planners wrestle with contiguous lot issue

Sanibel's Planning Commission wrestled once again yesterday with the contiguous lot problem created by the adoption of the Island's Comprehensive Land Use Plan (CLUP).

City Planning Director Bruce Rogers and semi-retired realtor Don Modrall appeared before the Commission requesting interpretation of the residential density section of the plan it applies to two lots in the aways Estates subdivision.

two lots, currently owned by Goodrich Lowry, share a common lot line and are legally considered contiguous lots. That lot line, however, happens to lie at the center of Pine Tree Drive. Modrall, appearing on behalf of the Lowrys, requested the lots be considered two separate buildable parcels, one on either side of the road. The CLUP now states that contiguous lots be considered as one when determining density.

Commissioners Twink Underhill and Ray Fenton shared the opinion that the parcels should be considered two separate buildable lots since "it was impossible to build a house across two lots separated by a road." Commissioner Don Manchester, however, felt the land owner should apply for a Specific Amendment to the plan saying, "It is my understanding these have to be handled as individual cases."

Sanibel resident Paul Howe pointed out to Commissioners that the contiguous lot problem had come before them before and was destined to come before them again unless some form of regulation was adopted. Reprimanding the Commissioners for their lack of action on easement clarifications, Howe pointed out the necessity for "subdivision regulations." "If this were written properly, two lots wouldn't run to the middle of the road,"

commissioners meet with attorney in \$1 million lawsuit

Sanibel's Planning Commissioners met with attorney Tom Corbin yesterday to review the recent \$1 million lawsuit brought against the City and the individual Commissioners by Outer. Island Development, Inc., and Kenleen, Inc.

The developers have sued the City in federal court after being denied a Development Permit for a condominium project that they claim met the provisions of the land use plan. The Commission had denied the permit on grounds of "neighborhood and charter incompatability."

According to Corbin the plaintiffs filed suit under a federal civil rights statute "that has been around since the Civil War." The plaintiffs, said Corbin, could not have filed suit under Florida law because the "State Supreme Court will not consider itself with aesthetic decisions...and losing money is not considered sufficient grounds" for filing suit. Corbin also said there was little federal precedent in this type of case. He explained to the Commissioners that usually the Civil Rights statute is cited when a person has been beaten or denied food by civil servants during the course of "performing their duty."

Don Manchester questioned whether or not the plaintiffs had exhausted their legal remedies since the denial for their permit was amended to read that they could return with a new plan for

C.R.O.W. to get new lease on life

Last Thursday, the Care and Rehabilitation of Wildlife (C.R.O.W.) board heard a land proposal by Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation (SCCF) director Dick Workman that could assure CROW's future.

The SCCF is offering CROW 10.26 acres south of the American Legion building. Bordered on the east by Belle Mead and on the west by Gulf Pines subdivision, the area, Workman feels, is especially suitable for CROW's operations because it is "fairly remote from existing development."

Two acres, the northern most strip. is high ground, the rest of the land consists of many mosquito ditches and open water "that could lend itself to the kind of operation CROW would be engaged in," Workman said.

Any agreement between CROW and the SCCF as to the use of the land, Workman explained, is contingent upon the waiveing of building restrictions. The acreage was bought through the Nature Conservancy. whose deed prohibits construction.

Workman feels certain, however, that the restriction can be lifted, citing CROW operations as a compatible use.

"It does have a reversal clause but an exemption for specific use is not out of the question," he explained.

The SCCF executive committee will take further action in its meeting tomorrow, and the results will be heard at the CROW meeting Thursday.

For two years, during which time 800 patients have received aid, the CROW has been investigating offers, and the SCCF proposal, the fourth to date,

promises to fulfill CROW's needs.

One year ago the Island Water Association (IWA) offered the use of about 14 acres on San-Cap Road, but the proposal was later modified on the advice of IWA's attorney that the lease might hamper the IWA's ability to expand in the future.


Feeling the lease was too restrictive and that it did not provide for long-term use, CROW did not accept the offer. Although the SCCF proposal does include long term use, CROW has not ended negotiations with IWA.

Upon hearing of IWA's initial offer, CROW started a capital fund drive to meet construction and operating expenses. Of the aimed-for \$100,000, the wildlife group elicited donations of \$31,000 up until IWA altered its lease. The board of CROW agreed to reactivate the fund raising campaign, recognizing its uncertain status as a probable cause of inadequate public commitment.

