


# suspect arrested for pat horn's murder

A 24-year-old shrimper arrested June 29 on sexual attery charges has also been charged with the first egree murder of Fort Myers Beach resident Patti Horn. Sources close to the investigation say the shrimper confessed to the murder last Friday during a lengthy interrogation by Lee County Sheriff's Department officials

Frank Allen Shoemaker, a short, softspoken man from Baltimore, Md., was arrested by law enforcement officials after being matched to the description of a man who brutally beat and sexually attacked a 17-year-old Fort Myers Beach woman the night of June 28. The woman, whose name is being witheld, later identified Shoemaker as her assailant from a police lineup.


According to the woman, she had been approached in the parking lot of Casey's Tavern by a man to whom she had been introduced earlier in the day only "Frank." Officials place the time as aproximately 11:30 p.m. and say the man requested a de from the young woman to the downtown area of Beach. Once inside the car the man then allegedly equested he be taken to the S & H shrimp docks. The woman complied, whereupon she claims the man then began to beat and strangle her, demanding she engage in sexual acts with him. According to the woman, she began to fight and the man told her he was going to "kill her" Beaten nearly unconscious, she eventually submitted to the man's demands. Later, according to her report, the woman was driven in her car by the assailant to another area of the docks near the new Fort Myers Beach bridge. After threatening her not to tell anyone about the incident, the man then fled on foot. The woman returned to her parents' home, whereupon law enforcement officials were contacted.

According to Capt. Dan Schmitt of the Lee County Criminal Investigation Department, the young woman had "been worked over pretty good." She sustained numerous bruises to her face and had strangulation marks on her throat.

# public properties recommendations meet with mixed response

Recommendations made by the Public Properties Committee for use of the "Algiers" and "Causeway" parcels may not be exactly what voters had in mind when they mandated the \$3 million purchase last November, but one thing is sure - if the recommendations for either parcel are approved, the City will have a new government complex.

In a special election held last fall, Sanibel voters approved City attempts to purchase the 30 acre Brown property, where the steamboat Alglers has been land-locked for the past 20 years, and the 28 acre Hoffman property which straddles the entrance to Sanibel.

A committee established to study the possible purchase before the election recommended the City purchase the properties to avoid possible subdivision. or shopping complex development on the sites. That committee recommended low intensity use for both parcels, including possible bike paths, nature trails, wildlife refuge, beach access, a vegetation nursery, and for the Causeway property - limited access parking for a possible future mass transit system.

After the successful vote was taken, City officials set the wheels in motion for obtaining the necessary loans through Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) for purchase of the properties, and also established a new Property Committee to recommend use of the land. Before the final loan closing, the FmHA must have an outline of proposed City property uses in their possession.

Last week, in a joint Planning Commission-City Council workshop, the Public Properties Committee's final recommendations were reviewed. Recommendations for the Causeway parcel included a small City park, a nature trail, a pedestrian walkway under the Causeway from one side of the property to the other, an extended bike path, a parking area for future mass transit, and the development of a City government complex, which might include administrative offices, and a City Hall.

Suggestions for use of the Algiers property also included renovation of the steamboat to serve as "temporary" quarters for City personnel. Other Committee suggestions, presented to the workshop by committeeman Conrad Lickel, were limiting parking and vehicular access to the property, installing nature trails, a bike path, beach access, restrooms, and a picnic

Workshop response to the Committee's suggestions was mixed. Several persons objected to the use of the steamboat Algiers as even a temporary house for City offices. Commissioner Betty Robinson vehemently opposed the proposed City

workshop he was "not yet ready to recommend" City use of the Algiers, but he thought the "City should look at it and look very hard at it." White told those present that the City currently pays approximately \$38,000 a year rent for their shopping center offices, and with \$50,000 worth of improvements to the Algiers, the City would have offices "virtually rent free for three or four years," while a permanent complex was being constructed elsewhere.


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


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# Permit conditions expected next week

Special conditions for an Army Corps of Engineers wetland development permit have been drafted by about 50 participants in earlier Corps workshops and are now in the hands of Col. James R. Adams, who is expected to issue a public notice sometime in the next week.

