

Register on Sanibel July 13

Enid Earle and her assistants from the Officer of Elections will be on the Islands to register voters on Tuesday, July 13, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Sanibel Community Center.

If you are not already a registered voter, you must sign an affidavit that you are 18 years of age or older, a permanent resident of Sanibel and do not plan to vote in any other precinct, and that you are a born or naturalized citizen of the United States.

If you haven't already registered, please do so—because if you don't vote, don't complain about how things are going!

If you wish, of course, you may register in town at the Courthouse. The books will be open until July 24 for registration in the September primaries, and until September 18 for the general election to be held November 2.



And the Council keeps on listenin'

Tuesday night at 5:01, June 29, at Casa Ybel the first of two scheduled night hearings were held so that the public might give the council members more "input" in the matter of the Comprehensive Land Use Plan (CLUP) which at that time was scheduled to be passed into law by Council on July 13.

(However, in a later development Thursday morning, Sanibel Mayor Porter Goss told the ISLANDER "I won't ask council to take action on the plan until everyone has time to digest it and fully understand it. It is quite possible that the plan won't pass on the 13th.")

The meeting, which had a much larger attendance than anyone expected, started out when Richard Brodeaur and Carol Quillinan suggested that the Planning Commissioners be elected rather than appointed.

Councilman Vernon MacKenzie said that in his opinion one elected body (ie, the City Council) responsible directly to the public was enough, and that the planning commissioners did not have to be elected, at which point formal discussion on the suggestion ceased.

June Henry spoke, questioning some major portions of the plan, particularly in the area of density and public knowledge and requested that the plan, rather than be adopted into law by the city council, be put to the public for approval or disapproval via a referendum. The Council members took notes.

Velna Ridge spoke briefly, voicing her opposition to the plan. When Mayor Goss asked what specifically she was referring to, she replied that the plan was incomplete or

erroneous "in so many ways it would take me an hour to do it."

John Spiotta and John Dyke, representing Sanibel Bayshore Associates (the owners of Wulfert Point) both expressed their appreciation of being able to address the council on the point of density of the Wulfert area. Under Lee County Zoning, in effect when the land was purchased by the association, somewhere upwards of 4000



du's could have been built in the area. The Association is asking for approximately 1,600, while the proposed CLUP allows about 50. Spiotta in particular expressed his appreciation for the "interplay of ideas," presumably between council and the Association.

Dyke had prepared a series of overlays, which, when superimposed upon a city map

of Sanibel, showed that if one took the CLUP's proposed .03 to .3 du's per acre and considered them "open land" (which, with one house to every 33 one third acres is valid), about 85 per cent of all land on Sanibel would be either publically owned, and -or virtually useless for residential purposes. Councilman MacKenzie sharply asked Dyke if he (Dyke) were implying "illegality;" Dyke replied no, that his implication "was being realistic."

Paul Kuhn spoke of the problem of "non-conforming existing zoning," at which point he was informed by Mayor Porter Goss that the language concerning "non-conforming" was one of the major changes made in the CLUP as a result of public input. "Non-conforming zoning," which would not have allowed a structure or structures to be rebuilt if they were destroyed 50 per cent or more at some future date had been changed to "lawfully existing use."

While this might seem to some to be mere legalize, it translates out as meaning that if a structure or structures are 50 per cent or more demolished, by fire, storm or whathave you, the structures can be fully rebuilt as long as they respond to the specifications of the plan. The Mayor then specifically used as an example a beachside motel, which might have a number of cottages in front of the DNR line which might be destroyed in a storm. His point was that the same number of units could probably be rebuilt, although they might have to go into two story structures in order to comply with the plan's specific that no building take place in front of the DNR line.

Bert Jenks called the plan one which was a "so called plan...which made the rich richer

and the poor poorer" and said some citizens might be taxed out of ownership of their land.

P.A. Bertrum questioned Part III of the CLUP (which was scheduled to be worked on this week) and was assured by Council that the present use of the land when the plan was passed would continue.

Maxine Michl pointed out that, as far as she could see, the plan was not a "threshold, but rather a ceiling" for, she said, once the land was put together to meet the building specifications called for in the present plan, there was any land to come from to take care of future expansion, if any? She also spoke of the raise of taxes on land already in use or built upon.

Councilman MacKenzie said she had raised an interesting point "if I have understood you correctly...you are saying that taxes will be going up when everyone else is saying they will be going down?"

Michl replied that when the large tracts of land were devalued, since a certain dollar base was needed, the taxes on improved property would correspondingly rise, in some cases, she feared, so high as to tax the present owner on a fixed income out of his home.

Arthur Hunter said that he thought the council looked awful tired and hungry and that he found it hard to understand the council's patience with all concerned and that he thought they were doing a good job, so let's let them go home.

Kim Chin, an attorney for John Sawbridge, spoke as Sawbridge's attorney,

Hurricane tonight

Yup, there's a hurricane coming tonight—at least, a hurricane preparedness meeting at the Sanibel Community Association. It will start with the traditional covered dish supper for members and their guests at 6:30 p.m., and the general open meeting will start at 7:45 p.m. (not 8 o'clock as previously reported).

You'll probably pick up some vital facts, especially if you have not been through a major hurricane in this area, so we recommend that you attend.

The agenda of the meeting follows:

- 1. "What is it like to go through a hurricane?" (Film) Col. Turon, Director, Department of Disaster Preparedness, Lee County —16 Minutes.
2. "The six hurricanes that have hit Sanibel since 1900." "Bill" Zeliff, Chief Meteorologist WBBH, Fort Myers—8 Minutes.
3. "At what point in a storm's development will you tell us its time to get off the Islands? Also, will you know at that

time what grade of storm it is, the wind velocity, and expected tides, and amount of rain that will precede it." Lestor Benson, Meteorologist-in-charge, National Weather Bureau, Fort Myers—10 Minutes.

Mr. Benson plans to graphically illustrate what can happen to property along the shore by showing 10 slides of homes, churches, buildings, and condominiums before and after the storm hits.

4. "How to prepare for a storm." (Film) Col. Turon—6 Minutes.

5. "How the Red Cross selects shelters and why Fort Myers High was selected for Sanibel and Captiva." Barry Hall, Executive Director, American Red Cross, Fort Myers—10 Minutes.

6. "Evacuation routes selected for Sanibel and Captiva to reach this public shelter." Col. Turon—5 Minutes.

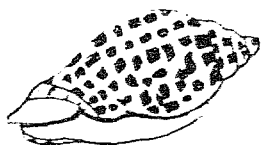
7. "How the traffic from Sanibel-Captiva to the shelter will be controlled. Road blocks to be set up, etc." Sheriff Wanicka—5 Minutes.

8. "What preparations have been made to prepare Sanibel and Captiva for a storm and a safe evacuation. Also the new plan of establishing Hurricane Wardens in each subdivision to prepare people for a hurricane, be able to alert residents more quickly, to handle problem cases, and keep tabs on where people plan to go. (This is new and will be unveiled for the first time.)—10 Minutes.

