

committee sets April 23 as housing questionnaire deadline

A deadline of Monday, April 23, was set by the City's Moderate Cost Housing Committee for the completion and return of the questionnaires distributed on Sanibel two weeks ago. (Forms may be obtained at the Library, post office or Bank of the Islands and should be returned to the Council Office in City Hall.) The Committee will review the data in the questionnaire at its next meeting, Friday, April 27, at 10 a.m. at MacKenzie Hall.

According to Dr. Louise Johnson who coordinated the questionnaire process, the data is being compiled by Drs. Enid Bever and Frances Faldey who have both been statasticians. She also stressed to the committee at Friday's meeting, after receiving accolades for the work done on the questionnaire, that she had much help. Dr. Johnson cited Charlotte Hamlet, Sue Johnson, Mary Lou Husler, Bobbie Dahlman, Ellinor Anspacher, Hilda Rush, Claire Smith, Jeanette Clegg, Dr. Eleanor Goldbloom, Mary Johnston and Arthur

Johnson. Dr. Johnson also pointed out that not all her helpers favored moderate cost housing but were still volunteering to help out the city.

Both Zee Butler and Francis Bailey said they had been approached by many Islanders who are adamantly opposed to moderate cost housing and the committee decided that a public meeting would be held in May that would be carefully structured and would address the issue of moderate cost housing in relation to community goals.

"People who are running around screaming and yelling about moderate cost housing who are against it just don't know the facts," Committee member Dick Workman stated. "They don't know that the City is mandated to do it. It isn't legal to handpick your neighbor anymore," he stated. Workman suggested that the legal situation be presented at the outset of the meeting. By setting the meeting date for sometime in May, Zee Butler felt it would give anyone who would not be on the Islands at that time enough time to

present their views to the committee in written form.

Workman, who is in charge of developing a committee to establish guidelines for moderate cost housing eligibility initiated the suggestion for a meeting to determine community goals. "Once we can establish community goals, it will be easier for all of us to work on our assigned tasks," he pointed out. Zee Butler agreed. "We'll have the questionnaire results then," she said, "and then we can investigate what they (possible moderate cost housing candidates) can expect and what we can provide. Some of the possible criteria for eligibility include where on Sanibel a candidate works, for how many months a year, what the gross family income is, and length of residence on the Island.

Fenton reviewed his approach to the "where" of the moderate cost housing question. "I believe it should be spread out all over the Island," Fenton said. It won't have as much impact on our resources and it won't create the stigma of living in a project." He has

suggested investigating possible conversion in restricted commercial by allowing a restricted commercial development some leeway on the impermeability of the land use plan to provide an extra parking space for a residential unit. Another area that Fenton wants to explore is the possibility of housing in commercial zones, which isn't now permitted. "That has the advantage of both security for the commercial property and 24-hour usage of the land," Fenton said. Another area Fenton wants to explore is residential existing and new subdivisions to see if it is possible to increase their density minimally for one or two units of moderate cost housing. Modular or pre-fabricated housing is another area Fenton wants a committee to explore. Fenton said that modular or pre-fabricated construction is one way to keep construction costs

At the next meeting, the committee will review the questionnaire results and consider plans for the public meeting.

C.R.O.W. meets Thursday to decide future

A notice has been sent to the 22 members of the Care Rehabilitation of Wildlife (C.R.O.W.) board announcing a meeting this Thursday morning to decide if the group should continue operations as they have in the past or terminate them, giving C.R.O.W. a "decent burial.

Although C.R.O.W. has raised almost \$30,000 in capital funds, C.R.O.W. president Adelaide Cherbonnier feels that spending money on operations would seriously hamper organization's ability to construct a

permanent facility if they can obtain the land.

According to the meeting notice, there is no evidence that a lease, gift or funds to purchase lands is forthcoming. C.R.O.W. did have a committment from the Island Water Association (IWA) to lease 14 acres but the offer was changed to a "footprint" lease offer when the IWA was advised by their attorney that the lease might hamper the IWA's ability to expand in the future. "But we have never had a formal response to the "footprint"

agreement," IWA general manager Ralph Zeiss said, adding that he had had the impression in earlier discussions with Ms. Cherbonnier that they were interested in the use of the land, not the lease of the land. Zeiss had said the IWA is willing to allow C.R.O.W. to use the land it needs for feeding ponds but they just do not wish it to be in a formal lease. Ms. Cherbonnier has indicated that she is wary of committing the funds necessary for the structures they need under the IWA's proposed arrangement.