The proposed general permit, if issued, would substantially cut down on the time and paperwork currently involved in obtaining permission for development in Sanibel's interior wetlands. The permitting process currently requires approval from both the Corps and the City. The issuance of a general permit, where minimal environmental impact is expected, would avoid the paperwork now involved in dual development application. If an applicant were approved by the City, they would automatically be approved by the Corps under the general permit plan.

Sanibel's Comprehensive Land Use Plan, environmentally aware citizens, and lengthy review and permitting procedures, have been cited by Corps spokesmen as positive factors for issuing a general permit. Under a general permit, the Corps would no longer administer certain specific development applications but would still ultimately remain responsible for the wetland development.

According to Capt. Paul Munch, "It appears that the Col. (Adams) will issue a public notice on the general permit, but not before next week."

If Adams issues a public notice, an automatic 30-day comment and review period will follow. If Adams does not issue a public notice then the general permit proposal goes no further. There is no legal requirement for a public hearing although Adams may call for one at the end of the 30 day review

period. It is also up to his discretion to extend the 30-day period if he deems necessary.

At the end of the review period Adams can then either issue or deny the general permit. If he chooses to issue the permit it will go into effect the day he signs it.

Participants in the development of the proposed general permit conditions also leaned heavily in favor of the City administering the permit, according to Corps spokesmen. The administration process of a joint City-Corps development permit has not yet been determined.

Steve Brylinsky, Sanibel - "I think that the City Hall should be concentrated. The best place would be on the causeway property. Leave the Algiers



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
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# Commissioners discuss Beach improvement ideas

The outcry by many residents for increased law enforcement on Fort Myers Beach has been always answered in the past with the complaint from the Lee County Sheriff's Department that a funds' shortage prohibits assigning more deputies to the Beach.

Last year, during a months-long battle with the Lee County Commission. Sheriff Frank Wanicka won his case to have the county appropriate more money for his department by taking his case to the Florida Cabinet. The Cabinet awarded Wanicka an additional \$108,571 to the 8.9 percent budget increase that previously had been approved by the county commission.

And so, instead of allowing the Sheriff's Department to increase its budget once again this year, three Lee County Commissioners say that may not be necessary, at least as far as improving law enforcement on the Beach. Instead, to help cool the cries of Beach residents, alternative methods to improve the area are being discussed.

Each year during budget hearings the Commissioners are faced with a paradox: residents continually plead with the commission to ease the tax burden, while people, Rodda said. demanding more and improved services. demands lead to a no win situation.

### IWA takes steps against illegal taps


During the routine installation of water meters, the Island Water Association (IWA) has discovered an unusually high number of unauthorized water connections to its water system.

The unauthorized connections are being installed during construction, according to IWA Engineer Ian Watson, and have been found on construction sites of both single and multifamily dwellings.

The IWA Board of Directors has decided to utilize the following procedure in the event of the discovery of an unauthorized tap:

- 1. Report the illegal tap to the property owner.
- 2. Determine the identity of the plumber or plumbing contractor who did the tap.
- 3. Contact the Lee County Health Department with the facts and request their assistance with the next step:
- 4. To obtain the suspension or revocation of the contractor's competency card by the county contractors' board.
- 5. Suspend service, if necessary, to the property owner until full

It was Tuesday night, June 26. Making his usual appearance at Casey's, Bill decided to ask about the short, slender man he had seen approach the blonde in the Mustang three nights ago. He offered a description around the bar, telling people he owed the short man money from a pool game. The name he kept getting was "Franky," and the comments on him were not good. "Weird," said one. "Antisocial," said another. "A loner," said the third. One outspoken woman in particular put it quite bluntly; "That son of a bitch better stay away from me," she said. "I'll kill him." But she, refused to expound further.

On Thursday, June 28, Bill was invited to Patti's parents' house for dinner. He decided to go. It would be good to break the tedium of the Casey's stake out. He couldn't have known thata by going to her family's home for dinner he would miss seeing a young girl be approached by a man in Casey's parking lot. A man who would ask the girl for a ride, and who, when she complied would have her drive him to the shrimp docks where Patti Horn had

been murdered.


