

request for multi-family permit continued

The first request for relief from the protection of the moratorium on multifamily housing was heard by the Planning Commission during their regular meeting yesterday morning, Monday, August 14.

Erich Trost contends that City Hall scheduling was the reason that he did not have his development permit when the July 18 ban was imposed. The moratorium is scheduled to run through the end of the year. Trost wants a development permit to build a 32-unit condominium on the corner of Tarpon Bay Road, and Guld Drive.

A cording to architect William Frizzell, Trost had everything he needed on June 30 but thought he had to clear the underbrush on the property so that the vegetation committee could insp. the land. Trost maintains that, during July prior to the moratorium, he called City Planning Director Bruce Rogers for an appointment and was granted one for July 25. Trost maintains that he had everything ready to go for his permit when he requested the appointment.

Planning Commissioner Ray Fenton asked for a continuation of the hearing until a list of chronological dates and a letter outlining the facts could be obtained.

ruled that all materials must be in the file one week prior to the agenda date. This was the reason that a request for a specific amendment to allow a tennis court to violate a setback line from Limpet Drive was continued.


Commissioner Fenton felt that the staff of the Planning Department should be chastized but the applicant should not be harmed.

The Commissioners agreed that a staff report should be in the file at the time of an applicant's pre-hearing and that the file should be complete one week prior to the agenda time so that the Planning Commission has "the time to do their homework."

The Commission also continued a request by Mariner-Properties for a development permit for 12 units, including six duplexes, four tennis courts and a swimming pool just north of Periwinkle Way.

A request for a development permit for a single family home by Emil and Margaretta Rosenberger was also continued because the file had not been complete at the appropriate time.

In other business Commissioner Ray Fenton suggested that a public hearing should be held after the August 21 session with the federal officials with


perching seen as new hope for Captiva

The hope for Captiva's eroded Gulf front beach lies with a ten by four foot permeable nylon bag.

Some 500 of these bags, filled with sand obtained from off-shore dredging, will be placed in the water along three sections of Gulf beach in an experimental effort to hold sand against Captiva's erosion-prone beaches. The process, which is called perching, has worked with success on other beaches and may help to save Captiva's vanishing beach front.

In a meeting of the Captiva Erosion Prevention District on Tuesday, August 8, Erosion District Chairman

The Captiva Erosion Prevention District will be undertaking a perching process with sandbags to lessen the effects of wave action against the secluded Island's Gulf front. Dan Burner conducted the update on the proposed perching program. The Naples firm of Coastal Engineering, which has been hired to design the project, was represented by Michael Stevens, who indicated that similar perching programs have been undertaken on Singer Island on the East Coast of Florida and with success in the Chesapeake Bay area, where the nylon bags were first used by University of Rhode Island researchers.

Stevens indicated that he expected the project to be under way in about six weeks and completed before the northerly storms hit Captiva in late Oc-

the legendary pelican

Anyone who has watched a brown pelican tumble from the air into Gulf waters to catch his meal can only wonder at the lack of grace of these familiar Florida birds. Yet their ungainly bodies do have a certain flair, and they're no doubt a favorite of every resident and visitor to Florida shores. It would be a lonesome Florida sky without them.

From the earliest days of recorded history, pelicans have fascinated man.

Fossil remains indicate that these birds have been on earth some thirty to forty million years, and certainly since ancient times, man has associated the pelican with religious symbolism and legends.

The earliest Hebrews regarded the pelican, who inhabited isolated areas, with loneliness and uhappiness, and early Christians interpreted the pelican as a symbol of sacrifice and used the symbol particularly in art works. Examples of thirteenth and fifteenth century stone and wood carvings as well as stained glass crafts, portray the pelican as a representative figure depicting Christ's sacrifice for mankind.

The unhappy pelican gained a new, natural significance when he declined as a religious symbol in recent years. For obvious reasons, he was used anywhere there was an aquatic reference!

Sir Francis Drake was one of the first to circumnavigate the globe. His ship was called the "Golden Hind," and it is thus that history records the fact. Hitorians failed to note that the ship had been re-christened before the voyage. It was originally called the "Pelican."

We can only guess if Drake feared an omen against the journey from the desolation so often associated with the lonely pelican. While Islanders take the pelican for granted on the Florida scene, his name has been often used by scientists who want to identify another organism with some of the particular qualities with which Nature has endowed the pelican.

