"Well, let's see—if they were here, where would they be camping? It would have to be on private property...hmmm, the report came out of the Miami office, and they probably wouldn't know the difference between Sanibel and Captiva...let's call South Seas."

South Seas didn't know anything. They were helpful, though, and gave us a few more names.

However, they didn't know anything either. We gathered a few snickers, too. "Ah, ha---the Conservation Foundation."

The phone was either out of order or off the hook.

"Ah, ha-Charles Wilson of the Counservation Foundation."

Luck!

"Umm, oh yes, they're here. Where? Well, actually, in the Sanctuary, I think.

Yes, on a program of some sort. Why don't you call Dick; I'm sure he'll have more information," kindly said Mr. Wilson.

Conservation phone still not working.

Call Glen Bond.

"Oh, yes, they're here. Camping out on the Lighthouse Government property, as a matter of fact. Went for a canoe ride this morning, and I took them on a birding exhibition yesterday. That was fun, explaining what a 'birder' was. In England, you know, a 'birder' is a guy who is out looking for girls. Not the same here, though," reported Mr. Bond.

"Now I'm not quite sure of all the facts, but they're members of a squad of the British Army headed a major who's the son-in-law of Dr. Yoder. Said something about sloshing around in the sanctuary, although it's raining," Bond continued.

After agreeing that if one were sloshing, it didn't make much difference if one were getting wet from what one was sloshing through, or from what one was sloshing under, we decided to take off for the Sanctuary.

Found LOTS of birds (feathered types) a number of fishermen, a beautiful nature walk (on which Carol broke her shoe) but not a Britisher in sight.

Left Sanctuary, went to

visit the Yoders. Lovely, lovely couple, who welcomed us in and explained that while their sonin-law, Major Kelvin Kent, wasn't here himself, he had been and really loved the Island. Major Kent is not only lucky enough to have the Yoders as in-laws and be married to their beautiful daughter, Jennifer, he also does all sorts of things like climb mountains with people who write books about it and swims Panama canals and breaches the Darian Gap and so forth.

Anyhow it seems as if the British Army has an "Army Adventurous Training' program, in which the squad members themselves kick in a bit of money, plus some Army funds, plus some money from whichever scientific foundation(s) they are helping (in this case, the British Museum of Natural History and the Sanibel Captiva Conservation Foundation) and this particular squad wanted to do something "Really different," so Major Kent came up with the idea of searching for Indian mounds which looked as if they might be here in airiel photographs according to the Yoders and collecting lizards and shells for the British Museum.

The Yoders mentioned the squad had flown into Washington, where they

were provided with GI issue tents and rations, as well as a big red rental car, which they weren't at all used to. Also mentioned the boys were being led by Lt. Iain Robertson and accompanied by the lieutenant's fiancee, Miss Sue V. Pryn, who is associated with the zoological department of Cambridge University.

Thanked the Yoders and headed towards the Lighthouse, when we spotted a big red car turn into the road. Finally flagged them down by Bailey's and found they were, indeed, the British (at

fatigues were green and didn't have a bit of gold braid on 'em, either) and that yes, they really were staying here, were going down to the Lighthouse and then back up to the Yoders, where they might play a bit of soccer, what?

Got other camera and Kathie and all three converged on the Lighthouse, where we talked with Lt. I.P. (Iain) Robertson, Royal Signals Leader, whose previous adventurous experience was in tropical and jungle survival in Malaya and deep water snorkeling and coastal navigation; Sgt. B.J. (Brian) Doughty, Royal Signals, who had been a member of the 1974 Joint Services West-East Sahara Expedition; Cpl. T.J. (Tim) Elsey, Royal Signals, who's been a member of expeditions to Mont Blanc, Norway and Iceland; Sig Devon, Royal Signals, and Sig Sirr, Royal Signals, both members of the Icelandic Glaciological survey expedition (where they really did survey glaciers) and Dvr. Dickson, RCT, Cfn. Pinchard, REME, and Pte Thomas, RAOC, for whom, we assume, this is a first official adventure.

