Time to get shot — free!



"Come into my parlor..." said this spider to just about anything that moves. A hard-backed crab like species, he was spinning his web by the Sanibel River early Friday. This particular critter defied telephone identification, for, as Wildlife Manager Glen Bond said, "There are more spiders per square acre than just about any other living thing."

Dr. Stanley P. Wegryn announced last week that the Wegryn Medical Clinic here on Sanibel now has both the monovalent and bivalent forms of the swine flu vaccine available for those who missed getting the shots on the Islands this past October 9.

The shots are available without an appointment at the Clinic between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and noon, and from 1:00 p.m. until 4:00 p.m. daily, said Clinic spokesman Rosalind Wegryn.

The two forms of the swine flu vaccine are being supplied by the Lee County Health Department, while the Wegryns are donating their time and syringes to the inoculation program, which is being offered absolutely free of charge.

As the vaccines will only be available as long as the supplies last, everyone who has not been inoculated heretofore is strongly urged to do so as soon as possible, with certain exceptions which can best be explained by the immunization authorities.

According to the applicable government regulations, only those 65 or older, or those suffering from chronic diseases are entitled to receive the bivalent form of the vaccine, which provides immunity to both the swine and Victoria flu strains. All others must receive the monovalent, which contains only the swine flu vaccine.

For the apprehensive, we can report that authorities have determined that none of the much-publicized deaths connected with the swine flu immunization program were directly attributable to either form of the swine flu vaccine.

According to Mrs. Wegryn, there were no reports of serious illness resulting from the swine flu vaccinations here on the Islands.

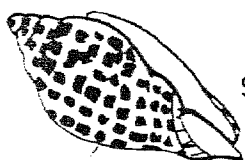

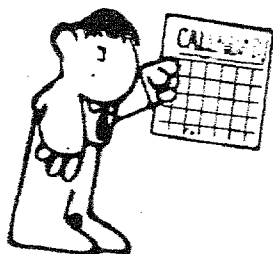

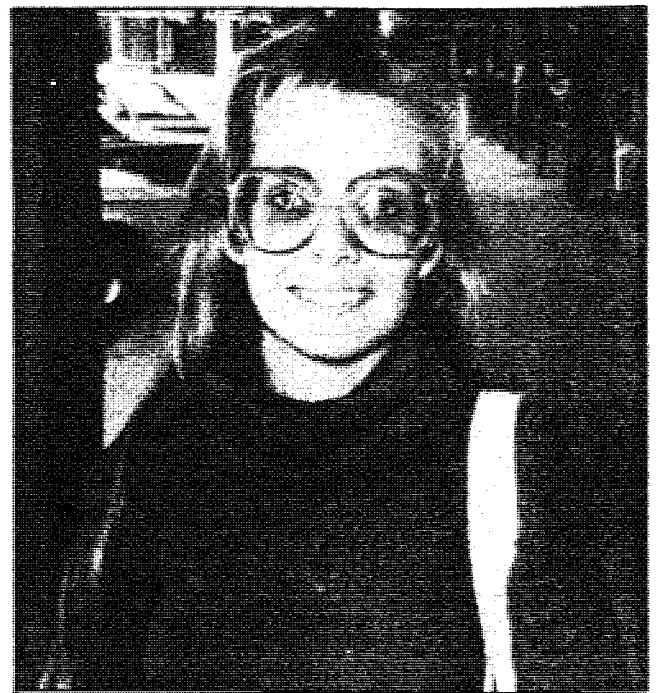

"What do you think of the new automatic vehicle inspection (AVI) system proposed for the Sanibel causeway?"