For instance, there is a rare pelican fish, which inhabits extremely deep seas. Over six feet long, with an ell-like body, the Pelican fish has overly large jaws, mouth and stomach, in a manner similar to the pelican. He is able to survive by ingesting prey that would normally be too large for him. This habit can only remind us of the pelican, whose "beak will hold more than his pelican!"

There is also a small mollusk which inhabits northern hemisphere waters. The spiny spikes on the end of its shell remind scientists of the webbed toes of the large bird. Hence its name, the Pelican foot.

The world map claims its share of pelican glory too. Far from Florida shores, Ethiopia bears a Lake Shala. Shala is the tribal word for pelican. Just as far from home, Australia's Princess Charlotte Bay harbours a Pelican Island, as does Lake Winnepeg, somewhat closer to home in Canada.

On the East Coast of Florida, the Indian River surrounds a Pelican Island, too. In 1903, Teddy Roosevelt, then President of the United States, visited this pelican breeding ground, The Department of the Interior later took over the area, and it is now a preserve for all fowl, but particularly for the vanishing pelican.

The awkward flight of the pelican must have seemed like the epitome of freedom to the prisoners who once inhabited a lonely piece of rock in California waters which bears the name of the pelican in Spanish Alcatraz."

The state of Louisiana shares Gulf waters, too, and once, before pollution wiped the slate clean of its numbers, pelicans. The Great Seal of that state features a pelican, as does the seal of the City of St. Petersburg in Florida.

The pelican has suffered greatly from mans detrimental influence on the environment, and naturalists have had to take strong steps in recent years to save the pelican from extinction. The killer DDT has taken its toll, as has other pollution, including fishooks aund monofilament line, and the disruption of mangrove homes. There is a poem by Edward Lear, published in his "Complete Nonsense Book" that holds some optimism for pelicans:

"Ploffskin, Pluffskin, Pelican jee! We think no Birds so happy as we! Plumpskin, Ploshkin, Pelican jill! We think so then, and we thought so still!"

Hopefully, a true verse in the future.

tober or early November. Stevens reported that the permitting process has been started with the Army Corps of Engineers, the Department of Environmental Resources and the Department of Natural Resources. The Erosion Prevention District will advertize for bids on the project in the next few weeks, and Stevens hopes for an "early fall construction date."

Dexter Bender, agent for the Erosion Prevention District, is in the process of contacting residents of the three

construction sites whose beach fronts will become access points while the perching process is being accomplished. The proposed stretch includes three points between Blind Pass to an area just past 'Tween Waters Inn.

According to Stevens, the Blind Pass perching will probably be the most "sensitive" work. "The near shore perching should just take a couple of days," he said, "but the Blind Pass perching will involve an off-shore structure ... probably a barge ... and

maybe a crane "to manage the cumbersome bags which hold 21/4 cubic yards - a metric ton - of sand.

Dex Bender reported that the test site may be expanded to include some South Seas homesites. Some owners have expressed interest in the project and have contributed privately to the Erosion Prevention District to be included in the experimental program.

Engineer Mike Stevens takes exception to the term "experimental".

"It's really misleading," he said. "Of course there's no guarantee with any

structure, but we have survey data from Captiva as to the effectiveness of similar structures, and we are confident that this method will perform as anticipated."

Stevens added that the sandbags are not meant to interrupt a natural process, but rather to trip the wave action and induce a stabilizing force on the beach. "We'll be undertaking this project at a time of normal accretion on Captiva's beaches," Stevens concluded. "We expect favorable results."



water rate hike promotes conservation

When the Island Water Association raised their rates for water consumption during the peak season that includes the months of June through January, consumption dropped.

On Sanibel in May of 1977, single family residences consumed 8,580 average gallons per unit. In May of 1978, the per unit average for single family homes was 4,917.

Captiva showed a similar drop in usage. The average usage in May of 1977 per single family home was 4,992; in May of 1978 the same home used an average of 2,817 gallons per month.

Multi-family units on both islands showed a decrease of about 2.000 gallons per unit for the same month under last year.

captiva zoning change should be approved

The Wiles family will get a final determination from the County Commissioners shortly about their request for a zone change in the Captiva property adjacent to Timmy's Nook to permit a small marina and three marina-related shops. We think that the Commissioners should rule in the Wiles' favor.

Opposition to the plans has been hot and heavy on Captiva and, we think, somewhat heavy-handed. By far, the majority of the people who have organized against the proposed marina do not live in the area surrounding the property in question. In fact only two of the 19 people within the 375-foot radius of the property have objected to date.