Currently in the operating expense budget there is only enough money to meet CROW's needs for four weeks. In light of this the board agreed to release from capital funds an amount not to exceed \$5,000 to cover costs until the cut-off date. June 30 was established as the date by which time, if CROW is prevented from securing a lease, the organization will curtail operations.

Earlier, it was agreed that this sum, part of a larger donation, would be available for either capital outlay or as an operating expense resource.


New facilities in which to treat the sick and injured wildlife are necessary if CROW is to continue its work. The importance of finding suitable land on



which to relocate "is the key," CROW president Adelaide Cherbonnier said, 'that will place CROW in the position to get more funding."

CROW is presently located on Ms. Cherbonnier's property on Captiva.

Not only will an agreeable lease prevent the group's demise, but permanent facilities will enable CROW to conduct breeding programs and



is one of CROW's biggest exp Ms. Cherbonnier told the board that students of the College of the Atlantic in Maine have expressed interest in conducting animal studies and serving internships should permanent facilities be forthcoming.

county commissioners begin bond validation procedure

In a speedy hearing Wednesday morning, Lee County commissioners voted to implement last week's decision by the state Supreme Court mandating the circuit court to validate the \$18 million Sanibel Causeway bond issue.

On a motion from Commissioner Harry Rodda, County Administrator Lavon Wisher was directed to initiate a CPA audit required by the county's bonding firm and to extend the funds for a traffic engineer's report of the proposed improvements.

The county's special attorney for the bond issue, Jim Humphrey told the board that, as its attorney, he was pleased the high court had supported the commissioners' bond validation resolution with a unanimous decision, even though not all the county's proposed projects were approved.

"The court looked at whether or not the mainland projects were Causeway approach roads and," Humphrey added, "they also looked at the functions of the roads. Even though Cypress Lake, Gladiolus and San Carlos (all refused by the court) incidentally carry traffic to the Causeway, that isn't their primary function," Humphrey explained.

The court said if the county chooses to proceed with the bond issue, it must use the money to:

-- Widen McGregor Boulevard from the causeway toll booth to Miner's Corner at San Carlos Boulevard. -- Widen unbuilt State Road 869 from the planned

two lanes to four lanes from McGregor to San Carlos. - Construct a parking lot on Sanibel near the

causeway, and for road construction and improvement on the island.

The court said the county's other plans for the money were not valid. The county wanted to use the money to also widen McGregor Boulevard from San Carlos to College Parkway, widen Gladloius Drive from State Road 869 to U.S. 41, construct State Road 869 from San Carlos to Cypress Lake Drive and widen Cypress Lake from State Road 869 to U.S. 41.

The commissioners action does not preclude consideration of alternatives to financing county roads. Two ideas Humphrey mentioned for the board's consideration was the possibility of selling the Causeway (to Sanibel) or to utilize the "pay as you go" system.

"I'd like to point out what happens to the money once you sell the bonds," Humphrey said after suggesting an \$11 or \$12 million bond issue.


"Seventy-four percent of the bond proceeds, after all the costs of selling the bonds are paid, will be deposited in a mainland account. Twenty-six percent of the funds go into an account for Sanibel projects.

"If, after that, you have excess funds, they go into a revenue account," Humphrey explained. "If there is extra money after retiring bond indebtedness, that money goes into an account in which 40 percent can be used by Lee County for any lawful capital purpose. Another 40 percent goes to the bond deduction fund, 16 percent goes to Sanibel for capital projects for city and county purposes, and four percent goes to Captiva for county purposes."

Humphrey estimated that 40 percent of an 11 million bond would give the county about \$400,000 a year.

One member of the group who opposed the original bond validation, Hannah Davis was in the audience at Wednesday's hearing but did not make any comments to the board.

Interested citizens have ten days to apply for a rehearing but, Humphrey said later, there have been no indications that this will happen.







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city hears transit proposal

Sanibel's City Council heard a presentation last week by Douglas Correia of the Lee County Transportation Dept. and Thomas Broadbent of the Lee County Transit System on the island's potential for public transportation.

Broadbent told the Council his agency was currently in the process of conducting a county-wide study on the need for public transit in the area. Specific problems of the aged and handicapped, the energy crisis, and transportation problems of those in outlying county locales are all issues to be studied in the next six months, according to Broadbent.

Council members questioned the speakers on the liklihood of on-island bus service paid for by the county. Councilwoman Zee Butler told Broadbent, "We're still part of Lee County ... We still pay taxes ... I haven't seen us get our fair share of our tax dollars in services."

