

A number of the lads expressed their surprise at the fact that American boys are allowed to drive cars before they are allowed to drink beer, which is the reverse of the case in Spain, they told us. They also compared Sanibel's beaches to Spanish beaches on the Mediterraneanfavorably, we might add.



Oh well, and buena suerte to our Spanish friends. You deserve a break today?


Special note:

To The ISLANDER:

The following statement was issued Aug. 9, at a special meeting of the Board of the Committee of the Islands (COTI). The Board speaks for the Committee's 565 members.

"Our City Charter was carefully written to create for Sanibel the form of government best suited to a small community. A fivemember City Council "with all legislative powers of the city vested therein" was determined to be the least cumbersome and most responsive. Simply put, it is an antibuckpassing situation.

"Our first elected Council, in turn, created a Planning Commission and charged its seven members with the responsibility of putting together a land use plan for presentation to the Council. This was done

prior to the enactment of Florida State Statute 75-257, which made mandatory the designation of such a local planning agent.

"By appointing the members of the Planning Commission, Councilmen are assured of a team as dedicated as they to the principles of our City Charter.

"The Planning Commission should remain an appointed body, chosen by the elected Council. Let us keep our City government clearly defined, with as simple a structure as possible. It will then be strong and undivided in its devotion to the preservation of Sanibel Island.

"A Council and-or Planning Commission with any other view would be acting in violation of our City Charter and our laws. Our government would be weakened, our purpose lost, and Sanibel Island would once again be exposed to death by uncontrolled development.

"It is time for us to concentrate on electing four City Councilmen. Our attention must not be diverted from this vital issue." -s-The Board of The Committee

of the Islands (per C.R. Heimann).

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


The Sanibel Police Department last week began testing and installing their new Plectron radio communication equipment, which will allow both on-and off-duty officers to be quickly notified in the event of an emergency no matter where they happen to be on the Island. Aside from the police radios installed in the Sanibel patrol vehicles, officers can only be reached by telephone at the present time. In the event of a major emergency, such as a hurricane, the Plectron system would enable the police dispatcher to mobilize Island rescue workers speedily and efficiently even if telephone lines wee blown down.

By activating the master control system in police department headquarters. any or all Island policemen and firemen can be notified immediately emergency call via their small individual receiver units which they are to keep handy at all times. The short-wave system will be used by SPD, as well as by both Sanibel and Captiva firemen, to provide better emergency protection to residents of both Islands.

The installation of the new Plectron system on the Islands was made possible by a federal Civil Defense grant of \$3,111, matched by an equal amount of funds raised jointly by the City of Sanibel, the Sanibel Fire Prevention District, and the Captiva Fire Prevention District. The total cost of the Plectron equipment was

tment with even more new equipment on the Islands, in the form of 25 emergency call boxes to be installed at various points on both Sanibel and Captiva where lacking at the present time.

The new call boxes will provide Islanders with from any of the boxes emergency light to be in-

directly to headquarters, should a person be either witness or victim of a crime. Special telephone lines will connect the call boxes to the station, public telephones are so that all one has to do to report a crime is pick up one of the 25 emergency telephones, immediately emergency hot line service engaging the hot line

police stalled at the police station, at which officers will be dispatched instantly to the source of the emergency

The 25 tentative locations which have been selected for installation of the new, bright red police call boxes include the Blind Pass area, the Sanibel Causeway, the Lighthouse, Captiva, a

number of points along Sanibel-Captiva Road, Dixie Beach Boulevard, and various beach access points, to name but a few.

Installation of the new call boxes, to be funded with a \$12,000 federal Law Enforcement Assistance Administration grant, is slated to begin within the next two to three weeks,

according to Sanibel Police Chief John Butler. The LEAA grant is authorized under the provisions of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act.