It has been argued that, with three marinas already on Captiva, that island doesn't need a fourth. That is not quite the case. The other three marinas are private; this would be public, available for residents and visitors alike. The channel in that area is already deep enough and no further dredging will be required.

There is also the aruement that the marina will increase the number of boats in the waters surrounding Captiva. What is go ing to increase the number of boaters is not a marina that would, in all likeliehood only hold abo ut 20 boats, but the artifical reef now going being constructed in Redfish Pass.

The property is now zoned for multifamily and four units could be built there. To our mind that wouldn't be much different than a small marina.

We think the Commissioners should take the necessary steps to ensure that the marina and its related small businesses be built tastefully with appropriate vegetation buffers, but we think they should alter the zoning.

This is not a case of an extrepreneur coming to Captiva, and making a quick profit, selling the marina and leaving. The Wiles family first came to Captiva in 1888 and the likliehood of them leaving is remote indeed.

So, county commissioners, on August 25 we hope you will vote in favor of the request for the zoning change.

flood elevation workshop rescheduled

county administrators actions praised

To the Editor:

The whiplash of California's current taxpayers' revolt has now hit the Lee County Commission with its full fury. Local news media were ablaze with reports of: impressive organized businessmen's opposition to the September 12th Referendum to impose a two percent countywide Tourist Room Rental Tax; and a surprise advocacy of an Impact Fee (on new construction throughout the County) by County Administrator Lavon Wisher.

long-time County The Administrator's proposal for the Impact Fee was the more surprising because of her traditional silence on such recommendations; and the widelyrecognized authority with which she speaks on County taxing and expenditure matters. As usual, her views were firmly based on generallyaccepted facts germane to the problems involved.

Mrs. Wisher's observation that the County's ad valorem property taxing methods are "unfair and inequitable" was elementary and indisputable. Any such tax that requires people already uning here to pay the tax bills for increased services needed to serve a flood of new residents is repugnant to any non-Communist community. The extent to which that unfairness has grown, was documented from a recent Florida Revenue Department report that "45 percent of the State's people to Lee County for its highly publicized

are paying 95 percent of the property taxes"; and stated the the Report devoted fourteen pages to listing the various property tax exemptions that create the growing number of taxation Free Riders.

Most encouraging was the reported open support of the County Administrator's suggestion by Commissioners Evans and Roberts - as were their recommendations for specific corrections to be made in the current property taxing methods. (The apparent silence of the other three Commissioners seemed ominous to this taxpayer.)

My hat is off to the Fort Myers Beach and Sanibel-Captiva Chambers of Commerce for their forthright opposition to the proposed Tourist Room Rental Tax. It, indeed, seems grossly unfair to levy the lion's share of that tax on the motels in the coastal areas with the preponderant number of rental units when the tax proceeds are to be spent for so-called "Tourist Facilities" located elsewhere in the County. It would not seem so suicidal for those beach orientated Chambers of Commerce to support the measure if the legally-defined "Tourist Facilities" had included such tourist-used facilities as: improved roads; public beach accesses and restrooms; boat ramps; fishing piers, etc. Those are the type that are appropriate to the demands of the tourist trade that come

sun-drenched beaches, seashells, boating and fishing.

In summary: Congratulations and best wishes to County Administrator Wisher and the beach areas' Chambers of Commerce for forcefully presenting their views on such key taxing issues. My regrets, however, that the Chamber of Commerce cannot overcome their diversified-membership-



on the water

If this past week's fishing reports are any indication, I would say that the snook fishing has taken a steep decline as we move towards the end-of-the summer fishing season.

The line-sided fish which draws hundreds of visitors to our islands seems to have stopped biting, except for a few scattered catches in the passes and at the fishing pier on the end of Sanibel Island.

Originally, we had felt that the cold winter had delayed the start of snook season and hopefully, many fishermen thought the season would extend well into fall. Last year snook were being taken in September and even early October, something not unusual, but pleasantly surprising.

This week has seen snook ignore most live baits, whether they were the choice mutton minnows, pinfish or pigfish. Those poor guys casting lures probably have taken up tennis or something more rewarding.

The only consistant snook catches I have encountered came from a fella who fishes south of Naples, an hour's

drive south of the Islands. This guy is a used boat salesman, so some of the reports probably have to be tempered, but he said early morning fishing with top water lures is producing some good catches.