And, of course, Miss Pryn of Cambridge.

They set up camp on Tuesday and headed out on Sunday, planning to visit Cape Canaveral and Disney World ("Don't you think we ought, being so close and all?" to which we heartily agreed, and advised them to try and see Disney under world, which two of our three staff members present insisted was by far the best part. The third was silent, only being a mere editor and just having seen the top, which we thought impressive enough for anybody.) That was on their way back to Washington from Sanibel, of course.

According to the official fact sheet, the results were stated as such: "If all goes well, the scientific value of such an expedition could be significant and benefit both this country's (Great Britain) Natural History knowledge as well as Sanibel's own conservation project."

The official aim of the expedition's Sanibel research was to add to the conchological knowledge of the British Museum and to see if they could find the Florida Puma (a particularly rare specie of American Mountain Lion—the florida puma Felis Conculor Conji) which the Royal Signals, at least, seem to believe may still be surviving on Sanibel.

Well, anything's possible on Sanibel.

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

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The Plan for the week---not the morrow (necessarily)

This week's plan, accepted by the planning commission on Wednesday, and which will be presented to city council February 2, is this week's plan only. The commission and the planning firm Wallace, McHarg, Roberts and Todd (WMRT) will continue working on the plan throughout the next few weeks in order to come up with a plan which is satisfactory to all concerned.

Early on Monday morning, we seemed to be getting closer to a "people's plan" with the advent of the commercial task force being asked to make recommendations about where the commercial and restricted commercial areas were to go. However, as one member of the task force commented, "We only had one day to think about it and none of us are planners."

While the commercial under areas were discussion, no public comment was elicited before motions, during motions or after motions and since most of the business people are at work during the day, needless to say, most of them were not in attendance.

Nowhere in the commercial areas was there provision made for tourist commercial, which is a fairly common designation in tourist areas which would allow for such things as day parking, tent grounds, etc.

Late Monday afternoon Richard Workman, conservation foundation, spoke saying that the people of the island had been disappointing in that they did not come forward to speak for the plan, but that the people who were more concerned about and what they could build or not build had had more input; therefore the planning commission had not heeded the mandate of the city charter, but had listened more to vested rights than to the ecologic problems of Sanibel. He begged the commission to reconsider the real problems and not add any more dwelling units to the fragile island in spite of how many people cried dollars.

but as a person was operating under such meeting.

constraints which would have allowed 90,000 people. but now, a considerable degree of progress has been made due to the planning process. He gave kudos to both the commission and the firm. The plan he said, should be a continuing process and no first plan was going to meet all of the objectives.

"You know some things aren't too good, but you don't know exactly what to do about it." he said, and continued to talk about specifics, eutrophic lakes. snook fishing, lawns, pesticides, etc., and ended on a positive note saying "I think we're on the right

Bill Roberts had the last word on Monday. He said that he had to fight off discouragement some nights.

In the beginning it had been his impression that the people of Sanibel would be willing to go to the absolute limits of the law to take care of the ecology. But after December 1, 85 per cent of the public input had been about protection of property rights. He said that 90 per cent of the planner's time had been spent to accomodate the real human problems, and "it can be made better before the plan goes to council." He continued that even if there was a complete buildout under the revised plan, the densities were so low that the environment would not be totally destroyed.

The planning commission Wednesday morning, expressed shock that so many Islanders and off Islanders had expressed dismay at the plan---that it was not workable or not defensible.

After listening to more } testimony, there was nothing for them to do after working so many hours. days and months but to vote unanimously for the plan as revised by themselves, the commercial task force and the commissioners, individually.

The land belongs to Friday. He was asked if he did not in fact have a conflict of interest. He said that he did and was asked to file a letter to that effect.