Broadbent pointed out that a countywide transportation system was his department's first priority. He said it was more feasible to consider a bus service from Fort Myers to the island than an island-only service at this time. Broadbent cited the current Ft. Myers Beach to Ft. Myers route as a similar situation. "I'm not sure I can justify a community bus out here," he said.

Sanibel resident Alice Kyllo objected to the possibility of a bus route from Fort Myers to Sanibel saying it would attract "undesirables" to the Island, "Just like Ft. Myers Beach." Paulette Burton of the Sanibel Taxpayers Association disagreed with Mrs. Kyllo and reminded the Council, "There are 13 miles of beaches and several public parks on this island that belong to all the people."

Sanibel resident Paul Howe asked the Council to consider several points. "The counterproductive loss of causeway tolls, the increase in daytrippers, the aggravation of dual taxation, the siphoning off of dollars from local merchants, and the fact that very few people had used an earlier bus service on the island."

Mrs. Burton told the Council that a petition was being circulated for once a week bus service from Sanibel to the Edison Mall. She suggested that a daily bus from Sanibel to the mainland could be a help to island workers and a weekend bus route from the mainland to the four public beaches could alleviate the need for inter-island service.

Councilman Porter Goss said the problem called for a joint solution between an island service and a route to the mainland. "You can't bring people out and dump them at the Chamber of Commerce," he said. "We need our own bus service here to cart them around."

Broadbent assured the Council that the island's needs would be considered in the planning study, as would the transportation element of the comprehensive land use plan. "The idea of a community concept might be successful," he said. "But we'd have to look into it further."

island fishing derby opens

Fishing Derby commenced yesterday at 12:01 a.m. and will continue until midnight, Sunday, July 1.

Rules for the Derby are as follows: There are no entry fees and no preregistration required. Four species of fish are eligible, the minimum acceptable weights of which are (per fish): spotted seatrout, two pounds; redfish, five pounds; snook, five pounds; and cobia, ten pounds. Each fish must be caught by hook and line in the neighboring waters of Sanibel and Captiva Islands. Weigh the fish at any of the official Derby weigh-in stations on the islands (South Seas Plantation. Twin Palms, 'Tween Waters, Blind Pass Marina, Tarpon Bay Marina, Sanibel Marina, The Bait Box, The Reel Eel); fill out the weigh-in form in duplicate; deliver or mail the original

The fourth annual Island Open verified form within seven days to the Sanibel-Captiva Chamber of Commerce, Causeway Road, Sanibel Island, FL, 33957.


Each entrant will receive a Certificate of Participation. Weekly winners will be declared in each category and their names entered for drawing of merchandise and gift certificates at the conclusion of the Derby.

A grand prize will be awarded to the angler under 16 years of age weighing in the heaviest fish of the Derby.

Certificates will recognize verified released fish.

Copies of rules are available at weigh stations and the Chamber of Commerce.

The Island Open Fishing Derby is sponsored by the Sanibel-Captiva Chamber of Commerce, the Southwest Anglers Club and the Island Reporter.



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
QUESTION: What is your opinion of the city ordinance limiting interval ownership and time-sharing?




Joan Martin: Sanibel -- "These buildings were built as private residences and not motels. I would favor regulating them."


Tom Harris; Sanibel -- "I'm against the ordinance because it encourages people to build more units instead of renting out what's already been built."




Vonnie Alekna; Stanford, Connecticut -"That's ridiculous!"


First Federal starts construction of new Sanibel branch

First Federal Savings & Loan Association of Fort Myers broke ground for its new Sanibel office on Monday, April 9, 1979. The Association's current office is located in the Island Shopping Center. When construction is completed, the Association will move to the new location. First Federal opened its Sanibel office in September of 1973. It was the first financial institution to serve the island with a permanent office.

The building, which carries a polynesian theme, embraces a total service area of 2800 feet and will be built on the corner of Palm Ridge Road and Florence Way. Two drive-in facilities will be provided.

Interior walls and ceilings in the public areas will be finished with natural cypress paneling in keeping with the island's environment. The exterior will feature stained cypress, tinted bronze glass and supporting columns of native Florida Coral stone. The building incorporates the requirements of the newly adopted energy conservation code.

Construction started almost immediately and completion is looked for in late Fall of this year. The estimated cost of the structure is placed at around \$200,000.

Lions Club withdraws permit application

A 10-month quest by the Sanibel-Captiva Lions Club for approval of a clubhouse facility ended last week, but a fund drive for a permanent location to house the Children's Center of the Islands began.