Chief Butler hopes that the new call boxes will enable SPD to give Islanders better. more direct protection from criminal

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City notes

The Sanibel City Council will hold a special meeting today at the Episcopal Church beginning at 9:30 a.m. Among those items to be discussed are the request of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation for control burning permits, a resolution authorizing a traffic circulation study for the Island, and a report on recommendations made by the city finance committee.

The Sanibel City Council has scheduled a public hearing on the proposed city budget for the coming fiscal year for September 14. The hearing will begin at 7:30 p.m. at City

The Sanibel Planning Department has scheduled a hearing on two requests for specific amendments to the city's comprehensive land use plan (CLUP) for the evening of September 1, to begin at 7:30 p.m. in City Hall.

The first amendment request was from John Ed Pearce, asking for a waiver of Section 3.3.1 of the CLUP to enable him to make some of his lots in the Dinkin's Bayou subdivision smaller than the minimum lot size outlined in the CLUP for his property. Although Pearce's proposed amendment calls for some of his lots to be smaller than the one-acre minimum lot size required for the subdivision, the overall density of the subdivision would remain the same in that other lots would be larger than the one-acre minimum to accomodate the already existing roads in the subdivision.

The second request for specific amendment under the CLUP came from Robert E. Hastings, desiring a waiver of Sections 3.2.2 and 3.3.1 of the CLUP to allow him to build on lots 3, 4 and 5 of the Gulf Pines subdivision. Under the provision of the CLUP, he is allowed to build on only two of the three

Based on the findings of the September 1 hearing, Planning Director Sam Shannon will make a recommendation on the proposed CLUP amendments to the city planning commission, which will hold its own hearing on the amendments in turn. The final decision on the amendment requests will come at a public hearing to be held by the city council sometime later on.

Sanibel Planning Director Sam Shannon appeared before the Lee County Planning Commission a few weeks back to suggest that the county take the initiative in establishing an interlocal coordination technical planning committee to include representatives of all governmental jurisdictions in Lee County, as required under the provision of the Local Government Comprehensive Planning Act of 1975. The county planning commission took no action on Shannon's suggestin at that time.

The Sanibel Planning Department has received four applications for short form development permits since reopening for business under the city's comprehensive land use plan on August 2. The plan was adopted by the city council on July 19.

The short form permit applications included two requests for permission to build swimming pools in the city, and two for permission to construct single-family homes. Two of the applications were found to be in conformance with the plan and were approved, while the other two were sent back to the applicants for more information.

Xerox copies of the final adopted version of the Sanibel comprehensive land use plan became available in City Hall late last week. Printed copies of the plan containing all pertinent maps will be available towards the end of this week, according to Planning Director Sam Shannon

Although he'll still have to take it easy fora while, Sanibel City Councilman Vernon MacKenzie has now returned home after being admitted to Lee Memorial Hospital with an upper bronchial respiratory infection a few weeks back. Our best wishes for a speedy recuperation are in order for councilman MacKenzie.

Sanibel City Manager Bill Nungester met last week with members of the Lee County Housing Assistance Office to discuss the possibility of getting some of the county's Section 8 Housing Assistance funds for Sanibel.

In particular, the city was interested in acquiring some rent subsidy funding for the Island, but, according to Nungester, the fair market rent scale approved by HUD for Lee County as a whole is far too low to allow Sanibel to participate in the program. The Section 8 program, administered by HUD, makes funding available for rent subsidies to persons paying too great a percentage of their yearly income for rent.

According to Nungester, the Section 8 program would be better for the Island than the construction of a low rent housing project, and thus, said Nungester, it is unfortunate that the program is unworkable on-

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

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
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Bloody trail left at attempted B & E site

At approximately 1:45 on the morning of Sunday, August 8, Harry Jabaay was asleep in the back room of the office at the Caribe Adventure Inn on West Gulf Drive when he was awoken by the sound of the front door of the outer office rattling. The rattling sound was so odd that he immediately aborted his slumber and walked out into the front office. In the moonlit darkness he espied an arm reaching through the broken panes of the jalousie door groping for the doorknob and cried out, at which point the arm and its owner hastily withdrew into the night.

