At any time of night or day, Island roads are filled with jogging souls. Daybreak finds them pushing along the highways. On through the daylight hours and into the evening, joggers are everywhere. All shapes and sizes enjoy jogging: fat ones, thin ones and those who are pear-shaped. Jogging speeds vary with the size of the joggers, although the two are not necessarily proportionate! There's the slow plodder and the sprightly, light-footed runner.

There is only one thing that joggers do share, in our opinion.

Have you ever seen a jogger on the road who has a look of pure contentment on his face as he jogs along? Quite the contrary.



Actually, according to those who actively participate in the sport, there is a difference between running and jogging. Runners are supposedly those enthusiasts who can accomplish a mile in eight minutes or less. Joggers take longer! Runners may also compete; joggers don't. The distinction may be a fine one, unless of course you happen to be the individual who's trying to manage the mile in less than eight minutes!

Not counting those who run for the satisfaction of competing, it is estimated that there are some 23 million people running for pleasure or health's sake, and those hardy souls are covering almost 17 billion miles a year. There are six national organizations for runners and joggers, with some 100 chapters throughout the country and 50,000 members who care enough about their craze to carry a membership card that attests to their enthusiasm.

The statistics evolving from 23 million joggers are really overwhelming, especially if you're a weight watcher and your life revolves around calories. If 23 million people run an average of two miles a day, that's 46 million miles a day or 16,790 million miles each year. Now, at 100 calories burned off for each mile ... we're talking about 500 million pounds. Sure makes that spare tire around your middle seem pretty insignificant doesn't it?

If clothes make the man, joggers are out in front. From terry and cotton to chic polyester, shorts and tank tops are side by side with tasteful warm-up suits in all colors and prices. A few resigned runners forsake fashion and stick with traditional cut-offs and sweat bands,




but a recent jog through a fashionable local shop would tempt the most sedentary prone Islander to purchase a lime green terry number and hit the pavement.

Police Department aides to ride bus

Sanibel

The Sanibel Police Department (SPD) has authorized a deputized person to ride the elementary school buses this year in the mornings and afternoons.

The aides will get out at the various bus stops and if there are children who must cross the street, they will act as crossing guards.

The action came after school bus driver Wayne Bashaw lodged several complaints last year with both the city and the SPD about drivers who were violating the school bus laws and driving past the buses while the children were getting on and off the buses.

Pat Kair, president of the School Parent Organization, told the ISLANDER that the last three months of the 1977-78 school year were "crazy".

"We've never seen anything like that before," Mrs. Kair commented. "It was as if the driving patterns suddenly changed. And the bus driver couldn't do anything about it because he couldn't leave the bus."

The aides will meet the buses at Mariner Pointe and at Blind Pass.

"We have children as young as four and a-half years of age," said Charles O. Wainright, principal of the Sanibel Elementary School, "so we're very pleased with this development."

Captran develops environmental division ...

With the announcement by Keith W. Trowbridge that Captran, Inc. of Sanibel Island is founding a Division of Conservation and Environmental Management comes a long overdie wedding of land development and exological and conservation interests that will be coming a growing and flourishing national concern. The division will be associated with Captran on its existing reports and those planned in the future.

The rich scientific and environmental background of Don and Nora Dietlein, who will be co-directors of the Division, will be available on a consulting basis through Captran to work with all developers, to effect conservation measures and techniques in future building projects.

"By having developer sponsorship," says Nora, "we can gain the attention of other developers to demonstrate how conservation measures can enhance new construction by retaining the valuable qualities of the natural atmosphere."

Currently the Dietleins are consultants zoological matters for the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation. Until recently Don was director of science and education at the Foundation's Nature Center and was responsible for the initial projects in setting up the Center located on the Sanibel Captiva Road. The Dietleins are currently renting a home on the Island where baby leopards, raccoons, and "intervaled tortoises"--Gopher Tortoises which were removed from the building site of Captran's Sanibel Beach Club II and who will be returned there when construction is completed--reside with the enthusiastic couple. They are in the process of constructing a home on the Gulf of Mexico which is scheduled to be completed soon and has already been fitted out with some temporary tortoise burrews.

Don Dietlein is in the process of drawing up plans for natural permanent habitat for the Gopher Tortoises to be located on the beach ridge of Sanibel Beach Club II.

