

Planning commission discusses CLUP, setbacks, etc.

The Planning Commission heard no respite cases vesterday.

Ed Underhill of the Public Information taskforce explained to the Planning Commission that a 20-page, more or less, summary of the land use plan was being collated for free distribution to those who are interested but that the number of copies had not yet been decided.

Duane White said the copies of the whole plan would be available for \$15 this week. He also announced that all of the reviewing agencies had received the plan.

Commissioner LeeRoy Friday reported he

was obtaining information regarding swimming pools and the water supply thereto since he personally was interested in putting in a swimming pool at his home and would "feel very guilty" putting in a pool without knowing if there is in fact enough water.

Emily Underhill announced that Judy Carberry was resigning and thanked Judy for doing an outstanding job as planning commission secretary. White concurred and said that a luncheon would be given for Judy at a later date.

Discussion of the Anderson property failed to bring forth the difference between a variance and an amendment. However, the commission felt legal opinion was necessary before making a decision as to whether Anderson can build seaward of the DNR setback line.

Paul Howe, in the audience, suggested that technical expertise be obtained from the beaches and shores division of the State of Florida who stand ready to help with cases concerning the DNR line.

A 200-foot setback from any open body of water for any part of a septic system for all zones except the mangrove zone where septic tanks are not permitted at all has been incorporated into the engineering department. Friday said that it was difficult to accept that pollution was island-wide and that it was a last-minute arbitrary decision to put a 200-foot setback in the plan.

White quoted Tom Missimer, hydrologist, who said that there should be no septic tanks in residential areas. Don Marshall agreed with Friday and mentioned the holding tank principle. White later explained that sewage would be held in fiberglass tanks or concrete tanks for a week, picked up by truck and hauled to a sewage treatment plant. Marshall opted for general sewerage throughout the island. Friday said that the planning commission had given verbal commitments to petitioners that if they met certain criteria, they would be allowed to build, and thought it was unfair to place a 300 or 200foot restriction at "the last draw." Arthur Hunter, in the audience, said that the thought of "a sewerage system all over the island makes my hair stand on end.

The meeting was adjourned to the wetlands.




Mrs. Moretti is a winter visitors who resides in the Periwinkle Trailer Park.

CPOOS hears about water

The Concerned Property Owners of Sanibel met Tuesday night at the Island Beach Club. Guest speaker of the evening was Ted Smallwood, professional engineer from the Naples firm of Black, Crow and Ideness.

The firm is now designing the 5 mgd reverse osmossis (RO) plant for Cape Coral with "turn of the century" capabilities of 100 mgd, which may eventually serve 1 to 112 million people.

Smallwood explained that the RO system was a "fallout" of the space program which necessitated recycling and purification of water from and for the astronauts, and during the past 10 years or so reverse osmossis had come into its own as a process of purifying brackish water.

Central and South Florida are deficient in ground water supply, he said, much of the water being siphoned off via the river system to recharge the Biscane Aguifer on the east coast. The formations underlying this coast, the Tampa-Tamiami and Suannee, have no apparent lack of water. he said. His firm had studied the formations of 160 wells free-flowing at a rate of 500 gallons per minute since 1923, over 50 years.

The Suannee formation is 900 to 1,000 feet deep on top

of which are the Tampa-Tamiami formations at 400 to 780 feet, he continued. All formations are a part of the Hawthorne aquifer. The Florida department of Geology has available detailed analysis of the quality and quantity of water underlying Sanibel and surrounding areas, he said.

Water should be considered a necessity and conserved as one would a good liquor, he said. He that water problem be looked at in context with recycling waste water. St. Petersburg. for instance, recycles its waste water for irrigation purposes, he said.

Ruth Hunter asked what could be done about people who over-use water. Smallwood replied by giving an example of the affluent people of Naples using four times the amount of water per capita than the people of Cape Coral and that the utility should be under city control so that the city would be better able to regulate growth usage and abuses.

Sanibel's water system is an electodialisis system which is producing water at \$2.92 per 1,000. The new Cape Coral RO plant is expected to produce water. for \$1.00 per 1,000 gallons.



Officer on duty helped pull disabled vehicle which had been stuck in sand.





To convert for Redfish Pass (north tip of Captiva), add 55 minutes to the time shown for every hi tide, and sub tract two (2) minutes for every low tide. (NO, we don't know why, but it works. Instructions following are even less sense-sical but, as we stated, they do work.)