In his cry of alarm, Harry Jabaay thwarted what may have been the third in a series of unsolved breaking and entering attempts on West Gulf Drive that evening.

Redless to say, Harry called the Sanibel Police Department immediately, and officers were dispatched to the scene post haste. At the Caribe Adventure Inn, Sanibel Patrolman Ray Rhodes found the broken Jalousie panes liberally spattered with blood (evidently the blood of the would-be burglar) and accordingly took fingerprints and blood samples from the door. SPD officers then found a distinct trail of gouts of blood in the bright moonlit sand, which led from the broken door along West Gulf Drive to the public beach access at Tarpon Bay Road, where the trail of blood ended.

Later that same day, SPD received calls from both Nutmeg Village and the Artisan Shop on West Gulf Drive to report similar breakings and enterings which had occurred during the night.

Although both shops had been successfully entered, only one reported that items were missing, and in the other case, the prowler had overlooked a small amount of ready cash in the form of contributions to the Sanibel bike paths.

Both shops had been entered by the same means as that employed in the attempted break-in at the Caribe Adventure Inn, leading authorities to presume that the three crimes had all been perpetrated by the same person in rapid succession. Evidently, the prowler abandoned his work and fled following his close shave at the Caribe Adventure Inn.

Thus, SPD is looking for a young person with signs of having recently incurred deep cuts on the left and possibly the right hand. The person may also have some deep scrape marks on the upper part of the left forearm, incurred while pulling the arm back have through the torn screen at the Inn. Dutair amount of blood that the prowler the sand on the night of the attempted entry, SPD officers have notified doctors to be on the lookout for a per desiring treatment for such wounds, but of yet, no suspects have come to the tention of anyone, it seems.

Harry Jabaay described the arm which he saw on the night of the crime as "long and slender with a moderate tan, like that of a young boy."

SPD would welcome any information which might lead to the arrest of the perpetrator of any or all of the above mentions crimes.



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Hurricane hints, informa for before, during

The ISLANDER was going to wait until the new hurricane wardens were appointed for the Islands, but with two hurricanes having bopped around (fortunately not in our area) and two more forming or having formed by the time this is written, we thought we'd better not put it off any

This section is designed to be kept and we hope will offer helpful hints and suggestions which we also hope you will never have to use.

SPECIAL NOTE: The two sections under "Hurricane Watch" and "Hurricane Warning" may or may not do you any good. We have seen the very best preparation completely wrecked by a stray tornado which frequently fringe nurricanes of any strength, and houses in which the owners have done nothing except lock the door behind them come through a devastating storm with nary a scratch, bar a broken window or two (and sometimes not even that).

We do suggest, though, that if you collect first editions and Shakespeare folios, you do not leave them on the bottom shelf of your bookcase, and if you have precious china, glass or crystal, that you do not leave it in cabinets or on exposed shelves—it should be packed to withstand at least the same amount of stress you might expect in a cross country move. But we again stress, unless you take your treasures with you, no matter what you do, they many not be there when you

Because your house might not be there either, my friend,

The following suggestions are partially official from Civil Defense (or, as it seems to be preferred to call itself this year, the Emergency Preparedness, Evacuation and Relief Team (EPERT) which is headed by Sanibel Police Chief John Butler on Sanibel and Captiva Islands.

The suggestions are in five parts-""General Early Preparation" which you may start on tomorrow, if you wish what to do when a "Hurricane Watch" is in effect, what to do in a "Hurricane Warning" (basically boiled down to GET OFF THE ISLANDS NOW), what to do "During the Storm" and what to do (or be prepared to) "After the Storm." GENERAL BEFORE THE STORM PREPARATIONS:

Be sure you have enough canned or keepable foods (including pet food) to keep your family going for a minimum of two weeks after the storm. Buy a couple of rolls of 11/2 to 2" masking tape, and at least one roll of three or four inch masking tape. Buy (or have on hand) a liquid bottle of chemicals for a chemical "john" (Civil Defense suggests you buy a bag of lime, and if you wish to take your chances with an open trench in your backyard, go ahead.) We believe the chemicals, along with a plastic garbage pail in a pinch, will do a lot less damage to the ecology, if you wish to stop and think about such.