His activities enhance Nora's new appointment as national Co-Director of the Gopher Tortoises under endangered species protection. She initially introduced this legislation before the City of Sanibel where removing Gopher Tortoises from their natural habitat is punishable by a \$500 fine or 60 days in jail.

Before moving to Sanibel, Don's expertise was associated with Lion Country Safari, Inc., Kings Island Zoo, and the Kings Dominion Zoo, all properties of the Taft Broadcasting Company of Cincinnatti. His respon-

Councilman Duane White said that two kitchens might be needed in a single-family unit, but the most im-

Atrium strives to avoid inconvenience

In an attempt to inconvenience the residents of the Atrium complex as little as possible, Surety Construction Vice-President Dave Kelly asked the city council Tuesday whether or not they could "push" the part of the pool that is seaward of the coastal construction setback line into the remainder of the pool and revegetate the area, rather than removing the whole pool. The City and the developers agreed on a \$62,500 settlement after it was discovered that part of the pool and the building were 24 feet seaward of the coastal setback line.

The matter was referred to the City Building Department because Council members felt that the subject was too technical for them to consider. An agreement is expected to come before City Council on August 29.

Manchester negotiates on Causeway Properties

In a 2-1 vote last Tuesday, the City Council decided to put the issue of spending \$1.75 million to acquire the Causeway properities tract, now under ntigation. Funds to purchase the tract would have to be available through a general referendum bond issue, now scheduled for November.

Sanibel realtor and Planning Commissioner Don Manchaster was the city liason in negotiating the final price with the Causeway Properities owners.

"I believe it is a fair price," stated Manchester. "They started at \$4 million and we started at \$1 million. There is over 900 feet fronting on the water and a major hotel chain is interested in acquiring that land."

Councilman Francis Bailey, who eventually cast the dissenting vote, said, "I still wonder if we need it. It smacks of giving into a lawsuit."

Councilman White disagreed. "I am convinced there is no more valuable piece of property on the Island. It is our front door, the first impression of Sanibel," he said. "I would choose this

the mark of

property over the Steamboat (Brown) property, if necessary," he added.

Mayor Zee Butler agreed with White. "I agree that this property sets the tone for the City and there are sensitive areas along the Bay I would hate to see developed," she said. Among the possible uses she cited for the property, included a holding area for mass transit or a possible city hall.

According to Manchester, if the voters approve the referendum, it will represent one-half mill tax over the next 40 years.

Councilman White moved that the Council adopt the recommendation of Manchester's ad hoc committee to purchase the property with the sales contract contingent upon the favorable outcome of a referendum vote. Mayor Zee Butler seconded the motion, after Francis Bailey refused to do so. Councilmen Charles LeBuff and Porter Goss were absent.

Children's Center Violates Permit

At last week's city council meeting, Sanibel resident George Campbell told the City Council that the Center had gone ahead and built a foundation on their new site for the cottages they moved from Casa Ybel when all the City had issued them was a myoing permit.

The Center had posted a \$2500 bond to assure the City that, if the Planning Commission does not approve their development permit, the Center will move their cottages within 30 days.

"The Children's Center put in 28 pilings and cleared the site," complained Campbell. Sanibel Mayor Zee Butler agreed that they were likely in violation of their moving permit and requested city manager Bill Nungester to look into the matter.

Campbell also voiced his disapproval of the actions because he felt that the Care and Rehabilitation of Wildlife (C.R.O.W.) had not been able to move their buildings because they had tried to follow the rules and had lost their chance because Mariner Properities Construction schedule dictated that the cottages be moved last week. (Mariner was not charging for the buildings, it

was simply up to the owner to move them). City Manager Bill Nungester disagreed. "I am not satisfied that C.R.O.W. can locate their buildings on the Island Water Association site because, according to the City's building department, there is a question about the permeable surface requirement in the land use plan, as well as one of number of dwelling units," he said. He added that the City is investigating the matter further.

Bowen Reports to Council

City Attorney Neal Bowen, in his regular report at the City Council meeting last week, said that he had heard no word from the State Supreme Court in the Causeway Bond Revalidation issue.

"All the briefs are in," said Bowen, "but, to date, the Court has not advised us that they are ready for oral arguments."

Last year, this same coach kept a couple of young hotheads on his team well under control, and when one of them got carried away, this same coach removed him from the game, and eventually from the team.

True, the coach apologized later (but that behavior is much different than we saw last year.)