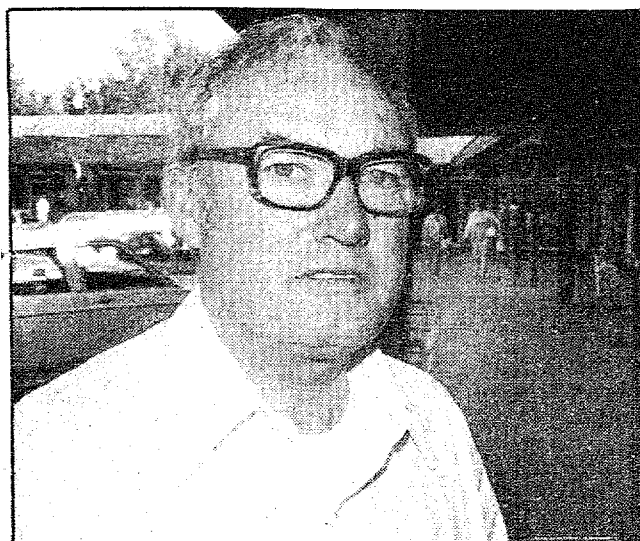

New assistant pastor at St. Isabel's

On November 5, the Reverend Ladislaus F. Pelczynski, M.I.C. arrived at St. Isabel's Catholic Church here on Sanibel, where he will be serving as Assistant Pastor to Father Gerard Bearegard in the

University of America in Washington, D.C. to pursue his studies toward the priesthood. He was ordained on May 28, 1942 at the Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, after which the first years of his

of Marians.

Together with the Reverend Joseph J. Sielski, M.I.C., the present Superior General of the Congregation in Rome, Father Pelczynski began the publication of the "Roze Marji," a Polish Monthly Bulletin, in 1944, and the "Marian Helpers Bulletin," a quarterly organ of the Association of Marian Helpers, in 1946. For a number of years, Father Pelczynski acted as Managing Editor of the publications, as well as serving as the Director of both the Marian Apostolate and the Association of Marian Helpers for about 16 years.

When the St. Stanislaus Kostka Province was erected in 1948, Father Pelczynski was chosen for its first Econome. As the Provincial Econome, he was sent to Great Britain in 1950 to help organize the first Marian House at Hereford, England, where he also worked for the Polish refugees in that country. His stay there was rather brief, for in 1951 he was recalled to continue his duties in the United States.

In 1963, he was elected as the Third Provincial Superior of the St. Stanislaus Kostka Province, a position which he held for 12 consecutive years.

In 1975, he was again assigned as the Provincial Econome, but for health reasons was released from his duties and sent to do pastoral work in the Diocese of St. Petersburg, Florida.

Throughout the 34 years of his priesthood, Father Pelczynski was often called to preach and to conduct missions, retreats and other parish devotions, especially as he speaks both Polish and English fluently.

The Reverend was also active in organizing and directing pilgrimages to various shrines throughout the world, among them the Canadian Shrines, the Shrines of Our Lady of Lourdes in France, the Shrine of Our Lady of Fatima in Portugal, as well as shrines in Rome and other countries.

As Provincial Superior, Father Pelczynski traveled extensively in visiting the Marian Missions in the Province as well as others which were supported by the Province.

Father Pelczynski was also featured in the 1975 edition of "Who's Who in Religion."

Father Pelczynski was born in Adams, Massachusetts, on August 7, 1916. Upon completing his studies at the Adams Schools in 1934 he entered the Congregation of Marians in Washington, D.C.

On August 5, 1935, he pronounced his first religious vows after completing his novitiate and entered the Catholic

priesthood were spent in various missionary endeavors.

In 1944, Father Pelczynski organized the Mercy of God Apostolate, which later evolved into the present Marian Apostolate, a center for the publication and dissemination of Catholic literature. He was also active in establishing the Association of Marian Helpers, a spiritual benefit society of the Congregation

Environmental notes

Radioactivity in Florida

Although the concentration of cesium-137, a by-product of nuclear testing, is well below any hazardous level, it is still ten times higher in Florida milk than in milk from any other state, the University of Florida's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences reported last week.

Dr. John Gamble, an associate research scientist with the Institute, is currently project director of a continuing study to determine why cesium-137 remains active in the Florida environment.

The project began in 1969 with funds from Sponsored Research and has been funded since 1970 by the U.S. Energy Research and Development Administration to the tune of about \$45,000 per year, with the grant having been recently renewed for 1976-77.

According to Gamble, if scientists can determine why cesium-137 remains active in Florida soil, it may be possible to prevent high concentrations of radioactivity in foods

if serious fallout should occur in the future.

Clay compounds in the soil will usually hold the cesium-137 until it loses its radioactivity, said Gamble, so the fact that there is little clay in Florida soils may account for the higher radioactivity levels in Florida.

Mycorrhizal fungi which grow from plant roots may be taking up the loose cesium-137 and transporting it into the plants, which, when eaten by livestock, may pass the active element into milk and other foods. Gamble theorized.