The Lions had originally requested a specific amendment to the land use plan allowing for the construction of a clubhouse on a five acre parcel (on Casa Ybel Road, north of the Southwinds subdivision.) Included in the Lions' plans was the relocation of the Childrens' Center from their current location on Bailey Road to the proposed clubhouse parcel. The non-profit preschool has been operating rent free in the old Bailey's store but must vacate the premises to make room for a proposed yacht club and marina.

The Lions request has been strongly opposed by many members of the community, particularly those residents of Southwinds who felt a clubhouse would impose a higher impact use than was intended for the residentially zoned parcel. The final hearing on the Lions' request was to be last Tuesday by City Council but on

April 5, the Lions Board of Directors withdrew their application while requesting they keep their place on the Council agenda.

Lions' secretary Fred Valtin appeared on behalf of the club before City Council last week to further explain the Lions' reasons for withdrawing their request and to urge community support for the Childrens' Center.

"... The Sanibel-Captiva Lions Club is desirous of continuing to make positive and lasting contributions to our community," said Valtin. "It is in this spirit that we have chosen to withdraw, without prejudice, our clubhouse request."

Valtin continued, "We would be less than candid however, if we did not say that we feel frustrated, saddened, and hurt by the events of the past 10 months. It seems eminently unfair that the members of our club - by far the largest voluntary service organization on the islands - many of whom have done considerable work for the benefit of the community for many years should be labeled and characterized in the manner that we have all witnessed."

Valtin then called upon the citizens of

the islands to support and work with the Children's Center to help raise the \$35,000 - \$40,000 needed to purchase the land and renovate two old cottages that have already been moved to the Casa Ybel site.

"It is time," said Valtin, "we all did something truly significant for the young people of the islands - and we call upon everyone - including and particularly those who opposed the Lions clubhouse but spoke in favor of locating the Children's Center on the site in question - to come forward and make this fund drive a truly community-wide undertaking." Valtin said the Lions intend to pledge \$2,000 as a club to the Center and will also call upon their 120 members for individual donations.

Noreen Twombly, president of the Center's board of directors, received over \$5,000 in donations from members of the audience. She told the Council that an account had been opened at the Bank of the Islands under the name "The Children's Center Relocation Fund." Donations to the Center are tax deductible and can be made at the bank.

Valtin also called upon the Council to


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adopt and publish a resolution of support for the Children's Center recognizing it "as a vital element in the development of our City." Mayor Duane White so moved saying, "You have shown your love for the island today .. and I'm proud to be a Lion." The motion passed unanimously.

William Webb, who along with his wife Helen, had led the protest against the proposed clubhouse, stood and told the Council, "We applaud the resolution just passed ... we are not the foe of the Lions Club, we are proponents of the land use plan."

photographs recorded

Sanibel City Manager Bill Nungester announced to City Council last week that photographs had been taken of all projects under construction on the Island. The photographic "proof" is necessary for the City to remain in compliance with the new federal flood regulations effective April 16. According to the new regulations all proposed development without a completed foundation in the ground by April 16 must meet new increased elevations determined by the agency.

Nungester reported that letters explaining the new regulations necessary for eligibility in the federal flood insurance program had been sent to candidates eligible for development permits under the rate of growth ordinance. All but one of those candidates had picked up a foundation permit and had a finished foundation in the ground before the regulation's effectiveness date.

fish & wildlife signs bike path agreement

City Manager Nungester has reported an agreement between the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Serivce and the City of Sanibel has been signed on the construction of a bike path down the north side of Sanibel-Captiva.

The proposed bike path has been the subject of controversy the last few weeks centering on the issue of encroachment by the path onto Ding Darling Wildlife Refuge property. Construction of the path was begun before March 1 in order for the City to maintain a \$50,000 grant awarded by the state for construction of the path.

connector road funds placed in escrow

The City of Sanibel has placed funds in escrow for the purchase of three lots in Los Conchas Del Mar. The \$50,000 investment will allow the City to build a road connecting Beach Road and Elinor Way. The road is part of a proposed Island east-west route which will serve as an alternate to Periwinkle and help relieve traffic congestion. After construction of the connecting road the City is expected to replat the parcel and sell two lots for \$20,000 each.

new flood regulations comply with standards

The City of Sanibel has received notice from the federal flood insurance agency that the new regulations recently adopted by the City are in compliance with federal requirements. The adoption of the new regulations was necessary for the City to maintain its eligibility in the federal insurance program. The new regulations went into effect April 16.