A couple of isolated incidents? No, we don't think so. We think that what started as good fun has changed into another animal entirely, leaving a trail of sprains, strains and injured feelings in its wake.

A member of the West Wind team, well known for his competetive feeling, confided to us that even he was disappointed in what was happening. Dick Noon laid the blame on the change with the rivalry between his team and Nave Plumbing. Much as he is to be commended for his candor, we don't think that two teams can dictate the mood for everyone.

Last year, when this spirit was beginning to surface, an older (but not much) member of the Lion's Club suggested the possibility of two leagues. Last week, Noon, pointing to the Captran-IWA upset doesn't agree that it would work. In an "A" and "B" league situation, those two teams would never have met and that would have been a shame. Caretta ends Patrols

Caretta Research jeeps no longer patrol Sanibel's Gulf beaches during nighttime hours for nesting female loggerhead turtles, but the last clutch of eggs taken from a beach nest is not due to hatch until the twelfth of August.

"They're usually about nine or ten days late in hatching when we've taken them out of the beach soil", reported Charles LeBuff, the head of Caretta Research. Le Buff was disappointed earlier this summer when the artificial nests on the beach in front of Sanibel Beach Club failed to yield but a few little loggerheads. LeBuff opened some of the nests and found some unfertilized eggs, and dead embryos. The deaths were attributed to a cooling of the egg because of flooded sand in the nest areas. Le Buff explained that a female loggerhead will normally seek a

stretch of beach with a high ridge or elevated dune profile, an instinctive measure designed to protect the eggs from the consequences of flooding. The beach area in front of Sanibel Beach Club is not the best place for the artificial nests to be set up, according to Le Buff, and Caretta Research may move the nest site closer to the Lighthouse beach area next year to avoid the flooding problem.

Last year, during the many Labor Day rains, several nests were also destroyed by flooding, and LeBuff attempted to remedy the situation, this year by placing the eggs in buckets, which would alow the water to drain from around the eggs, but apparently, the coarse sand and low beach profile

Jogging:

prone to some health problems that they didn't know they had before they started running; weak ankles, for instance, and sprains and strains are often the result of energetic running. Joggers need to stretch and limber up before they start running, and drink plenty of liquids, too.

Really, we feel that what joggers need to do is ... stop running!

If you can burn 100 calories by running a mile, statiticians figure combine in this area to hold moisture and thus fatally cool the eggs.

"We never had this problem when we had the hatchery by the Lighthouse," LeBuff commented. Caretta maintained artificial nests at the Lighthouse Beach for about five years. But the drainage is just so poor there (Sanibel Beach Club). We may be moving it closer to the Lighthouse next year... maybe to Sanibel Beach Club II.


Some loggerhead hatchlings were recently rescued from being used as fishing bait at the fishing pier, where they had been found by some misinformed fisherman. They were housed by Islander Mike Lubich for a while, and were released last week in Gulf waters.






King's Crown 'Saws Off' Violation

Public Works Director Gary Price expected to receive a survey report from the Latham Corporation,

developers of the 21 unit addition to King's Crown Condominium complex, on Tuesday of last week. As of Friday,

the 18 of August, Price reported to the ISLANDER that he still had not received the survey.

King's Crown was one of several construction projects on the Island asked to run foundation surveys in an effort to avoid another violation of the Coastal Construction Setback Line, such as recently occured with the West Gulf Drive Atrium Complex. The 24 foot setback error at the Atrium was the result of an engineering error. King's Crown is also on West Gulf drive, not far from the Atrium, and a similar surveying error had placed a corner of the unfinished three story complex seaward of the setback line.

When the City asked the Latham Corporation for a survey to investigate two corners of the project which were in possible violation of the setback restrictions, officials of that company complied with a survey for only one of those corner, which showed the corner to be aboaut one and a half inches behind the line, according to Price. Price followed through with a request for a survey on the other corner. That request has yet to be complied with, but the Latham Corporation apparently justified the mistake on the second corner before notifying Price or the City.


The error was remedied early last week with an airhammer. A two inch corner of the building has been "sawed" off.

Price indicated that he assumes the Latham Corporation will furnish the City with the requested survey, showing the corrected corner of the building.

"I asked for it by last Tuesday," Price said Friday. "I haven't gotten it yet!"