Duck stamps judged

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife service, a branch of the Department of the Interior, announced last week that over 200 entries had been received in the Federal Government's Duck Stamp Art Contest since the competition was officially opened on July 15.

The winning drawing or painting will be reproduced on the 1977-78 Migratory Bird

Hunting AND Conservation Stamp. The Duck Stamp, as it has come to be called, has been familiar to migratory waterfowl hunters, philatelists, and conservationists since Sanibel's J.N. Ding Darling designed the first issue of the stamp in 1934.

All migratory waterfowl hunters over 16 years of age are required to buy one of the stamps, the proceeds from which are used to acquire additional migratory bird habitat.

Before 1949, wildlife artists were commissioned to provide a design for the annual stamp. Since that time, the design has been chosen by a contest open to all artists who are residents or citizens of the United States.

The annual competition is the only art contest regularly sponsored by the Federal Government, and the colorful stamps constitute the longest running, annually issued series of stamps in revenue or postage stamp history.

The entries in this year's contest were to have been judged last Friday by a panel of five prominent artists, conservationists and ornithologists that was to have been announced the day of the contest by Assistant Secretary of the Interior Nathaniel P. Reed.

Damroth posters discontinued

The Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation's annual poster project has ended after three years, with the current 1976 Great Egret poster to be the last of its kind to appear.

Featuring photographs by William Damroth and art layout by Frans Wetterings, the posters have been quite popular with visitors to the Islands and have received awards for excellence, among them the international award for the 1975 Egret poster.

Citing distribution and marketing problems as the major reason for withdrawing sponsorship of the project, Damroth and Wetterings decided that they could better support conservation efforts in other ways.

Posters from 1974, 1975 and 1976 will continue to be available while supplies last. They can be acquired through the Foundation office, Island retail shops or by writing Conservation Publishers, P.O. Box 25, Sanibel 33957.

Seashell conservation T-shirts

In an effort to promote the conservation of live shells on the Islands, the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation is preparing an educational program designed to make seashell enthusiasts more aware of shells as living creatures.

Graphic works by Sanibel artist Ikki Matsumoto suggesting that collectors "Take Only Empty Shells" and "Let Live Shells Live" will appear on beach T-shirts now available at select Island stores.

In the recent past, many Foundation members expressed concern about indiscriminate live shelling witnessed regularly on Island beaches and mud flats, and suggested that the Foundation promote better live shell conservation.

A contribution from the Drey family of University City, Missouri, established a fund for shell conservation, enabling additional work on the program by the Foundation.

In July, the Sanibel City Council held a meeting to air public concerns about live shelling, at which Foundation Board member Patsy Simmons delivered a statement on behalf of the Foundation calling for better scientific understanding of seashell populations and natural history. She further recommended that shell conservation should be promoted on a communitywide basis.

As a result of that meeting, a committee established by the Sanibel Community Association will address the live shelling issue. The Foundation will continue to be represented on that committee and will coordinate Foundation efforts with other organizations interested in shell conservation.

Adios, Smokey!

For those who might have missed it, the big story in environmental news last week was the demise of that internationally famous symbol for forest-fire prevention, Smokey the Bear.

Smokey the Bear, the little orphan black bear cub who was rescued from a New Mexico forest fire in 1950 and nursed back to health by forest rangers, died last Tuesday at the National Zoo in Washington State at the ripe old age of 26 (human years).

For black bears, 26 years is considered longevity, and although Smokey had been suffering from arthritis for some time prior to his retirement as the official Forest Service symbol in May of 1975, his death was attributed simply to old age. According to Zoo officials, Smokey died in his sleep.

Smokey is survived by his adopted son, "Little Smokey," a younger orphaned bear who was chosen to carry on Smokey's ceremonial functions when an attempt to mate the elder Smokey with a female of his species proved fruitless.

Smokey was buried last week in the Smokey Bear Historical Park in Capitan, New Mexico, near his original home in the Lincoln National Forest.

Over the years, Smokey netted the U.S. Forest Service roughly \$1.5 million in contributions to their forest-fire prevention program, a spokesman announced last week.

Smokey was mourned far and wide last week by young and old alike, who had come to love him over the years as the charred little cub in the traditional ranger's hat, which has since come to bear his name.