9. Questions and answers from the floor—15 Minutes.
10. Comments: Chairman, Lee County Commissioners "Bob" Whan Sanibel Mayor, Porter J. Goss.

b. Evacuation routes to shelter.
c. What to take with you to a shelter.
d. The individuals who make up the Sanibel-Captiva E.P.E.R.T. Organization.

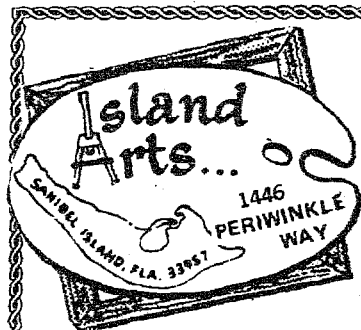

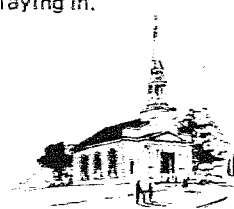

Young conservation group working on the Islands

For those of you who've been wondering what the little yellow sign reading "Y.C.C." that has been seen at various points around the Islands means, it's the abbreviation for Youth Conservation Corps, a federal program administered by the Fish and Wildlife Services under the auspices of the Department of the Interior that's been in existence nationwide for all of six years now, although this summer marks the first time that a Y.C.C. group has worked on Sanibel.

Nationwide, the program has 1500 participants, while on Sanibel the Y.C.C. is composed of only 16 young people between the ages of 15 and 18 years old from Fort Myers and the surrounding unincorporated areas of Lee County. Regrettably, none of the program's youthful participants are from the Islands.

The purpose of the program is to provide gainful employment for teenagers on public lands, with an eye to making them environmentally aware through education and their work experience.

On Sanibel, Y.C.C. members spend 75 per cent of their time working in the J.N. ("Ding") Darling National Wildlife Refuge. Currently, the group is engaged in clearing one side of the 5-mile long wildlife drive through the Main Tract of the Darling Refuge of Brazilian pepper and other undesirable plant species, to improve the visibility from the dike.

The remaining 25 per cent of their time is spent in studying the environment under the tutelage of Atlanta environmentalist John Draper, with the assistance of various guest speakers from the Islands. There are

also plans to take the group on a number of educational field trips later in the program.

Refuge manager Glen Bond, Jr., is the project manager for the Y.C.C. program on Sanibel, with Wayne Mills serving as camp director. The official title for the program on the Islands is The J.N. Ding Darling National Wildlife Refuge Youth Conservation Corps Camp, which, to this reporter, smacks too much of the bureaucratic for such a worth program as this.

This summer's eight-week program will end on August 13, but camp director Wayne Mills expects the Y.C.C. to be continued on Sanibel because of the success of the program.

"These young people are all working hard," said Mills last week, "but apparently they're finding time to enjoy the beauty of Sanibel as well."

A copy of the following letter, addressed to William Nungester, Sanibel City Manager, was submitted to The ISLANDER for publication:

This letter is to formally convey the Concerned Property Owners disappointment with the way Sanibel's Revenue Sharing Funds have been earmarked without published notice to the public.

We realize that you did not receive the notice until June 18th that the funds were forthcoming and were required to reply to Washington on the 25th but it would appear that you could have run an ad in the Fort Myers News Press on the 21st advising the citizens of Sanibel that the subject was to be decided on that date. It is our understanding that public input into how revenue sharing dollars is highly desirable, yet the working people of Sanibel were never given public notice (published).

The Concerned Property Owners of Sanibel, Inc. feel that Sanibel has many crying needs. It seems a bit absurd that Sanibel would spend two-thirds (\$10,000) of

its revenue sharing funds still trying to prove that septic tanks pollute our canals and bayous. The Concerned Property Owners have stated all along that septic tanks are not a problem of that magnitude.

In that \$10,000 of our \$17,271 has been earmarked for this environmental study we also want to go on record at this time to strongly recommend that if this study absolutely has to be made, it be made by a local engineering firm with some professional stature.

Creditability of government at all levels is at an all time low and to bring in a new firm that isn't even listed in the Yellow Pages to do this controversial study as you indicated to me on the phone Friday, could only further erode creditability.

We sincerely hope that we can work together in the future to make Sanibel an even better place to live.

City notes

Sanibel city attorney Frank Watson announced last week that the city was successful in overcoming the attempt of Sundial Condominiums to have the city post a multi-million dollar bond while awaiting the outcome of the city's appeal of the Sundial ruling handed down last October, which allowed the corporation to proceed with building on the site.

Circuit Court Judge Jack Schoonover ruled that the case could only be heard at the appellate court level, thus making him ineligible to hear the case on a point of procedure. As of the ISLANDER deadline last week, Sundial had not appealed the decision.

In other litigation involving the city, city attorneys still have a few days left to file their reply to the Pointe Sanibel Con-

dominium suit before deadline.

The Sanibel City Council last week instructed city manager Bill Nungester to enter into lease contract for another police car for the Islands. The council felt that the acquisition was necessary because both of SPD's official vehicles had broken down the previous weekend, causing some minor problems in law enforcement.