A monthly expense sheet that ac-

companied the letter to the Board members points up an operating expenditure of approximately \$2,210, depending on how many patients there are, the nature of their injuries and the use of the van to transport them.

C.R.O.W. employs two full-time people and is currently housed on Ms. Cherbonnier's Captiva property, but that arrangement is short-term because there is not enough room for the number of patients C.R.O.W. usually has and there is no privacy in the employees' living quarters.

city to apply for matching funds for well plugging program

City Manager Bill Nungester will ask the City Council to approve an expenditure of funds at their meeting today to match a grant by South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) to plug old wells on Sanibel. Nungester estimates that the total cost, which is still indefinite, will run between \$10 and \$15 thousand. According to Bill Nungester, South Florida will assist in the inventory of wells on the Island together with the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation and the Island Water Association. "SF-WMD has an electric logger and they will send that equipment and personnel to Sanibel in addition to the financial aid," Nungester stated Friday. He added that he wished that any resident

who has a well on Sanibel would contact the city - even if they don't want it plugged. "We'll be able to check the condition of the wells' casings, the depth and whether or not there is any leakage," Nungester said. "We won't repair them, of course, but we will tell you what condition they are in."

If City Council gives its approval, and that seems to be likely, Nungester said they would try to be on the agenda of the District's Board meeting which will be held this Thursday and Fride in Fort Myers.

"It's a very big program with a lot of legwork involved," Nungester concluded, "but it is something we have wanted to do for a long time."



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county to discuss Sanibel bond issue

Lee County commissioners will discuss what to do with their disappointing victory concerning the \$18 million Sanibel Causeway bond issue at their meeting Wednesday.

"Selling the causeway (to Sanibel) may have some merit," Commissioner Wade Scaffe said, in light of the Supreme Court decision last week.

The court validated the bond issue that has been in litigation for several years but limited the use of the money so much that most of the commissioners are not sure they now want to proceed with the bond issue.

Scaffe said perhaps selling the causeway State Road 869 to U.S. 41. to Sanibel would be an alternate way of getting money to build roads. The money from the causeway toll. from the sale of the causeway would not have strings attached like the bond issue.

If there's no other way for the county to those projects outlined by the court, pernaps then the county should use the bond issue, Scaffe said.

"We need those (court outlined) projects," Steele said. "I wouldn't want to drop it months. (the bond issue)."

Sanibel Mayor Duane White said he was very pleased with the court's decision and hoped that county action on it would not be delayed. White also said that he hoped that the county would elevate McGregor Blvd. just before the Causeway. "The elevation there is only four feet," White said," and that is going to pose a major evacuation problem during a big storm or hurricane."

The court said if the county chooses to proceed with the bond issue, it must use the money to:



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

Dvorin sets record straight

Dear Editor:

In your April 10, 1979 article regarding the Interval Ownership Ordinance, you quoted Council Member Zee Butler as questioning my qualifications to comment on several legal issues.

To set the record straight, I received

a B.A. in Political Science from Rutgers University and a Juris Doctorate from the Boston University School of Law. I have been admitted to the Bar in Massachusetts, the District of Columbia and Florida. Before moving to Sanibel in 1976, I spent five years in Washington, D.C., serving as an Attorney-Advisor to the U.S. Price Commission, Cost of Living Council, Internal Revenue Service and Federal Energy Administration. During that period, my primary responsibilities were in the areas of economic legislation and regulatory matters. I have been engaged by Captran, Inc., for the past year as a consultant on

governmental affairs.

Without any predjudice to the Council or Council Member Butler's remarks, I am concerned that inadequate attention to constitution issues will result in unfair and unenforceable regulations. The City has already spent hundreds of thousands of taxpayer dollars to defend the Comprehensive Land Use Plan, and I fear cavalier treatment of legitimate constitutional questions may adversely affect the validity of the entire plan.

Thank you for the opportunity to clarify my position.

An ecumenical spirit prevailed at this historic event with the participation of area clergymen of other religious communities. In attendance and participating were Father Stephen E. MacNamara, pastor, Roman Catholic Church of the Resurrection,

Father Adelbert Buscher, OSB, priestmonk and Canonist of St. Meinard Archabbey, Ind., Father Thomas Madden, Episcopal priest, Sanibel, Rev. 


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council passes law regulating high impact units

Sanibel City Council unanimously passed a general amendment to the comprehensive land use plan last week to control high impact units on Sanibel. The ordinance defines high impact as those units of more than 600 square feet available for rent at periods of less than one month.