Holtzman has first hearing

City Council held a first hearing on a request by Dave Holtzman last week that would allow for the development of an additional 32 units at the Shell Harbor Inn at the intersection of Lindgren Blvd. and East Gulf Drive. The construction of 32 units would bring the Inn's total to 100. The Planning Commission has recommended that Council deny the applicant's request. A second hearing will be held June 5.

code enforcer

given ticket authority

Sanibel's City Council last week unanimously approved a City resolution giving powers of enforcement to Richard E. Baker, the City's new code and ordinance enforcer. The action gave Baker the authority to write citations and "notices to appear" to those persons found violating City legislation.

city approves contracts

The Sanibel City Council has approved two sales contracts for the purchase of the 28 acre Causeway property. A final closing date of September 1 has been set for the \$1.75 million City purchase.

appeal process clarified

The City Council last week passed unanimously an ordinance that amends a previous ordinance governing the appeal procedure against City decisions.

The ordinance clarifies the appeal procedure available to persons contesting a decision by the City Manager. The new procedure allows an applicant to file an appeal to the City Council within 10 days of a City Manager decision. The City Council will then make a ruling within 30 days after a grievance hearing date. The hearing date will be within 15 days after receipt of the grievance by Council.


The amended ordinance allows for an aggrieved party to submit his grievance to the City Manager who will then forward it to the City Council. The new ordinance by-passes the City Planning Commission in the grievance procedure.




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

Those die-hard snook fishermen are ready to pounce on their fishing gear and head for their favorite spots because snook season is about to start. In the next couple of weeks, we'll take a look at where and how most of the snook are taken on the islands.

As with any fishing, snook are caught by trout fishermen along the causeway, at the free fishing pier near the lighthouse on Sanibel in the middle of the day - and in the surf by the littlest fisherman. But, if you want dependable snook fishing - and all snook fishermen know that "dependable" is a very loose term -- then you better perfect your fishing at the passes and the saltwater canals.

There are snook all year around along Sanibel and Captiva Islands. You hear reports of snook being caught in the canals of Sanibel all the time. And you will get hot weather snook there, too.

think the two most important I elements in canal fishing are finding a "legal" place to fish and being persistent. As for the first point, if you have a small boat, you can fish any part of any canal you can float into. But if you must fish from the shore, you need to seek out good spots along the canals. This sounds simple enough, but many canals are lined with houses. These houses often have people who do not share your interest in snook fishing and take a dim view of you thumping a lure into the water behind their house at 5 a.m. So you need to find friends who will let you fish behind their place from time to time, or locate some open spaces where you can fish the canals. Canal snook seem to get along just fine with lures. This solves most of the problems of getting and keeping live bait. If you have ever fished snook, you know that they are one of the most picky eaters you will ever encounter. So everything must be perfect. The cast. The movement and the lure.

There are several standard canal lures which take snook. Three of the most consistent are the 52M11 Mirolure and the Rapala "Magnum" lure. The third is the "Ghost" bucktail. Often, Tourt Touts, the shrimp immitation, also do well for you in the canals. Of course, pinfish will make snook hit when no artificial lure will even get them curious, but again you get back to the problem of keeping pinfish alive. This is quite important and most fishermen let their captive pinfish mar themselves to a point where not a snook will look at them. But a large catfish might!

If you are working the canals, keep to the lures. Even the old stand-by lure, the spoon, will work just fine on occasion. The main thing is to keep the lure moving, erratically if possible, and keep the hooks sharp on that lure. Even a brand new lure needs to be sharpened so don't rely upon the factory doing this for you. Incidently, if you feel several snook "bumps" that is getting the lure hit but not actually hooking it -- then you most likely have poorly sharpened hooks.

The last factor in canal snook fishing is consistency and add in a generous helping of persistence. Keep at it. When you see several snook fishing people out at 5 a.m. and quitting at 7 a.m., you can take a hint that the fish are feeding at dawn. You have to get up and work hard for an hour or so and do it as often as you can.

You know that there is always someone from downtown Manhatten with a borrowed rod who will wander down to the canal -- lost, he was looking for the beach -- and cast out, hook a 20-

"Fishing's fantastic," says Mack Hamby of Tarpon Bay Marina, and other sources concur that things are really picking up.

It could be that the rain last Friday night made the fish hungrier than they usually are. They get nervous and try to solve their problems by eating, only to jump from the water into the boat (if fishing were that effortless it would be boring).