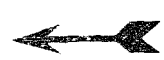

Sanibel history at Library Session

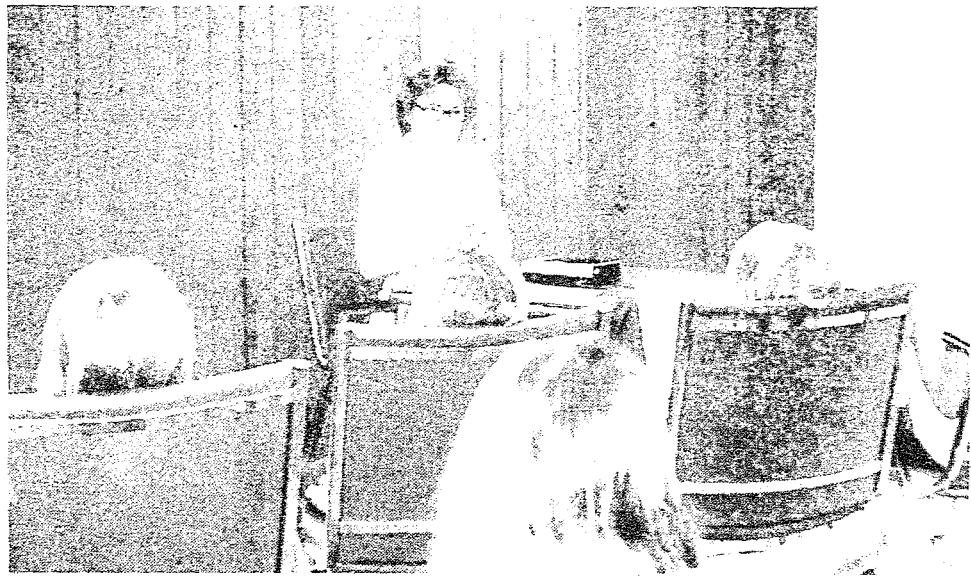

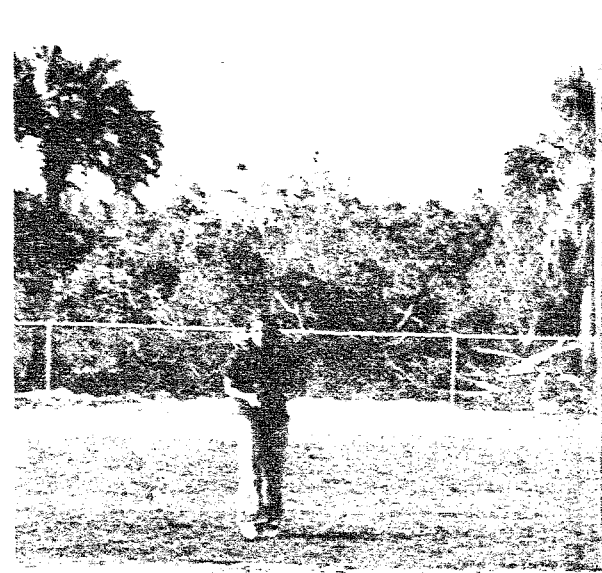
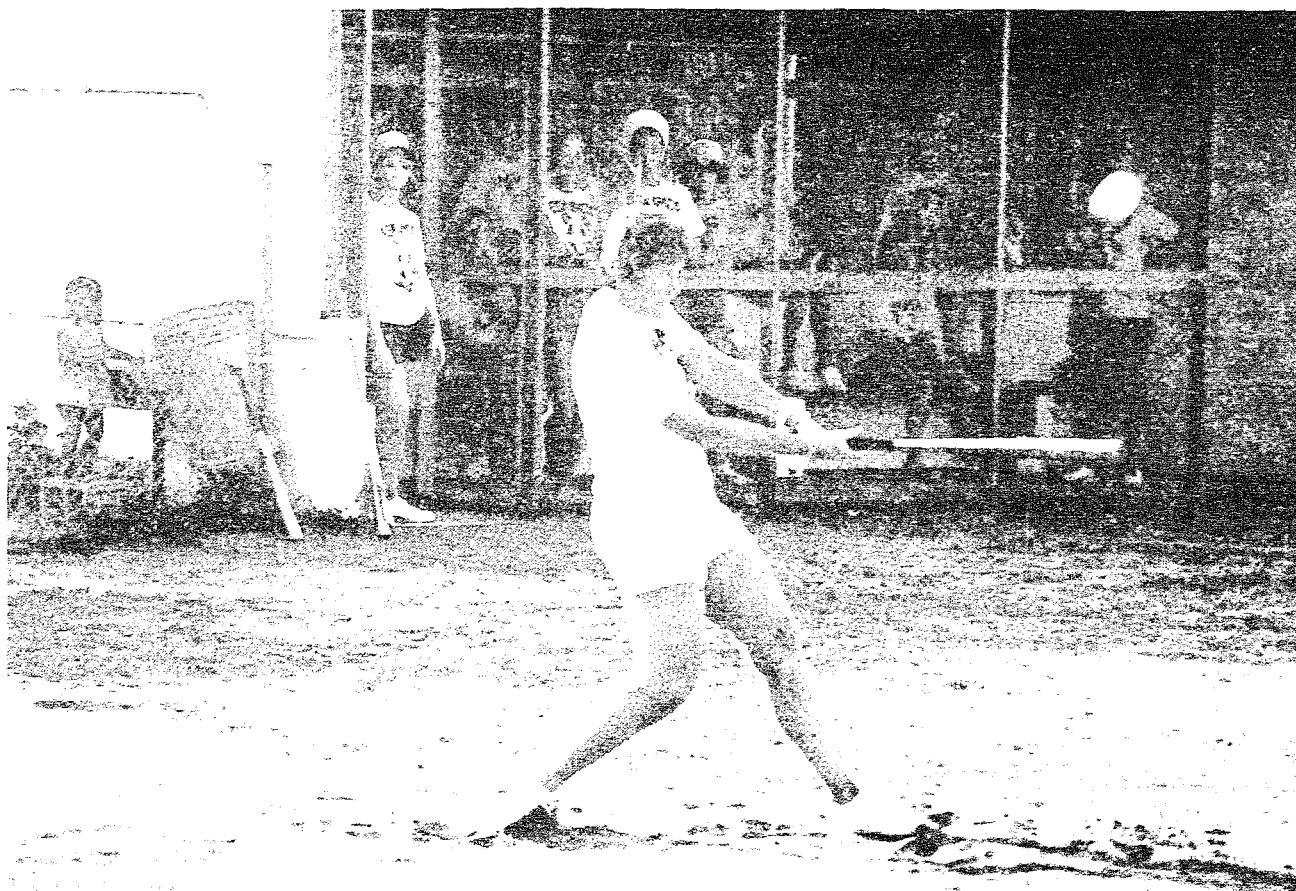

WMRT in Miami

We see by one of last week's Miami *Heralds* (the Monday, June 28, one to be exact) that Little Havana is deteriorating. The way the people of Miami know this, the article says, is because "These are some of the facts revealed by investigations conducted by the architectural firm of Wallace, McHarg, Roberts and Todd, an internationally known urban-planning organization.

"The Company has been planning the development of all the Miami neighborhoods, in accordance with new state regulations requiring adoption of a comprehensive development plan for all municipalities or counties by July 1, 1979.

"The firm, which has a \$391,000 city of Miami contract, has been working on the project for the last 18 months..."

We merely were set to a-wondering if that figure was the original one, or if Miami's financial experience with WMRT has been anything like Sanibel's. (We still find it very hard to understand why the City of Sanibel has to pay an extra \$6,000 to correct a *mistake not made by the city but rather by WMRT*. It's not quite a case of coals to Newcastle, but it smacks of something similar...Perhaps carrying sea shells to Sanibel?)

Kudos to Council

These past few weeks have been long and weary ones for many of us, especially the City Council, during the fine honing of the Comprehensive Land Use Plan (CLUP)

which has been going on and on and on and...for ever on.

At this point, The ISLANDER would like to congratulate the Council members on their patience and dedication. This is not to say that we agree with them on which way the Plan is heading, but at least they are listening and taking the many contradictions, suggestions and sometimes downright abuse into consideration with what seems to us to be an almost superhuman quota of patience.

For a while, we were a bit confused, because everything was so different—and then we realized what it was. The Council truly is trying to listen to the people of Sanibel. What the end result will be is still a moot point (we're still ready to make book on the CLUP going all the way to the Supreme Court) but we are heartened with the City Council's attempts, both as individuals and as a body.