Buy at LEAST one or two (or up to three) months supply of drugs you need to take regularly (heart medicine, thyroid,

birth control pills, medicines for diabetics and so forth). We have been assured by pharmacists that even nytroglycerin, if stored in a cool place, can be safely stored for three to five months. (The pharmacist also suggested that ace hurricane season is over you start using the stored

rricane supply immediately.) Ve also suggest that you write down and carry with you drugstore name, the prescription number, the name of doctor AND the name of the drug of anything you may ...ed over a long period of time. The "Why?" to that is imple-it is quite possible your drugstore will not be there you get back, or if it is, its records may be scattered

Naples to North Port. on your "beforehand" shopping list should be enough er products (plates, napkins, towels, etc.) to ast you and irs for a couple of weeks, at least one sturo styrofoam e chest (Bailey's has a very good brand, "Lo-Boy" which will not only keep ice for three days but can be sat upon as well), charcoal, plastic covered torches (the red kind which float are great), soap which lathers in any kind of water (such as Zest, Dial, Irish Spring or the like), a bottle of Joy (which will wash ANYTHING including your hair, if necessary), and, if you have an all electric home, a charcoal grill, habachi or some sort of cooking container. (In a pinch, four cement blocks and a rack from your oven will do, and INSECT REPELLENT!!!

When we're under a HURRICANE WATCH: removing ALL movable objects from the outside of your homegarbage pails, driftwood, stone and statuary decorations, lawn and porch furniture, coconuts from your trees (you haven't really appreciated the force of a hurricane until you have seen what a four inch by one ince piece of dry driftwood which you can easily break in your hands can do to a window, the side of a metal trailer, or a car roof when driven by winds of up to 186 mph).

If you haven't taken your precious first editions off the first shelf, and you intend to do so, now's the time to do it. However, preparations of this kind depend on your luck...one family we knew lifted everything in one house (including all the bedding) four feet above the floor and got four and a half feet of water in the house, but didn't bother trying to "save" anything they had in some rental units across the street from their home. The rental units had 3/4 of an inch of water in them, total.

Also, this is the time to decide where you plan to stay when you evacuate the Islands.

If there is ANY way to avoid going to a public shelter (the one designated for Sanibel and Captiva Islands is Fort Myers High School), we advise you to do so, having had the dubious pleasure of riding out Donna there. Not only did all the cars in the parking lot get cracked windshields from gravel blowing off the roof, the windows broke and flooded the shelter floors. We didn't get killed, but we certainly were not comfortable. If you can stay with friends (NOT people with homes along the river, please-try to stay on the other side of U.S. 41 above College Parkway) in their homes, or can make a reservation at the hotel or motel of your choice, do it.

Hurricane warning is also the time to tape your windows (the criss-crosses of tape won't necessarily keep them together, but they will prevent flying splinters of glass and to also run the narrow (11/2 to 21/2") strips of tape along your door jambs and doors. (The idea being that masking tape will not stick to wet surfaces, and by the time the warning arrives, it will probably be raining—at which point, presto, as you go out the door, strip off the narrow tape from jamb and door and cover with the wide tape, which will provide at least a measure of water-proofing.) A thought about the tape-if you live on the east end of Sanibel you can expect to be flooded. If your house is well built and a window breaks, the tape can keep the water inside the house. Well...ya places ya bet and takes ya chances.