A few tarpon have been showing in the bay by the same name, along with trout and reds. Come May, the tarpon will be falling for your ploys, hook line and sinker, so get ready for some heavy-duty fights.

Jack Scott, a fishing guide at Twin Palms Marina on Captiva, said people have been catching a few trout in the two-three pound class. And it's been reported that shell and fishing guide Bob Sabatino landed four snook weighing in at 16 pounds each.

"Tween Waters also reports that snook are showing in the passes and scattered locations on the Gulf beaches. You might also want to check out the action at the Lighthouse pier, especially very late at night and early in the morning.

The grass flats in just about any location within Pine Island Sound have been yielding trout. Twenty were caught by Capt. Jerry Way's party, but "a dozen got away." The fish were three-five pounders.

Anglers were casting live shrimp on the north side of Wulfert Keys and the technique produced reds weighing eight to ten pounds, according to Carl Abner of Blind Pass Marina.



In between these points on gulf or bay guesstimate and have good fishing, and or shelling.



said Howe. He raised the possibility of a General Amendment to the Plan, saying, "It would clear up problems in the future." Commissioner Joe Searing agreed with Howe on the feasability of a General Amendment.

Commission chairman Ann Winterbotham agreed the contiguous lot problem was a recurring-one and said that she had questioned consulting city attorney Fred Bosselman on possible solutions when the problem had arisen earlier. At that time, according to Winterbotham, she was told "to wait, and the problem would be addressed later."

"The problem with contiguous lots," pointed out Winterbotham, "is a problem with density." Giving contiguous lots individual densities would raise the overall predicted future density of the Island.

Winterbotham then told the Commission she would like to have the City Council look at Modrall's request, saying, "I don't want the Planning Commission accused of playing with the Plan or changing the Plan."

Commissioner Ray Fenton disagreed, however, saying, "I think passing this on to City Council is shirking our responsibility...Being a Planning Commission implies that we know more about the Plan then the City Council does...It is our responsibility to make an interpretation of the intent of the Comprehensive Land Use Plan."

Fenton then moved that the two lots in common ownership on one side of the road be ruled one buildable lot and the contiguous parcel on the other side of the road be ruled a separate buildable lot. Underhill seconded the motion and it passed with only Manchester dissenting. Manchester said later that he was "very much in favor of the ruling," but that he thought the applicants should have gone through the Specific Amendment process.

In other Commission business: The Commission ruled that a taxicab dispatching office was considered a permitted use in commercial areas under the Plan. The location in question is between the craft shop and county park on Periwinkle Way.

The Commission heard a presentation by Public Works Director Gary Price on the proposed improvement to



the intersection of Periwinkle Way and Donax. Price presented a plan similar to that submitted by City Traffic Consultant Robert Hubenette, with changes incorporated to ensure all construction will be on the south side of the road. The proposed improvements will widen Periwinkle and incorporate a right-lane turn onto Donax. Price said the final improvement plans will be ready in about six weeks and construction is slated to begin in mid-July.

The Commission agreed to meet only once during May, on the fourteenth, as the second meeting was scheduled for Memorial Day.

Chairman Ann Winterbotham asked the CLUP clarification committee to explore the issue of contiguous lots on the Island and to also consider the elimination of the 50 percent extension of commercial property provision in the plan. Ms. Winterbotham also asked the Committee to consider putting a termination date on some areas now considered commercial under the plan's "lawfully existing use" provision.



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

The Story of a Purposeful

Man

A small boy, born in Kansas City, Missouri but brought up in Kenmore, upper New York State, grew up and matured more quickly than most of his con temporaries. After 30-odd years of having lived a highly adventurous life, he and his family settled down on our Islands in 1955. Since then, he has enjoyed 20-odd years of an entirely different kind of an adventurous life.


If you happen to be a patron of the Grog Shop in the Island Shopping Center, for purely medicinal purposes, of course, or because you know the current manager and just want to say hello to an old friend, you will recognize who we are talking about. David B. Wooster, to be exact. He's on hand there most of the time.

This outstanding citizen is a tall, good-looking man with a rugged face, wise blue eyes, and a sweet smile. His host of old friends, and new friends, might appreciate a mini-biography about him and his various lifestyles. It's rather a unique story.

Dave joined the Navy right after graduating from High School, was sent to take an advanced educational course in engineering at the University of Kansas, and then assigned for duty on the U.S.S. West Point during World War II. This Navy high speed transport ship, which never traveled in convoy, went around the world three times, according to Dave. There were 15 Pacific crossings, 41 Atlantic crossings, and 463,000 nautical miles clocked off. The S.S. West Point was often shot at but never hit.

