

Council okays signing inter-local agreement

The Sanibel City Council held a special meeting early last Tuesday morning to authorize Mayor Porter Goss to sign an interlocal greement between the Lee ounty government and the county's three

municipalities for the formation of a new Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) for the greater Lee County area.

Following a directive from the Federal Highway Administration and the Mass Transit Administration, the MPO is to be a policy making body in matters of transportation planning, with its memgovernors of the individual states. In Florida, the Lee County MPO will be one of 15 such urban transit planning bodies to be established under the new regulations.

In effect, the new Lee County MPO will replace the old planning advisory committee to the Board of Commissioners, which was comprised of private citizens and which was empowered to hand only down recommendations rather than firm policy decisions.

Governor Rubin Askew originally appointed nine members to the Lee County MPO early this past Sepbership appointed by the tember, but failed to include

a representative of the City of Sanibel on the new board. Thus, city indignation was aroused and the Governor was forced to expand his list of appointments.

One of the primary stipulations in the council's approval of the interlocal agreement last Tuesday was that at least one city representative be appointed to the MPO. The council further suggested that Mayor Goss should request the appointment of two city representatives to the new planning board, while moving emphatically to accept no less than one.

Hence. revised the

membership of the MPO as proposed by the city council will include two Cape Coral city councilmen, two Fort Myers city councilmen, the five Lee County Commissioners, one member of the Lee County School Board, and either one or two representatives of the City of Sanibel.

The interlocal agreement will take effect upon its adoption by all of the participating governmental bodies, and subject to the Sanibel council's request for a clarification of the duties to be performed by both the State Department Transportation and the local MPO under the

arrangement.

The interlocal agreement was approved by a 3 to 1 vote of the Sanibel council last

Tuesday, with Councilman Charles LeBuff absent and Councilman Duane White dissenting.


Eight of the show's competing artists were found to be deserving of awards by judges Jean Dean and Elizabeth Niven of the Fort Myers Beach Art League.

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


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A ten foot wide house???

The meeting last Monday in MacKenzie Hall became a rather difficult situation for the seven-member Sanibel Planning Commission when a group of residents from the Tradewinds subdivision turned out to protest one of the provisions of the city's comprehensive land use plan (CLUP).

The issue at stake was whether or not to let Donald J. Anderson build a single-family home on a Gulf-front lot (oddly shaped) located to the south of a small section of Gulf Drive which connects the two streets in the subdivision at their southern end.

In his petition for a specific amendment to the CLUP, Anderson explained that if he were to abide by both the front yard setback and the coastal construction setback line contained in the plan he would end up with a house ten feet wide. His request was for a waiver of the coastal setback line, which falls deep into his property.

His plea for a variance had previously been denied by the city council this past April 20, under the respite procedures accompanying the citywide building moratorium which was in effect prior to the CLUP's adoption in late July. As there are four other lot holders in similar straits in the same immediate area, the council suggested that they jointly purchase two vacant lots directly across the street from their property in order to have Gulf Drive moved at their expense, which would, in turn, give them adequate space to build on their Gulfside property.

The group investigated the council's idea shortly thereafter but found it to be infeasible for them because of the cost of the undertaking, which they reckoned to be in the vicinity of \$70,000.

Many of the other homeowners in the subdivision were fearful lest the city deny the five unlucky lot owners the right to build, which, they contended, might lower the value of those lots enough to let the city move in and buy them up for a public beach access parking facility, an eventuality which could mean some annoyance to the subdivision residents, they claimed.

Thus, they turned out en masse last Monday to argue in behalf of Anderson's right to build.

"I think it's prima facie evidence in this case that I've had the patience of Job," Anderson told the commission last Monday. "After four years of waiting, I would like to build."

The commission, however, felt it was not in their power to grant him a variance from one of the city's most cherished develop-

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ment standards, even though they agreed that the city should do everything in its power to work out a cooperative solution to the problem.

Finding the proposed amendment to be in non-compliance with the CLUP, the commission was forced to pass a motion recommending that the request be denied. The motion to deny passed by a vote of 6 to 1, with Commissioner LeeRoy Friday dissenting.

The matter will now be passed back to the city council, for them to decide the issue at a public hearing scheduled for December 21.

Earlier in the meeting, the commission voted unanimously to approve the issuance of a development permit to the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation for them to construct their oft-discussed Conservation Center on the Foundation's Nature Trail property located in the Island's central wetlands area south of Sanibel-Captiva Road.