The commission then decided to leave the west 100 feet commercial and leave the 100 feet on the east alone. Citizen Jim Evans was counted out of order when he wanted to discuss commercial along Rabbit Road.

Dave Holtzman made another pitch for more motel units but so far was unsuccessful. "Certain people are being asked to bear the cost of this plan."

As it now stands: On the Gulf Beach Ridge; 6 units per acre from the lighthouse to Tarpon Bay Road and 2 units per acre thereafter.


Most of the individual lot owners in subdivisions will be able to build a home, if they own 10,000 square feet or more, so hopefully the construction business will pick up.




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Notes about the arts and craft fair

Forty-one Island crafts people have already signed up for the forthcoming fifth Annual Arts and Crafts Fair sponsored by the Sanibel Public Library according to Mada Harrison, general chairman of the affair. The fair will be held at the Sanibel Community House on February 7 and 8. This number does not include the artists whose exhibits are being coordinated by the Sanibel-Captiva Art League under the supervision of Helene Sparkes.

Both professional and amateur craftsmen will exhibit and demonstrate their skills. The list of crafts runs the whole gamut from ceramics to spinning and

weaving.

As might be expected on a shell island such as Sanibel there will be a variety of shell crafts exhibited including flowers, jewelry, pictures and animals, all concocted from shells. There will also be a wide range of ceramics including demonstrations with a potter's wheel.

For the first time there will be exhibits by some of the island's noted nature photographers.

Other skills to be shown include macrame, jewelry making, eggery, metal

working, decoupage, needlepoint and stitchery, plant hangers and wood carving.

Hourly demonstrations outside the building have been scheduled for both Saturday when the show will be open from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. and on Sunday afternoon between 1 and 4 p.m.

If present plans work out, these demonstrations will have a bi-centennial theme in that they show some of the crafts popular around the time of the Revolutionary War.

As in the past, several

Island people have donated works which will be awarded as prizes in a drawing at the conclusion of the Fair on Sunday. These include a fine wood carving by Russell Denyes, a beautiful shell floral arrangements by Emma Guthrie, a water color by the late Leon Levy (whose works are now on display at the Sanibel Library) and finally, eight autographed books each by a different Island author. These prizes may be seen at the Library where tickets may be purchased for 50 cents each or three for \$1.

real eel tips ...

Try sailing --- for a change!

Want to glide by people in outboards and sneak up quietly on unsuspecting birds and wildlife? Try sailing in an Alberg classical design sloop. The sailboats are for sale at the Sanibel Marina, one boat is on land and the other in the water.

John Williamson, realtor

for Parcells and Gentry, and Bernie Tool, owner of the Valhalla Shop in Periwinkle Place, are the only distributers of the sloop in Florida.

The boat is 22 feet, 6 inches with a 7 foot beam. draws 3 feet of water, has a 30 foot mast and 1.475 pounds of lead on the keel. This design allows for one person to sail (which was done within the past couple of years by a 21 year old who sailed single-handled to England).

The boat is built in North Kingston, Rhode Island, and is designed as a weekend pleasure boat.

Holiday fishin's great!

These past few weeks of holidays have kept all the local fishing areas jam packed with Island and vacationing anglers. Editor's note: obviously including the writer of this column, whom we hope had a good time and sold a lot of educated shrimp. Welcome back to the ISLANDER's pages!)

One of the most popular fishing spots is the Sanibel Causeway. Many of our friends fishing reported catches of trout, sheepshead, small black grouper and some nice redfish.

Whiting are being caught frequently in the surf. Wade out to the second sandbar during low tide or fish from the beach from high.

Try tipping your jigs with a little piece of shrimp. I've found it very productive in increasing your catch.

The novice usually doesn't know how to care for the fish he has caught. They should be kept alive in fresh salt water by using a stringer or a floating live bag. Also.

using an inexpensive styrofoam ice box (with ice) will keep your fish fresh, if not alive. Clean your catch after each fishing day, wrap in plastic and refrigerate.

