police chief, patrolman, deputy clerk-treasurer, and building inspector. Bretzke also expects the city's planning commission to be operative by March.

The city plans to augment their loans with revenue from occupational licensing fees and building permits as soon as possible, said Mr. Bretzke.

The committee also discussed the outstanding debts incurred by the city thus far. Since the special election does not have to be held, the city just owes Lee County \$800 for the December 3rd council election.

The next committee slated to meet on the city calendar is the Vegetation Ordinance Committee, which will meet at 10:30 a.m. on January 30 at city hall.

Reel Eel Tips

by Skip Purdy

The sun is back to shining and the fishing situation has gotten brighter, too. I have been getting lots of reports on very large sheepshead being caught at most of the popular Island fishing spots. These lucky fishermen are using small to medium sized "educated" shrimp from the Real Eel on a 2/0 or 3/0 hook. There are also medium sized trout and some snook being taken while wading at the end of Dixie Beach Blvd.

Spanish mackerel have been seen schooling between the Sanibel Lighthouse and Fort Myers Beach with the catchers trolling, using a No. 2 spoon. This fish is silver-bellied with gold dotted silverish sides. The back is a greenish-blue having a high dorsal fin which is black in color. The Spanish mackerel has a fairly large mouth containing fine needle-sharp teeth. It's truly a beautiful fish to behold. You can spot these fish by their method of chopping the water's surface while feeding. There will also be a cloud of

screaming sea gulls flying overhead.

The mackerel is a very hard fighting fish for its weight. It is very good eating and easy to fillet. Can you ask for anything better than that? Do beware, for this fish spoils quickly and should be put on ice as soon as it's caught.

For the novice fisherman I have a few special pointers on when fishing is best which I would like to share with you. Expect our scaly friends to be hungry when daylight changes on the water. They'll shake their head no at high noon because they prefer subdued light for feeding. The changing of the tide is also a great influence on a fish. This tidal activity stirs up what's below and the fish anticipate a feasting. They'll jump for an "educated" shrimp at the change of tide and first hour of tidal flow.

Have many happy fishing hours with the best of luck to you.

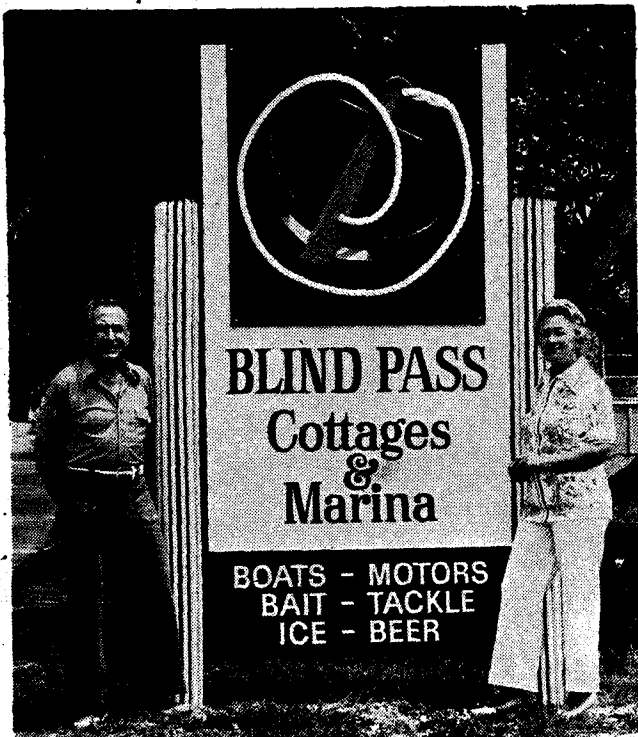

Bailey Reinstated Councilman

The special election for council seat number one which was slated for February 25 is no longer necessary, in that Francis Bailey, the man who resigned the seat last month, was the only candidate to qualify by Saturday's noon deadline, thus making the election process superfluous. The fact that no one made an appearance at city hall to oppose Mr. Bailey in the election implies that Sanibel residents are satisfied with his work on the council, and are willing to forget his legal faux pas at the time of the

December 3 council election. We are confident that no one on the Island will be too crestfallen at this turn of events, insomuch as the election would have cost Sanibel residents in the vicinity of \$650 had it been necessary, according to the supervisor of the Lee County Board of Elections, Enid Earl.

So now that the uncertainties and technicalities are behind us, it is time to get behind the council as a whole and get down to the business of running a city.

brought before the Council again). The motion was seconded by Charles LeBuff. Before the Council voted, Goss called for discussion, at which point C. Duane White, who is presently doing a preliminary density study for Sanibel, reported that existing permits and completed structures, including single family homes, motel and condo units, can presently accommodate 10,589 persons. White added that if Dworetzky's request was granted, it would "be a hardship upon Island residents."

When the motion was finally brought to a vote, it was unanimous in denying the request. This vote may set a precedent in the manner of handling other large development projects until the Council sets a firm zoning standard.

Earlier in the morning, the Captiva straw vote question (concerning beach renourishment and possible moving or complete closing of Blind Pass) was discussed. Goss suggested the Council keep an eye on the situation, as anti-erosion projects on Captiva inevitably effect Sanibel beaches.

Also, Rosalind Wegryn's request for a hardship variance to build a mini-condo behind the Lewis S. Wegryn Memorial Clinic on Sanibel-Captiva Road, was withdrawn.

Edward Pearce's hardship request for the Dinkin's Bayou Subdivision was granted unanimously, with certain specifications.

At 11:15 Tuesday, between the Dinkin's Bayou and Hilton zoning requests, the Council unanimously

passed Emergency Transition Ordinance 75-4, which said that Francis Bailey "be elected by default and acclamation" to council seat No. 1, which he had vacated by his resignation. He was immediately installed with the oath being administered by Sanibel Secretary Jean Nichols, amidst a warm round of applause.

The Ramada Inn hearing, scheduled for 11 a.m., was delayed until the afternoon session, so more about that next week. If the Hilton case did set a precedent, the case was probably denied, but we won't know for sure until next week's edition.