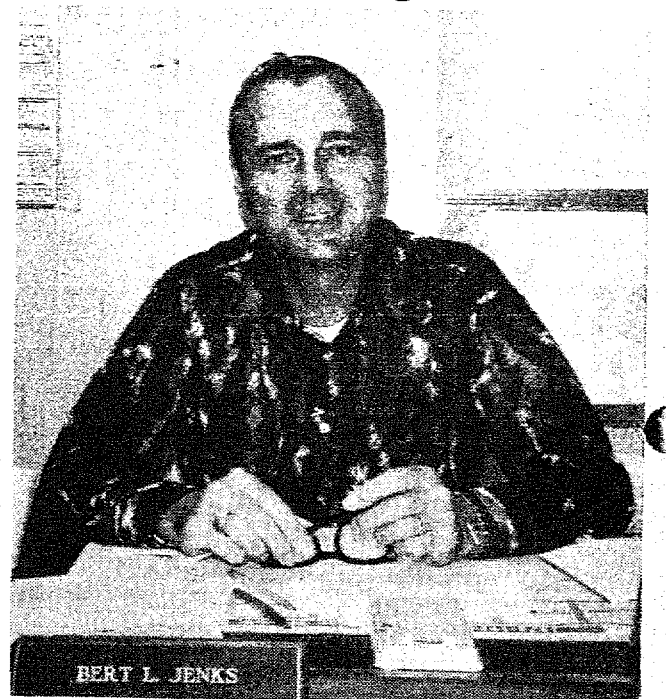

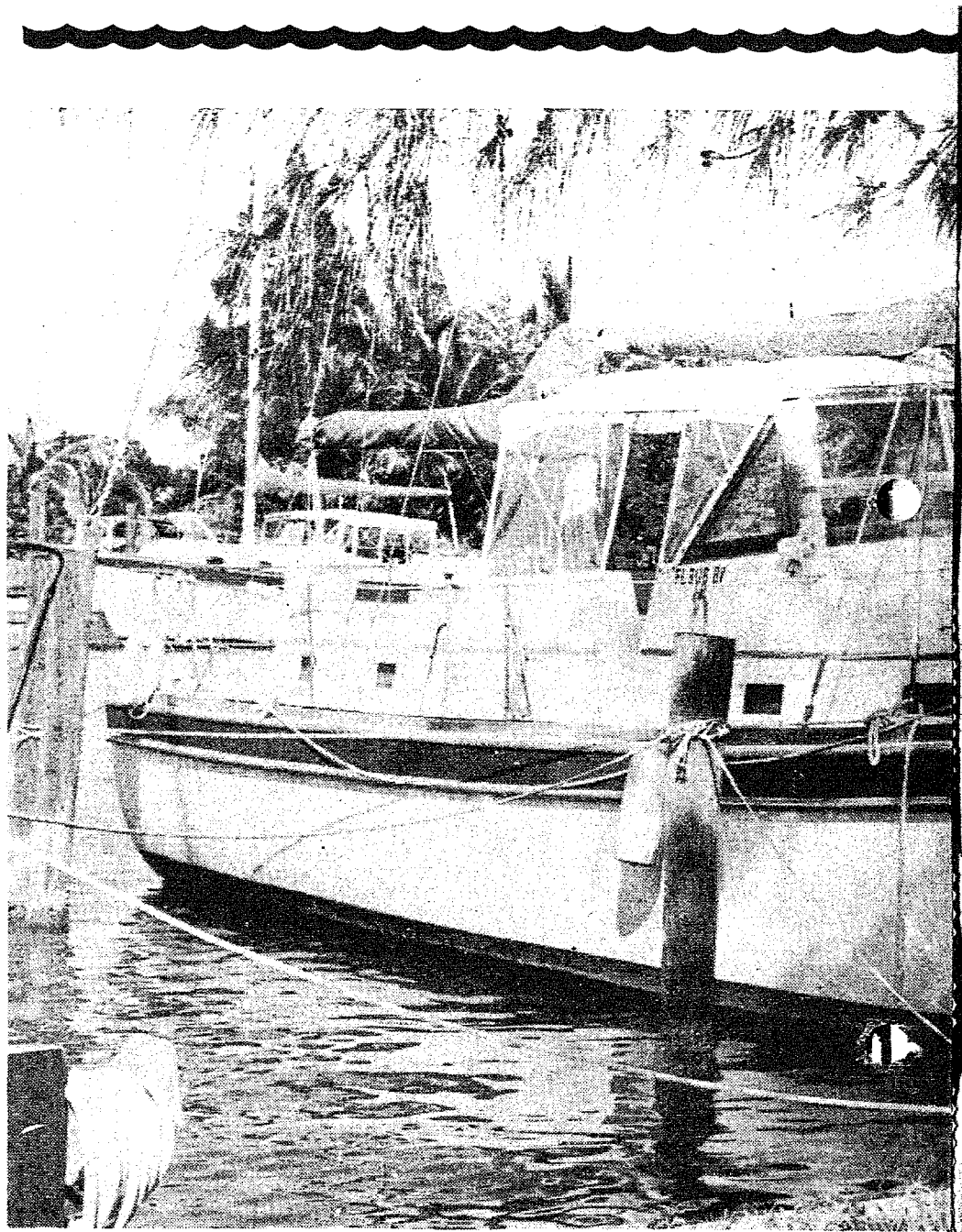

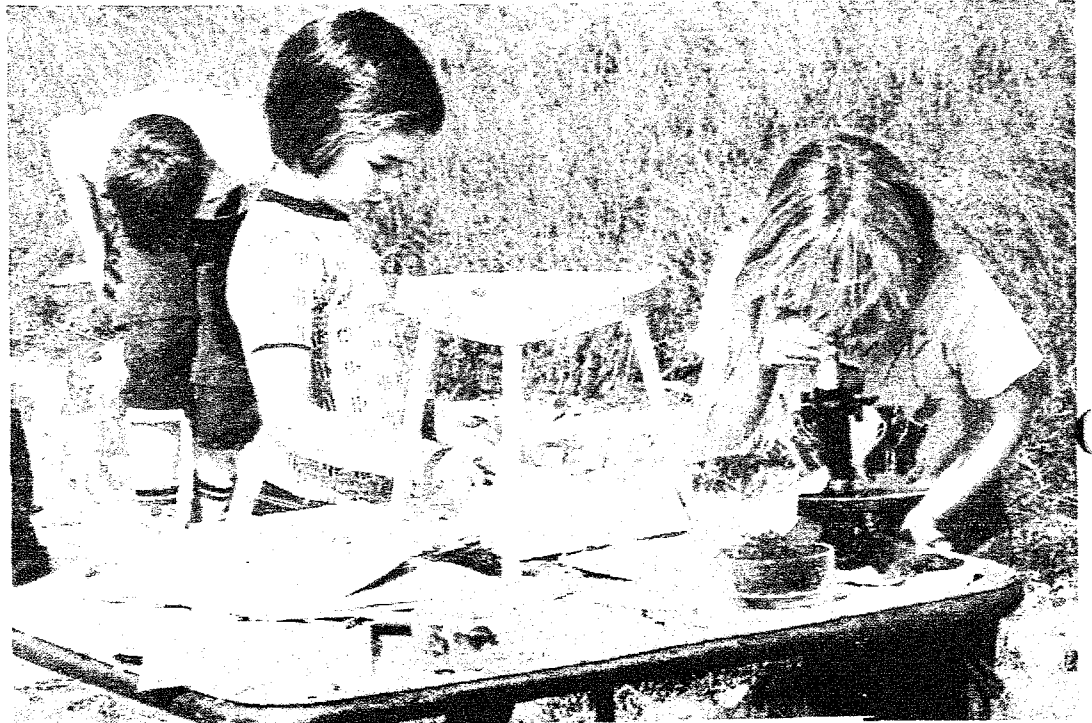

Approximately 30 of the youthful scientists were involved in the study, most of them from 2nd and 3rd grade classes.

Becky Hogue, Bob Kuehn and Mike Fitzpatrick led and assisted the group in their study of ecological relationships in the tidal flat environment. The field trip was a combined effort by the Lee County

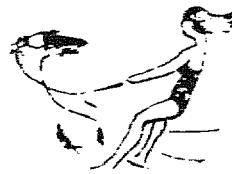
According to Ms. Cain, "The girls are very excited about going to Sanibel to go shelling and bird watching. We will be arriving Wednesday night, Nov. 17, and

New city planner to be announced today

At the Sanibel City Council's regular meeting today, November 16, City Manager Bill Nungester will announce his selection for the post of city Planning Director, which

came open this past October 1 with the resignation of former city planner Sam Shannon.