The tarpon are still up in Boca Grande Pass, but they are running smaller, in the 50-80 pound class. Still lots of fun and you won't be battling a "fleet" of other boats this time of year. Several major sports magazines have featured "off season" tarpon fishing at Boca Grande. And just when we were trying to keep it all a good secret too.

There are still lots of fishing being done, however. The trout are making their annual come-back, showing up in the deeper and cooler passes. There are more over the grassflats now, but it will take a couple more months of cooler weather to make it really good out there.

Incidently, there was one of those monster sheepshead brought into Tween Waters Marina the other day. A six-pounder was weighed in and compared to the usual two or three



pounders, it was a giant.

Shelling seems to be about the same, but we could use a good west wind to drive up some new shells. There are several beaches on Sanibel and Captiva just about bare of shells. This is something which happens from time to time. Keep walking, if you find a beach vacant of shells. Chances are good that a mile or so down you will find a mound of shells and a few really good ones.

Snorkel diving has been good in the early mornings if you have a boat and can get up to the rocks off Cayo Costa Island, north of Captiva. These rocks aren't to be compared to the Florida Keys, of course, but do offer close diving and sometimes the sighting of several tropical fish too. You grouper fishermen might try the rocks in this area because evertime I've been diving

One of the best joys of fishing in Florida is that, in a sense, we have the best of two worlds. Not only is the fishing in the Bay and Gulf a pleasureable experience, but there are abundant fresh water lakes within a relatively short driving distance.

One lake not too far distant is the Okeechobee. You can get there from here by car or by boat. All the facilities are available and the water is clean, due to excellent maintenance, I would presume, and well stocked.

As always, fishing is good in the Gulf, of course, but at various times the particular species you are interested in may have gone on vacation, but then he never departs without leaving a sitter at home.

Back on the briny - nothing of unusual significance, but lots of the usual. Flounder are being caught around the sand bars and in the mangroves, as are trout (they are also numerous around the rocks). A few tarpon are still in the bay named for them although most of the family is sojourning at Boca Grande. A few snook are playing at Redfish Pass, as out there I see several fish backed into the pockets along these rocks.

There are plenty of good fish which are fun to catch along the surf on the Gulf side of the islands. For many island visitors, this is the easiest way to have some fishing fun and not invest a fortune at the same time. Any kind of rod and reel, with a small bobber and shrimp bait, cast out fifty feet or so should produce some action, providing there aren't too many breaking waves out there.

Remember that we are headed directly into the hurricane season so have some plans for your boat, should a major storm come our way. Let's hope we can be missed again this year.



Now ... though the fish are roaming about on holidays, keep in mind THAT WHILE SOME LEAVE, SOME COME and the redfish is an example of this. It would appear the young ones have started to arrive, with the older ones on their way.

So - be you 8 or 80, year-rounder 6r day-tripper - in the waters around Sanibel its always good fishing. Good Catching.

Cconversion table: The above tides are for the lighthouse point of Sanibel only. To convert for Redfish Pass (north tip of Captiva), add 55 minutes to the time shown for every hi-tide, subtract two (2) minutes for every low tide. (NO, we don't know why, but it works. Instructions following are even less sense-sical but as we stated, they do work.)

For Captiva Island, Gulf side, subtract 30 minutes from each high tide, and subtract 1 hour and 16 minutes for each low tide.

For Captiva Island, Pine Island Sound (Bay) side, add I hour and four (4) minutes for each high tide, and add 52 minutes for each low tide.

In between these points on gulf or bay — guesstimate — and have good fishing, and or shelling.


proposes to destroy the quiet residential aspect of a neighborhood, and in addition wants a liquor license, it is time for "David" to pick up a sling shot.








community association votes for addition

Faced with the need for more space, the Sanibel Community Association voted unanimously last Tuesday to build an addition onto the Association Building on Periwinkle Way. "Last year we had to turn down many exhibitors for the Shell Fair because of lack of space," Dick Wilson, Chairman of the Building Committee said at the meeting Tuesday night. He also stated that "some exhibitors had expressed concern over the safety of the old wood frame structure, especially in case of fire." The Community Association is now required to have a fire truck stationed outside the building for the duration of the shell fair.

The new addition to the building will consist of a 4000 square-foot auditorium with a seating capacity of 450 people, and office areas and restrooms encompassing another 1000 square feet. The building will be fireproof and would serve as a refuge during storms. The addition will be built with entrance ramps for the handicapped, and will be built at the same height as the old building.