Now (during the "WATCH" period time) is the time to pack your immediate storm and post-storm necessities—a sack with pet food (pets are not allowed at public shelters, so if you plan to go to one, the Humane Society will keep your pet for you. It would be a nice gesture, however, to bring the

You will also need your medicines, one or two bathing suits (or anything you can wear which will not feel uncomfortable if wet), tennis shoes, dry towels, matches, cigarettes, IN-SECT REPELLENT, and enough food to get you through at least one day in the shelter and one day back at home (hopefully, the stock you laid in earlier will still be there, as, also hopefully, your home will be). If you have any doubts about the latter, take your whole stock with you (remembering that canned hams keep, but roast or fried chicken doesn't).

Turn your freezer and-or refrigerator on the lowest (coldest possible) setting. The fuller a freezer is, the better the food in it will keep. If you have both a freezer and a refrigerator with a freezer in it, and everything can fit into your refrigerator freezer, put it there and unplug the regular freezer. If, of course, both are full, just get everything as cold as possible. DO NOT GO OUT AND BUY MORE FOOD TO FILL YOUR FREEZER. Lee County Electric Cooperative told The ISLANDER that foods like ice cream will keep in an UNOPENED freezer for 36 to 40 hours, while



meat will keep safely for up to three days, but if the power is not back on in three days, you will either have to cook or throw out everything you have.

When asked how long the Electric Co-op expected it would take to restore full power to the Islands, Manager Homer Welch said, "Oh, about five days—if you still have a causeway, of course."

Mr. Welch also asked that we ask you to TURN OFF ALL ELECTRIC APPLIANCES (with the exception of your refrigerator and-or freezer) so that when the power comes back on, the company does not get hit with a power surge which will overload the transformers and blow everything out again.

If you're lucky (or have been foresighted enough) to have gas appliances, you do not have to worry, as long as your home and your gas tank stay intact.

Speaking of which, during the watch period, fill up ALL vehicles under your control with gasoline, water, etc., (if you happen to have a generator, get a couple of cans of fuel for it), make sure you have drinking water (plastic containers or five gallon glass bottles) since your tap water may not be usable for quite a while after the storm. The civil authorities say to fill your bathtub—personally, we've never found a bathtub which can hold water for more than a couple of hours. Of course, you can experiment with Saran wrap and a brick or something if you want to

If you're really playing it safe, NOW is the time to leave the Islands, since we personally think that if you don't get off two to four days before the storm, you may not get off at all. However, that is just our personal opinion, and the actuality depends on from where the storm comes, how much prestorm flooding there is and a number of other circumstances completely out of our, your or Civil Defense's control.

Also, unless SPD Chief John Butler has informed you otherwise, now is the time to leave your chain saws and other such equipment which can be used by the community to clear Periwinkle Way and-or the alternate routes. They are to be left at the Anholt Standard Station, where, theoretically, they will be there after the storm to help clear up the trees along the main roads...or clear the houses off, for that matter.

Also, if you have a choice in the matter of shelter, a frame home on pilings is the safest bet. Next choice would be between a frame home on the ground (mainland ground, that is) and-or a structure you know has ridden through a number of storms, such as the hurricane shelters, the Bradford or the Spanish Main. Your last choice (outside of staying on Islands—almost anything is better than that) would be a CBS home, and for heaven's sake, don't even THINK of trying to ride out a hurricane in a mobile home (or whatever they're calling them these days).

HURRICANE WARNING—NOW is definitely the time to leave ... taking with you not only the supplies you've packed, but a full styrofoam ice chest - full of ice.

As to alcohol, the authorities warn against it (although a wee bit of medicinal brandy surely can't be frowned upon). The official reasons are reasonable; one, alcoholic beverages are not allowed in public shelters, two - the last people anyone in authority needs is a bunch of drunks wandering around during a storm having fun and taking unnecessary chances, and three, if you come right down to a crisis situation (the roof blowing off the shelter, for instance) you will not be able to help yourselves and others is you are "bombed."