The man he has chosen to fill the crucial

post is 32 year-old Carleton Riffel of Gainesville, Florida, Nungester told The ISLANDER.

A graduate of the Florida State University in Tallahassee with a Master of Science degree in Planning, Riffel has been the Chief of Current Planning with the Department of Community Development for the City of Gainesville since January of 1974.

After completing his graduate studies, Riffel worked briefly with the Leon County Department of Environmental Services, and thereafter with the Florida Environmental Analysis Service in Tallahassee, an advisory body to the Governor of the State.

Riffel also holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Geology from Florida State, where he minored in Chemistry and Mathematics.

In the past six weeks, Nungester has considered in the neighborhood of thirty applicants for the position with a wide variety of experience in all facets of planning work before deciding upon Riffel because of his "sound background in environmental planning," one of the primary criterions for the job.

"We didn't encourage the out-of-state applicant," said Nungester. "We wanted someone familiar with Florida planning legislation and coastal zoning."

"I'm very happy with the selection," Nungester continued. "I think Mr. Riffel will do an excellent job for the city."

Carleton Riffel is married and has two children. According to Nungester, he accepted the job early last week at an annual salary in the vicinity of \$19,000.

Riffel is slated to report for work on December 6. In accordance with city policy, he will serve as Acting Director of Planning for a six-month probationary period.

Other business to be heard by the council today includes the Chamber of Commerce's request for city funding assistance with the Sanibel-Captiva locator maps and a proposed amendment to the city's dog ordinance, as well as the swearing in ceremony for the city's newly elected councilmen and the council's election of a mayor for the coming year.

The council is also supposed to hear a report from the City Hall Site Selection Committee at their meeting today.