"We have to get this started now," architect Frank Vellake pointed out, "because in October the new federal



flood guidelines will go into effect which would force us to build the addition either 10 or 11 feet above sea level. The present building is only 7¹/₂ feet above sea level, and having to put ramps up to connect the two would greatly add to the cost of the structure."

The structure, although not yet out for bids, is estimated to cost \$150,000. There is now \$63,000 in the building fund, and the other \$90,000 will come from a bank loan. The bank has already approved the loan using the land on the south side of Periwinkle Way as collateral, and the payments would be less than the annual revenue from the Shell Fair.





live shell report

After more than two years of often intense debate and bitter emotionalism, Sanibel Island's controversial Live-Shelling Committee appears to find itself stranded on a sand bar of city cost effectiveness.

The committee currently has before it a second proposal for an exhaustive study of island mollusk populations basically to determine if the mollusk populations are truly in a decline and whether that decline can be attributed to over collecting of live shells.

Pine Island biologist Shawn McGee has proposed a three year shell study that could prove to be the most thorough, and certainly the only scientific examination, of the question of live-shell collecting on these unique barrier islands.

The big stickler in McGee's proposal - like the \$62,000 proposal rejected by the committee after a doubletake late last year - is the cost and who is going to pay for it. McGee's shell study would cost an estimated \$132,000 - with onethird of the cost to be borne by the city and the remaining two-thirds funded by the state Sea Grant College Program from the University of Florida.

Of even more concern to some committee members is the future of the committee itself. At the shell committee meeting last month, Sanibel Shell Club President Anne Joffe questioned whether the committee may be in more danger of extinction than the shells they are trying to save.

In its stormy two year history, the Sanibel shell committee has triggered several public hearings of the Sanibel City Council in which the question of live shelling was vigorously debated.

Noted mollusk experts, including Dr. R. Tucker Abbott, author of American Seashells and malocologist Bill Lyons, from the state Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Marine Research Lab in St. Petersburg, told the committee that live shelling does not pose a threat to the mollusk population as a whole. In an article in Hawaiian Shell News last year, Abbott suggested that other man-made causes of environmental degradation, including coastal construction, dredge and fill, and water pollution are a more serious threat than individual shellers.

Although the shell committee urged the city of Sanibel to enact ordinances restricting commercial shelling operations and emphasizing public education, no action has been taken.

bridge . . . by jeannie smith

To finesse or not to finesse, that is often the question.

I do believe some bridge players (including your writer) agonize over this dilemma as much as the tragic prince, Hamlet, did over his "To be, or not to be".

Now players, let's be honest. Our dilemma is not a matter of living or of dying. Well, not quite. To finesse or not to finesse, nonetheless, often determines the making of our contract in glory or sinking down to melancholy in defeat.

And doesn't it frustrate you to play with people with this uncanny ability to read the opponents' cards while you remain completely in the dark--until the cards fall?

Let one of my favorite bridge people give you some pointers on finessing and on reading the opponents'

Is. A charter member of the American Bridge Teacher's Association, the "White Gloves Teacher" was recognized in 1970 as the nation's outstanding Goren brige teacher. More than 20 years ago, she also happened to be my teacher and sponsor into the world of teaching bridge in Dallas.

A couple of years ago, Margaret Wales told me about this hand she played while conducting bridge activities on a 90-day round-the-world cruise. As you read this hand, please note that spades are listed first and the other suits follow in downward rank to Clubs,

North deals. E-W vulnerable

Mrs. Wales' response of 3 Diamonds to North's 1 NT opening told her partner that she had a long, strong Diamond suit and alerted him to the possibility of a slam. The bidding then went: 3 Hearts, 4 Clubs, 4 Diamonds, 6 Diamonds. (The 4-Club bid told North that she had a second good suit.)

The Declarer felt that her contract was home safe if



either minor suit split evenly or if the Q dropped on the first lead of the trump suit. If statistics were on her side, she knew her contract was safe. Hadn't she taught that the Q should drop when the two hands hold 9 cards in the suit?

She knew, too, that contracts are made by thinking and not by statistics. So, she decided to get a reading on the opponents' cards. Now remember that although an expert, Mrs. Wales is also human-she, too, was unable to see more than two hands. And Just as you, she was restriced from using mirrors at the table. So, card sleuthing was in order.

With only 4 Spades in the two hands, she thought it should be safe to delay drawing trumps and to play the Spades. This play should provide some clues as to the distribution of the opponents' cards.