The ordinance, initiated last fall by Zee Butler, was the result of several months discussion.

The ordinance controls units that are in the general rental market as well as those sold by unit weeks and contains some provisions relating specifically to interval ownerhsip and - or time sharing units. It prohibits, for example, the conversion of a condominium to time sharing without the complete consent / of 100 percent of the owners and the

lien holders. The new law also mandates 7500 square feet of open space for each high impact unit.

The ordinance came under fire from community members but still passed unanimously. Mariner properties president Bob Taylor questioned Zee Butler on the data to support her contention that the people who use the "high impact" units create more of a drain on the Island's resources than others. "People renting for more than one month will not be of as much impact as those who rent for less than one month," Mrs. Butler expalined in answer to a question from Pricilla Murphy Realty president Stan Johnson. When asked how she knew that, the council woman replied "from observation."

Captran attorney Tom Liber disagreed with the Council's interpretaion of high impact use. citying a Captran interval ownership situation on Fort Myers Beach as an example. "We've decreased the number of people who use the unit by one-third, and increased its value 21/2 times," he stated. Taylor, too, questioned the council on their interpretation of the issues. "You're saying that changing a motel use to interval ownership is changing the intensity of use of the land," Taylor remonstrated. "That's not what I'm doing — I'm changing the ownership. A change in ownership is not a the site of interval ownership con-change in development. Porter dominiums. Goss, however, remained unshaken

in his contention that it was still a change in intensity of use. "All I'm saying," Goss stated, "is that if you convert to time-sharing you might be changing the intensity of use and then the Planning Commission should look at it."

Goss said after the meeting that the new ordinance does not affect those units already in a rental or interval ownerhsip program — only future development.

The final ordinance draft was also changed to allow rental programs on

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
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




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












Mosquito Control District Bill passes House committee

A bill authorizing the Lee County Mosquito Control District to spray within five miles of county boundaries and allows District employees the right of trespass on private and public property to eradicate mosquitoes upon the authorization of the Lee County Health Department passed the House Community Affairs Committee earlier this month. The bill also authorizes the District to use "any and all mechanical, physical, chemical or biological control measures" they deem necessary. If a property owner refuses to allow the District to eradicate a mosquito problem, the District will be allowed to enter into an agreement with the property owner whereby the owner is responsible for

eliminating the breeding grounds in a manner the District approves and at the owners expense. If the District does not feel that adequate measures have been taken, upon the authorization of the Lee County Health Department, they can inspect the property and take their own measures.

The


costs of the District's action becomes the landowner's responsibility and are to be considered as a lien against his property.

Reaction to the proposal has been mixed and Tallahassee legislative sources have indicated that there are doubts about the constitutionality of the proposed legislation. State Representative Frank Mann thinks that the bill's future is "uncertain" and admits that the "bill has some controversy." Paul Nuckoll's office pointed out that according to Mosquito Control Director Wayne Miller such extreme measures are only necessary in one percent of the cases and that the District has to declare the area a health problem.


The bill states, however, that the District only has to present information to the Director of the Lee County Health Department, "indicating a belief that a mosquito problem exists on said lands, which, if not eliminated, would adversely affect nearby properties or residents." The bill as it


is now written does not specify that the presence of mosquitoes has to constitute a "health" hazard, merely that there must be a mosquito problem.

Other changes that Miller requested were eliminated by the House Committee who specifically ruled that the election of members of the Board of Directors had to follow general election rules.









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on the water by mike fuery

The only deep water fishing most small boat owners can comfortably reach is in one of our passes between the islands, but unfortunately many people waste time working the wrong spots. This week, let's look at a couple of our passes where most action takes

Redfish Pass

This shallow pass, located between the Captiva Islands, just north of South Seas Plantation resort, is a relatively new pass. It was created in the '20s by a hurricane. It's not as deep as the other passes on the coast, but certain parts of it are excellent fishing posts.

One thing I've found, and this holds for most passes, is that the best fishing isn't in the middle, but around the edges and points of the passes. That's why Redfish Pass is very famous for snook fishing. Work the southern side of the pass, where the current has cut a path for deeper water. That's where you will find the snook in the summers. The middle of Redfish Pass is not deep at all and the outside of the pass changes all the time. Those outside, shifting sand bars often have schools of whiting and trout, in addition to small shark, catfish and pinfish.

It's quite often that I see a boater new to the area pull up in the middle of Redfish Pass, drop anchor (which is dangerous in any pass) and not catch a fish. Don't waste your fishing time in the middle of the passes unless you know that a certain type of fish, such as grouper are feeding there at the time.

