## Plan to pass tonight?

Tonight MAY be the night -- the night Sanibel's City Council may pass the Comprehensive Land Use Plan (CLUP) into law. A public hearing will start at 5:01 at City Hall, and according to what Mayor Porter Goss told the ISLANDER Friday morning, passage of the CLUP will depend mainly on what public input is offered this evening. Be sure to attend!

## Park plans

The Sanibel City Council last week gave tentative approval to Lee County Director of Community Services and Parks, Larry Gnagey, to proceed with plans for the installation of the long overdue Sanibel-Captiva Community Park on ground owned by the Lee County School Board behind the Sanibel Elementary School.

The proposed recreational facilities planned for the site include an Olympic-size swimming pool, softball fields, and a regulation Little League baseball field among others, while four lighted tennis courts are slated for installation within the year, along with the

\$15,000 earmarked for the Islands in the Lee County Parks Department budget and an equal amount of matching funds from the City of Sanibel, to come from the proceeds from the J.N. (Ding) Darling National Wildlife Refuge. The parks department will have \$30,000 set aside for the Islands in next year's budget, Gnagey claimed. The entire project is expected to cost in the vicinity of \$300,000 and take five lighting and resurfacing of the existing basketball courts at the school.

The immediate plans are to be accomplished with the

### Planning Commission, in terms of their final land use plan (CLUP). Both councilmen and planners spent much of the week reading the numerous files of correspondence that have accumulated from interested citizens

commenting on the plan. With the originally scheduled adoption of the CLUP slated for tonight at a public hearing to be held at the one won-Sanibel City Hall, ders if last week's relative lull in the planning controversy might not have been the proverbial calm before the storm.

Both the council and the planning commission met late last week for a final bout of workshop sessions on the CLUP, the planning commission Friday morning, and the council later that afternoon. Primarily, those sessions were intended for final editing and revision of the plan, as well as for the consideration of a few dangling policy matters.

The major change in the proposed CLUP which evolved last week was that the development intensity for all areas allocated a 4.4 or a 2.9 density in the plan would be

Last week was a relatively quiet week for changed to a density of 2.0 units per acre, both the Sanibel City Council and City while all areas allocated a 2.0 density would be changed to allow a development intensity review of the city's proposed comprehensive of 2.2 units per acre, with certain exceptions. The changes were made to provide equity throughout the plan to modern platted subdivisions.

The long, long awaited final adoption of the plan could come tonight at the public hearing at City Hall, although a number of councilmen have stated publicly that they would delay the final adoption another week or so if the public expresses a desire for more time to digest the recent revisions at tonight's hearing.

"We're going to do our best to sort out all genuine concerns that the public might have with regard to the plan in whatever length of time it takes us to do so," Mayor Porter Goss told The ISLANDER last week, "but of course, no amount of further consideration will suit those who are just plainly opposed to planning on principle. We're at the point now where most of the policy questions are pretty well decided anyway.

"I think this is a good plan for the first year." Goss continued, "although granted, we'll have to make some adjustments as (Continued on Page 3)





#### Shots for school

The State of Florida, in its infinate wisdom, requires all kindergarten and first grade students (or students new to the Lee County School System) to be immunized against Polio. Diptheria. Whooping Cough. Tetanus, Measles (regular) and Rubella (German Measles). The state also strongly recommends that the children be given a vaccine for Mumps (evidently they expect a bumper crop this year) but the latter is not an ABSOLUTE requirement.

Anyhow, the state has found out that twothirds of all pre-school children have not had complete (and in many case, any) of the required shots. And to get your child into school, public or private, you must present a certificate of immunization to the school before your child can be accepted. To get a certificate, (and, of course, the shots) see or call your family doctor or the County Health Department.





'Twas quite a week in more ways than one-first off, "that" alarm went off 29 times, triggered by such various sounds as "a loud crash!" people nearby decorating a parade float, ringing telephones and one real B&E which was taking place down the block a way. Seven other alarms decided to join the fun and went off for unknown reasons at one time or another.

Two tickets were issued for speeding, two moving violation tickets or warnings were issued, four cars were parked where they oughten of been itwo on sea oats. vet: six calls for assistance were made and answered. the ambulance was called for once, seven cars were broken into with total losses reaching over \$2,000, one wallet and two dogs were lost, while three wallets and "medic alert" bracelet were found, two "open door" checks proved fruitless (doors left open by mistake, but no damage done and-or intended) and there were a few B&E's which we shall go into later.