Our Police Chief, John Butler, also served on the same ship and he and Dave knew one another but it was a huge transport. Dave was in the engineering department and John was a member of the gun crew. They didn't have much time to discuss the situation over a cup of coffee.

After the war, Dave lived in Ft. Wayne, Indiana, where he took additional courses in electronics and

This was before the Coast Guard became officially in charge of this operation.

Dave took the doc's advice, to a point, and gave the business to his son and two sons-in-law, Don DuBrasky and Michael Ford. It is now being run by the "boys" and Michael's father, Dick, who retired from the firm he purchased from Dave in Ft. Wayne and is presently part-owner of the business here. In 1976 Dave went to Seattle, Washington for a retrial of a 1969 murder case. He had been divorced from the children's mother for some time and while in Seattle he met a charming gal originally from Ontario, Mary O'Mara. Mary has an interesting and varied background, too. They were married by Father Madden here in Sanibel in 1977 and are extremely happy together. Mr. and Mrs. Wooster work side by side.

The hero of this story naturally couldn't retire. He took on the job of managing the Grog Shop a couple of years ago, not following his doctor's orders after all. He's in great shape these days but is not what you'd call "taking it easy." It's a tough assignment. Dave helped found the American Legion on the Islands, is a charter member of the Shriners, and has been a member of the Board of Compliance of Appeals for many years. He's done a lot of other things, too.

He cited two recent Supreme Court decisions which will result in some curtailment of writing and attitudes of newsgathering persons.



"Goodturn for Goodwill"

Saturday, April 28, Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts and Explorers in Collier, Lee and Charlotte Counties will open their annual drive for Goodwill. Goodwill Industries of Southwest Florida, headquartered at 199 Bayshore Road in North Fort Myers, provides employment and vocational rehabilitation to the handicapped in the three-county area. Ninety percent of Goodwill's operational costs are raised from the sale of used clothing and other





discarded items which handicapped workers repair and recondition. These activities provide the handicapped with opportunities for job training, employment and personal growth.

The annual "Goodturn for Goodwill" is an official activity of the Southwest Florida Council, Boy Scouts of America, and is a long-standing tradition in area Scouting. It reinforces the Scouting concept of helping others and increases awareness of the needs and capabilities of handicapped persons.

The two-part project begins April 28 when Scouts distribute paper Goodwill bags in their assigned neighborhood zones. The boys ask residents to fill the bags with usable discards, such as clothing and small repairable items. The following Saturday, May 5 "Goodturn Day" - Scouts return to the same houses to pick up filled bags and take them to collection points. The bags are then transported to the Goodwill Rehabilitation Center. Last year 4,700 filled bags were collected. The Scouts drive fills a critical need, coming at a time of year when donations are generally at a low level.

"STRAWBERRIES-----UPICKUM. 35 cents a pound" read the signs sprouting along roadsides these past weeks. It's time for the berries.

The queenly strawberry is the caviar of the fruit world. It may be more difficult to grow than other fruits and requires more care, but far and away the strawberry is regarded as "the most."

One fine day recently, we took a portion of our tribe to "pick our own." That particular strawberry field may never be quite the same.

If we were a family of migrant workers who followed the crops and our children worked with the harvest, they might not have shown the same glee ours did when let loose in the fields

The scene was like the clown car that opens at the circusand out spews what seem to be thousands of clowns.

Our family took over the place. Each grabbed a picking basket and tore out to harvest the crop.

When my editor asked why I hadn't brought my camera to take pictures of the berry plants, or take pictures of the children picking the berries, I could only apologize for my inefficiency. Secretly I thought over the futility of protecting my prize camera while also protecting the farmers' fields. After all, there had to be something left for the rest of the folks to pick.

We started out with a few basic instructions:

No berries with worms, rotten spots or green ones. Don't throw strawberries at each other, and try not to step on any plants. Yes, you may eat some berries, but please try

Do you have any idea how many berries eight children can pick in one hour? If they were being paid an hourly rate they could have put themselves through college in just one hour's work.

Only once before did we try to pick our own anything as a family. That was several years ago in upper New York state, when we went apple picking in the "glorious fall crisp weather."

We returned home with seven bushels of apples. For the entire winter and following spring we had everything from applesauce to applehead dolls.

We are now stocked with strawberries for a few weeks, at least.