East followed suit to the Spade lead, won by Dummy's Q, and both followed when Spade K was played while Mrs. Wales discarded a Club. This discard was noted by East. It crossed East's mind that Declarer might be void in hearts to discard from her other long suit.

With the lead of a third Spade, East was put on the

spot. If he trumped in, he might not only be overruffed by South but, more importantly, he would unguard his Diamond Q and face the loss of his potential trump trick. The sluffing of a Club also looked unattractive to East since Declarer's bidding had shown length and strength in Clubs and East wanted, then to protect his Club Q. So, he discarded a Heart.

Declarer now knew something about the hands of both opponents. East started with only two Spades, so West started with seven. East's refusal to ruff in shoed he either had no trumps or was protecting a potential winner, the Q. Mrs. Wales decided to play the letter distribution.

She played a small Diamond to the K in her hand, led back a small club to the K in Dummy, and then led a small Diamond to her J after East played the 10. West was unable to follow suit and on the next play the A of Diamonds dropped the Q.

"How glamorous," Mrs. Wales though, "If I could make an overtrick!" She didn't. Instead, when she played the A of Clubs, West showed out, and Mrs. Wales claimed her contract by conceding a Club trick to East.

And its there that Annie Laurie gied me her promise true,


Gied me her promise true, which ne'er forgot will be



Aunt Muriel

Her life and her art

"My candle burns at both ends, It will not last the night. But ah, my foes and oh my friends it gives a lovely light.'

t is with the above philosophy pinned up on the message ward by her kitchen desk that my aunt Muriel Pargh Turoff conducts her daily life.

Born in 1904 in Odessa, Russia, she and her brother Murray (the baby) and her parents Julius and Edith left their native country in 1906 because of the increasing violence and pograms.

While her father journeyed to America with two loaves of rve bread, several dried herrings and \$4 in his pocket, another sister was born in Austria where she and her family waited.

In 1907 her dad sent passage money and found sponsors who guaranteed the upkeep of the new immigrant family. They arrived at Ellis Island and soon settled in Brooklyn.

'I remember when we lived at 149 Belmont Ave.;" it was so rural there that cattle from the rail yards used to graze in the fields near our room." Muriel recalls.

The ? 3 of Brooklyn she refers to is now Brownsville -"where some of the worst rioting occurred several years ago," she says.

As Julius prospered in his cabinetmaking and the family grew (eventually there were seven brothers and sisters) they moved here and there throughout lower New York City and Brooklyn.

It was in elementary school that Muriel was recognized as possessing an outstanding artistic talent. By high school she was on her way to success in art and in life.

Being a wife and mother came early. Her late husband Abe and son Alan (a toy designer who invented the Parker Brothers game "Boggle," and former professional photographer with works in the "Family of Man" collection) occupied most of her time.

Proping her candle burning at both ends, Muriel was still able to become an accomplished potter. Crown Publishers published her book "How to Make Pottery" and it has been hailed as one of the best in the field, especially for teachers.

Her pottery works are in the collections of several museums, including the Jewish Museum in New York City, which also purchased her brass candlesticks for its per-

manent collection. The art of cloisine enameling has become a specialty of Muriel's; her works include "work in silver, copper, platinum and other precious metals," she explains.

Painting is still a favorite medium; water colors are a lifelong love. Sculpture as a form of pottery is included among her art forms. We asked if there were any others. Muriel smiled and replied, "teaching."

Searching for a new pursuit, she took a course in quilting about two years ago. After a small pillow turned out "lovely," her teacher encouraged her to try something a bit larger.

The something a bit larger turned out to be an almost finished quilt with all the wildflowers of the United States and in the center, in Hebrew, the words: "Blessed art thou oh Lord."

What more can be said for all the beauty that exists in this world, and what expresses it better than flowers?" she explains.

Her awards are almost too numerous to mention but a few of them include "Who's Who in America", and "Dictionary of International Biography."

Always interested in foods and the artistic arrangement of them, Muriel explains, "I was my mother's first born and she was very young -- there were only 20 years between us."

"We were so close and when she lost her teeth as a very young woman and suffered so because of it I started doing research on the causes and relationships between health and the foods we eat. The more I learned and tried, the more I became convinced this was the correct way to live.

Currently I eat very little meat. I am not a vegetarian but I only eat a bit of hamburger about every two weeks or so. Mostly I eat vegetables -- all kinds, and very often I get organically grown ones so that the pesticide residue does not build up in my body.

"I never use margarine and avoid salt as much as possible."