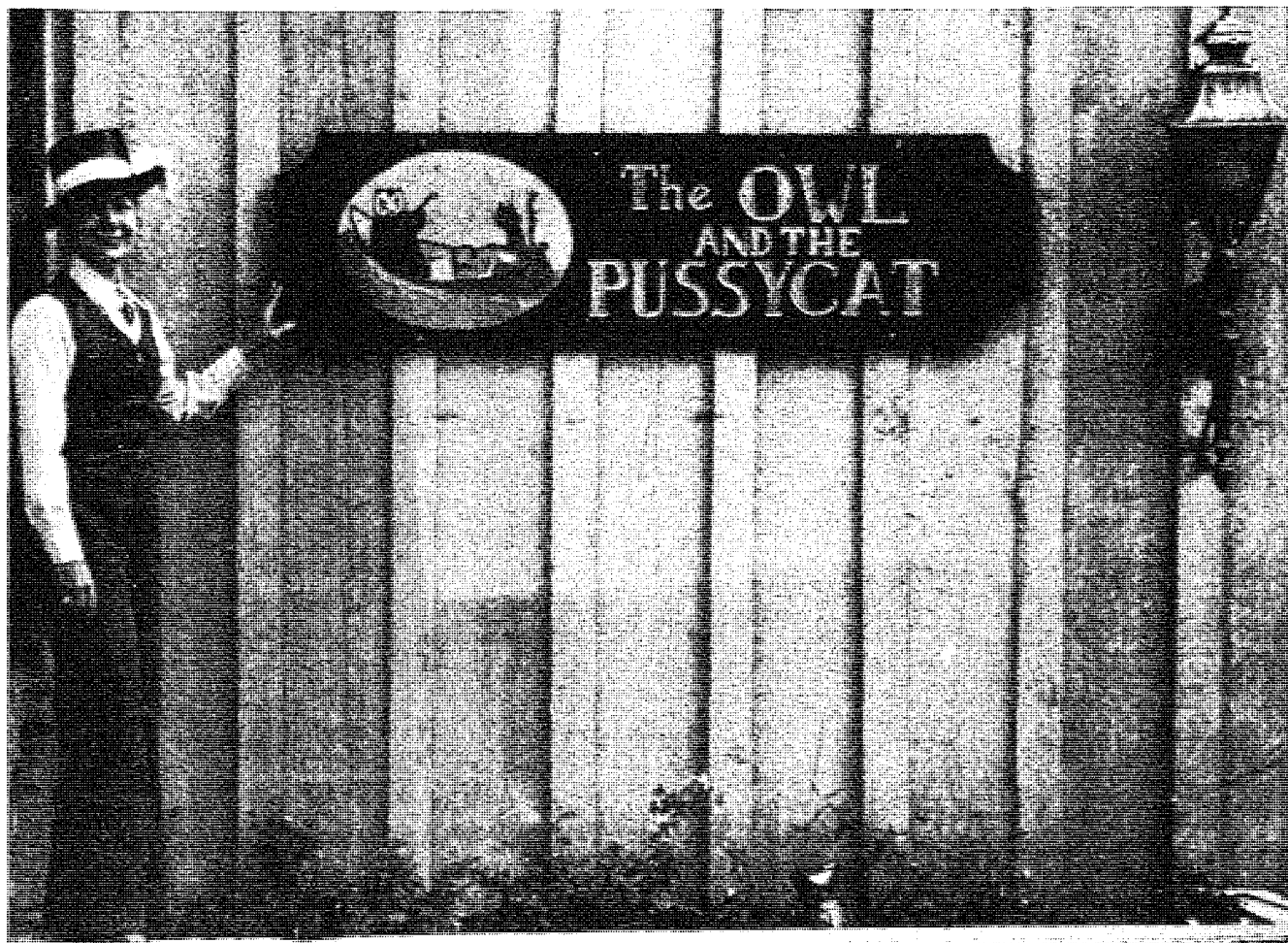

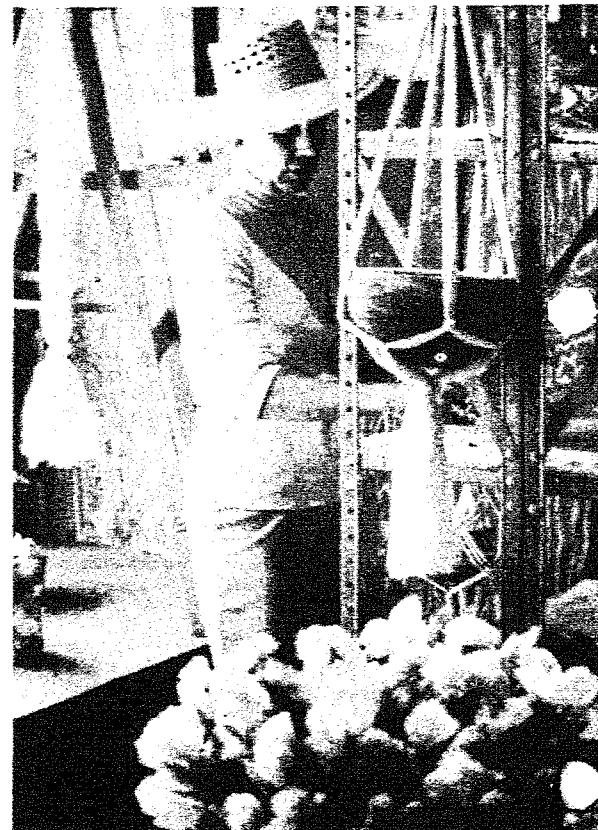

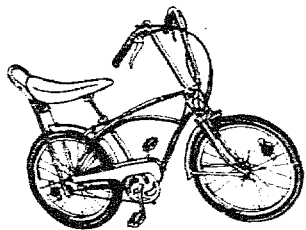

After completing only 33 units of phase 1, the project stalled and the county building permits expired, at which point the developers were faced with the prospect

of trying to obtain city building permits under the building moratorium to complete the work.

Latham President Robert L. Johnson appeared before the city council twice this past summer to request relief from the respite in order to complete the remaining 39 units in phase 1 and was twice denied on the grounds of density.

On October 29, Johnson wrote a letter to Sanibel Mayor Porter Goss requesting permission to meet with city representatives in an attempt to work out an amicable solution to the density dispute, which would allow him to resume work on the site and ultimately, to salvage his investment in the project.

On the basis of their recent negotiating success with the Sundial Condominium developers, the Council appointed Councilmen Zee Butler, Francis Bailey, City Attorney Neal Bowen, and City Manager Bill Nungester to a city negotiating team to bargain with the Latham Corporation.

The negotiations will get underway at 10:00 a.m. Wednesday in the city attorney's meeting room, located in the Michigan Homes office building on Periwinkle Way.