Our feeling on the matter is (taking into account that wee bit of medicinal brandy, of course) that Murphy's Law will be in force, and if you remember the booze, you'll forget either the mix or the ice, and please believe us—a tall glass of vodka and warm Hawaiian Punch just won't do a thing for your or anyone else's nerves.

The Governor of the State of Florida has passed a law making evacuation manditory upon advice of the civil authorities. In practice, we doubt that if every citizen decides to stay, that the local authorities will have the time (or the inclination) to carry them kicking and screaming off the Islands

If you decide to stay, at least have the courtesy to register your next of kin with the Police Department, so they'll know who to ship the body to. They're going to have enough to do after a storm without having to worry about your funeral.

If you really and truly CANNOT get off the Islands, tell your area warden as soon as possible (or alert the SPD dispatcher) since emergency "last ditch only" safety headquarters have been set up on the Islands, although we're not going to tell you where, since you will be asked to leave and should not depend on a last minute "rescue" out of stubborness.

If you have not been lucky enough to make arrangements to stay at a motel or with a friend on the mainland (high mainland, we hope) and do plan on using the public shelter, please expect to also take with you blankets, pillows and air mattresses for each member of your group. If you're lucky and your air mattress doesn't leak, you'll stay a bit dryer on top of one

Do NOT leave the public shelter or your in-town haven until the authorities have told you it's okay. (Oh, we assume you also have at least one transistor radio—if not, get one back under "GENERAL BEFORE THE STORM PREPARATIONS." If you wait till the watch or warning periods, you will either find that everyone is out of radios or two, if they have radios, they won't have any batteries, or vice-versa.)

DURING THE STORM: Stay inside AWAY from large sheets of glass. Make sure at least one window is open to reduce pressure. (This last "rule" is very important, since your house might implode if the pressure cannot be equalized. To counteract it, however, we have not as yet heard about any house which did not have at least one window pane or jalousiebroken during the storm. But we suppose if you don't leave that window open, you'll be the classic one who doesn't get a broken window and does get an imploded home)

If you're going to the public shelter, head for the upstairs (between the library and the auditorium) and away from the ells of hallway with all the windows which will surely break getting you all wet. ('Tis better to be wet than dead


Wherever you go, be it the public shelter or a private home or motel, and all of a sudden the sun starts shinning and the wind stops blowing, DO NOT GO OUTSIDE. You are merely experiencing the "eye" of the storm, which can last for 10 minutes to almost an hour, depending on the size and strength of the hurricane. After it passes over, you will be hit once again with winds and rains, frequently stronger than the ones in the first half. (Oh, if you have any intact windows, now's the time to shut the ones on the lee (away) side of where the wind was blowing before, and open the ones on the other side of the house.)

After the second portion of the storm passes, DO NOT return home until the authorities tell you it is safe.

AFTER THE STORM: We surely hope you haven't missed the many references to INSECT REPELLENT, because now's when you'll need it. You'll also need fortitude, the chemicals for your john, the bathing suits, footwear which can be worn in the wet, and a lot of muscle for cleaning out and up the mud, water, broken trees and wet mattresses. Even if the electricity is back on in a week, and the roads are cleared in a day (Ha!) and you can arrange with your favorite contractor to put your roof back on, you should plan to basically be able to "camp out" for anywhere from two to four weeks.

ANOTHER SPECIAL NOTE: All of the above can be avoided by -1)moving to Labelle, 2) planning your vacation to start the first day of hurricane warnings and not returning home till after Christmas.

In case it is any comfort, Louisiana is the single state to have the dubious honor of having the most "disasterous" hurricanes strike it; the New England Coast has the distinction of being in the path of more disaster hurricanes than any other section of the country, but Florida gets the most publicity. However, so does our sunshine.