For Captiva Island, Gulf side, subtract 30 minutes from each high tide, and subtract I hour and 16 minutes for each low tide.

For Captiva Island, Pine Island Sound (bay) side, add I hour and four (4) minutes for each high tide, and add 52 minutes for each low tide.


"Gripsholm." which normally carried



Both Sisters really wanted Islanders to know how much their help was appreciated.










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


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Letters to the ISLANDER

To The ISLANDER:

This is a letter from the concerned parents of children and animals who live and walk on Donax St. We think it is time something is done about the Donax St. traffic. You see, last week a raccoon and two very dear family cats were killed. Our reason for mentioning this is because that anyone of those animals could have been one of our children as they were not killed at night, but in broad daylight.

We would like to make a couple of suggestions to the city and other concerned people. First the matter of the afternoon bus stop which is now at the intersection of Periwinkle Way and Donax St. At approximately 3 p.m. every weekday there is a traffic jam between parents waiting to pick up their children and other passing traffic. There have been some pretty close calls of children being hit as we have seen cars go around the bus after it was stopped and had the red flashing lights on.

One of our suggestions is that the bus stop be changed to a quieter place on Donax St. such as behind the Sewage Treatment plants green shed where the morning bus stop now

Next, we would like to suggest a type of bumper across the road in two or three places, such as near the bus stop (after it's location is changed) and one at each end of Donax Village to slow the traffic down. We're talking about the type such as used in trailer parks and other residential areas. We realize our police force isn't large enough to control this situation and the traffic on

Donax varies from 40 mph to 60 mph. At that speed a car couldn't stop in time. This stream of traffic goes on day and night. Also we have witnessed a car passing another car that was going the proper speed of 30 mph.

You see our children and animals are geared to a slower and more peaceful atmosphere (after all that's what this Island is known for) so they tend to be less cautious than if they were in a big city.

We would like to see this matter tended to with the utmost urgency as one day it may be too late and some child will be hurt or killed. Losing an animal can really hurt, but to lose one of our children would be like losing our life.

If the City of Sanibel feels that it would be too costly to finance bumper guards we the parents would like permission that if we collected the money for this project they would allow them to be put in the street. Traffic must be slowed down now!

There is one fact we would like mentioned and that is that there are signs on the Island protecting the birds, the bike path, etc. Other than the school area where are the signs that say "SCHOOL BUS STOP" or "SLOW CHILDREN CORSSING?"


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Review of Jordan Davidson's "Of Men and Dreams"

In the flood of the streams; I am dreamer and dream.





AMENDMENT XVI

Income taxes authorized

(Proposed by Congress July 12, 1909; ratification completed Feb. 3, 1913.)

The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever sources derived, without apportionment among the several States, and without regard to any census or enumeration.

AMENDMENT XVII

United States Senators to be elected by direct popular vote.

(Proposed by Congress May 13, 1912; ratification completed Apr. 8, 1913.)

- 1. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each Senator shall have one vote. The electors in each State shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the State Legislatures.
- 2. When vacancies happen in the representation of any State in the Senate, the executive authority of such State shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: Provided, That the Legislature of any State may empower the Executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the Legislature may direct.
- 3. This amendment shall not be so construed as to affect the election or term of any Senator chosen before it becomes valid as part of the Constitution.

AMENDMENT XVIII

Liquor prohibition amendment

(Proposed by Congress Dec. 18, 1917; ratification completed Jan. 16, 1919. Repealed by Amendment XXI, effective Dec. 5, 1933.)

- 1. After one year from the ratification of this article the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.
- 2. The Congress and the several States shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.
- 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the Legislatures of the several States, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress.





If a President shall not have been chosen before the time fixed for the beginning of his term, or if the President elect shall have failed to qualify, then the Vice President elect shall act as President until a President shall have qualified; and the Congress may by law provide for the case wherein neither a President elect nor a Vice President shall have qualified, declaring who shall then act as President, or the manner in which one who is to act shall be selected, and such person shall act accordingly until a President or Vice President shall have










Bonita Glenn Awes Audience At Community House



"This is just the first step." says Causey. "We've got quite a few more acres to go, and I'm looking forward to it. Sanibel Beach Club is an exciting concept. Bought here myself, so you can be sure the land-scaping is going to be as good as I can make it." And that's very good, indeed.