Pity the same can't be said for the Planning Commission, where it is oh so

very, very obvious that legal points are outweighing equity. The more we think about it, the more we tend to agree that the Planning Commission should be an elected body, rather than an appointive one—then, just perhaps, consideration of the public might outweigh consideration of what can be gotten away with legally.

This last, by the by, is not an outright condemnation of all of the planning Commission, since in our personal opinion, Messrs. Friday and Tenney seem to be following their own conscience in the same way they would whether they had been appointed or elected.

But, back to Council—congratulations—we may not agree with you, but we surely can't say you aren't trying to fulfill your responsibilities 'way above what might be expected.

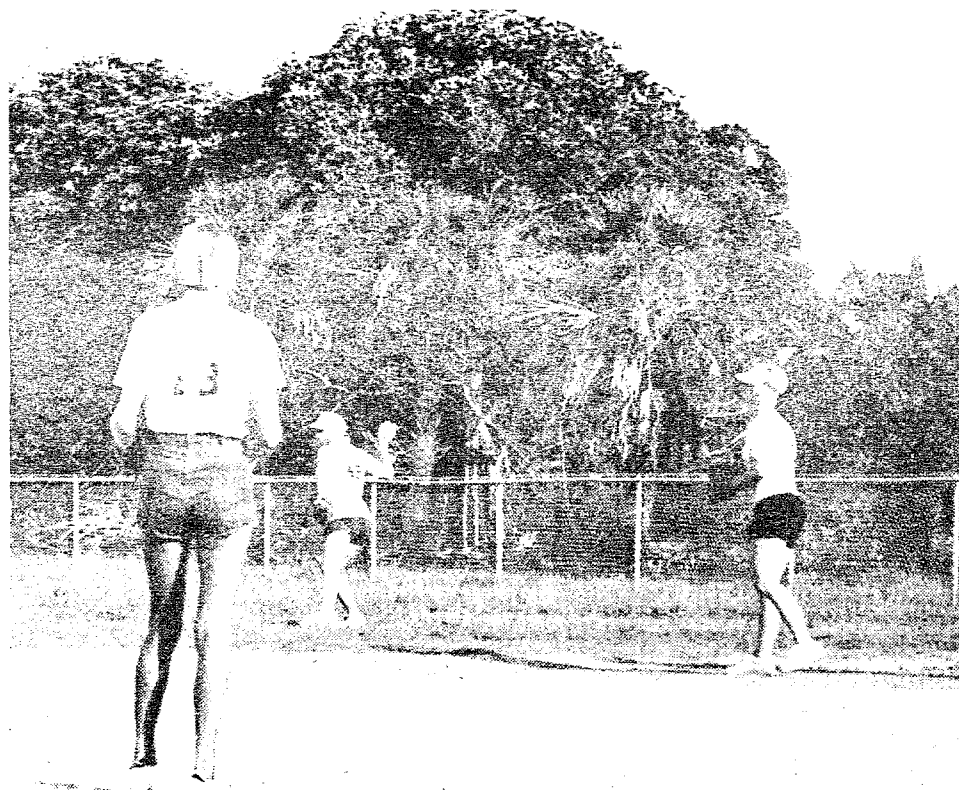

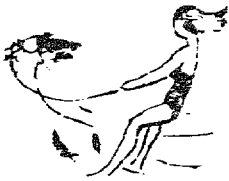
Anyhow, a number of telling points were made during the hearing--two of the most important being the suggestion by Richard

Long announces

Last week, Fort Myers attorney Jim Long announced his candidacy for the newly-created judgeship in the Lee County judicial system, which will have jurisdiction over all criminal misdemeanors and civil actions involving less than \$2,500.

Long's qualifications, he said, include extensive trial experience and many years of private legal practice in the state of Florida. As Assistant State Attorney during the years 1973 through 1976, Long prosecuted more than 500 criminal actions and was responsible for the conviction of Fort Myers Delbert Tibbs.

Long describes himself as a man "concerned with the continued disrespect for the American judicial system and favoring the return to old fashioned values where the law was respected, applied equally and firmly."

2 a.m. bar closing okayed

At their regular meeting last Tuesday afternoon, the Sanibel City Council passed the controversial liquor ordinance that has created such a stir among Island night people since it was first proposed some weeks ago, but not without having been revised in its most vital spot.

Originally, the ordinance contained a provision requiring all bars within the city limits to close up shop at midnight, but last Tuesday the council modified their stand on the issue to allow Island lounges the 2:00 a.m. closing permitted elsewhere in Lee County.

The closing hour revision was instigated by councilman Zee Butler on the basis of a letter received of Sanibel Police Chief John Butler in support of the 2:00 a.m. closing. Chief Butler had originally suggested the earlier closing in hopes of minimizing late night disturbances occasioned by rowdy bacchantes, but it was feared that the midnight closing would flood the city streets with a mass exodus (or evacuation, if you will) of dwt's weaving their way to taverns elsewhere in the county.

The council did, however, negate the possibility of an autonomous bar community ever growing up in the city by making the issuance of a liquor license coincident to the applicant's selling food at all hours that liquor is served. Not more than 49 per cent of the gross annual take of the business can be attributable to the sale of liquor under the ordinance if the spirits are consumed on the premises.

The action was intended to rule out the existence of "local watering holes that cater to the unhappy element of the community," as Mayor Porter Goss put it, although two Island businessmen possess liquor licenses which permit them autonomous bars at the present time. One of them is councilman Francis Bailey who claims no intention of ever using the right granted him by his special license, while the other is Keith Trowbridge for Casa Ybel Resort, which, although anticipating the installation of restaurant facilities in the near future, currently has only a lounge.

The ordinance provides for all bars on Sanibel to be closed between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m. Monday through Saturday, and 2:00 a.m. and noon on Sunday. Liquor can be sold for consumption off the premises at all hours except midnight through 7:00 a.m. daily.

So, the issue that has probably generated more debate among Islanders than any since incorporation has now been laid to rest in the city statutes.

"We have received not a little comment with regard to the closing hours," said Mayor Goss during the course of the discussion last Tuesday. The majority of the comment and correspondence received by the city in support of the 2:00 a.m. closing came from young people, Goss reported.

Chin up, young Americans, for on Sanibel there is democracy at work!

Free boat inspections

Safe Boating week, the July 4 to 10, will feature free boat inspections, according to Harley Brown, Commander of the Sanibel Captiva Power Squadron.

The Squadron has arranged with the Coast Guard Auxiliary to offer free "courtesy inspections" for all local boat owners on Friday and Saturday, July 9 and 10. The inspections will be held at Brown's dock on the main canal in the Shell Harbor area. The address is 794 Conch Court and the dock is just over the Periwinkle Way bridge over the canal.

APPOINTMENTS must be made for inspections, which will be held between 9 and 5 each day. To make an appointment, call Harley Brown at 472-1395 any time

from now to July 10. In case your boat is too big to get to the dock (for instance, a sailboat or other high boat) the inspectors will go to the boat's location.