The flavor of your fresh fish can be greatly enhanced if you don't have to pick out the bones. Filleting your fish will make your meal much more enjoyable. Follow these steps:

- 1) Put the fish on a flat board and make a cut through the skin from the back of the head, along the back to the top of the tail. Don't cut the flesh free from the carcass. Do the same on the opposite side of the dorsal fin.
- 2) Cut around the back of the head to the rib bones: then make a straight cut from the first incision to the backbone from the tail.
- 3) Leaving the rib bones attached to the backbone, carefully free flesh from the ribs, using your knife and fingers.
- 4) Now you have a strip of flesh with skin and tail attached. Editor's note: wanna bet?) Do the same on the other side.
- 51 Start a cut between skin and flesh at the tail end, hold the blade of the knife flat. Take hold of the tail and pull, still holding the knife flat. The fillet will peel right

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



Fire & rescue report

The Sanibel Fire Control District members made a total of 75 fire and rescue calls during 1975, according to a report from administrative assistant Phil Verdung to Fire Chief Allen Nave.

There were 37 rescue calls, ranging from three "dead on arrivals" to one person locked out of a house, and 38 fire calls (with fortunately only one false alarm) ranging from eight palm fronds to one TV set on fire.

This number, Verdung pointed out, does not include the calls made by the Lee County Emergency Medical Services (EMTs).

Traffic awful

As we're sure anyone who ventured out of their habitat during the past few weeks has to be aware, the traffic on the Islands has been ferocious. Over 72,00 cars went through the toll gates during December (we'd figure about 70,000 from Dec. 21 to Dec. 30---well, we THINK we're kidding) and that's not counting the over 5,000 trucks who came ahauling. We know the gentlemen at the toll booths looked exhausted (although they managed to keep on smiling) and also quite relieved during the much lighter (trafficwise) first week of the new year.

The traffic flow was helped considerably by the installation of the four-way stop signs at the intersection of the causeway, Periwinkle and Lingren. At least it helped when the locals got used to seeing them, which quite a few didn't for the first few days. The four-way signs were installed on an emergency proposal by councilman Francis Bailey, who suggested the measure at the Dec. 29 council meeting.

Although some think a traffic light could be used, the general run of opinion is "Oh, please-No traffic lights on Sanibel!" (Reminds us of a time when we were a wee tad---well, sorta---and one of our mother's friends returned from a visit to the east coast, absolutely HORRIFIED that a traffic light had been installed in that tiny, adorable town of Fort Lauderdale. And that was in the late 40s or early 50s!)

Bike path note

Thanks to the super hard work and dedicated efforts of Mariel Goss and Starr Thomas, it looks as if those bike paths might be rideable on towards the end of the season, 'round March or so.

Pinto won by Miamian

The prize Pinto car, raffled off by St. Isabel's Church to help the rectory building fund, was won by Mr. G. Bradley of Miami. While we're sorry to see the car go off the Islands, we're glad that at least it will be driven in the state, and perhaps the Bradley family will be visiting the Islands more often

City council notes


The City Council meeting this past Tuesday was sort of outshone by the Planning Commission's acceptance of The Plan (see elsewhere for complete PC report) but a few sparks flew when council told Pointe Santo de Sanibel owner Richard Miller that he couldn't build anything at this point, and that the hearing "would be continued until a mutually agreeable time.'

From Miller's words and actions, as well as those of his attorney, Richard Brodeur, who have been working since mid-summer to get a permit for one or another of the five building project, we're not quite sure any time will be "mutually agreeable."

After explaining about financing, and saying that "vested rights would not be brought up at this hearing although we do not waive them," (with the clearly implied, if unspoken, notion that they would be elsewhere, most likely in court) Brodeur said they'd be willing to settle for two permits for two buildings, and then, finally, one permit for one building, building C.