If Bill had seen a young girl pick up a man in the parking lot, he probably would have followed, the same way he had followed others before. If he had, he would have seen the man who had gotten the lift to the docks begin to strike the young girl in the parked car in the face. He would have seen him try to strangle her in much the same way that had left throttle marks on the neck of Patti Horn. But instead he went out to dinner and the next day, exactly one month from the day Patti's body was found floating in the bay, he received a phone call telling him that a shrimper named Frank Shoemaker had been arrested and charged with the first degree murder of Patricia Horn.

Paul Howe, Sanibel's original "curmudgeon - in residence" said, "To hell with all this winter stuff" back in Pittsburg, circa 1969, moved to Sanibel, bought a straw hat at Bailey's for \$2.50, and retired to partake of his favorite hobby "sitting on the sidelines throwing darts". And local politics have not been the same since.

A former affiliate of the Army Corps of Engineers. the Department of Housing and Urban Development, and the Roosevelt New Deal Program (WPA), Howe has been running with the big boys for a long time. "Some people we have in government are good," he says," and others are bad. They need dedication-like priests - it needs to be a vocation, not just a job. To too many people it's just a 9 to 5 job.'

Howe serves as the Devil's Advocate for Sanibel's fledgling municipal government, attending most of

the City Council, Planning Commission, and Committee meetings. "I attend the meetings," he says, "to cajole them to do some good. You can't force

Howe's strongest tools in his curmudgeon trade are his grasp of the myriad state, county, and municipal laws, his refusal to become apathetic, and his strong belief in the system. He believes that you find true wisdom "in a whiskey bottle or the U.S. Constitution," and that the force of logic conquers all. "It's easier to be factual," he maintains. "It keeps you out of a lot of arguments."

Paul strongly believes that "you have to retire to something - not from something," and his retirement days are filled with the "somethings" time never allowed for during the career years. Shelling, gar-

dening, writing letters to papers and politico's, softball games, and recruiting new shakers and movers to the growing curmudgeon crowd, keep Paul inspired and involved. "This Island," he says, "has the greatest talent bank in the world, but it's not being harnessed. I feel a person has to have a mental hobby as well as a physical one. So many people come down here and play golf and their minds waste away. I go to all these meetings partly because I'm acting selfishly to keep my mind active so it doesn't go to seed."

In these ill-tempered, apathetic times Paul Howe's oratorical light shines like a beacon from his position as protector of the rights of the people. "I respect laws," he says. "Every civilized society has laws, even primitive societies have taboos - taboo is law. I want to live in a civilized community - a lot of people here want to live in a civilized jungle."

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
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
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# wainright announces retirement

Joining him in retirement is his wife Peggy, who, for two years, has been the media specialist at the local school.

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

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
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# refuge report

Pier fishermen at the lighthouse point have been witnessing some unbelievable rudeness from nearby boat fishermen. Although tens of thousands of acres of water are available nearby, some boat fishermen choose to anchor near the pier and let their lines mingle with the pier fishermen's lines. One "sportsman" was observed to cast his bait to within 20 feet of where a surf fisherman was standing. We receive complaints about this sort of activity and observe it ourselves but cannot do much about it. It is not illegal to be

Considerable activity is taking place on the Gasparilla's Trail at the end of the wildlife drive. YCC and refuge crews are trying to eliminate the Brazilian pepper from the vicinity of the trail and it has become a major project. We hope that by the end of the rainy season this fall, the pepper will be all removed and nature will have healed most of the scars we have caused.

We are also doing some brush control work on the Bailey Tract west of the Mangrove Head Pond. We hope to

eventually turn that area into shallow marsh interspersed with grass uplands and scattered clumps of native trees and shrubs

Our YACC program, which never really got going, is about to become defunct. Our single enrollee, Rick Mowry, will be terminated this week because his one year enrollment period has ended. Our YACC group leader, Leroy Wynn, has received notice that his job will no longer exist after July 13. There is a freeze on hiring new enrollees and even if it were lifted, we would have a ceiling of one.

We have submitted a Management Plan to our area office recently. If it is approved, we will be expecting to burn some of the refuge upland this fall. The main goals of a burning program are to eliminate accumulations of fuel so that uncontrolled wildfire will be less of a hazard, create diversity in habitat and help in the control of Brazilian pepper and Australian pine.

### refuge featured in new guide

Florida's J.N. "Ding" Darling National Refuge is featured in a new book, Guide to the National Wildlife Refuges, being published by Anchor Press-Doubleday in July.