The inspection, which takes about twenty minutes, will insure the boat owner that he has all the legally required safety equipment in good working order, as well as an offering of informed advice and tips on equipment, while not legally required, can contribute to the safety of the boat and its occupants.

There are NOT any penalties if the boat does not pass inspection, and no records are made when a boat doesn't pass— but at least you'll know what you need for both your personal boating safety and the legal requirements in case you

get stopped by the Marine Patrol or Coast Guard at some later date.

An official 1976 Coast Guard decal will be placed on each boat which passes. This decal is recognized by all maritime authorities as evidence that the boat is properly equipped.

President Ford proclaimed July 4 through the 10th as National Safe Boating week this year. The annual event is sponsored by the National Safe Boating Council, Inc., which is an affiliation of a number of organizations including the U.S. Power Squadron, the Coast Guard Auxiliary, the American Red Cross, the Boy Scouts, the Boating Industry Association and some 25 other marine oriented organizations.

Conversion table: The above tides are for the lighthouse point of Sanibel only. To convert for Redfish Pass (north tip of Captiva), add 55 minutes to the time shown for every hi tide, and subtract two (2) minutes for every low tide. (NO, we don't know why, but it works. Instructions following are even less sense-sical but, as we stated, they do work.)

For Captiva Island, Gulf side, subtract 30 minutes from each high tide, and subtract 1 hour and 16 minutes for each low tide.

For Captiva Island, Pine Island Sound (bay) side, add 1 hour and four (4) minutes for each high tide, and add 52 minutes for each low tide.

In between these points on gulf or bay --- guesstimate --- and have good fishing and - or shelling.