We've said it before, and we'll say it again-PLEASE do NOT leave things of value parked car, especially if it is parked at a beach access or in a large public parking lot—this past week, people lost anywhere from \$25 to well over \$800 in auto B&E's. Unfortunately, Sanibel and Captiva are not the secure islands they once were-it seems the world has caught up with us, and we'd better start locking our doors, and cleaning out our cars and so forth.

A late afternoon call came in that a young person was firing what appeared to be an air rifle "around the property all day and, in fact, was now by the garage." Unfortunately, the officer on duty was at the end of Bowman's Beach trying to extract a Lee County Sheriff's Office vehicle from the sands. By the time the car was unstuck, the kid was gone.

Break-in was reported-said break-in being accomplished by removing glass sections from a door. Nothing was apparently stolen with the exception of space and time, since building seemed to be used as a "love nest."

Call came in that a front wheel had been stolen from a bike; when officer responded to call immediately, there was nothing to investigate, since everyone had gone home with or without wheels.

Officer on routine patrol noticed three people standing by a canal looking at alligators. Since one of the three persons had a white bucket, the officer said he put two and two together and asked the bucket holder if he were feeding the alligators. Bucket holder

readily admitted doing so, saying he had been feeding 'em for 47 years. When the officer pointed out the sign which clearly read "Do Not Feed The Alligators" bucket holder responded that he was of the opinion that the sign was there for tourists, not him. Officer informed feeder that if he were caught again, he would be arrested. Officer didn't think man believed him.

Man came in to SPD to report a horse was running loose up Periwinkle. Four other citizens shortly called in same complaint. Officer on patrol saw horse on Periwinkle, at which point, horse evidently wanted to window shop, as it entered shopping center parking lot and cantered down the row of shops, then disappeared behind the buildings. Next report of horse was that he was at the end of a road. Officer arrived to find that a resident had horse under control. Since no one could identify owner of horse, and since horse wasn't talking, horse was left at resident's house ofr the night. Owner of the horse showed up the next day and took it home.

The power failed at 10:45 Saturday. SPD called Lee County Co-op to report it and started SPD generator. (Power outage was reported to SPD by a number of people who couldn't get through to the electric company. Power was restored at 4 p.m. that afternoon.)

Manager of sleeping place called in to report vandalism—a fire extinguisher emptied in office the previous night, eight brass washers in the Coke machine, and two fire extinguishers emptied on beach earlier, PLUS somebody liberated a large conch shell from the office.

Call came in that "Dune Buggies were racing on the beach." Turned out Fish & Wildlife official had been driving a six-wheeled vehicle in the Sanctuary.

A small grey Honda was reported stolen.

Complaint came in that complainant was trying to work using a front end loader, and someone in a nearby boat was shining a light in his face, since the light owner wanted to sleep. Time was 9:30 p.m. Officer arrived at 9:39 and worked out a compromise-30 minutes more work and then sleep for all.

Fire alarm went off; one police vehicle and one fire vehicle responded. False Alarm!

People who were asked to move out of quarters apparently vandalized the apartment when they were asked to pay rent. Garbage and other stuff strewn around; two inch chip knocked out of sink. Took pictures.

SPD loaned \$3 for gas to stranded couple who had no money, since purse had been stolen.

Palm tree reported on fire on causeway; officer interviewed a citizen who said that a "substance was thrown out of a motor vehicle (and) caused the tree to be set on fire." (No, it WAS NOT the city's fireworks!)

Officer on patrol reported a five-foot alligator had been hit on the San-Cap Road and was severly wounded, its side being split open, although the gator was still alive. SPD couldn't find alligator expert for advice so called conservation foundation. It was decided that the gator should be put out of its misery, which officer did with one shot. Gator disposed of.

A commercial B&E resulted in the theft of almost \$1.500 of merchandise. The figure is a wholesale one; retail value would double it. B&E accomplished by prying a window open and then ripping through some screening and shelves. Fingerprints photographs were taken. Investigation continues.

Off islander came in to SPD to see if she could get any gas since the attendant at an apparently open station told complainant to get a policeman to help her. as attendant was "busy closing up." Officer responded and ended up pumping gas not only for original visitor, but for five other cars as well. Report ends with a notation that it is a pity, since there are four stations on the Island that they don't rotate staying open late once a month so tourists could get gas.

Call came in that noisy motorcycles were making circles on the street. Officer arrived and heard them, but couldn't find 'em since they left the road and rode off into the brush and boon-

Complainant called in to report that "the same sorry bunch" who lived on a shop's steps all winter were back, this time in back of the shop, and were free-loading.