According to Foundation Director Dick Workman, the Conservation Center will consist of two buildings connected by elevated walkways, with a total floor space of approximately 3,500 square feet.

Building "A" in the complex will house the group's research and educational programs, including a guest area with nature exhibits, experimental laboratories, preparation rooms, and the like, while Building "B" will contain the Foundation's administrative offices and executive library.

The Foundation plans to proceed with construction on the site as soon as possible, said Workman, and will kick off a fundraising project for the Center at their annual meeting on December 6.


The administrative branch of the Foundation is still working out of temporary quarters in the Sanibel Lighthouse under a special permit from J.N. (Ding) Darling Wildlife officials.

In other action last week, the commission voted to approve the issuance of development permits to the following, after finding the proposed construction in each case to be in full compliance with the CLUP:

—to John Kontinos for the construction of a concrete weir in the Dunes subdivision at the Island's east end. The weir had already been installed two months ago, but Kontinos was unaware that a permit was needed for

—to Robert R. Hollopeter for the development of a shopping and office complex on a 1-acre parcel of land lying south of Periwinkle and directly to the east of the Bank of the Islands. According to Hollopeter, work will commence within the next few weeks on the new shopping center, which will include five shops and three offices, although tenants for the new complex have yet to be announced.

—to the Hugger-Kennedy Corporation for the construction of a 14-unit cottage colony on a 4.54-acre tract of land lying south of the route for the city's proposed extension of Middle Gulf Drive. The commission's approval was subject to the developer's installing a cul-de-sac of 80 feet in diameter at the terminus of the private driveway providing ingress to the property.

Water control meeting on Dec. 8

The Central and Southern Florida Flood Control District (FCD) will be holding workshops in Naples and Fort Myers December 8 and 9 to explain water management regulations which will go into effect in this area January 1.

The workshops are preliminary to a public hearing establishing the rules in Collier County, the portion of Charlotte County being transferred to the FCD from the Ridge and Lower Gulf Coast Water Management District, and the portions of Lee and Monroe Counties which are not previously within the FCD boundaries.

The FCD boundaries will be changing January 1 to include the southwest portion of the state. These boundaries were established by the 1976 legislature.

On December 8, the workshop will be held at the Lee County Courthouse, room 610, beginning at 8 p.m.

The water use regulations are a part of the 1972 Water Resources Act, designed to insure the best and most effective use of the waters of the state, while protecting them from overuse and abuse. The FCD has already implemented its rules throughout its current jurisdiction.

Under the Water Resources Act, the FCD manages and controls all of the ground and surface water within its boundaries. To do this a permitting system was established. Users of more than 100,000 gallons of water per day must obtain a permit from the FCD. The law specifically exempts domestic use of water, however.

"Anvone who uses water is affected, either directly or indirectly, and should be interested in these workshops," said FCD Executive Director Jack Maloy. "We want everyone to understand the rules and the intent behind them before we begin operating under them in January.'

Members of the FCD Governing Board will be on hand at the workshops, along with staff members of the regulation, legal and public information offices, to explain the regulations and answer questions.

King's Crown negotiations proceeding

Latham Corporation President Robert L. Johnson recently signed a negotiated settlement agreement for the density to be allocated to his King's Crown Condominium project on West Gulf Drive.

As reported in the November 23 issue of The ISLANDER, a density compromise was worked out between Johnson and a four-man city negotiating team on November 17 which would permit the developer to construct 66 additional units on the remaining 6.12 acres at the site, bringing the total to 99 units on almost 8 acres of Gulf-front property.

The proposed compromise will come up for a vote by the Sanibel City Council at their regular meeting today in MacKenzie Hall.

To obtain permission to proceed with the construction of his negotiated settlement. Johnson has also applied for a specific amendment to the city's comprehensive land use plan, as stipulated in the negotiated agreement.

Pool committee appointed

Last Monday, the Sanibel Planning Commission announced their appointments to a new ad hoc committee intended to undertake an investigation of the requirements for swimming pool setbacks from open bodies of water currently outlined in the city's comprehensive land use plan (CLUP).

Since the plan's adoption this past summer, a number of amendment cases have come before the commission which pointed out the difficulty in abiding by the CLUP's provision requiring all swimming pools to be setback at least 20 feet from the nearest open body of water.

The new ad hoc Pool Committee has therefore been enjoined to review the criteria underlying the pool setback regulations and report their findings to the commission, which, in turn, is considering initiating an amendment to the troublesome pool setback provisions.

