Birds In Evolution


The eleventh program sponsored by the Sanibel-Captiva Audubon Society will be held tonight, Thursday, February 27, at 8 p.m. in the Sanibel Community House. Featured speaker will be Karen Eastman, who in previous years has presented a number of very successful shows reporting on birds of many countries, seen and photographed by her during her world-wide travels. In the course of these travels Mrs. Eastman has sighted an ever increasing number of exotic and rare species in every continent.

This year her presentation, titled "Birds in Evolution", represents a departure from previous shows, because the bird slides to be viewed constitute a sequence arranged in ornithological order, depicting the gradual degree of development of birds away from reptiles. Adaptations of a number of species for living in diversified habitats and eating various foods are explained. Some courtship displays are shown, including those of the Frigate-bird. Included is also a brief discussion of Darwin's evolutionary theory and his conflict with the church, not yet resolved to everybody's extifaction.

As usual, the program is open to the public, and all are cordially invited. repeated on these two evenings in order to allow all interested Islanders and visitors to attend. All proceeds will go to the Building Fund of the Sanibel Community Association, which is planning the construction of a new auditorium with a capacity of almost 900 and other adequate facilities for the growing needs of our Island.

As in past years, Mario Hutton will present on this occasion the premiere of his latest "photo-verse" features, completed during the past year, at least five of which have never before been shown here or elsewhere. The program will go under the general title of "Swan Song", an indirect reference to the fact that after a tenure of almost ten years Mr. Hutton will be retiring as president of the local Audubon in April. In addition to his new compositions he will include in his two-part program a selection of all-time favorities, covering a variety of subjects, that he has presented during the past eight years before audiences ranging from the National Audubon Society to the Smithsonian Institution Associates, from the Wilderness Society to the Nature Conservancy, and in over thirty Florida

A committee headed by Mrs. Porter Goss is being formed to promote the event, and the names of the prominent ladies cooperating in the collection of donations amounting to \$5 per person will be published by the Islander in coming weeks, together with further information on the benefit.



Budget, Bretzke, Approved By Sanibel Council

Tuesday morning was another calm one for Sanibel's councilmen. After accepting vice mayor Vernon MacKenzie's proposal to appoint Dave Bretzke as permanent city manager, rather than acting city manager, they got down to considering the budget.

The new city's budget appropriations for the fiscal year Nov. 5 1975 to Sept. 30, 1975, was approved. It calls for a total expenditure of \$219,775 against anticipated revenues of \$254,000, which should leave a balance of \$34,225. Dave Bretzke said that he already collected \$1,000 of an anticipated revenue from licenses and permits of \$4,000 during the fiscal year. The rest of the budget, which was drawn up from a combination of the proposed budgets by both Sanibel Tomorrow and the Chamber of Commerce, will be derived from short term loans of \$250,000. Bretzke said that first property taxes will be levied on Nov. 1, 1975.

The council then discussed other possible means of raising money, such as the resort tax now in effect on Miami Beach, and instructed Bretzke to investigate this and any other tax measures to bring more funds into the new city's coffers.

Gorden Tracey, president of the newly formed Sanibel Property Tax-payer's Association, then presented the council with a number of requests -- basically that bike paths and a turn-around at Periwinkle and the causeway road be given top priority in any budget considerations. Tracey also questioned the reason why almost half of the new city's budget was being spent on

the new city hall, furniture and the salaries of city hall employees, including the city manager, clark and receptionist.

The council in turn thanked Tracey for his concern in city matters.

After a lengthy discussion, with many changes made in the proposed planning ordinance, the council adopted unanimously an ordinance providing for the establishment of an appointed seven man planning commission for Sanibel.

The commission members will themselves elect a chairman and vice chairman, and will be aided by a non-member secretary, who will be appointed as a paid city employee by Bretzke.


During the afternoon session (too late for the ISLANDER deadline) the councilmen were going to consider the appointment of the seven member commission from a list of 28 names previously suggested for the committee. More on that next week.

The Planning Commission has been allotted \$500 for operating expenses, and \$15,000 for consultant fees during the fiscal year. Members themselves will serve without salary.

An interesting item on the afternoon's agenda was a continuation of the Hilton Hotel's hearing, following last week's four to one decision to grant Edward Dworetzky's hardship request, with a number of stipulations and a promise from him to drop any actual or proposed legal action against the new city. More on that next week.

A public hearing has been set for March 11, at which time the council will consider the adoption of five building codes for the city.

FLORIDA LIONS EYE BANK - HISTORY & PURPOSE

The eye Bank was incorporated in 1961 and formally opened in January 1962, in the Bascom Palmer Eye Institute, the Ophthalmology Department of the University of Miami School of Medicine, in Miami, FL. Its staff now consists of two pathology technicians, two secretaries and a voluntary staff consisting of the Executive Board of Directors, a Medical Director, and an ophthalmologist who supervises the training and teaching of corneal grafting technique to the eye Residents.