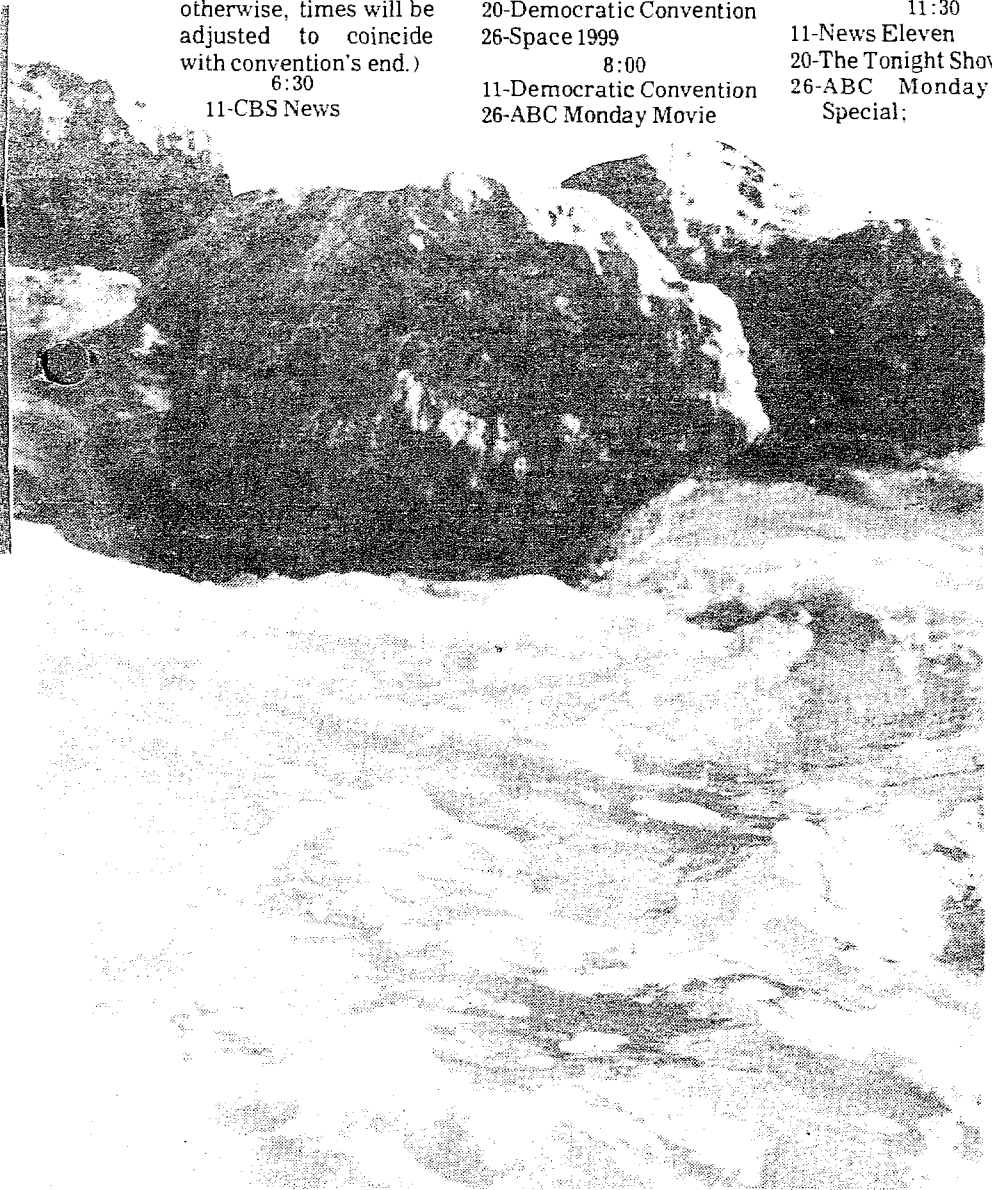

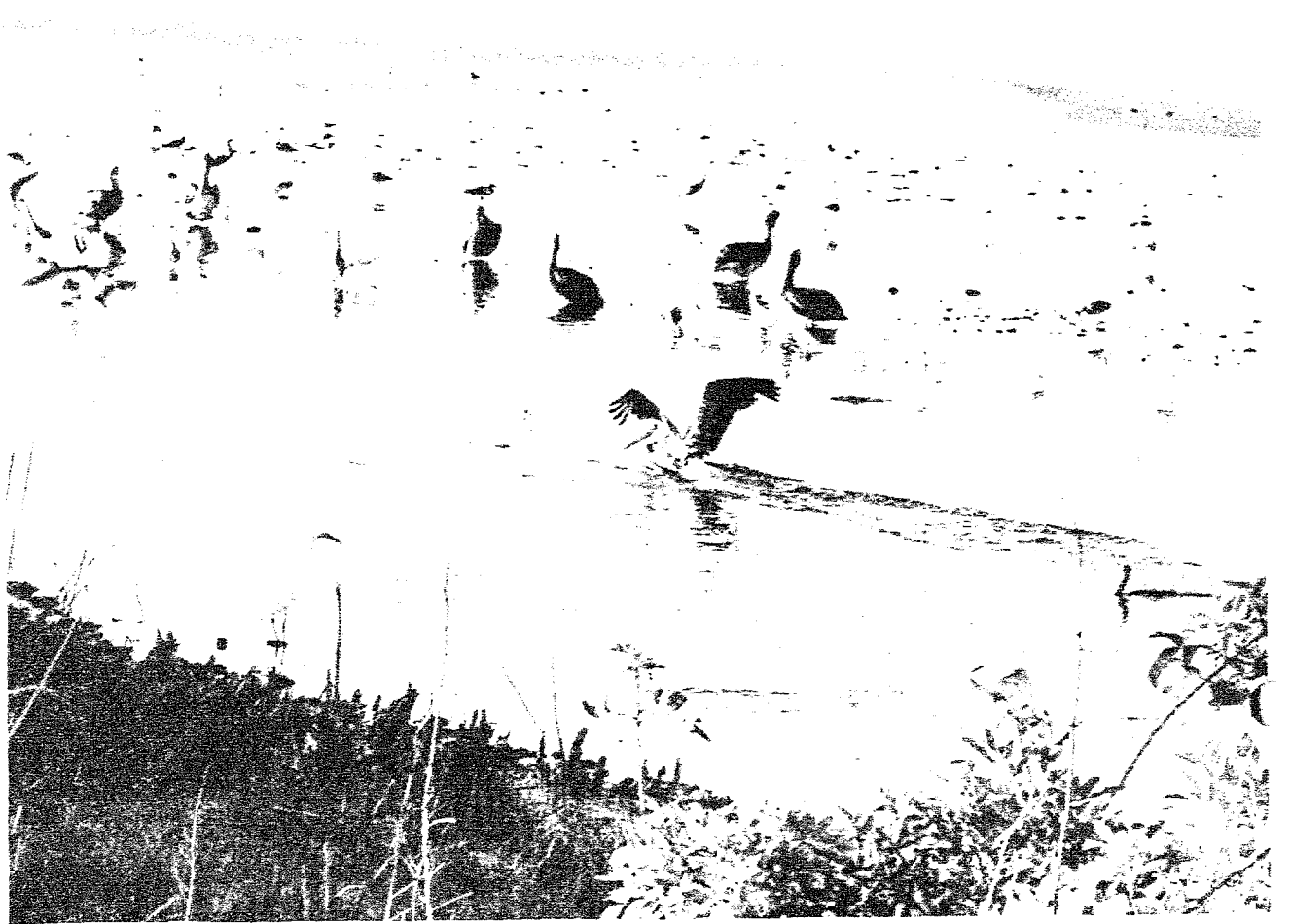

Last Tuesday, the Sanibel City Council voted unanimously to grant the request of Jane and Theodore Slosson, Jr. to build a single-family home in the Sanibel Estates Subdivision on Lighthouse Way, despite the fact that the Slosson's plans failed to conform to the provisions of the proposed comprehensive land use plan (CLUP) for the city of Sanibel.

The Slossons' case is, admittedly, a unique one. Although their lot conforms to the minimum lot size required to build under the CLUP, building on the land would be impossible were they to observe both the Bay beach and front yard setbacks outlined in the CLUP due to the erosion of the property caused by wave action on the Bay side.

As the lot was on filled land and there would be no other allowable use of the property were the city to deny the Slossons'

request, the council decided to grant them a variance of 7 feet from the front yard setback contained in the plan's development regulations. The Slossons must still abide by the Beach beach setback, elevation requirements, septic tank requirements, and all other performance standards set forth in the CLUP.

In other business last week, the council passed an ordinance governing the operation of taxicabs within the city and considered resolutions requesting the County Court to sit in regular sessions on Sanibel and requesting the Lee County Supervisor of Elections, Enid Earle, to conduct the election for city offices.

Later in their meeting last week, the council directed city manager Bill Nugester to write a letter in support of the state purchase of portions of Cayo Costa and Upper Captiva Islands.

City sued

On June 29th, Naples attorney David Emerson Bruner filed a suit for declaratory relief against the City of Sanibel on behalf of David B. Holtzman and Rudolphine Elstner Holtzman of the Shell Harbor Inn on Sanibel.

The plaintiffs charge the city fathers with "unfair discrimination against motel owners as a class" in their denial of Holtzman's respite request for permission to build 42 additional motel units and a restaurant onto the Shell Harbor Inn, located at the corner of Lindgren Boulevard and East Gulf Drive.

The battle over the 42 additional units began on February 9 of this year and continued through a long course of hearings before the city planning commission and city council until the council finally denied the request on June 29 on the grounds that the proposed expansion of the motel failed to conform to the density requirements outlined in the city's proposed comprehensive land use plan (CLUP).

The planning commission had originally recommended that the project be approved

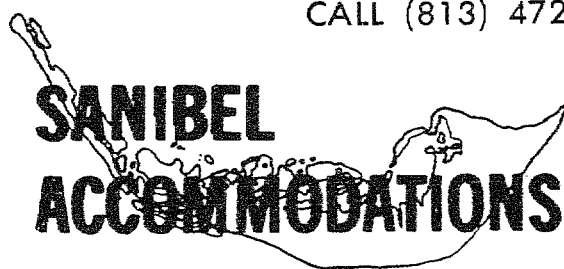
with provisos, but on March 22 they reversed their earlier decision due to a change in density allocation in the proposed CLUP. The suit avers that the CLUP's density allocation for Holtzman's 7.87-acre beach-front parcel is "unreasonable, unlawful, illegal, discriminatory and confiscatory," by dint of comparison with the old Lee County zoning for the property, which permitted considerably more than the 110 units (total) desired by Holtzman.

Holtzman's request for the additional units was based on a desire to maintain an excellent AAA rating, for which the proposed restaurant and lounge are imperative, thus necessitating at least 100 units in the motel. At the present time, there are only 69 motel units in the Shell Harbor Inn.

Sanibel Mayor Porter Goss was reluctant to comment on the suit in time for The ISLANDER's deadline without consulting the city attorneys. Goss had only received the document Thursday morning.

The action was filed in the Lee County Circuit Court with State attorney Joseph P. Allesandro.