The Latham Corporation was also quick to comply with a stop-work order handed down by the Building Department because of construction debris seaward of the Coastal Construction Setback Line and further violation of the line by construction vehicles.

The stop work order was lifted on Monday, the 14 of August, after a fence was erected and construction scraps cleaned up.




Children's Center Pre-Registration







refuge report

Last week the refuge's Youth Conservation Corps (YCC) people all went for a combination work and environmental education trip to Egmont Key Refuge in Tampa Bay. Environmental Awareness Coordinator Mike Lubich taught them a bit about the ecology of the island which has some of the best gopher tortoise habitat in the state.

The enrollees had the opportunity to help change the island's ecology by eliminating several hundred Australian pines. Larger trees were notched or girdled and treated with 2, 4-D. Smaller trees were cut or pulled. Eventually we hope to eliminate all Australian pines and Brazilian peppers from this 250-acre refuge.

While at Egmont the enrollees also picked up a great deal of litter and had a chance to explore the remnants of the old army fort abandoned in the early 1900's.

Todd Loggen, a graduate in Wildlife management working under the Young Adult Conservation Corps program for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife branch of research is inventorying gopher tortoises and their habitaton refuge areas including "Ding" Darling and Egmont Key Refuges. He has nearly completed his den counts on the ridge area between Tarpon Bay Road and the entrance to the wildlife drive. About onehalf of the more than 40 dens he has located are active.


A planning team will be coming to the refuge towards the end of this month for the purpose of developing a public use plan for the refuge. A portion of the planning effort will be utilized in determining whether or not a bike trail would be compatable with the primary purpose of the refuge.

Loggerhead are beginning to hatch out and beach users observing the tiny turtles along the shoreline should leave them alone. They have a lot of things going against them already and do not need the added stresses of being handled or otherwise disturbed. Last week some baby turtles were about to be impaled on fish hooks as bait before some other fishermen intervened.

Loggerheads are now listed as

"threatened" under the Endangered Species Act of 1973 and anyone taking or molesting them is subject to federal prosecution.

Four Environmental Assistance Awards were given out the past week to Rene, Tracey, and Bill Carter and Ellen Walton of Miami. These are certificates that the refuge issues to persons willing to check in at the office, pick up a litter bag, go out on the beach or refuge, fill it up with litter and bring it back again.

You know it's hot when everyone fishing on the boat is standing in the cooler and telling stories about skiing at Vail. Talk about being hot out there, the snook are wearing panama hats and the redfish are gathering under unbrellas.

It's that time of the year when you have to come up with some good ideas to keep the sun off, while fishing or shelling. So this week we are going to offer some prize winning sun-dodging methods that have proven effective under certain limited conditions.

The hat is the most important piece of wearing apparel, unless of course you have extremely bushy eyebrows. Having eyebrows is an asset because correctly cultivated eyebrows, teased out two or three inches gives very adequate shade to the eyes. Few people know of this, but it's true and some of the best fishing guides, exposed to sun all the time, have eyebrows three inches thick. Deep eyebrows also serve as a good resting place for the bill of your hat.

For that matter, body hair comes in



very importantly in several places. This is a subject rarely touched upon, because of the inherent delicacy of the issue, but a thick mustache is highly important for covering the lower lip. This has been long known, of course, but the problem here was getting women fisherpersons to grow one. It seems that every time Dolly Parton comes on television they end up saying, "The hell with the mustache, I want to wike a woman..." and there goes the 'stache.Obviously, the lower lip has to be better protected with people who talk too much. In light of this observation, a man or woman should seriously consider growing a mustache if they are out in the sun for long times.

Sun lotions are an excellent way to avoid the burning rays of the sun, but did you know mayonnaise spread over your body tends to serve two very important purposes. The first is that you will take on a yellow-white appearance which reflects the sun. The other is that if you meet a person dressed as a ham sandwich, you could get together and who knows what could

happen!

The nose is very delicate and easily exposed to sunburn, but fortunately there is now relief for those with big beaks. There I referred to "beaks" as a commonly used word for nose, and there is a new sun protection product called, PIKE'S BEAK. It was developed by Marvin "The Nose" Pike. It is based something like those little plastic nose coverings you attach to the bridge of your sun glasses. There was one major drawback to these in that they give you the appearance of being a sunburned pelican and old men and little boys would come by as you strolled the beach and throw fish to you. That's aggravating, but as I said PIKE'S BEAK eliminates all that and saves your nose too.