Captiva Pass Captiva Pass is the quiet zone between Redfish and Boca Grande Passes.

It's not as exciting as Boca Grande during tarpon season, but this pass between Upper Captiva Island and Cayo Costa Island offers a good variety of catches. Again, you will find most of your action on the southern rim of the pass. This is where the deep water swirls and where you will find the largest grouper and tarpon in season.

The center of the pass offers small grouper and the inside of the northern rim used to be a top snook spot-but has been slim pickings recently. The outside of the passes-again fish near the sand bars on the deep side-offer trout, whiting and when they are running-bluefish.

There is a deep hole in Captiva Pass. I've talked with one diver who has gone part way into it. At the time, during a summer night dive, he said there were many, many snook lying there. The only trouble is you can't get a hook and line under the ledge. This doesn't mean you can't coax a grouper or snook out once in a while. Count on lots of break-offs in this pass.

Boca Grande Pass

This pass is world-famous for tarpon fishing. Only trouble is that it's getting to be that there are as many boaters as tarpon. A hooked, jumping tarpon will often foul a couple other lines from near-by boaters.

This pass also houses grouper and some formidable sharks too. This is bottom fishing and it helps to have a recording depth finder on your boat to pick out fish near the bottom from obstructions down there, also.

Again, the middle of the pass is usually unproductive, but the northern rim, this time, is where most of the action takes place. If you want to battle a grouper from out of the pilings at the phosphate docks, then fish close to the docks with cut mullet or live pinfish. There are snook up under those docks, but as with the grouper-they are difficult to get out once hooked. The fish saw off that leader and line on the barnacles as soon as they feel the hook.

Good fishing this week and remember to work the edges of the

Hey! All you redfish lovers out there! Your favorite finned friends are still in force at Wulfert Keys and all other places where there's mangrove and deep pockets of water.

Several 8-10 pounders were caught last week using, of course, live shrimp. The reds, like just about all the other fish you'll catch, thoroughly enjoy shrimp. In this respect fish are similar to humans - we all crave shrimp as well (but minus the hook).

Nothing like getting philosophical about fishing ...

Anyway, take it from me, the reds are all over the place.


A few snook are being taken in the creeks off Tarpon Bay, such as McIntyre Creek, and in Pine Island Sound off marker 18 on the Refuge side. What are the snook demanding? They're settling for shrimp but they also are delighted to have pin fish now and then. Pin fish happen to be plentiful in the bay, and that's what the snook are going after. Now you go after the snook.

Some 9-13 pound snook were brought in last week by people who were actually fishing for reds in the deep holes near the mangroves and in the passes. You might have luck here.

Big cobias are being ripped off too. They're cruising the grass flats near the causeway and in the vicinity of the second power lines in the Sound. Sanibel Marina reports a 25 pounder, taken with shrimp (but they dig pin fish

Grouper and jewfish are still hanging around the causeway, and tarpon have been spotted at Captiva Pass and hovering above the grass flats in the sound - and with that we close this week's installment.

Good fishing! Good catching!



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

shelling tips by capt. mike fuery


One of the most misunderstood of all shells is the sea urchin. This little fella found in our waters takes the blame for more horror stories than any other of the so-called, "dangerous" shells.

If you shell along Sanibel and Captiva Island beaches enough you will come upon the remains of many, many sea urchins. They generally have long since died when they are washed up on the beach and it's also likely that they will have no spines on them. When the urchin comes up like this we call it a sultan's cap. The sultan's cap is used for shell decorations, but I've seen them with Christmas tree lights for seasonal decorations and it seems that creative people never find an end to new projects with the lowly sea urchin.

It's not unusual to find several hundred sea urchins come up on the beaches during a bad storm off-shore. Right now, on a small portion of a beach on Upper Captiva Island there are perhaps a thousand remains of urchins which died a few weeks ago. If you can locate sea urchins and get good ones before the sea birds peck them apart, then you will have good shells to add to your collection.

Obviously, there are many live urchins on the bottom surrounding the islands. These are the ones that get too much bad publicity. The type we see are often up to four inches across and have short, greenish spines. You would have to go out of your way to get stuck by one of these harmless little urchins.

There are a few of the black, long




spined sea urchins in our waters. These could stick you, should you walk directly on one, but they are so rarely found that the worry over them is minimal when you are shelling. Those


black, round-bodied urchins make poor collector's shells because the spines seem to fall off as soon as the urchin is picked up and examined.