How successful has the Eye Bank been in its operation in these past thirteen years? We can best describe this by advising that 2,399 corneal grafts have been performed and 3,545 patients have donated their eyes. Donor eyes are available locally or statewide to any ophthalmologist in need of eyes for transplant. If these needs are fulfilled at the time of donation, then the donor eyes are sent to other cities in need of eyes or, at times, are shipped internationally. These efforts are accomplished through the cooperation of the Eye Bank Network, a group of volunteer amateur radio operators that check in every morning and every evening to fulfill the emergencies that may arise in Eye Banks throughout the world.

Pathologically, more than 7,621 specimens have been studied and reports sent to the contributing physician. The disease processes vary from trauma to tumors to inflammatory conditions to degenerating conditions of the eye. Specimens are submitted to the Eye Bank from many communities in Florida, as well as many other states.

The third purpose of the Eye Bank concerns teaching and research. Eyes that are not satisfactory for transplantation are used for teaching corneal transplantation technique to the Residents in training in ophthalmology. Eyes, from which the corneas have been removed for transplantation, are examined pathologically in the hopes of obtaining insight into the aging diseases of the eye since most of the donors are beyond middle age. Also, some of these specimens with corneas removed after transplantation make excellent eyes for the demonstration of gross anatomy to the medical students.

Some of the activity with respect to the research connected with the Eye Bank consists of improvements in the technique of storage of corneal material as well as an attempt to understand the process of wound healing and graft rejection in recipient eyes. Other projects which are inter-related with the facilities of the Eye Bank have been the study of retinal detachments, electron microscopy of the eye, fluorescene distribution in the eye, vascular diseases of the eye.

It is well to remember that this service is provided to the patient, physician, and community at no expense at all. The operation of the Eye Bank is totally supported by the Florida Lions Clubs.

PERTINENT INFORMATION

One is never too young or too old to donate his eyes. Color of eyes, sex, age, race, or the quality of your vision does not matter.

Persons who have diseases of the eye may also donate them to the Eye Bank. These eyes are invaluable for the purpose of research. In this way, their donation can help advance our knowledge and prevent the loss of sight in this and future generations.

Eyes must be removed as soon as possible after death - preferably within six hours.

One's appearance remains unchanged after eyes are removed.

All major religious faiths approve and endorse this humanitarian effort to help one's fellowman.





John Butler

As of last Wednesday, February 19th, there is yet another new city official in Sanibel City Hall. He is none other than the new Chief of Police for the city, Mr. John Butler.

Mr. Butler does not come to Sanibel as a novice in his trade, having served for twenty-six years on the police force of Mansefield, Ohio, his home town. He started as a patrolman in 1948 and rose through the ranks by way of diligent and meritorious service to lieutenant, then captain, and finally to chief in 1966, which position he held until 1974, when in June he retired and moved to Ft. Myers Beach, residing at 320 Randy Lane.

John Butler was educated with an eye toward police service. He attended Ohio State University and then went on to graduate from the Southern Police Institute at the University of Louisville in Kentucky. He also served in the United States Marine Corps for four years before returning to Mansefield to settle down to a position with the police department.

The forty-nine-year-old Butler is married, has two children and two

grandchildren.

Mr. Butler was appointed by acting city manager Dave Bretzke during the morning session of the February 18th city council meeting. The selection had been made by Bretzke after reviewing a field of twenty-four applicants for the position.

When asked about his goals with respect to Sanibel, Chief Butler stated: "I am very happy with the faith which Mr. Bretzke has shown me. I have just one objective, and that's to serve the citizens of Sanibel." Butler also mentioned that he and his wife would probably be moving to Sanibel in the very near future.

So now there is a Police Chief in city hall, with a small police force soon to follow, we hope. According to Dave Bretzke, the police force will be installed in the city's second floor offices in Periwinkle Place, adjoining the present city hall, as soon as the furniture and necessary equipment can be procured. Let us suggest that Islanders in difficulty now direct their calls and complaints there, rather than to our already overburdened councilmen.

Reel Eel Tips

This week I'll start out with a boom or interesting information. Snook were being caught under the first bridge of the Sanibel Causeway from sunset on for a few hours during high tide. The lucky fishermen were using live "educa.ed" shrimp with just enough weight to sink the line to the bottom.

There are still a lot of trout and sheepshead being taken in the local fishing areas.

Good grief, the fishermen are here, ready and raring to fish. Those who are unfamiliar with fishing in our area (fien ask me what they should use for bait. I must say, live "educated" shrimp is the most popular and well liked by just about any fish. There are several methods of booking your shrimp desending on what you're fishing for. He ing through the head will keep the pactive which is the best method in the dark spot because that will kill the little fellows instantly.

For whiting and red fish book the whrimp through the tail allowing him to move with the tide, leaving the line behind him. Bottom fish will strike at the head first positioning the hook to catch the fish's lip.

Frozen shrimp, threaded on the hook will work just as well for catching sheepshead, mangrove snapper and many smaller fish. Sandfleas are good by Skip Purdy

bait for pompano. To let them attract the fish with some motion, place the hook through the rear.


If you're using live bait fish, I suggest gently hooking through the back at the front edge of the dorsal fin.


There is also a large variety of salt water lures to choose from. The simplest and most practical lures to buy are jigs. There are two things to consider when picking out a jig: the size of the fish and the depth of the water. Yellow, white and a red-white combination are the most popular to select from. Many more lures are on the market which I have not mentioned, including various plugs and spoons.