Because strawberries are hardy plants and reproduce themselves quickly, I don't believe we wiped out the farmer's entire field. But it will be quite awhile before we go as a family to pick crops again.

Whenever I think of strawberries and their elegance it is usually in creamy terms: strawberries and cream, strawberry mousse, strawberry souffle.

Combine flour, baking powder and salt. Heat milk with butter just to scalding and cool slightly.

Beat eggs until foamy in small bowl with electric mixer. Add the 1 cup sugar gradually until mixture is very thick and fluffy. Add vanilla.

Sprinkle flour mixture a third at a time over eggs, alternating with warmed milk and beginning and ending with flour mixture. Pour into two greased and floured 8x11/2 inch cake pans or 18 inch springform pan.

Bake in 350 degree oven for 25 minutes for cake pans; 35 minutes for springform pan (or until top springs back when lightly pressed with finger tip.) Cool layers on wire rack 10 minutes; loosen around edges with knife, turn out and cool completely.

Wash, hull and slice strawberries into a large bowl, reserving a cup for decoration. Add sugar; stir lightly, and let stand about 30 minutes so some juices can develop.

Whip cream in small bowl until soft peaks form. Place one cake layer on serving plate (split cake in half if using springform pan.)

Top with half of cream and strawberries. Top with remaining cake layer and cream. Place one whole strawberry in center of cake; cut remaining strawberries in half. Arrange halved strawberries cut side up in rosette pattern over the cream.

STRAWBERRIES, BANANAS AND CREAM

Equal parts: strawberries bananas

sour cream

sugar to taste

Slice bananas and combine all ingredients in a bowl to suit the number of people eating.

Refrigerate until serving time.

This dish is so scrumptious it will usually be devoured before serving time right from the refrigerator.

If it survives until serving time, it is very festive-looking served in a melon half and garnished with a fresh strawberry on the top.

STRAWBERRY CHEESE

1 pt. strawberries (washed, hulled and dried)


1 lb. cream cheese

1/2 cup sugar

Soften cream cheese by putting in bowl of electric mixer and beating. Add strawberries and sugar. Beat until well blended and pack into a decorative mold or roll in chopped almonds or walnuts.

Decorate with fresh strawberries and mint or rose leaves when serving. Good for a different cheese board choice at a party.





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

Canada candidly

As some of you know, we are gearing up for a Federal election on May 22. For what it's worth, my prediction is that the Tories will get in with a minority government. The polls now have them and the Liberals running neck and neck but the only poll that counts is the one on May 22. Trudeau is pushing national unity while Joe Clark is promising higher employment and a reduction of inflation on his platform. Promises, promises!

south seas announces Villas completion



shelling tips

Coquinas and jingle shells are simple little shells which are found on all Sanibel and Captiva Island beaches. These shells are the most often looked over by most people, but to the first time sheller and the most accomplished collector, the shells are the best for decorative work.

Jingle shells are often thought to be fish scales. They are light, circular shells which come in gold, black, brown and other colors. They grow on other shells on the bottom of the Gulf and it's a rare time when the sheller can find both sides of the jingle shell in tact.

Some shellers have tried to string jingle shells and make wind chimes, but our local shells don't really have the hardness to make a good use in this way. What the jingles do provide is a great back ground for your more colorful shells. One of the most popular ways to display jingle shells in in one of those tall, clear bottles with a large cork on the end. If you are really careful, you can eventually find enough jingles of a single color to fill these containers.

The lowly coquina shells are easily found alive in the surf line. It seems

that everything on the shore, in the air and in the water likes to feed on these small shells. Wading birds often search the surf for them. Look for the already dead coquinas. These allow you to look at the inside of the shell for any particulary interesting patterns of colors.

The coquina makes a fine border shell for lamps, mirrors and just about anything which requires small, bright colored shells. They come in so many variations of colors that I won't even list them, but all the shells are easy to find and make a fine starting place for the novice sheller.

It is possible to make soup from the live coquina shells gathered in the surf and carefully prepared. It's said that it takes six quarts of live coquinas to make about one quart of broth soup. I have to say now that although I am not a gourmet chef, without a doubt, coquina soup is the worst I've ever tasted.

Good luck out on the beaches this week and look for jingles and coquinas high on the surf line. They are light shells and are pushed far upon the beaches.



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



auto accident sends two to hospital

Prior to being taken to Cape Coral Hospital by Air-4 helicopter, two injured automobile passengers were administered first aid by an **Emergency Medical Team.**






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
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
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
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
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