PIKE's BEAK is something like stereo ear phones, only they fit over your nose. Pike allows you to not only

In a day and time when you just can't depend on anything anymore, or so it seems (like truck stops serving good food), let it be noted that a gathering of the gulls above our blue waters does not indicate that a meeting has been called to see what can be done about the heron, nor does it mean a crisis is near and they are in flight training, or that they are having fun in the sun. It simply means they are fishing and you can still bet that bottom dollar they are having good luck doing so. Take a few minutes out to watch them soaring, gliding and then dipping. Pay particular attention to just where all this is taking place cuz if its fish for dinner you have on your mind then be assured that the gulls will point the way to a "hot spot."

With succulant eating in mind -Webster defines redfish as a marine scorpaenid food fish that is usually bright rose-red when mature - my description would be more like delicious. This week Captain Cole who has been bringing them in from the Sanctuary would probably say they are coming to the bait (live shrimp). At the present time you may find them at high shade your beak, but there is a tiny radio built into this device and it emits any smell you want so you don't have to smell the mayonnaise on the rest of your body. With this option you have the opportunity to get mountain air into your nose, while listening to the local Top 40 radio station -- and save your nose from the sun. I talked with Pike by telephone the other day and he's already at work on a new product which should prove highly effective to men who sunbathe in the nude. More about that later.

Of course the old reliable method of keeping the sun off is to only go out in the night. This tends to make you crave blood and you become unexplicably afraid of oak stakes, but that's another story.

Feel free to use any of the methods outlined here and seriously, take care of that skin while in the sun.



Mr. Jack Cravelle is not playing it quite so hard to get and is traveling about with what seems to be the whole family. Old faithful trout is playing the gad a bout and has been seen "Just everywhere." So it goes in our ever changing fish population around the islands.

As you cast out and take in the essence of the good life glance about and when you see the gamey gull, think not only - what a picture - but also wonder what he's catching - good fishing.

Cconversion table: The above tides are for the lighthouse point of Sanibel only. To convert for Redfish Pass (north tip of Captiva), add 55 minutes to the time shown for every hi-tide, subtract two (2) minutes for every low tide. (NO, we don't know why, but it works. Instructions following are even less sense-sical but as we stated, they do work.)

For Captiva Island, Gulf side, subtract 30 minutes from each high tide, and subtract 1 hour and 16 minutes for each low tide.

For Captiva Island, Pine Island Sound (Bay) side, add 1 hour and four (4) minutes for each high tide, and add 52 minutes for each low tide.

In between these points on gulf or bay — guesstimate — and have good fishing, and or shelling.

Operations Report presented at the Governing Board meeting Friday.

This abnormal precipitation has affected Lake Okeechobee, the main backup water supply for much of South Florida's population, the three Everglades Conservation Areas, and Everglades National Park.

John R. Maloy, Executive Director of the SFWMD said the abnormal rainfall could create a problem on one hand, and a solution on the other hand.

The solution is the possibility of obtaining the long-sought 17.5 foot water level in Lake Okeechobee. "This is the first time the dike encompassing the Lake has made higher water retention possible to provide our 16 counties a generous backup water source," Maloy said.

On the other hand, he continued, Conservation Area 3 could have a problem from the higher water by causing stress to wildlife who make the Everglades their home. District staff reported that gauges which indicate optimum water levels for deer show that herds may be experiencing problems in the very near future.

A similar situation exists in Everglades National Park where it is reported that alligators have built nests in low areas throughout the recent dry years and current high water is threatening those nests.

Maloy said the District has been trying to reduce flows to the Park by discharging water from the Conservation Areas to the coast, but that the limited capacity of the canals has made the effect minimal.

"We want people to realize that it is only August, and we still have a lot of rainy season to go," Maloy said. "We are dealing with that unpredictable Mother Nature again, and this year she is giving us a lot of water. It has been about seven years since we've had a really good rainy season like this, so many peoplemaynot have experienced water standing like they have or will this year.



New students need certificate of immunization

All students entering a Lee County K through 12. School for the first time from out of county or out of state must present a Certificate of Immunization or Certificate of Exemption to the school before they will be admitted to class. This is in accordance with Florida

Statute 232.032 and applies to all grades

Certificates and Exemptions may be obtained from the office of a private physician, or the Lee County Health Department, 3920 Michigan Avenue, Fort Myers.