Planning Commissioners Betty Robinson. Lee Roy Friday, and Islander Dave Davenport were selected to sit on the new committee, which is slated to hold its first meeting sometime this week.

Pointe Santo sues I.W.A. In the wake of the successful outcome of

their lawsuit against the City of Sanibel, the

week filed a suit for declaratory judgement in Lee County Circuit Court against the Island Water Association.

According to Water Association Attorney John Schumacker, the Point Santo group, developers of the Point Santo de Sanibel Condominiums on Gulf Drive, claim to have a contract with the Association dating back to 1973 for the hookup of all of the units in their multi-phased condominium project. which has been under litigation since this past June.

The I.W.A., on the other hand, contends that the 1973 hookup contract is invalid, with the issue at stake being the difference between the 1973 hookup fee and that being charged at present. According to Schumacher, the amount involved is in the thousands of dollars because of the number of units to be built by Pointe Santo.




Reed is described as an "amateur botanist, ichthyologist, biologist and an ardent fisherman and hunter.

Nationwide Realty suit against city dismissed

Circuit Judge James Adams last week granted the City of Sanibel's motion to dismiss the suit for declaratory and injunctive relief filed against the city in late September by the Nationwide Realty Corporation.

In their suit, the Nationwide Realty group contended that the city's comprehensive land use plan (CLUP) was too prohibitive with respect to the lot sizes in their Sanibel Bayous subdivision, located to the north of Sanibel-Captiva Road at the Island's west end.

As the subdivision was originally approved by Lee County in 1971, the amended pleading which

developers were seeking a court finding as to the nature of their posture under the city's CLUP. according to City Attorney Neal Bowen.

In his dismissal of the suit last week, Judge Adams allowed the plaintiffs ten days in which to file an could possibly reopen the case. Bowen told the ISLANDER.

The revised pleading would of necessity have to allege such facts to show that the developers had exhausted all possible remedies open to them under the CLUP before resorting to legal action. said Bowen. The group has

never appeared before the city to request approval of the development. Bowen

Attorney Edward Ryan of the Chicago law firm Ross. Hardies, Babcock and Okeefe was admitted by Judge Adams to assist Bowen in presenting the city's defense in the case.

Free boat check

Boat Inspections Offered

Sanibel-Captiva Squadron, Power cooperation with the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary, will be conducting free courtesy inspections for Island power boat owners December 3 and December 4.

The inspections will be held by appointment at Commander Harley, Brown's dock at 794 Cont Court in the Shell Harbour subdivision. Inspections for boats too large to clear the bridge spanning the mail Shell Harbour canal, will be held at the Sanibel Marina.

The inspection will take about 20 minutes to complete, and will insure the boat owner that all required safety equipment aboard the boat is in good working order. Inspections will scheduled from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Friday, December 3, and from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Saturday, Decemben 4 Commander Browns dock just beyond the Periwinkle Way bridge over the canal.

An official 1977 Coast Guard decal will be placed on each boat which passes the inspection. The decal is recognized by all marine authorities as evidence that boat is properly equipped.

Captiva merger committee

At the Captiva Civic Association's general monthly meeting last Tuesday, Association President Sam Conant announced the names of the association members he has selected to serve on a committee which will undertake an impartial study of possible advantages and disadvantages which might be expected of a proposed merger of unincorporated Captiva with the City of Sanibel.

Edward Lowry was appointed by Conant to head up the new committee. which will also include Marty Holtz. Dewitt Jones, Charles Stevens and Barbara Trimble.

The newly-appointed group will be charged with the task of investigating all of the possibilities open to Captivans for a joint governmental venture with the neighboring City of Sanibel. The results of their study are intended to educate Captiva's electorate, who will be faced with a choice on the issue at the time of a referendum vote proposed for no later than April 1, 1977.

In order for such a merger to take place, however, the City of Sanibel would have to annex Captiva by an ordinance approved by a majority of the voters of both Islands.

The Association's Board of Directors has already set aside \$1,500 to finance the merger study, which was initiated late last week as the new committee began preparing a letter of interest in the proposal to be mailed to all residents of Captiva. According to President Conant, the interest surveys were to have been mailed last Friday.

The Association members were also treated to the unveiling of the Island's first juried art show last Tuesday, as well as the customary business of the regular monthly social meeting.

The art show, which was sponsored by the Association in conjunction with the Sanibel-Captiva Art League, was held last week at the Captiva Community Center.