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

Environmental notes

Sanibel Vice-Mayor Zee Butler expressed her disappointment last week at the decision of the Lee County Commissioners to grant Robert Troutman's Estauries Properties, Inc. a hotel-motel zoning for their 40-acre portion of Connie Mack Island, located in the Caloosahatchee River north of nearby Punta Rassa.

The decision, approved last Wednesday by a 3-to-1 vote of the commission with commissioner Dick Sayers absent. will allow Troutman to build 91 single-and multi-family units on the small mangrove island, as well as permitting him to dredge a small lagoon for a boat dock.

According to Vice-Mayor Butler, the buyers of the 91 new units to be constructed on Connie Mack Island as a result of the decision will place an even greater (albeit minimal) strain on the already overcrowded roads and beaches of neighboring Sanibel.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Jacksonville District, has received an application from Estuaries Properties, Inc. for permission to fill about 28.6 acres of wetlands north of State Road 867 on Punta Rassa for agricultural purposes.

Although the Corps' preliminary review of the application indicates that an environmental impact statement will not be required of the applicant, the Corps still feels that the fill work "will incur short-term environmental impact of consequence and will permanently alter the existing characteristics of the project site.'

The decision whether to issue a permit will be based on an evaluation of the probable impact of the proposed activity on the public interest. Authorization is also required from the State Department of Environmental Regulation.

Anyone having an interest which may be adversely affected by the issuance of this permit may request a public hearing on the matter in writing by September 7. Anyone having questions on the proposed work are asked to call Steve Rose at 904-791-2211.

Island environmentalists tell us that the sizeable aggregations of jellyfish that have been remarked more and more often during the past few weeks in Island waters are "moon jellies," which, although they do indeed sting, do not carry a very painful toxin and should not be feared by anyone, with the possible exception of very small children.

It is, however, quite unusual for moon jellyfish to appear in such large numbers around the Islands, and according to one Island environmentalist who has examined a few of the coelenterates, the presence of gonadal tissue in some of the specimens indicates that they are here for breeding pur-

The largest specimen reported in Sanibel waters measured 16 inches across.

Dick Workman, Director of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, reports that in the weeks ahead, the Foundation is planning to undertake a small experimental control burn of spartina grass on a small section of a slough running through a parcel of Foundation property located one-half mile to the east of Rabbit Road off of Sanibel-Captiva Road.

As the proposal stands now, the fire is to be monitored and controlled by the State Division of Forestry, with the assistance of the Sanibel Fire Department. Although Sanibel Fire Chief Allen Nave had not been apprised of the proposition by the time of the ISLANDER's deadline last week, the Foundation's proposal calls for the local firemen to participate in the burn as a learning experience, in order to give them some practice in controlling grass fires on the Island

Under the provisions of city ordinance 75-23, Foundation representatives must appear before the city council to obtain a special burning permit for the proposed work, which must be approved by both the local Fire Department and the Division of Forestry. The same regulations apply to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, which plans to do some control burning in the J.N. (Ding) Darling National Wildlife Refuge later this summer. The underlying principle in control burning is to remove vegetation that might catch fire of its own accord and spread to adjacent areas during the winter

'We're going to learn from this one," said Workman, "and if all goes well, we'll eventually try other control burns.'

Ideally, the Foundation is hoping for a day with a very light breeze, followed by an accommodating rain to aid in extinguishing the fire.

Mosquito Control helicopter reported some well hidden campers, who, when checked by SPD personnel, said they had permission of property owner. They didn't.


Someone committed vandalism by cutting slashes in 100 sq. feet of screening and chopping about on badminton net. That's dumb.

What with a couple of hurricanes having already been and a couple more forming, we've decided that our hurricane section is about due- -- so you should find a pull out section elsewhere (probably center spread) in this issue.

Hurricanes can be fun---in much the same manner that snowstorms were fun, when one got out of school and was not yet old enough to worry about work, what to eat and so forth. Many of the suggestions and tips in the "before the storm" section may well prove useless, if a hurricane decides to sneak across the Gulf of Mexico without due (more than 12 hours) warning, which, whether the Civil Defense officials wish to admit it or not, has happened.