If you do get an urchin for your collection, and it's live, the way I usually suggest to my charter people to clean them is to take a knife and carefully remove the meat from the inside. If you are lucky, you won't loose too many spines, but then get a light, clear glue or similiar material to keep those spines on. It's a tough job to preserve an urchin with its spines in place. Most end up as sultan's caps, without the spines.


Good luck shelling this week and keep in mind the two live shells per species, per person rule when you are out there on the beach.

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live shelling committee to design brochure

In its monthly meeting last Wednesday, April 11, the Live Shelling Committee (LSC) determined the size and number of signs telling shellers of the two per species limit, to be posted on beaches and inside commercial establishments.

Following the resolution submitted by the LSC to the Sanibel City Council March 6, which met the council's approval, the signs will state: "Live Shelling Code: A Limit of Two Live Shells of Each Species Per Person, by Order of City Council Resolution."

Twelve metal signs to be paid for by the city, will be posted at all public beach accessess, and smaller cardboard placards will be affixed beneath the rate schedule on the doors of every motel room and other rental units on Sanibel. Larger poster size signs will be printed for use in shops.

Also discussed was a brochure of basic shelling facts that will be distributed at the Chamber of Commerce and all commercial establishments.

The purpose of the brochure is to educate visitors about molluskan life and breeding habits. The bulletin also briefly describes and defines the differences between gastropods and bivalves, and how a collector can distinguish a dead mollusk from a living one.

The draft was authored by Diane Walters who, although not a member of the board of the LSC, has done considerable research in molluskan life habits. She, along with LSC Chairman Pat Kair and life-long Sanibel resident

Esperanza Woodring, have conducted observations in and around the island's grass flats and beaches in efforts to determine molluskan breeding patterns and impinging environmental influences.

Pending further revision, the brochure will be submitted to the Sanibel City Council for final approval.

In other activity, Mrs. Kair announced that she had been considering resigning from her chairmanship. Citing the lack of time necessary for further in-depth field studies, Kair expressed her wish to devote more of her time to this area.


Board members Charles LeBuff and George Campbell suggested that the LSC need not meet every month since the most important measure, the "two-per limit," had been established. Consequently, the committee will meet every other month or when the need arises.

Following this decision, Kair responded that she will retain the chairmanship and called for a motion that the LSC become an advisory committee. Kair and others involved in molluskan research will submit data to the committee which in turn will direct the information to the City Council.

"There is nothing else to do," Mrs. Kair said, addressing the committee's accomplishments, and added, "Without a four-year study there is no reason to go any further ... we'll see what the impact is of the "two-per" resolution during the next few years."

The next meeting of the Live Shelling

Committee is June 13.





sunrise service draws crowd

The pallor of a grey dawn did not diminish the spirits Sunday of the nundreds of people who gathered for the traditional Easter Sunrise Service on the Causeway. The procession of headlights visible in the pre-dawn larkness on Periwinkle Way was eminiscent of earlier pilgrims' ourneys. Nor were they disappointed.

Susie Pickens, described by the guest peaker, Dr. David Robinson, Edison Community College president, as a 'gentle bulldozer,' coordinated the very difficult task of preparing for the service.

One of the crowd got a little more han he bargained for at the service. He had pitched a tent right in front of a 'No Camping' sign and went blissfully asleep with the gentle sound of bay waves in his ears, only to awaken with

the first organ crescendo, poke his head out to find that his solitary splendour was now shared by the hundreds of early risers who had gathered for the traditional event.

Last year's speaker, Bruce Larson, asked everyone present at that service to take with them a reminder of the day. Rev. John Wilcox opened his year's service by recounting what he had done with his token; his rusty bottle cap has sat in his office as a daily reminder of the energy and spirit of Easter Sunday.

Dr. Robinson's message centered around the importance of food as spiritual and physical nourishment.

"In America, we get together to eat or we eat to get together," Robinson said after reciting a verse from John in which Jesus Christ told John that, if John loved him, he should "feed my sheep."

"My church is the eatingest church in town," Robinson added lunches and progressed to breakfasts. Is it that we all like 17 different kinds of casseroles? "Robinson queried," or is it something more important." When referring to food as nourishment, he said that spiritual food is nourishment for the soul.

Today, said Robinson, "we'll be given a chance to feed someone" and told his audience that it was important to feed the sheep in one's own family, even if they do not desire the experience. He also warned of people who can feed others, but are themselves unable to accept nourishment.


The service closed with hosts serving fish crackers to the assembled crowds to symbolize the significance of the spirit of Easter.