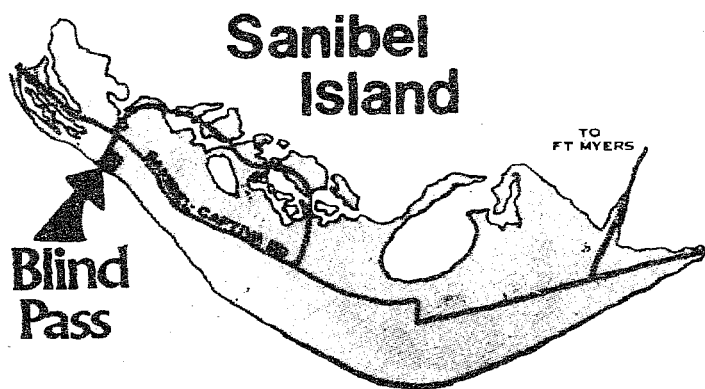

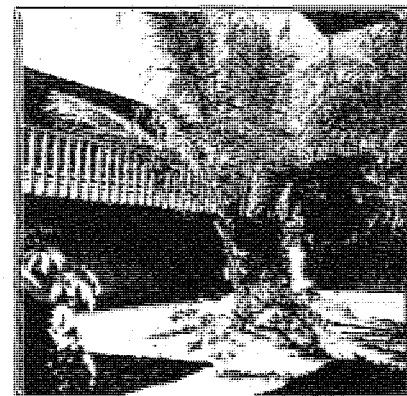

Police report

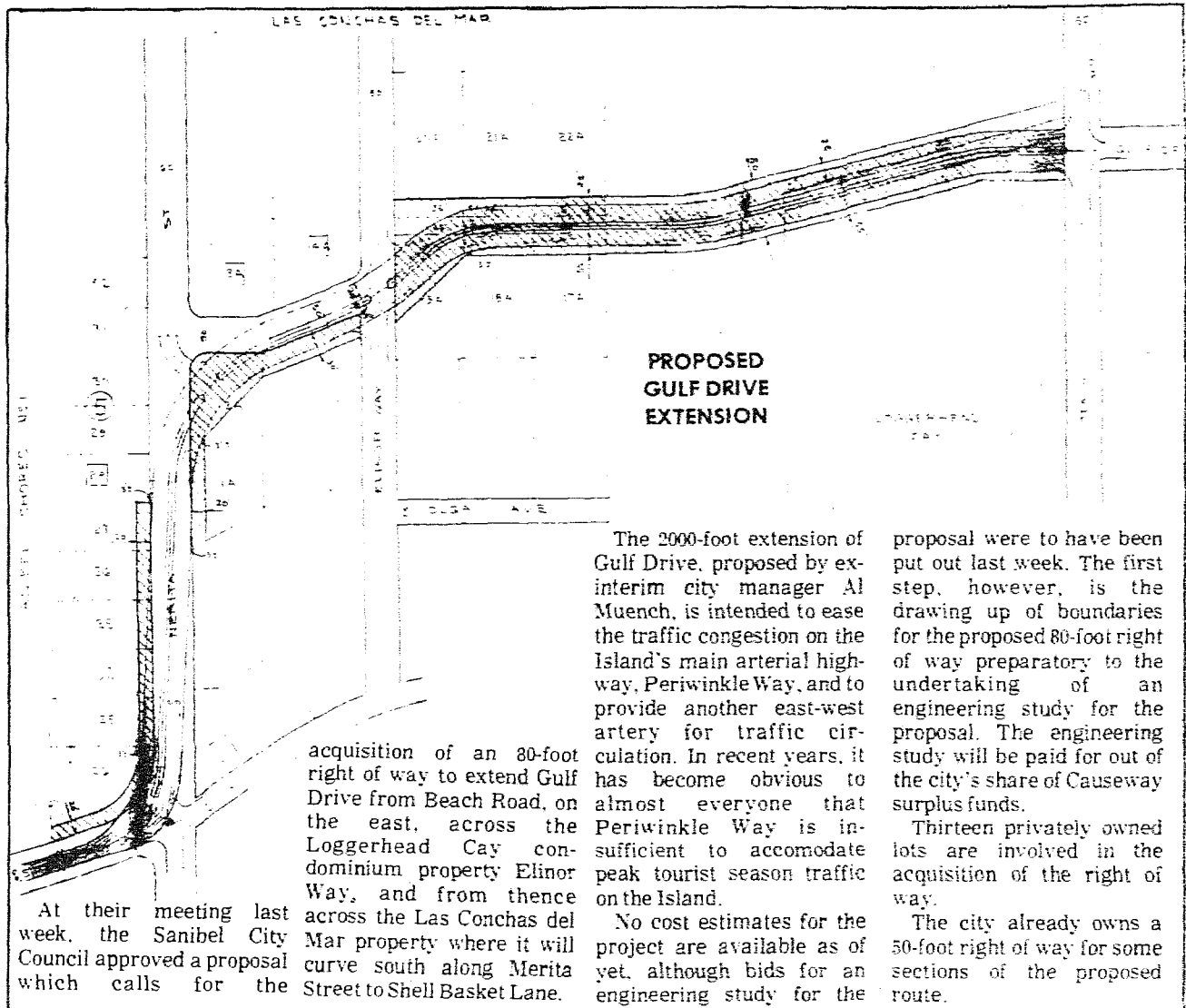

At their meeting last week, the Sanibel City Council approved a proposal which calls for the

acquisition of an 80-foot right of way to extend Gulf Drive from Beach Road, on the east, across the Loggerhead Cay condominium property Elinor Way, and from thence across the Las Conchas del Mar property where it will curve south along Merita Street to Shell Basket Lane.

The 2000-foot extension of Gulf Drive, proposed by interim city manager Al Muench, is intended to ease the traffic congestion on the Island's main arterial highway, Periwinkle Way, and to provide another east-west artery for traffic circulation. In recent years, it has become obvious to almost everyone that Periwinkle Way is insufficient to accommodate peak tourist season traffic on the Island.

No cost estimates for the project are available as of yet, although bids for an engineering study for the

proposal were to have been put out last week. The first step, however, is the drawing up of boundaries for the proposed 80-foot right of way preparatory to the undertaking of an engineering study for the proposal. The engineering study will be paid for out of the city's share of Causeway surplus funds.

Thirteen privately owned lots are involved in the acquisition of the right of way.

The city already owns a 50-foot right of way for some sections of the proposed route.

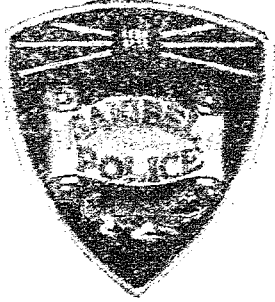

Somebody stole an empty case of soda bottles.