Happily, not very frequently.

We admit to a wry amusement in recent treatment of hurricane coverage—for instance, when we read in a local daily that New York City was waiting for the "Core" of Bella, we not only had visions of all our unemployed friends and acquaintances descending on the poor beleaguered city, but we instictively thought, "'Core," my eye."

(For those who haven't read up on hurricanes, or haven't concerned themselves with details, the center of a hurricane is the "eye"—not the "core"—and you can bet your foot on that!)

It is our most sincere hope that none of the helpful hurricane hints will be needed—after all, although this section of Florida gets a "severe" hurricane every seven (or 11) years, the one state which has sustained the most "hurricane disasters" (according to the World Almanac) is Louisiana, and the area of the U.S.A. which most frequently gets buffeted about by nasty hurricanes is New England—and Jacksonville didn't get one for 100 years (but when they did, they got Dora, who was 400 miles across)—but if any of them help you through what might be a difficult or uncomfortable time, we'll know we've done our job.

As a further note—the worst thing about hurricanes relates to the story of the little boy who cried "Wolf" once too often. It is our personal belief that if you don't get off the Islands 72 to 30 hours before the storm hits, you ain't about to be able to get off at all, and it is our very strong feeling that 'tis wiser to spend a couple of extra days in town than to end up on a dead or missing-in-storm list.

If you do choose to ignore the advice of experts on when to evacuate, please do your relations a favor—let the SPD know where your next of kin can be notified—so that they don't only have to put your corpse back in one bag, they'll know where to send it. If that sounds morbid and dramatic, it is meant to be. Risking your life, and the lives of those who may try to rescue you, is not a laughing matter. When you're told to go, please GO.

COTI held a board meeting last night, too late for this week's issue to report upon.



Wednesday, Aug. 11, the Sanibel Planning Commission held an informational meeting on the Comprehensive Land Use Plan (CLUP) to answer specific questions about specific pieces of land, which subject has been "not allowed" in previous public hearings.

It was attended by under 100 people, most of whom were relieved to find out that their right to build a single family home was passed on with the land in case of a sale, even if the property in question did not meet the new specifications of the CLUP, provided it was 10,000 or 15,000 square feet, and you could build two houses if you owned two lots (unless the lots adjointed) and so forth, but Patty Plum (the young lady pictured above) threw the meeting into a stunned silence when she asked what provisions, if any, had been made for the purchase and use of Sanibel land for commercial agricultural production (otherwise known as a farm).

The silence (and quiet giggles) were quenched when Chairman Duane White informed Ms. Plum that no provision had been made for commercial farming although she could ask for a specific amendment if the need arose, and of course, she was free to grow any kind of edible produce for her own or her family's use.

One point on which the audience seemed to think the CLUP unfair (that of having to obtain a building permit for any interior or exterior construction on an existing structure exceeding \$100.00) really can't be laid at the feet of the planners, the CLUP or the Planning Commissioners. It's been a part of the Lee County Building Code for many a year and is more for the convenience and knowledge of the Tax Assessor rather than any implied "nosiness" on the part of the city.



Conversion table: The above tides are for the lighthouse point of Sanibel' only. To convert for Redfish Pass (north tip of Captiva), add 55 minutes to the time shown for every hi tide, and sub two (2) minutes for every low tide. (NO, we don't know why, but it works. Instructions following are even less sense-sical but, as we stated, they do work.)

For Captiva Island, Gulf side, subtract 30 minutes from each high tide, and subtract 1 hour and 16 minutes for each low tide.

For Captiva Island, Pine Island Sound (bay) side, add 1 hour and four (4)

minutes for each high tide, and add 52 minutes for each low tide.

In between these points on gulf or bay — guesstimate — and have good fishing and or shelling.


Crowded, eh what?