The discussion was fascinating, because somehow or other 18 units per acre got down to six, and 10.1 acres got down to 2, which we would think would allow 12 units (if you take the two acres at 6 units per acre literally) but it added up to 30 units, of which they only

Maybe they got the 30 units by taking 7 acres times 9 units, which are in our notes,



but that didn't last long, because Chairman White said the Plan threw out the nine units, at least along the Gulf Beach Ridge, and then there was some discussion as to whether one went to the mean high tide line (Council Vernon MacKenzie holding out for that one) or mean sea level favored by Chairman White) or the waters of the Gulf of Mexico, which is what Brodeur said the deed read, and indeed, all deeds on the Gulf read.

Anyhow, after Mayor Porter Goss said, while the plan would be adopted by the planning commission the following day, it would be in effect around March, Council Zee Butler made the motion to continue until mutually, etc.

Miller and Brodeur turned their backs on council, turned back and said they'd like a yes or no on whether or not they could build Building C.

Goss asked if they were aware a motion to continue was on the floor. They turned their backs again, turned back to council and said yes, but could they or could they not build **Building C?**

Zee Butler called "Question," all voted

"Aye" and Miller, Brodeur and their court reporter (plus that cute little punch tape machine) buckled up their briefcases and took off for parts unknown.

We could hazard a guess or two, but we're sure we'll have more to report later that isn't guesswork.

Earlier on, while a case was being presented for the Christensens, who wish to build a home in Gumbo Limbo, the question of the height of the road came up (but not far enough. Bad joke. Oh well.)

Anyhow, seems the road is 41/2 feet and that just wouldn't do.

Mayor Goss asked P.C. Chairman White, with a bit of horror in his voice, "You mean to tell me we're going to ask the planners or developers to raise their already paved roads another foot or foot and a half to six feet?" To which White replied, "Yes, your Honor. That is our intention.'

Anyhow, the case got continued without

And that's enough about city council. It was an awful day, anyway. .

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

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
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Shell Fair notes

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
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
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
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A beautiful way to start the new year

We approached the twin diesel tour boat to the strumming of banjos plunking out "Down by the Levee."

It was just along about sunet Friday last, after a long work day for the employees of the Cape Coral Evening Breeze, the Islander and the Beach Bulletin, when we all gathered on "The Suncoaster" to go boating down . the Caloosahatchee.

One of the most unfortunate things about the

Fort Myers area is that the only time one can view the great river is coming across one of the bridges. After that, it disappears and cannot be seen again until one goes to Cape Coral or reaches the Sanibel causeway, after the river has become a part of San Carlos Bay and is no longer distinguishable as a river.

Never having been privileged to go boating up or down the river before, we were in a seventh heaven state as the Suncoaster left the dock in Fort Myers and the twinkling lights of the city behind.

The vast expanse of the Caloosahatchee in the blackness of the night was being watched over by thousands of stars.

The city lights, the streaks of car lights along McGregor, were soon to disappear behind the shoreline of trees. Only now and again the lights of a house along the shore could be seen and along the west bank, the beginning lights of Cape Coral began to twinkle.

The river became all of the here and now. Several boats passed going the other way. The lights of the Cape

Coral bridge span the river somewhere far away and in the future.

The channel meandered around in the wide black calm waters

The boat was doing about ten knots; the two great engine hearts thumping away steadily, the guests were talking and dancing to the tunes of Marty Goldberg and his banjo.

It was a beautiful, clear cool night. Just the right kind of night to be out on the river, going nowhere in particular, but just going. One could feel the kind of peace that comes only from one's soul joining the totalitly of the river-skyuniverse.

The boat approached the Cape Coral bridge. The long striped reflections of the green bridge lights became shorter and shorter along with the reflection of the town lights.

The buildings of Cape Coral are stunning at night...little jewels of color. especially the reflections in the river, which were soon to disappear in the wake of the boat.

The Cape Coral bridge, from the river side, looking up, is a fairly respectable piece of engineering. The pilings and beam decking inspired confidence in the engineers and builders, but that inspiration soon passed to become once again part of the night as we left the bridge behind.