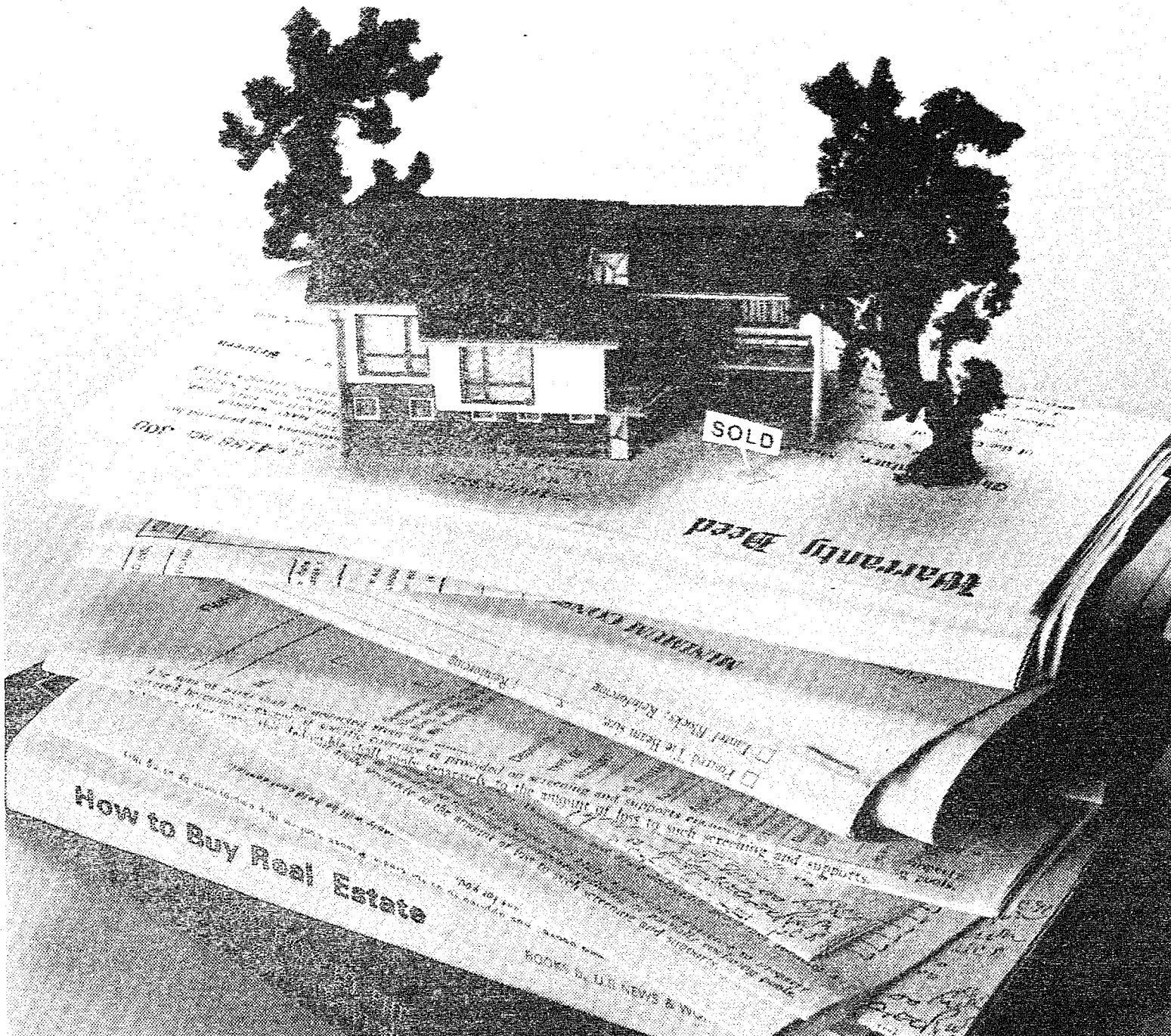
Call came in that person or persons unknown were parking illegally and trespassing. Turned out car(s) were on dedicated roads which were further dedicated public walkways.

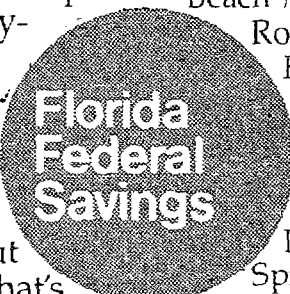

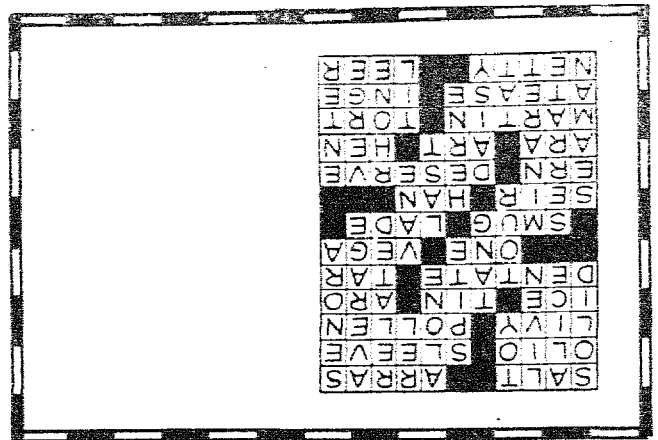

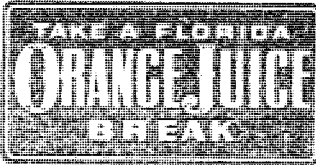

protesting his client's land being designated as "wetlands," when in fact, he said, Sawbridge stated much of it was so dry that it had cactus growing on it. He asked for a personal visual inspection of the Sawbridge property, rather than a blanket wetland designation determined by aerial photographs.

Alice Kylo expressed her disgust and said she was sick and tired of having people say "I don't approve" when they didn't even know what they were talking about, and that hundreds of hearings had been held on the plan, so how could anyone not know what the plan was all about.

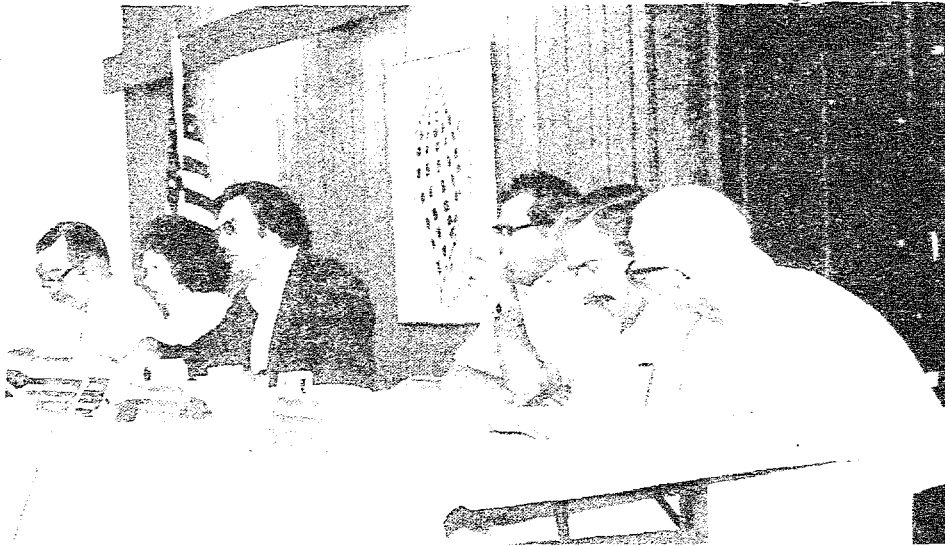
Philip Hunter said that he didn't know too much about the plan, except what he had

Just before adjournment, Mayor Goss said that July 13 was "the magic date" and that the plan could be passed after hearing more public input starting at 5:01.