Each grade will have its own teacher this year and the staff has now been selected, according to school principal Charles O. Wainright.

Mrs. Mary Rhodes is returning as the Kindergarten teacher, Mrs. Lutz will teach first grade, and Mrs. Sharp will be conducting grade two. Mrs. Winans will be responsible for Grade three, Miss Kiesel for Grade four and Mrs. O'Neil will again teach Grade five. Mrs. Wainright will be returning as the librarian.

"We all worked well as a team last year," Wainright said. "and I hope for bigger and better things this year."

Changes in the school program include a larger number of students in the gifted classes and the addition of a video tape recorder. Plans are to have students put on their own productions including writing, producing, directing and filming.

Non-residents are reminded that there is a \$50 tuition fee. For those moving permanently to the state, a declaration of domicile can be obtained from the Clerk of the Court.

New students can register any day from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. at the school on Sanibel-Captiva Road and parents are urged to do so before school starts Monday. A new student is defined as someone who was not in attendance at Sanibel Elementary School at the close of the last school year.

Cafetorium scheduled for completion

The latest addition to the Sanibel Elementary School, a 40' x 60' cafetorium, is scheduled for completion shortly after the start of the school year. The new facility will provide the school with a much-needed lunchroom and general auditorium, according to Sanibel Elementary School Principal Charles O. Wainright.

The room will hold 220 fold-up chairs and 24 fold-up tables. It can be divided into two separate rooms, one twice as large as the other. Each of the two areas will be air conditioned. A public address system is also scheduled to be installed. Walls of cabinets have been ordered to provide needed storage and display space.

A National Immunization Initiative has been established by President Carter and is being conducted by Secretary Califano of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. The problem, as they have stated it. is that of the fifty-two million children 14 years old or younger, approximately twenty million have not been adequately immunized against childhood diseases including polio, measles, rubella, diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus and mumps:

The incidence of measles has increased steadily since 1973. As of September 10, 1977, there had been anincrease of fifty-five percent in the number of cases of measles reported over 1976.

One of the objectives of the National Immunization Initiative is to raise immunization levels for children under age 15 to above ninety percent by October 1979.





There were miles to go back thru narrow roads for we had got "losted" on the way out and ended up at the Anglers Arms Hotel just in time for supper which included black currant pie. Bars are the best places to eat in Britain we found out and besides they are the only spots to get anything to eat between the hours of four and seven, "high tea being at four and dinner at seven!"

Breakfast is always at 8 a.m. however. Before going into the dining room I walked up Victoria Lord's knoll to listen to the doves cooing. As we ate the usual stewed tomatoes, egg and toast we chatted with the other guests who talked about old English songs. I learned about Barbara Allen and Uncle Tom Bagley and also that the British are acquainted with our Uncle Tom's Cabin. Nevertheless, a lady at the Information Booth on our way to Coventry had no idea where Lady Godiva was and we were only 26 miles from where she stands in bronze in the middle of this interesting town of the ninth century. (Our Sea Shell Shop Pauline Tuttle is from Coventry.) Lady Godiva rode side saddle with her long golden hair coming down over her tum-tum. She was so loved by the people of Coventry everyone put out the light and pulled down the shades when she galloped thru Coventry in her birthday suit to reduce the high taxes.

But one rascal, couldn't resist the temptation to peep at the Countess and legend says before he could satisfy his gaze, he was struck blind. You guessed it, his name was Tom. I borrowed a pencil to copy Tennyson's words about beautiful Lady Godiva:

On the East Side of the pedastal: "She rode forth clothed on with chastity, the deep air listen'd round her as she rode, and all the low wind hardly breathed for fear."

I had to chase the wee boy whose father I borrowed the pencil from, because he ran to the side with it. I grabbed the pencil and wrote:

Tennyson's 2nd verse:

"When she rode back clothed on with chastity, she took the tax away, and built herself an everlasting name."

One very happy thing about Britain is that no place is very far away. In no time at all we drove to Deddington to stay at a delightful farmhouse right alongside of the town with two of the nicest people I have ever had the good fortune to know, Audrey and Brian Fuller. The house was two hundred and fifty years old with stone floors, and Audrey served mushrooms for bre ' fast. Two children were feeding chickens in the barnyard. "Let this little girl help too'' said Brian and I had the grandest time for I love to hear the "gluck gluck" and the long sign a mother hen makes.