Only a few Cape Coral house lights remained. In the distance, on shore, was another patch of light which was soon obscured by an uninhabited mangrove island. The boat disturbed a few birds from their sleep.

Once past the island, the patch of light became brighter but unrecognizable. The second mate said that they were the lights of Shell Point Village and just beyond, we passed Little Shell Island. A warm yellow glow beckoned from the dark shadows of a house tucked into the bushes and the trees.

Once again the night covered all. A very small boat rested at anchor near the shore. The captain turned on his spotlight to find a channel marker, then turned the boat slightly to starboard. The land mass of Cape Coral came to an end.

The river was all of a sudden confined in between little mangrove islands and, over the loudspeaker, the Captain said the river was entering the bay, the lights in the far distance were Fort Myers Beach and the red, green and white lights immediately in front were the lights of the Sanibel causeway. The bow wake of the boat stirred up a little phosphorus.

Dinner was served. A magnificent spread of cold cuts were spread out on a long table in the lower deck.

The boat whistled. The causeway bridge was raised, cars stopped as gates came across the approach.

The boat passed under the

bridge. Ginni came to the forward deck to remind us that it was time to eat. We went below, filled a plate full and returned to the forward deck. Something terrible had happened. We were approaching another bridge! Where were we? The stars weren't in the same position!

The lights of Fort Myers Beach had disappeared! What had happened to the beacon of the lighthouse?

Somehow, all recognition of time and space had left consciousness.

The second mate said that the boat was now on its way back to Fort Myers. It had made the turn-around. The captain had turned the boat so carefully that none of us had realized what had happened.

There was a temporary feeling of being out of harmony with nature, and feeling a bit annoyed that food had taken precedence over the turning around part of the voyage.

However, it wasn't long before the little islands and the constellations were in their proper place for the return trip.

The night air had turned quite chilly but not cold enough to be inside except briefly for a dance or two.

Two hours more of soul soaring brought us back to the real world of Fort Myers at night, a lot of hustle and bustle of the group gathering up their belongings and going ashore and, thanks to the Captain . the crew and the musicians we began the new year just

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
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




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
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Letters to the editor

To the ISLANDER:

Your news account of January 6th reporting on the previous day's meeting at the Island Cinema of the Sanibel Planning Commission was very informative.

One paragraph, however, gave me pause to wonder whether a statement attributed to Chairman White was misunderstood or whether he truly believes the "carefullycultivated" myth that his statement implies. In response to an inquiry as to "whether the plan would supersede subdivision deed restrictions," he was quoted as responding:

It is customary in these United States for the courts, when properly requested by a party to that specific agreement, to enforce a Deed Restriction so long as it does not contravene public policy on such matters as civil rights, moral turpitude, health, safety, etc. It is true that the Lee County Commission has shied away from such enforcement by insisting that the parties settle

through the costly and time-consuming civil court machinery. That attitude is not based on any specific provision in Florida's lawsas our City Attorney advised in response to my recent specific query at a public meeting of the Planning Commission.

The above-mentioned court custom goes back to the days when "zoning" by governmental action was a rarity, and contractual Deed Restrictions were the accepted medium for neighbors to insure continuing compatibility in the use of their lands. The emergence of "zoning" as the modern tool for that purpose has been spotty throughout the Nation. Texas, for instance, still relies heavily on enforcement by local governments of acceptable Deed Restrictions instead of establishing zoning regulations and a bureaucracy to administer them. (It is that practice that has mislead Lee County Commissioner Goldtrap into believing that the City of Houston is not concerned with land use planning and control).

You may wish to belatedly report my recent suggestion to the Planning Commission that the enforcement of Sanibel's land-use regulations defer to a valid and recorded Deed Restriction when the latter is more restrictive on such land use matters as lot sizes, set-backs, elevations, densities, etc. Council action on such rulings would obviously be needed.