In one corner of the kitchen were two little containers of seeds sprouting -- alfalfa and lentil.

"They are a good source of protein, and taste good too. I always toss some in with my salads," Muriel says.

This Saturday she is going up to the Carolinas, where she has rented a little one-room cottage in a very rural area.


"The landlord has planted a little organic garden for me by the side yard so I will have fresh produce the month or so I am there. Isn't that delightful?" She is like a teenager in her enthusiasm.

"I will be taking my art supplies, and of course the quilt, with me

"Going away like this always gives me a refreshing view on life again."



him mother. In Britain "mother" always pours the tea and passes the cookies. I think I should like to live in Dimfries ... you can walk to everything.

A WONDERFUL old bridge where you watch the water tear over rocks, a library with flowers galore in the gardens, double Margurites, roses, zinnies ... the steeple of the old church atop part of an old brick wall still stands - one passes through an opening to the new church built when fire destroyed the former. At Mass Father asked us to pray that the queen would be safe on her trip to Ireland as she was about to visit on her anniversary. camille-type hurricane would devastate county

A major killer hurricane with the intensity of Hurricane Camille, which devastated the upper Gulf coast in 1969 with 200 mile per hour winds and a deadly storm surge, would force the evacuation of all of Lee County west of the I-75 corridor and displace more than 150,000 persons, according to a draft hurricaneevacuationreport prepared for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

Tuesday, August 15, 1978

The report, the first in-depth technical study of the impact of a major hurricane striking the densely populated Lee County coastline at the worst possible angle, projects a hurricane with the intensity of Camille could push 18 foot storm tides over Sanibel and Fort Myers Beach, 10 to 14 foot tides over the populated areas of Cape Coral, and up to eight feet of water over downtown Fort Myers.

The storm surge profile is part of a draft report prepared by the Southwest Florida Regional Planning Council as a pilot evacuation study and plan that may soon be the model for every coastal county in the State of Florida.

The draft study utilized data for coastal storm surge heights of three hurricanes of successively increasing intensity striking Lee County at an angle that would cause the greatest amount of water -- storm surge -- to be pushed before it as it moves inland.

This initial data, provided by the National Hurricane Center in Miami, did not take into account the impact that barrier islands, open expanses of shallow back bays dotted with mangrove islands, and other natural coastal contours would have on the tons of water being pushed inland by the winds of an approaching hurricane.

To determine exactly what areas would be affected by a hurricane and may need evacuation, the council contracted with the Houston Storm Institute to incorporate information on coastal and natural features and elevations, depth of water in bays and rivers, distance between offshore islands and the mainland, and other similar data into a computer profile of the approaching hurricane.

The institute "created" three computer hurricanes designed to simulate actual hurricanes of successively increasing intensity, which could strike Southwest Florida.

These computer-simulated hurricanes are modeled after three "real" hurricanes, which included:

-- Hurricane Betsy: a moderate intensity hurricane of class three strength, based on the Saffir-Simpson scale, with an average 100 to 120 mph winds.

Hurricane Donna: A 1960 hurricane which struck Southwest Florida with 120 to 150 mph winds before cutting a swath of destruction across the center of the state.

-- Hurricane Camille: a devastating killer hurricane which swept the upper Gulf coast with intense 150 to 200 mph winds and 25 foot storm tides. This is a class five hurricane and the most intense and dangerous storm that could strike the coast. Using the wide variety of data correlated through the computer, the Institute then postulated the maximum distance that storm-driven water would be pushed inland and the height of the storm surge in varying locations. The Regional Planning Council contracted for these computer storm profiles with a \$35,000 grant from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to create the pilot study. The Corps conducted new elevation surveys of all major designated evacuation routes from low lying areas. The molding of this crucial information into a cohesive plan has allowed planners to know what evacuation routes will be flooded by an advancing hurricane and how much time is necessary to evacuate low lying areas before those key evacuation routes are made impassable by storm waters.

order an actual evacuation of coastal areas. Planners estimate as many as 110.000 of the county's 179,000 people live in the coastal areas and may need evacuation when threatened by a hurricane.

To move that many people, planners had to know how many vehicles would be moved through the key intersections within the time frames established by the intensity and movement of the oncoming storm.

After surveying the public, planners discovered that because of second cars and other reasons, only an estimated 81 percent of the vehicles would be used in an evacuation. Figuring how many vehicles, traveling at speeds of 25 to 40 mph could be moved through key evacuation routes by the hour, planners then determined how many hours would be required to evacuate the coastal zones before these routes became impassible.