Have you ever tasted a Banbury cake? Every bakery in Banbury, (Oxon) has trays of them in the windows and they are sold in specialty shops and souvenir places, for of course they are a souvenir of the bursery rhyme:

"Ride a cock horse to Banbury Cross to see a fine lady upon a white horse"

Rings on her fingers and bells on her toes, she shall have music wherever she goes."

Banbury cakes are out-of-this-worldgood. (I must look up the recipe in "The Joy of Cooking" which Irma Rombauer, its author, autographed for me when we were on a program with Mary Margaret McBride - NBC). We ate our delicous Banbury cakes as we studied the Banbury Cross which stands in the middle of this quaint old English town of long ago. And descendants of the "fine lady," the Finnes family still live in Broughton Castle nearby.

Ever since Gertrude Ederle made her historic swim, the first woman to make it, I've wanted to see the spot at the English Channel where she did. So we drove to Dover and the famous white cliffs which served as symbols of homecoming troops, which inspired Alice Duer Miller to write: "I have loved England dearly and deeply since that first morning, shining and pure, the white cliffs of Dover, I saw rising steeply out of the sea that once made her secure!"

We had to walk thru a carnival to get to the beach and to my great dismay, I found that Merry-Go-Rounds" do not play their jolly boom-fah boom-fah music any more but some wretched modern stuff and there were no bras rings to catch either. I spied a huge bush of yellow flowers in the yard of a deserted house. As I reached to pick some a buzzer sounded scaring me out of my wits for I thought it meant a Bobby would grab me. But it just happened somebody wanted to cross the road and that was the cross signal. We stood on a high place looking over to Calais. France. That very morning three kids had made the swim four miles out before some one discovered them treading water and hauled them back. Poor Gertrude Ederle....she got a hero's homecoming - I was on the curb and watched her ride up Boardway in a ticker tape parade but the famous swim across the English Channel made her stone deaf. Of the name of this beach where we watched the ferries back and forth from Calais was called "Shakespeare Beach" and no one at our posh Dover Hotel at the White Cliffs knew why.








Then there is Gerald Rafsoon, a Madison Avenue advertising executive and self-styled image-maker who met some important people along the political campaign trail and ended up with a White House job. He receives \$56,000 annually for attempting to improve the president's popularity rating.

His first and only publicized advice



so far has been a suggestion that the president should not smile so frequently during public appearances. The president was told he could smile all he wants in private, but not in public because there are not enough funny things happening in the world.

Also, it was pointed out that the president's smile was unnecessary in Washington amid all the laughter over so-called Jimmy jokes, the latest being that the president is doing the work of two men - Laurel and Hardy.

Then there is the new White House slogan that became popular after the departure of the president's drug advisor, Dr. Peter Bourne - "Things go Better with Coke."

Of course, these jokes are created by envious outsiders who don't know the right people on the inside. Still, knowing the right people can cause a temporary derailment on the road to success.

Take Midge Costanza who got to know the president's inner circle and apparantly didn't fit. Her audacious, outspoken manner conflicted with the quiet drawl of the president's Southern Circle and cost her an office on the VIP wing and cancellation of a long-awaited national TV appearance. Frustrated, she resigned. But this is only a temporary setback. Now she can become rich by writing books, giving lectures and being paid for TV appearances, all

because of the people she knows.

Then there is Robert Griffin, a 35 year veteran of General Services Administration and close friend and confidante of House Speaker Tip O'Neill.


Griffin was fired suddenly by President Carter after O'Neill was told by the White House that the firing would never happen. O'Neill was angered to the point that he threatened to break all relations with the president and his people.

An upset and worried president immediately found a new job for Mr, Griffin as a \$50,000 per year White House assistant to Robert Strauss who said he didn't need an assistant.

Knowing the right people is the key to success in almost every way of life. Where would Rodgers be without Hammerstein, Laurel without Hardy, Jerry Lewis without Dean Martin, Walt Disney without Mickey Mouse. And where would Bruno and Minnie be without Mickey. The axiom even worked in Watergate. Would all of those involved in the scandal have served such short prison terms and become rich authorities if they had not known President Nixon and each other. Sometimes, you don't have to be important or powerful to effect someone's career. Just think: Where would President Nixon be today if he had been a personal friend of the Watergate night watchman?