One of those alarms did some good, as it was triggered by an attempted B&E a few doors down from the place of alarm. Evidently scared of attempted theives, as the door was insecure, but no one got to the goodies.

Call came in that an attempted B&E was in progress; young person tried to get into business three different ways, then jumped on bike and fled. Owner ccalled; checked premises, money still there.

A horse was reported running loose again. Two firemen proceeded to scene with a long rope, intending to capture horse and return it to presumed owner (the same owner who claimed the other horse.) Well, it was the same horse, but had already been corraled by a citizen, who returned him, her or it to owner.

Call came in from a man who said he wasn't complaining, but just wanted to report the sighting of an UFO-a low, fairly well lighted object over Gulf. Officer on duty saw lots of lightening, but no identifiable UFO.

# with a pinch of salt... by ginni

It's really too hot to eat, let alone cook, so we tried to think up some cook-less nibbles that are cool to fix as well as eat. They are all very simple and don't require heating.

Tomatoes are plentiful right now, and taste simply delicious when sliced very thin with a VERY sharp knife) and placed on a platter in layers, with a pinch of oregano, garlic salt, olive oil and wine vinegar sprinkled on each layer. (You need at least three layers for the full effect, so if you're only using two tomatoes, say, use a small bowl.) Cover and refrigerate for at least an hour so the flavor soaks through.

Speaking of layers, here's a way to make cucumbers "burpless"—we know some people are trying to or already have) grown some which aren't supposed to make you burp, but this you can do with regular cukes in your own kitchen. And please don't ask why it works—we don't know...it just does.

Anyhow, peel and slice the cucumbers into very thin slices, salt heavily and layer in a bowl (covered) for about a half hour. Then, sort of rinse them off, slice some yellow phions (also very thinly) and layer cucumber slices (which should still have some salt, but not a thick layer) and onions in a small, deep bowl. Mix two thirds of a cup of cider vinegar with one third of water (you want enough liquid to cover the layers) add a pinch of alum to the liquid and stir well

before pouring over the cukes and onions. Cover and refrigerate for at least one hour or longer. (The alum will keep them crisp for two to four days if you really want to.)

Another nibble which is both cool and filling is chick pea or garbanzo salad. Chill a can of chick peas. Chop up two to four scallions (depending on size and mix in with a sauce made from a half cup of mayonnaise, a quarter cup of wine vinegar, salt, pepper and garlic to taste. Stir in chilled, drained chick peas, and rechill for about an hour or so.

The last idea is for instant vichyoisse, for which you just dump a can of Cambell's cream of potato soup into a blender with a can of half and half (or light cream if you don't care about calories, but do care about carbohydrates) and blend. Taste—you MAY want to add a little salt, and probably some white pepper and a pinch of garlic powder. (We normally make it up in two can batches, since it almost always tastes a lot better than you remember it being.)

Chill in a covered glass container, pop a couple of thick mugs into your freezer, and serve about an hour after making in the chilled mugs. It's even better with chopped chives sprinkled on top, which you can get by growing them, or buying them dried or frozen.

Or else get someone to take you out to dinner!



# Captiva building

hassle zoning resolved to everyone's satisfaction apparently, work has commenced once again on the new building at the corner of Coconut Street and Captiva Road that started such a outcry on Captiva when construction first began some months

At the insistence of Captiva Civic Association attorneys, the plans for the structure were revised from five units in three stories to three units in two stories to comply with the Lee County zoning standards for the property.

Other concessions made

by the developer were moving the pilings for the building back two feet further from the roadway and situating the septic tank for the units on the east side of the property, rather than on the beach side as had been planned originally. The latter concession was made on the advice of the Lee County Health Department officials.

Captiva Civic Association Vice-President Don Seymour called the agreement an "amicable settlement," and said that the revised plans for the building should make it more "aesthetically acceptable" to Captiva residents, whose assistance was invaluable in halting work on the site originally, opined Seymour in appreciation.

The dispute over the construction did serve to incite Lee County Commission Chairman L.H. "Bob" Whan and Director of County Development Don Malloy to undertake a review of the county zoning for the island, with an eagleeye to avoiding overdevelopment of Captiva in the future.





# City council doings

from their busy reading schedule last Tuesday afternoon to conduct a regular meeting for the prupose of transacting the routine ongoing business of the city.