"One of the biggest remaining problems we have, which was not addressed in the scope of this plan because of limited funding, is the possibility of a major hurricane like the famous 1926 storm which swept overland from the east," Daltry said.

Such a storm, according to hurricane planners, could flood key evacuation routes inland through heavy rains and localized flooding in advance of passing westward over the coast. As it passed coastal areas and plunged into the Gulf of Mexico, storm tides pushed backwards could flood coastal areas that could not be evacuated in time because of the inland flooding already taking place.

Planners say such a storm would require considerable advance warning and evacuation time. Coastal areas faced with the threat of one of the three computer "model" storms coming in from the Gulf of Mexico, could require a minimum of 18 hours advance warning and evacuation time before the storm's landfall.


The National Hurricane Service cannot promise an accurate prediction of the landfall location of a hurricane more than 12 hours in advance, although hurricane officials indicate that warning time could possibly be stretched to 18 hours,

"All we can do is push for the most accurate prediction as early as possible," Daltry said. "Then it is up to the emergency preparedness officials when to give the evacuation order for the various zones."

If that evacuation order comes too early, and the storm turns, people who left their homes needlessly may pay less heed to the next warning -- and it could be fatal.

If the evacuation order doesn't come soon enough, thousands could be trapped by rising tides and storm waters. "It's a choice that has to be made carefully and with a high degree of accuracy," Daltry said. "This plan doesn't leave much room for leeway -but it's the most accurate instrument we have so far."

The plan will be circulated among local governments, planners, and emergency preparedness agencies for a 30 day reviewand-comment period before being submitted in its final form to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers as Lee County's first detailed hurricane evacuation plan.



Storm tide contours for Camille-type storm



Hurricane Camille was a killer. In spite of evacuation orders along the upper gulf coast in 1969, hundreds who refused to leave their homes perished as the "compact" hurricane's 200 mile per hour winds pushed a 25-foot wall of water over the coastal area.

In its wake, it left everything up to 12 miles inland devastated.

If a hurricane like Camille struck Lee County at the worst possible angle, everything west of the I-75 corridor will have to be evacuated. Disaster planners say they don't know where they will house the more than 160,000 people that may be forced to flee to high ground. Almost every primary and secondary shelter in the county would be inundated with at least eight feet of water.

"Its the kind of nightmare we to prepare for but don't like to think about." says Red Cross Director Barry Hall.

Coastal areas from Sanibel to Bonita Springs will require between 21 to 23 hours warning time to evacuate. South Cape Coral, mainland Estero bay, and low lying upriver areas of Tice and Alva will require at least eight hours and 50 minutes warning time, followed closely by riverfront areas along North Fort Myers with seven hours needed to evacuate, and Pine Island, Matlacha and northwest Cape Coral with six hours and 20 minutes of minimum warning time necessary.

Other evacuation areas will require at least five hours or less to evacuate, including the city of Fort Myers.

150,000 people would be forced to leave their homes, to find uncertain shelter and 'no high ground'

Planning council staffer Wayne Daltry said evacuation time factors, incorporated into a plan for the successive evacuation of coastal zones, will give officials the time parameters within which they must act to





When Hurricane Donna struck Fort Myers in 1960, it was rated as a "dry" hurricane for Lee County. Because it made landfall south of Lee County, the counterclockwise motion of the hurricane pushed tons of water out of bays and rivers. Only when the winds shifted from the west in the wake of the passing storm, did coastal flooding occur.

If Hurricane Donna, packing 150 mile per hour plus winds, struck north of Lee County it would push 10 to 14 foot tides over all the coastal islands, Sanible, Pine Island, Fort Myers Beach, Bonita Beach and the Punta Rassa-South Fort Myers area.

Because of road conditions, population and low lying areas, Fort Myers Beach

and the Hurricane Bay-Siesta Isles area would require at least 22 hours and 22 minutes warning time to evacuate, followed closely by Sanibel, Punta Rassa, Shell Point and riverfront McGregor Boulevard areas with 20 hours and 58 minutes warning time at a minimum.

Southern Cape Coral will need eight hours and 55 minutes minimum warning time to evacuate, along with the Hendry Creek and South Estero area. Pine Island and northwest Cape Coral will need at least six hours and 26 minutes warning time to evacuate, and the Cypress Lake, South Fort Myers, Schooner Bay, and Port Edison areas will also have to be evacuated and will require five hours or less advance warning.