The first item on the afternoon's agenda was the respite hearing of Robert L. Johnson, president of the Latham Corporation, developers of the King's Crown Condominium on West Gulf Drive. The council voted unanimously to deny Johnson's petition for relief from the respite to build 39 additional units on the site on the grounds that 15 of the proposed units would be constructed seaward of the coastal construction setback line, as well as on the grounds that the number of units desired by Johnson failed to conform with the density allocation for the parcel outlined in the city's proposed comprehensive land use plan (CLUP)

Councilman Vernon MacKenzie and city planning director Sam Shannon calculated that Johnson was entitled to roughly another 12 units on his property while Mayor Porter Goss thought that Johnson might be entitled to a few more than 12 due to certain extenuating circumstances, such as the fact that the footers for the proposed buildings have already been installed. Johnson was urged to come back before the council and apply for a specific amendment to the plan after the CLUP's adoption.

Next, the council heard Dan Royal's request for relief to build a 59-unit condominium development off of Gulf Drive to be known as Breakaway Condominiums. Here again, the request was denied because of the density allocation for the 10.88-acre site, which would only permit Royal to build 22 units, according to city officials. The council was also loath to commit themselves to constructing an extension of Gulf Drive across the property on a 60-foot right of way which Royal had originally deeded to Lee County. Royal claimed that the denial would

The Sanibel City Council took time out constitute a severe financial hardship for him, if one considers the 196 units originally planned for the site.

Conservation Foundation Chairman Dick Workman than presented the council with a report on the location and status of artesian wells on the Island, recommending that the city plug all wells not in use to conserve water and to minimize the chances of salt water intrusion into the Lower Hawthorne Aquifer, the primary water supply for the city. The cost of plugging the wells with concrete would be \$300 per well, said Workman, who informed the council that the Conservation Foundation had located approximately 55 deep wells in the city, only 16 to 20 of which are in use for either irrigation or household purposes.

Workman also suggested that the city institute impact fees for any new tapping of the Lower Hawthorne Aquifer within city limits, and urged the council to draft legislation to protect the city's diminishing water supply. Island Water Association spokesman Jim Robeson supported plugging of non-essential wells, but thou... well-drilling legislation would be redundant because of the many existing controls exercised by the state government.

Workman gave the city a map of the wells already discovered by the Conservation Foundation and promised to update it as more wells are located.

Later in the afternoon, the council delayed action on another water-related matter by postponing the vote on a resolution directing city manager Bill Nungester to enter into contract with Tom Missimer and and Associates for a study on the effects of septic tank effluent on the ground and surface water systems of Sanibel. The proposed resolution calls for a maximum expenditure of \$10,000 to come from the general revel sharing funds to be received by the city.

The council deferred action on the resolution until their next scheduled regular meeting to be held on July 20th, in order to obtain a legal opinion on whether or not the septic tank study falls under the purviews of the Consultant's Competitive Negotiation Act. According to Nungester, Missimer was chosen to do the work because of his familiarity with Island problems.

In other action, the council decided to drop a resolution applying for a county judge to hold regular court sessions on the Island due to insufficient need for the service

The council also heard first readings of an ordinance reappropriating city revenues within the general fund and an ordinance establishing the election process for city offices to be held later this year.

The qualifying period for candidates for city council seats numbered one, two three is tentatively slated to be held fr September 13th to October 4th. Voting on Sanibel will be held at the Community House on Periwinkle Way. This year's election will be held on Nobember 2nd, with a run-off election scheduled for November 16, if necessary.


This means that the newly elected councilmen will take office on November 16 at the very earliest, or on November 30 in the case of a run-off. Upon one of those two dates, the terms of councilmen Francis Bailey, Charles LeBuff, and Mayor Porter Goss will expire, unless, of course, they are re-elected.

# Letter to —The ISLANDER

To The ISLANDER:

"The term 'land use planning' has come into vogue in the last few years, particularly in relation to protection of the environment and development of natural resources.

"Land use planning is bureaucratic jargon devised by government planners to disguise ir assaults on the constitutional right to perty. 'Land Use planning' really means control of private lands. It means a person can have control of his property only if he uses it precisely as the government tells him to. 'Land use planning' is a modernized version of Mussolini-style fascism, which was so much admired by the New Deal social reformers before World War II.

"Attempts by the government to control private lands aren't new. Cities and counties have long had the power to zone land uses. But that isn't good enough for the federal planners. The next step will be to take management away from the states and entrench it in a new Washington bureaucracy.

They operate from within the security of the federal bureaucracy, and they can afford to keep coming back and coming back until they wear Congress down.

"If we don't stop and start to protect our private property rights, there will be no private property and we will all be living in public housing like in the Communist countries"
